Value of jigsawed artwork not puzzling to collectors

Chances are good that many Americans spent an hour or two at the dining room table this winter, putting the pieces to a jigsaw together. Chances are also good that most don't know there's money to be made from certain scrambled pieces of cardboard or plywood.

The origins of jigsaw puzzles go back to the 1760s when European mapmakers pasted maps onto wood and cut them into small pieces. These puzzles were cut using a marquetry saw. John Spilsbury, an engraver and mapmaker, is credited with inventing the first jigsaw puzzle in 1767. Spilsbury used maps as his jigsaw topics and the dissected map has been a successful educational toy ever since. American children still learn geography by playing with puzzle maps of the U.S. or the world.

Spilsbury would be amazed to see the transformations of the last 250 years. Children's puzzles have moved from lessons to entertainment, showing diverse subjects like animals, nursery rhymes, and modern tales of superheroes. But the biggest surprise for the early puzzle makers would be how adults have embraced puzzling over the last century.

The first great era of jigsaw puzzles started in England and migrated to the



U.S. around 1900. By 1908 a full-blown craze was in progress in the U.S. At that time, most pieces cut exactly on the color lines. There were no transition pieces with two colors to give a clue to the connection of each piece. A sneeze or a careless move could undo an evening's work because the pieces did not interlock, And, unlike children's puzzles, the adult puzzles had no guide picture on the box. The true subject could remain a mystery until the past pieces were fitted into place.

Because wood puzzles had to be cut one piece at a time, they were expensive. A 500-piece puzzle typically cost \$5 in 1908, far beyond the means of the average worker who earned just \$50 a month back then. High society, however, embraced the new amusement.

The next few years brought two significant innovations to puzzles. First, Parker Brothers (the famous game manufacturer) introduced figure pieces into its Pastime brand puzzles. Figure pieces made puzzles a bit easier to

assemble. But the fascination of pieces shaped like dogs, birds and other recognizable objects more than offset the somewhat reduced challenge. Second, Pastimes and other brands moved to an interlocking style that reduced the risk of spilling or losing pieces. Pastime puzzles were so successful that Parker Brothers stopped making games and devoted its entire factory to puzzle production in 1909. Following this craze, puzzles continued as a regular adult diversion for the next two decades.

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Women were voting prior to the 19th Amendment

PHILADELPHIA -- The year 2020 will be remembered for many things, not the least being the commemoration (somewhat overshadowed) of the 100th anniversary of American women's suffrage. But as it happened, some of their sisters were granted the right to vote in the earliest days of the budding country. Some 144 years before the ratification of the 19th Amendment, the state constitution of New Jersey extended the right to vote to all free people, regardless of race or gender. And vote they did, only to have that privilege quashed 31 years later.

Celebrating this rather obscure point in history, the Museum of the American Revolution introduced a groundbreaking new exhibit last fall, "When Women Lost the Vote: A Revolutionary Story, 1776-1807." As no book, exhibit, or other medium has done so before, the Museum tells the story of the country's first women voters and examines the political conflicts that ensued as a result. To compensate for complications from the pandemic, the Philadelphia museum has recently introduced a virtual adaptation of this onsite exhibit, accessible on the internet and free to all.

Key elements of the onsite and virtual exhibit include the examination of how women got the vote, how that right was exercised, and how it was rescinded, only to be reclaimed in the 20th century. Telling the story are more than 150 historical objects, including numerous documents and a multitude of images, with nearly 100 collectors and institutions having contributed to the project.

Among the objects on display is the March 1776 letter from Abigail Adams to

her husband, John, in which she chides the Continental Congress to "remember the ladies." Physically on loan to the Museum, this famous centerpiece of the exhibit can be viewed in greater detail online, as every page can be read, with the folds and quality of the paper discernable. Similarly, virtual inspection reveals small tears and other signs of wear on a short gown belonging to Elizabeth "Betty" Dorn, a free Black woman. Also on exhibit is the wedding gown of Deborah Sampson, the Massachusetts woman who disguised herself as a man to fight in the Continental Army.

A lifesize tableau, now a permanent installation at the Museum, depicts women voting in New Jersey in 1801. Screened at the Philadelphia museum are two 25-minute films, first-person portrayals of two women, one an early New Jersey voter and the other, an enslaved woman who sued for (and won) her freedom. Both can be viewed online at any time. These and similar displays "present many, many opportunities to dive into juicy, meaningful topics," a reminder that these historical figures are "real living, breathing human beings," according to Adrienne Whaley, education director at the Museum.

Official documents on view include a 1790 New Jersey election statute that specifies "he or she" when referring to those franchised, thereby "positively establish[ing] that women had the right to vote,"

noted Philip Mead, chief historian and curator for the Museum. He continued that this story of early suffrage is "known but not known, virtually nothing was known about the individual stories" of those affected.

Lamps will shine bright when Moran sells Schneider collection

MONROVIA, Calif. - For 50 years, Antique Traders, a small shop at the corner of California Street and Fifth Avenue was on the lips of the most ardent collectors of American and European art glass.

"It became a destination," said Jeff Moran, president of John Moran Auctioneers. "The owner, Alan Schneider, was a native of the city. He had a passion for anything San Francisco, sports or otherwise; golf, hamburgers and art glass. What he built up in that little shop is quite a testament to his life.

But Schneider's shop didn't stay small for long. For 50 years he would keep buying adjacent buildings and ultimately owned a 12,500-square-foot store that was stuffed to the brim with Art Nouveau art glass.

Schneider became enamored with the atural themes and femininity of the Art Nouveau motifs while on a trip to Europe in 1970. He bought a few pieces of the antique art and opened his shop. He also started investing in American Art Nouveau, primar-

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

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But perhaps the most exciting of all of the online options is the opportunity to view close-up several recently discovered New Jersey poll lists dating from the early 1800s. To date, 163 women and at least four free Black men have been identified among the pool of voters. Ongoing interactive genealogical study to learn more about these everyday people continues; the public is invited to participate in this project.

Of course, for those able to visit the Museum in person, "When Women Lost the Vote" provides, from now until April 25, an extraordinary opportunity to view an assemblage of rare artifacts. Because of "enhanced health and safety protocols" and thinner crowds, this may well be "the best time to come to the museum," according to Alex McKechnie, speaking for the Museum, now open Fridays through Sundays and just steps away from Independence Hall. But for those unable to make the trip to Philadelphia,

ily Handel and Pairpoint lamps and other higher-end lamps that workers created by reverse painting the insides of the shade.

The reverse painting technique seemed to create a mood in a living room or library, particularly casting a new and novel lighting. About 20 years ago, Schneider bought his first Tiffany lamp for around \$5,000. From that point, there was no stopping Schneider.

His daughter, Kelly, recalls those early years.

"I remember those Saturdays and Sundays, with lots of doughnuts, we would hit ever estate sale, moving sale, auctions, garage sales ... anywhere he thought there might be good finds. Once he found his passion, the business just took off. He was selling lamps and art glass to people all over the world.

On July 15, 2020. Schneider died of cancer. Moran's auction house will sell around 320 handpicked lots from the 19th and 20th centuries on March 2, at noon (PST).

The single-owner sale features unique lighting in all the important decorative styles of the 20th century including Arts and Crafts. Art Nouveau and Italian mid-century. Cameo, cut and favrile glassware, both table and hanging lamps from Tiffany Studios, including a rare Tiffany "Curtain Border" ceiling fixture will be offered.

There will also be furniture accompanied by intricate silver and glass objects from around the globe. The sale will also include late 19th century sculptures by Thomas Bell (1819-1911, American) while metalware from Archibald Knox, WMF and Tudric is expected to be among the highlights of the sale.



Also available for sale will be fine-crafted European decorative objects and a selection of paintings made by California and women artists.

"In the shop he was just happy to show people world-class masterpiece art," Kelly said. "He was very particular when buying. He knew what he was looking for and if something was wrong with the piece, he wouldn't bother with it. People would enter his shop and he was always happiest showing people the various features of the object, and the craftsmanship that had to be accomplished to create the piece.


"Personally, I don't think dad liked to sell what he saw as his collection. He was a collector first; dealer, second. He had museum-quality pieces, anyone could touch the pieces who came into the store (including some of the \$60,000, \$80,000 and higher-priced lamps) and he could talk all day – and often did – about them."

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
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Value of sheet music rests in cross-over collecting appeal

Q I recently inherited a collection of piano sheet music, most dating from the 1940s. I have gone through the pile and discarded the most deteriorated sheets. I am down to slightly over 77 individual

pieces of sheet music and about 25 books of piano music. A sampling of the sheets includes Stephen Foster's "I Dream of Jeanie," the cover of which features a photograph of a young Dale Evans, "A



Dream" by J. C. Bartlett with a romantic image of a woman with her head on a pillow; "Just A Baby's Prayer at Twilight;" and, "Winter Wonderland" with a cover photograph of Don Bestor (orches-

tra leader). The latter song was a featured song by Billie Burke in the Ziegfeld Follies. I did some research and am amazed at the dollar amounts asked for some sheet music. What advice can you





provide as to the value of my collection?

A There are two non-collecting issues that frame this answer. First, the sale of homebased pianos has been steadily decreasing as fewer and fewer individuals wish to learn to play the piano. Second, the secondary antiques and collectibles market is flooded with used pianos, most of which never find a buyer.

Your books of piano music have little monetary value, at best a dollar. My recommendation is to contact a local piano teacher, assuming there still is one in your area, and offer to give the books to the person free of charge for distribution to his/her students. Do not be surprised if your offer is turned down. You may have to persist. If this fails, try contacting a local high school or college/ university that still has a music program. Again, do not get discouraged by a "not interested" response.

The value of your music sheets rests primarily with crossover collectors, those individuals buying the sheet music for the cover art image rather than the music. Assuming this is true, it means you maximize your return by selling the sheets separately, a time consuming and labor-intensive process.

You took the correct first step in discarding the damaged sheets. Sheet music buyers want sheets in fine or better condition. Decorators want sheets in frameable condition.

Based on the images that accompanied your email, you did not go far enough. In one image, someone used masking tape as a resale price sticker. It cannot be removed without damaging the sheet. In another image, an owner of the music sheet signed his name across the center of the sheet, a factor that lowers the perceived value of the sheet.

Finally, asking prices on the internet are not getting prices. Even a sell through price is not a guarantee that the next example will sell through at that price or better.

My recommendation is to sell the 77 sheets as a lot – take them all or not at all.

An asking price of \$20 should result in a sale, albeit you may have to work hard and be patient to obtain it. Asking more will most likely result in your not selling the lot.

The alternative is to pick out the best five to seven sheets from the lot and try to sell them individually at half the asking value of identical sheets being offered for sale on eBay. It always makes sense to undersell the competition if you want to sell something quickly. As with any lot of material, the majority of the value (80 percent or higher) rests in the top 10 percent of the items.

Q I recently acquired a chalkware statue of Babe Ruth. It is 18-inches tall and weighs almost nine pounds. I repainted it, which may have been a mistake. What insights can you provide?

A ESCO (Entertainment Statue Company) was responsible for the "Big-Headed" statues that graced American bars/taverns and steak houses during the 1970s and 1980s. Statue subjects ranged from Humphrey Bogart to W.C. Fields, from Frank Sinatra to Babe Ruth.

ESCO never licensed any of its statues, often producing images of individuals who were deceased. Small batches were created to avoid copyright litigation.

Over 85 different statues of movie, music, television, and sport celebrities, notable cultural figures, and character figures have been identified. The figures were made of plaster of Paris built around a wire skeleton. Most exceed 16-inches in height and weighed between eight and nine pounds. The ESCO statues are cousins to carnival chalkware, which is much lighter in weight and cast without interior support. ESCO statues were marketed in tobacco shops, novelty stores, and through bar and restaurant wholesalers.

ESCO statues were painted with great care and skill, especially given their chintzy nature. The statues were prone to chipping, meaning that when found most need to be repaired and often repainted. There are several companies such as ESCO Artist Painter & Repairman (www.escostatues.com) that specialize in restoring ESCO statues to their period appearance.

Collectors identify your repainting as an "amateur" restoration. Collectors pay top dollar only for period pieces with no paint damage or with repainting by a skilled professional.

The images that accompanied your email suggest you did an excellent job repainting it but did not match the period colors exactly. You used a thick paint which masked some of the statue's period detail. The value of your statue as it now stands is between \$150 and \$175.





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Museum looks at how every day objects have changed through the years

MILDFORD, Del. (AP) -- Local history buffs looking for something fresh to do can check out the new "Then and Now" exhibit at the Milford Museum.

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Director Claudia Leister has gathered dozens of objects owned by Milford residents to show how consumer goods, most of which are from the 20th century, have changed over time.

"The general concept of the exhibit is to share objects from the Milford Museum collection and compare them to the same items we use today," Leister said.

"The idea for this exhibit came from one specific unique item," she said. "A large, almost 6-foot-tall beauty parlor permanent wave machine." The wiry, old antique, which made users resemble Medusa while they had it on, seems "like something from a Frankenstein movie" in Leister's mind.

"I was so amazed when I first discovered it in our collection that I knew I had to create an exhibit to showcase this piece," she said.

Items currently on display in the museum's front gallery include toasters, fans, vacuum cleaners and a wide array of other domestic products. When Leister found she couldn't fit everything she wanted into that one room, she expanded the exhibit into some adjacent ones.

"There were so many other categories that I wanted to share that the exhibit expanded into the front room to show the changes in telephones, radios, cameras and television(s)," she said.

Dave Kenton, the museum's vice president, also is excited about the new exhibit.

"The whole concept is one that I like a lot," he said. "Everybody thought differently, and that's what Claudia is trying to bring forward in this exhibit."

Kenton said these consumer goods give some insight into how people thought during the times they were used.

"People's whole life experiences change

with the environment around them," he said. "If I had grown up in the Depression with no food and not being able to pay mortgage and everything, I would think differently than I do now in our era when we have really too much."

While all the objects featured in the new exhibit belonged to Milford residents, some were manufactured in the city. This sets up a striking contrast with an adjoining exhibit, titled "Made in Milford," which features products from its earlier years.

One item featured there, Leister said, is a "wooden wall telephone, (which) was used in the Milford Depot during the late 1800s when an operator was always used to place a call."

Nearby, Leister has an apron from the Grier Lumber Co. "Their phone number is displayed as No. 9," she said. "It makes you wonder who had Nos. 1 through 8."

Kenton said manufacturing in Milford stayed strong until the late 20th century.

"In the 1980s, we still worried about making things and manufacturing in Milford," he said. "After 1990, all anyone could think about was working off the internet or selling things on the internet or buying things on the internet."

In reflecting on how technology has advanced over the course of his lifetime, Kenton, 74, said there are both windfalls and drawbacks in this shift.

"I certainly use my cellphone, and I really like having direct contact with everybody I used to interact with in the mail," he said.

"I'm happy that technology is moving forward, but it doesn't give very much time to reflect. That's a pain to people like me who were born and raised in the '50s and the '60s," he said. "We had lots of time to reflect on where we were going and what we wanted to do. Now, if you reflect more than 15 minutes, you're behind."

Luddite. He bought his first computer in the mid-'80s, back when the internet was in its infancy, to help him save time when researching and writing about local history.

"Change and new ideas are inevitable," he said. "We've got to learn to adapt to them, but I have to admit it's going a little too fast for me right now."

Leister said the "Then and Now" exhibit will be up for years. Furthermore, she said the museum is now back open to the public.

"The museum has been closed much

Still. Kenton shouldn't be described as a of the (past) year, as we followed the governor's recommendations," she said, adding that it officially reopened Feb. 2. Hours are Tuesdays through Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Leister said her "visitors will always discover something new in the museum. There's something for everyone."

"New people moving to the area are interested in the city's history, and longtime residents are surprised at all of things they never knew about Milford," she said.

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
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Jigsaw Puzzels

With the onset of the Great Depression in 1929, puzzles for adults enjoyed a resurgence of popularity, peaking in early 1933 when sales reached an astounding 10 million per week. Puzzles seemed to touch a chord, offering an escape from the troubled times, as well as an opportunity to succeed in a modest way.

Completing a jigsaw gave the puzzler a sense of accomplishment that was hard to come by when the unemployment rate was climbing above 25 percent. With incomes depleted, home amusements like puzzles replaced outside entertainment like restaurants and night clubs. During the 1930s craze for puzzles, drugstores and circulating libraries added puzzle rentals to their offerings. They charged three to 10 cents per day, depending on the puzzle size.

Some major names for jigsaw puzzles from that time period include Tuck's Zig-Zag Puzzles (1866-present, British made), Arteno (intricate, hand-cut puzzles, 1933-1936), Parker Brothers (with its leading Pastime Puzzles line, 1908-1950), Isabel Ayer (1908-1930s), Milton Bradley (Premier Line), Madmar (Utica, New York, 1920-1967), J.K Strauss (1933-1974), Hayter Victory (1930s-1970s), Falls Puzzles (1930s), Charles Russell (1930s-1970s), Raphael Tuck and Sons Ltd. (London maker), James Browning (U-Nit puzzles, 1950-1970) and Par (makers of high-end puzzles, 1930s-1970s).

Most of the 1909 era puzzles were cut from solid wood. Between 1909 and 1930, plywood came into the picture and powered scroll saws as well as diecutting machines emerge. But Arteno puzzles were hand-cut, making there one hot commodity and the "holy grail" of jigsaw puzzles.

Par Puzzles have long been dubbed the Rolls Royce of jigsaw puzzles. Par owners Frank Ware and John Henriques, young men with no job prospects, cut their first puzzle on a dining room table in 1932. While other firms were cutting costs and quality, Par steadily improved their puzzles, and marketed them to affluent movie stars, industrialists and even royalty.

Par specialized in customized puzzles, often cutting the owner's name or birth date as figure pieces. Ware and Henriques also perfected the irregular edge to frustrate traditional puzzlers who tried to start with the corners and edge pieces.

Soon the wooden puzzles gave way to cardboard puzzles. The introduction of die-cut cardboard puzzles for adults made production inexpensive and allowed the manufacturers to cut prices substantially. There was a vogue for advertising puzzles in the mid-1930s. Retail stores offered free puzzles with the purchase of a toothbrush, a flashlight, or hundreds of other products. After World War II, the wood jigsaw puzzle went into a decline. Rising wages pushed up costs substantially because wood puzzles took so much time to cut. And as prices rose, sales dropped. Lithography and die-cutting made the cardboard puzzles more attractive, especially when Springbok introduced high quality reproductions of fine are on jigsaws in 1963. In 1965, hundreds of thousands of Americans struggled to assemble Jackson Pollock's Convergence, billed by most jigsaw puzzle experts as the world's most difficult jigsaw puzzle. One by one, the surviving brands of wood puzzles disappeared. Parker Brothers discontinued its Pastime puzzles in 1958. By 1974, Par and Straus (another long-time manufacturer) had retired from the business. Victory puzzles, easily found in department stores in the 1950s and 1960s, almost completely vanished.



even some wood puzzles cut by computercontrolled water jets or lasers. Puzzle aficionados of today can choose from a number of different styles of wood puzzles to suit their passions for perplexity.

Collecting vintage puzzles is a tough task. Puzzles from the 1930s onward can become easily damaged during disassembly of the puzzle. As puzzles get older the plywood starts failing or chipping, and there are very few people in the world who can restore puzzles and cut Above: The "Hero of Luenburg" was produced in 1909 by Parker Brothers. new pieces.

The Association for Games & Puzzles International (AGPI) will hold its annual convention April 22-25, 2021 in Fredericksburg, Virginia. One key member of AGPI is Mark Cappitella, a collector and individual manufacturer of jigsaw puzzles the past 26 years. Cappitella once owned 800 priceless jigsaw puzzles.

"The PAR puzzles are the ones to collect," Cappitella said. "You can find

PAR puzzles most of the time, whereas an Arteno or a Falls puzzle are very hard to find you may only come across a dozen a year. There were only 500 to 1,000 Par puzzles produced, while the two men at Par made roughly 10,000 in 40 years."
