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Sewing was necessary; and now highly collectible

In our ready-to-wear world, sewing is often regarded as merely a quaint curiosity, a nearly forgotten homemaking art. Many high school "home ec" veterans equate "sewing" with painful memories of creating something drab, baggy, and only passably grade worthy. When class was over, needle-and-thread disappeared into oblivion.

But, once upon a time sewing was a necessity, a mainstay of the harried housewife's daily "to do" list. As the 1947 edition of the "Singer Dressmaking Guide" noted:

"Since time immemorial, sewing has been the special field of expression for women. Down through the ages, the advance of sewing has marked the progress of the world, as definitely as rings mark the age of the tree."

Of course, Singer had a vested interest in championing this "special field of expression". The company's 1851 introduction of the first sewing machine for practical home use helped alleviate centuries of hand-sewing tedium.

How long have there been sewing accessories? Well, how long have folks been wearing clothes? "Bodkins" (stone "needles"), discovered in French cave dwellings, have been reliably dated to the 15th century B.C. Bronze thimbles have been traced back to 3000 B.C. The real glory days of sewing accessories, however, had to wait until the 19th century, when mass production made them readily available to all classes.

Although the purpose of sewing paraphernalia was always a practical one — these were, after all, items intended for use - the degree of decoration was dependent on who was doing the actual sewing. Ordinary folk, sewing only for their own family, hiring out mending services, or providing piecework for sale, had the plainest tools. A wealthy household might indulge in more elaborate sewing accessories, for use by lady's maids. The most elaborate sewing utensils were reserved for use by the ladies themselves - those for whom sewing was a genteel art, rather than a requirement of everyday life. A prized gift in these circles was an etui, a decorative box filled with exquisitely realized sewing accessories.

What constitutes a collectible sewing accessory? Well, for starters, thimbles and thimble holders. You've seen brass ones, you've seen pewter ones, you may even have seen a silver one, but thim-

bles weren't always fashioned of metal. Literally any substance that could adequately perform a thimble's main purpose — pushing a needle through material — could be fashioned into a thimble. There have been wood thimbles, plastic thimbles, and china or porcelain thimbles, as well as less practical options, such as glass and mother-of-pearl thimbles. Among the most durable: the "Dorcas" thimble, dating from 1884. Its silvery surface concealed a steel core, the reason the Dorcas was "guaranteed for a lifetime".

Naturally, all those thimbles called for thimble holders, and here imagination ran rampant. Some portrayed classical or pastoral figures, while others were issued as souvenirs of specific occasions: a thimble holder from the 1898 Omaha Exposition, created from shell, depicts a boy in a sailboat. Among the most-sought-after and pricey: thimble holders made of "vegetable ivory" (corozo nut), a sturdy, wood-like material that could be carved into a myriad of desirable shapes. If the thimble was

an expensive one, its holder invariably followed suit.

Also ubiquitous in the sewing realm: pincushions. There are pincushions held by ceramic children, metal and wood pincushion shoes, beadwork pincushions and fashionable ladies boasting pincushion skirts.

Designed as they were for a humdrum task, there's little variation in pins themselves, other than those with ornamental heads, intended for exterior decoration. However, advertising "pinwheels" stocked with a full complement of pins can be quite valuable. Never intended for longevity, nowadays they're in short supply. A 2 ¼ inch pinwheel of the 1920s, heralding the "Burpee Manure Spreader", and given to the lucky housewife whose husband purchased one, now commands over \$300.

Also issued in abundance: needlekeepers, (a velvet-covered Victorian version came complete with an interior

Need for a screwdriver led to Swiss Army Knife

The Swiss Army Knife, that veritable toolbox-in-your-pocket, is a global icon, representative of Swiss ingenuity, design and craftsmanship. "The Little Red Knife," of which there are hundreds of designs and many millions made and in use, has been on epic journeys to the North Pole, the Amazon, the top of Mount Everest, and into space.

For generations, people have relied on the knives for tinkering, outdoor pursuits, and even for building houses. Swiss Army Knives have played roles in a seemingly endless variety of adventures, from rescues and other emergencies to repairing broken-down vehicles in remote tracts of desert or tundra.

It's strange to think that bright, tidy, efficient and wealthy Switzerland was once one of the poorest European countries in the 19th century. At this time, many Swiss emigrated due to the weak state of the economy and the high unemployment rate.

It was in this economic climate that Karl Elsener founded a cutlery workshop in Ibach in the Canton of Schwyz in 1884, and began producing goods for local consumption. In 1889, the Swiss Army adopted a new standard-issue weapon, the Schmidt-Rubin M1889 service rifle. A slotted screwdriver - a tool which was impractical for soldiers to carry - was required to break down and reassemble the gun.

Elsener consulted with the military in 1890 about designing a rugged, compact implement which would fulfill several functions required by soldiers in the field, including the maintenance of the Schmidt-Rubin rifle. Within a year, Elsener presented the prototype of the Schweizer Offiziersmesser ("Swiss Officer's Knife").

Besides the blade and screwdriver, this

experimental model had a can-opener for opening tins of rations, and a reamer (which had a multitude of uses). The scales (handles) were made of oak (subsequently changed to a fiber material which resisted chipping and cracking). Elsener exceeded the military's expectations, and in 1891 he began provisioning the army with the knife, known as the Model 1890.

The initial batch was manufactured by Wester & Co, a cutlery maker in Solingen, Germany, as no Swiss firm had the production capacity to satisfy the numbers demanded by the army. Elsener persevered in laboring to build Swiss production power to rival that of Germany's, going broke in the process and taking loans from relatives in order to avoid bankruptcy. Elsener also initiated the establishment of the Swiss Cutlers' Association, an enterprise intended to create jobs and facilitate the provisioning of the Swiss Army with knives.

Elsener worked to improve the Model 1890, and had a breakthrough: He developed a two-spring design which allowed the fitting of tools to both sides of the knife (the Model 1890s implements all opened from one side). This increased its potential number of features. The new knife had six tools, but was also lighter than the previous model.

Elsener registered his new creation, named the Officer's and Sports Knife, on June 12, 1897. Even though the Swiss Army didn't contract to make the 1897 model its new standard-issue knife, Elsener's latest design was so well made and became so popular that soldiers simply bought them for themselves.

Elsener's mother Victoria had been supportive of her son's aspirations, and when she died in 1909, he adopted the brand name 'Victoria" for his knives in her honor. At this time, Elsener also registered the emblem of a

Swiss Cross on a shield as a trademark. Elsener had competition in the form of Theo Wenger.

Wenger has its origins with the Paul

Boéchat & Cie Cutlery Works, established in 1893 at Courtetelle. As they had with Elsen-

Anti-counterfeiting task force investigating coins sold on Amazon

Acting on a tip from a concerned collector, the Anti-Counterfeiting Educational Foundation's (www.ACEFonline.org) Anti-Counterfeiting Task Force (ACTF) has notified law enforcement agencies and online shopping platform Amazon.com about a seller who is in apparent violation of federal laws involving reproductions of rare coins.

The seller using the name SeTing offered nine reproductions of coins and fantasy dates, but none of the accompanying coin images indicated any of the items were properly marked "COPY" as mandated by the Hobby Protection Act.

The offered items included replicas of a 1794 Flowing Hair dollar, an 1804 Draped Bust dollar and a 1915 Indian Head Quarter Eagle (\$5). There was also a fantasy piece resembling a Trade Dollar but with the date 1791 and a Carson City mint mark that was identified by the seller as "Old Original Morgan Dollar." Genuine U.S. Trade Dollars were struck from 1873 to 1885 and Morgan silver dollars were produced between 1878 and 1921.

bers of the American Numismatic Association Board of Governors, some former ANA officers, the United States Mint and to several numismatic publications and numismatic information websites. ANA Past President Gary Adkins forwarded the email complaint to former Texas Police Chief Doug Davis, ACEF Director of Anti-Counterfeiting.

to the appropriate federal agencies and Amazon," said Davis.

"ACTF currently monitors over 200 websites and social media platforms selling counterfeit coins and precious metals across the country and around the world.

Foundation is aggressively seeking legislation on the state level to provide local law enforcement officers with statutes seeking criminal penalties for the possession, manufacture and distribution of counterfeit coins and precious metals," said ACEF Executive Director Robert Brueggeman. "However, to address these problems requires the support of the numismatic community. The Anti-Counterfeiting Educational Foundation is a 501(c) (3) non-profit corporation that operates solely upon donations."

Prices for the "coins" ranged from \$2.99 to \$3.29 plus an additional \$3.98 shipping.

A hobbyist who saw the online listings sent a complaint about the seller to mem-

Intelligence information is forwarded to the Secret Service and Treasury Department Office of the Inspector General. ACTF also assists all levels of law enforcement in counterfeit case development for prosecution," he explained.

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
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
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

er, the Swiss government contracted with Boéchat to manufacture knives for the army. creating competition between the two firms. A business group from Delémont took over the company in 1895, renamed it Fabrique Suisse de Coutellerie SA, and built a new plant in Courtetelle.

In 1897 or 1898, the struggling business (operating in the same national economic conditions as Elsener was) brought Theo Wenger aboard as a fixer and general manager, a move which retrieved the Courtetelle factory from closure. Fabrique Suisse de Coutellerie then purchased A. Mertens, Schweizer Britanniametallwarenfabrik, a metal goods maker in Basel.

Wenger's next major step was the construction of a substantial new factory in Delémont. The project was approved in July 1899, and in 1900 the new works were established. They moved their production facilities from Courtetelle to Delémont, and before the end of the year the new factory was up and running producing tableware and other products.

By 1902 the company, now calling itself Fabrique Suisse de Coutellerie et Services" (Schweizer Besteck-Fabrik) S.A, had more than 150 employees. As Wenger wished to be based in Basel, he negotiated to have Hans Mury appointed as managing director, leaving Wenger free to focus on sales. However, this separation of manufacturing and sales caused the company to stumble. In 1907, in order to salvage Fabrique Suisse de Coutellerie, Wenger bought the business. This created the limited partnership, Wenger et Cie.

Elsener and Wenger were now in direct opposition, not only simply as the two primary Swiss cutlery makers, but both were supplying knives to the Swiss Army. In the spirit of Swiss impartiality and neutrality, the government formed a plan which would be fair to each maker, and beneficial to the economies of the Schwyz and Jura cantons. In 1908, the government split the Swiss Army Knife contract down the middle between Wenger and Victorinox.

Karl Elsener died in 1918, and his son Carl took over. In 1921, Elsener began producing the first stainless steel knives. He adopted the brand name Victorinox through a combination derived from "Victoria" and "inox," the latter an abbreviation for the French term acier inoxydable ("stainless steel"). Evolving almost in parallel, in 1922 Wenger established Wenger Co. S.A. Though Theo Wenger fell ill in 1925 and died in 1928, the company continued on under the Wenger name.

In the production of knives for commercial sale. Wenger and Victorinox continued in competition throughout the entire 20th cen-

tury. As Victorinox was first, they were able to assume the slogan "The Original Swiss Army Knife." However, Wenger's knives were also authentic, enabling them to take on the motto, "The Genuine Swiss Army Knife.'

The commercial rivalry continued past the century mark, with each company noted for its extraordinary innovations and world-class quality. But in 2005, Wenger became a subsidiary of Victorinox; and on Jan. 30, 2013 Wenger knives merged with Victorinox knives. While the Wenger factory in Delémont has continued production, and some Wenger items were carried over into the Victorinox line, all Swiss Army knives are now made under the Victorinox name. Wenger continues to produce watches and other products under the Wenger brand. Victorinox is headed by Karl Elsener's great-grandson, Carl Elsener Jr.

There seems no end to these Swiss makers' inventiveness in fitting knives with new tools. Past decades saw the introduction of wood saws, hack saws, tweezers, magnifying glasses, toothpicks and more, all concealed in a pocketknife. More recent inclusions have been various LED lights, a variety of pliers, compasses, ballpoint pens, clocks, an altimeter, USB memory sticks and MP3 players.

Beloved the world over for its durability, quality and endless usefulness, the Swiss Army Knife's design is recognized by the Munich State Museum of Applied Art and the New York Museum of Modern Art.

The two most iconic types of Swiss Army knives are those with plastic-like red celluloid scales, and those known as Alox which have aluminum scales. The celluloid knives especially are famous for the Swiss Cross logos on their handles. The Victorinox Swiss emblem is usually in the shape of a shield, while the Wenger insignia most often takes the form of a square with rounded corners. Many of the Victorinox emblems are of metal inlay. The makers' distinctive types of crosses provide the most immediate way of recog-

nizing a knife as a Victorinox or a Wenger.

When combing auctions and sales of Swiss knives, keep in mind that the Victorinox knives with red celluloid scales were introduced in 1937 (those with visible rivets being pre 1961), while Victorinox knives with Alox handles first appeared in 1957. Wenger used red nylon scales on its knives from 1951 to the early '70s, and in the early '60s introduced its models with Alox handles. Pre-1954 Wenger and Victorinox Swiss soldier knives sell for from about \$100 to more than \$1000, with those from the 1890s (especially oak-handled examples) having the highest values.

In recent auctions of vintage Victorinox knives, an example of the Automobile/Mo-

torist model with St. Christopher (the patron saint of travelers) inlay realized \$110, while a Luxury Automobile variation (with more tools than the standard model) fell under the hammer for \$250. Of Victorinox Alox knives, a Voyageur closed for \$283, a Pioneer sold for \$193, and a model 1961 Soldier went for \$120. In recent auctions of vintage Wenger knives, a 1950 Soldier model went for \$139, a 1950s model 927 sold for \$200, and a 1960s Monarch auctioned for \$174.

Many examples of vintage Victorinox and Wenger knives auction for much less than the values reported above, so even those on a tight budget can start a collection of these top-quality Swiss gems.

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Chalkware art bust is Italian Renaissance man not Native American

Q I inherited a chalk art piece that is an unusual native American bust. I love the patina and the years of wear as well as the family history connected to it. Although I am certain it is a carnival art piece, I was told that it was a 1920s purchase from a now defunct Midwest store. Can you direct me to any sources where I can determine the history and origin of the piece and its value?

A I can do better than that. I can answer all your questions for you. The bust dates from the 1910s or 1920s. It is definitely not carnival chalkware.

When I first received your email, my thoughts immediately turned to the elaborate painted chalkware cigar store Indian busts of warriors and maidens that were produced at the end of the 19th and early 20th century. I have seen several of these during my antiques and collectibles travels and confess I had to use all my will power not to acquire one for my collections.


When I inspected the pictures, I noticed "TES" on the left shoulder of the bust. The old phrase "haste makes waste" applied, a situation that resulted in a "dumb me" moment ten minutes later. I immediately did a "chalkware Indian bust" search on WorthPoint.com. After examining more than 700 images, I found nothing closely resembling your "Native American" head.

I returned to the images and took another look. A light bulb moment suggested that the bust was not that of a Native American but rather an Italian Renaissance figure. It took several additional searches but eventually I identified the subject of the bust – Dante.

It is time for the "dumb me" moment. If there is a "TES" on the right shoulder, there should be a "DAN" on the right. Although not evident at first glance when looking at the photograph on the bust, closer examination reveals its presence. A Worth-Point.com search of "Chalkware Bust Dantes" turned up listings for several identical examples.

Your photographs were helpful in a second way. They revealed the condition of your Dantes statue. It is in poor condition. Large sections of the period paint are missing. It is scratched in some sections. Its appeal is its sentimental value to you. It has no resale value because of its condition.

Although examples do not appear regularly on internet sale sites such as Ebay, they appear often enough that any buyer with patience who wishes to add one of these Dantes chalkware



busts in very good or better condition to his/her collection can do so for less than \$50.

I believe I own a pipe rack used to peddle clay pipes. When collapsed it looks like a toolbox, that is to say it folds up into first tier and then a second tier as an antique high-chair did. What can you tell me about it?



A It most likely dates from the early 20th century, albeit it is not clear if it is a commercial or handmade example.

If your folding pipe racks dates from the late 19th or early 20th century, its value is around \$100. If it is a 1920s or later Colonial Revival piece, the value diminishes to between \$20 and \$25..

I have a metal scissors-like device. One arm ends in a round tube circle. The other with a small blade like cutter that closes over the tube to nip something. It measures 2 1/4-inches by 1 1/2-inches. I could find no markings on it. What do I have?

A You have a scissors-type cigar cutter that was used to open up the head of the cigar to allow it to draw.

The first cigar cutters date from the late 1860s. Within a decade, the cigar cutter evolved into a knife-like device. By 1900, most male cigar smokers owned one or more cigar cutters. Many attached them to the end of a watch



chain or kept them in a trouser or vest pocket.

Your cigar cutter closely resembles a cigar cutter made by GCW of Germany at the end of the 19th or early 20th century.

Your cigar cutter needs a good cleaning. Because it is unmarked, its secondary market, retail value is between \$25 and \$35.

I want to sell some of the stamps in my collection. I have mostly blocks of four United States stamps from the 1960s and 1970s. I could group them and look them up in the Scott references. However, I recognize these are lower value stamps. Are there selling choices? – TM, Email Question

A Do not waste your time looking up your stamps in the Scott catalogs. First, the values are retail and not wholesale. Second, the Scott prices, especially for recent issues, are what dealers ask but not what they get.

Plate blocks are a glut on the market. Most sell for a dollar or less. Any money above the face value of the stamps in the plate block is a bonus. There are a few plate blocks that appeal to crossover collectors, for example, the American Revolutionary War commemorative stamps from 1976, albeit most crossover collectors who want an example already own one.

Do not attempt to sell the plate blocks individually. Rather group

Institute of Antiques them in lots of 15 to 25. The good news is that the cost to ship them to a successful buyer is minimal.

When I encounter 1960s sheets (panes) and blocks of stamps, my suggestion to clients is to use them. The face value of unused stamps never goes away. My own rule when I buy these stamps is to never pay more than 70 percent of the face value of the stamps. This is lower than the more traditional 85 to 80 percent of face value dealers charge, but as my readers are aware, I am a cheap buyer.

spools. Holes were drilled in the front of the box, through which desired threads were, well, threaded.

Sewing boxes, kits, and chests are among the most varied sewing collectibles. You might find a wooden shoe serving as a memento of the 1933-34 Chicago World's Fair; a plastic box marked "Pins 'n Things" or an elegant red velvet fitted sewing box from 1860 complete with a porcelain cameo accent piece on its cover. Inside: a velvet-lined interior, an oval mirror, and metal sewing accessories with finely carved handles.

The 20th century saw the advent of a new batch of sewing collectibles, including catalog advertisements, instructional booklets, and sewing patterns. Judging by the colorful illustrations on the packet exteriors of patterns issued by Butterick, McCall's, Simplicity, and their cohorts, sewing perfection was just a needle-and-thread away. Judging by the number of unopened vintage patterns available at today's yard sales, the path to actually sewing up that perfection was perhaps more challenging than anticipated.

Less often seen, but collectible for their rarity: finger guards (a "cut-away" thimble); "peeps" (an ivory or vegetable ivory needle case, with a scenic visual seen through a tiny peephole at one end); and "nanny brooches". Concealed beneath its ornamental exterior, the nanny brooch held a variety of remedies for sewing emergencies: needles, pins, and thread.

While few collectors have enough space available to host hordes of fullscale sewing machines, there are plenty of travel and toy versions available to augment a collection. A 1907 "Travel Model" by Singer was specifically intended as a travel aid, "easily packed in a lady's traveling bag". "Junior machines" were marketed as teaching tools for youngsters, their bright case colors supplanting the traditional black.

While the box clearly stated that a Singer miniature was "Not A Toy", company promos proudly boasted that "every little girl over four years of age can set one up and sew in a jiffy":

Homemakers once spent countless hours on household chores like sewing and mending. Imaginative renditions of the necessary tools lightened their daily drudgery. Now, these basics of yesteryear's everyday life have become cherished collectibles. In many cases, they're even put to their intended uses once again, as the art of sewing is rediscovered by a new generation. As the Spool Cotton Company put it, in their 1941 booklet "Learn How", sewing "gives color and meaning to modern life."







