# Marx hit the right mark with tinplated steel toys

Those growing up in the 1960s are certain to remember the Rock'em Sock'em Robots game. In this tabletop game, each player controlled the jabs of their 9-inch tall, solid plastic robots using "hand boosters" until one player landed a punch that sent the opposing robot's springing upward. Marx Toys came out with this popular toy in 1966 and it was quite the rage.

But collectors enamored by Marx Toys know that Louis Marx began making toys in 1919, and his toys were made of die-cut tinplated steel. Marx was born in 1896 in Brooklyn, N.Y. He entered the toy business at age 15, working as a toy salesman for the F.J. Strauss & Company, one of the largest mechanical metal toy companies around in those days.

After serving in World War I, Marx returned home and established his own company (Louis Marx & Company) on Fifth Avenue in Brooklyn. There he and his brother, David, designed and contracted the manufacturing of a wide variety of toys, and the company copied toys made by other manufacturers, improved them, and sold them at lower prices. Needing some form of trademark, they used a circular logo with a big "X" behind "MAR."


Marx would lithograph toy patterns onto large sheets of tinplated steel, which would then be die-cut, folded and assembled. Marx would often repurpose dies, using the same model for several different toys. The Honeymoon Express, a windup train on a circular track with a plane circling above, became the Mickey Mouse Express.

In 1921, Marx purchased the used tooling and product rights to two of the old Strauss products that were thought to have run their course: The Climbing Monkey and the Mechanical Minstrel Singer. Marx's salesmanship brought these two products back to life. Millions of these units were sold. Marx found even more success when it began marketing its own whistling yo-yos, branded as Lumars. Within a decade, the company had sold 100 million of these whistling and non-whistling toys.

Marx used Sears, Roebuck, & Co., Montgomery Ward catalogs and Woolworths to market its toys. The brothers even developed a high-profile partnership with Disney and created several toys based on popular comic strip and radio show characters like Popeye and Charlie McCar-



## Five generations of Hulman history heading to auction block

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. - From the 1980s until 2016, Indianapolis 500 Race fans eagerly awaited the voice of Mari Hulman George announce, "Gentlemen, start your engines." Later she added "Ladies" in front of gentlemen.

The daughter of Anton "Tony" Hulman Jr. and Mary Fendrich Hulman, she was the chairperson of The Indianapolis Motor Speedway from 1988 to 2016. She was also chairperson of the multi-faceted Hulman & Co. in Terre Haute.

An only child, her father Tony joined the family business, Hulman & Co. in 1924 after graduating from Yale's Sheffield Scientific School. The story goes the owner of Hulman & Co. Anton Sr. told his managers, 'Don't give Tony a place in the business. Let him work for it."

And that, the younger Hulman did. By 1926, he was the company's sales manager developing and directing an ad campaign that made Clabber Girl baking powder an American household name. By the age of 30, he succeeded his father as company president.

But young Tony Hulman was not only a savvy businessman, he was also a sporting man. He loved fishing and ultimately traveled the world seeking out trophy size deep sea bluefin tuna. He enjoined horse racing, football (he was inducted into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame) and, of course, auto racing where he achieved international fame.

He married Mary Fendrich the

daughter of Fendrich Cigar Co. owner John Fendrich in 1926.

Ever restless, Hulman bought the dilapidated Indianapolis Motor Speedway from a group led by World War I flying ace Eddie Rickenbacker for a reported \$750,000 in 1945.

Mary Antonia Hulman was born in

1934 and by the age of 11 years "Mari" was surrounded by families of Indianapolis 500 drivers, whom she befriended. She married one driver, Elmer George, in 1957

Mari, like her father, was a sporting lady. She bred and raced standardbred and quarter horses. From her farm outside Terre Haute and a 1,300-acre ranch in Wyoming she would become a formidable presence in the horse racing community.

She loved animals and rescued and adopted several racing greyhounds. As a philanthropist, she generously contributed to her alma mater, St. Mary-of-the-Woods College, where the school maintains the Mari Hulman George School of Equine Studies. The family generously donated to numerous civic, educational, and public intuitions.

Mari Hulman George died in November 2018. During the ensuing years, the Hulman George collection was cataloged, and after a family decision, it is being sold at auction June 11-12 at the Wabash Valley Fairgrounds in Terre Haute. Indianapolis-based Robert



# 'Do you read me' will have you chuckling over toys

Once upon a time, there were no cell phones. There were no laptops, tablets, or video game consoles. When it came time to play, kids were pretty much left to their own devices, imitating what was going on

in the world around them, but limited to one important resource: their imaginations. Himself exhibiting no shortage of that superpower, author Leslie Singer takes a nostalgic look back in his book "Do You Read Me? Vintage Communication Toys.'


Singer points out that back in the day, walkie-talkies were for "serious business," while their "little brothers," toy walkie-talkies, were for what might be classified as serious play. Sometimes requiring batteries (or maybe not), these toys evolved from two tin cans (or paper cups printed with advertisements) connected with string, which, come to think of it, was the only cord required.



in his informative book. Injecting a bit of method into his madness, he approaches this mid-century subject chronologically, decade by decade, beginning in the 1930s and ending with the

1970s+. But it doesn't stop there: At the back of the book is a bonus feature, a template for building your own "Singer Communicator," not to mention a price guideline that is general enough not to date this 2018 publication.

But oh, what's in the middle pages of this 96-page little tome is the best part. Not only do we learn about the collecting topic, but we also get a peek into why this whole thing turns Singer on. Unlike other collectors, he doesn't care much about condition. In fact, he rather likes the fact that something has been loved and played with. And if something doesn't really work in the real world, well, he's ok with that too. Two pieces of

J. Brown and Associates got the job of making it happen.

There will be no internet, phone, or absentee bidding. The only sure-fire method of obtaining these pieces of sporting and commercial history is by attending and bidding, Brown said.

Items from Indianapolis are primarily Indianapolis 500 material, and it is being transported by semi-trucks to Terre Haute. Then there is the eight-story building in Terre Haute that served as a veritable repository of advertising material, fishing equipment, a 2,000-plus book library, vintage Coke machines, a wooden box filled with 1,000 rounds of Winchester 30-.30 ammunition, printing plates and blocks for advertising Clabber Girl, Cook's Beer and other commodities owned and distributed by Hulman & Co.

The Hulman company printed its own advertising in-house on the seventh floor.

The third through seventh floor of the historic building became a warehouse of Hulman history. "There are five generations represented in that building," said William C. Metzger, executor of the estate.

There are various sizes of mint, never used Clabber Girl, Farmers Pride and Cook's Beer signs, a large wheel coffee grinder, fine art, jewelry, coins and currency, a multi-person snow sled/toboggin, vintage furniture, vintage toys,

Red Ryder advertising, Cook's beer advertising fishing lures, new-old-stock in the original boxes (some cross promoting the Indy 500 and Cook's beer), cased fishing rods, and a seven-piece Oshkosh steamer trunk luggage set with initial "A.H. Jr.".

"There will be thousands and thousands of lots," Brown said. He will be selling items in tandem with Wickliff Auctioneers of Carmel. "It's taking 20 26-foot-long semi-trucks to transfer all this history to the Vigo Fairgrounds."

The sale will open to the public at 8 a.m. on June 11 and 12, sales beginning at 10 a.m. The only preview opportuni-

ties will be the two hours before the sale.

"We will be running two rings most of the time on the two days" Brown said. "We're not sure yet, we may have to go into Sunday (June 13) if we can't through it all. We'll announce that at the second auction."

The Indianapolis 500 memorabilia alone is, a voluminous array: unused tickets from 1947, early autographed photos of drivers and cars, early racing programs, original bricks from the track, early pit badges and vintage advertising ashtrays (originally found in boxes padded by straw).

"There so much here, there's some-

thing for everyone," Brown said. "It's an eclectic sale, but for Indy 500 collectors, fishing and hunting enthusiasts, antique and advertising collectors it's really going to be a seldom seen opportunity.

"These things were really inadvertently stored for 65 years. Protected, in the unlighted gloom of at least five stories in the building. It was like out of sight, out of mind. It's once in a lifetime sort of sale ... one that will be remembered for a long time." Brown said.

wood that make two kids think they're communicating with Martians is just fine with him. Welcome to the world of Buck Rogers, Dick Tracy, and Tom Corbett, as well as Tom Mix, Captain Video, and Dick Tracy. It's clear that Singer really goes in for graphics, and if the toy (or the box in which it was sold) is space-related, well, so much the better.

Aside from witty asides, what makes this book a joy to behold is Willie Allen's photographic genius; we're talking 150 color images here. You might read through the book once or twice, but I guarantee you'll go back for the pictures.

So, who would want this book (a dinosaur of sorts in this digital age) on their shelf?

For those of you of a certain age who appreciate the writings of American humorist Jean Shepherd, this book will have you chuckling, beginning with what might be the best-ever dedication all the way to the thumbnail bios of the author and his collaborators. On the other hand, if you're a bit younger and



you want to know what makes your parents/grandparents tick, this might well be your guide.

But this is what I like best about this is in the end, I think Singer is a real collector's collector. The Golden Rule

of "collect what you love" is clearly his mantra. And even if this isn't what you love, I don't see how you can't get caught up in his passion. But spending a lazy afternoon or two with "Can You Read Me Now?" is a treat. And I'm willing to guarantee that you'll come away feeling refreshed, although maybe a bit sad for simpler times.



## World War II mimeographed newsletter needs museum home

I have five issues of "The Bangalore," an eightpage, mimeographed newsletter of the 12th Battalion Engineer that trained at Fort Jackson, S.C. Three of the newsletters are dated April, May, and June 1942. Each features a cartoon sketch

cover. The June issue shows an engineer building "A Span to Japan," a pontoon bridge from the U.S.A. to Japan. The May issue shows a soldier standing at arms in front of a bridge with the text: "To The Heroes of Bataan...Corregidor." These belonged to my father-in-law. Do they have any value?




The 12th Engineer Battalion was activated on July 1, 1940, at Fort Jackson, S.C. It was assigned to the 8th Infantry Division. Initially, it was comprised of individuals from the 1st Engineers stationed at Fort DuPont, Del., and the 7th Engineers station at Ft. Custer, Mich. The remainder of the unit was filled with selected volunteers and the Selective Service.

The 12th Engineer Battalion was initially commanded by Major Patrick H. Tansey. Major Charles H. Mason replaced Tansev in August 1941 and gave way to Major Edmund Fry in August 1942. When Major Fry was sent to Engineer School in February 1943, Major James C. Taylor assumed command. Major Fry returned to lead the 12th Engineer Battalion through its European tour of duty.

Completing its training at Fort Jackson, the 12th Engineers subsequently moved to Camp Forest, Tenn., and Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. From there, they built the Laguna Desert Camp in Arizona,

Although the newsletters suggest the 12th Engineer Battalion was preparing for the Pacific campaign, it was deployed to the European Theater in July 1944. It participated in the landing at Omaha Beach on D-Day. Following D-Day, the 12th Engineer Battalion participated in the Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, and Central Europe and Luxembourg campaigns.

After World War II, the 12th Engineer Battalion was inactivated on Oct. 25, 1945 at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. It was reactivated as part



of the 8th Infantry Division on Aug. 17, 1960 at Fort Jackson, S.C. It moved to Nuremberg, Germany, with the 8th Infantry Division in October 1956. The company eventually relocated to Dexheim, Germany. I was not able to locate a U.S. Army military museum for either

the 12th Engineer Battalion or 8th Infantry Division. If you are open to donating the copies of the newsletters, I recommend contacting the librarian at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. If the library is not interested, the librarian should be able to recommend an appropriate military museum for them.

Under no circumstances should you throw these newsletters out. If you place them on eBay with an opening bid of \$0.00, someone will buy them. As suggested above, I would rather see them go to a museum or other institution who will preserve them. If there are any historians of the 12th Engineer or 8th Infantry Division who will to preserve them, email me at harrylrinker@aol.com so that I can pass along your contact information to the owner.

My father was in the sound business. Y In cleaning out his place, I found a number of items including an old loudspeaker. It has no markings on it. Can you identify the maker and provide a value?



I was not able to identify the maker of  ${
m A}$  your loudspeaker. I checked numerous internet sites including hundreds of images on WorthPoint.com. The base mount for the speaker is what has me confused. I wonder if it was added later by your father to turn the loudspeaker into a floor model rather than a model that sat atop an old battery-operated radio.

There is no doubt the speaker is a radio bell horn speaker and dates from the 1910s or 1920s. There were multiple companies that made such speakers. Atwater-Kent, Bristol Autophone, Dicto-Grand, Federal, Jewett, Magnavox, RCA Radiola, Silvertone, Stewart-Warner, Thompson, and Trimm are just a few examples. Manufacturer information was usually found on a metal plague attached to the base mount of the speaker.

The Bristol Autophone, a version of the Dicto-Grand, RCA Radiola, Stewart-Warner, and Trimm loudspeakers closely resemble the example that you have. The similarity in loudspeaker design suggests the possibility that some radio manufacturers contracted with loudspeaker manufacturers who then branded the loudspeakers with the brands of their clients.

Bell size (the larger the better), material (brass, painted tin, or wood), completeness (period mount), and working order impact value. Radio loudspeakers with their period base in very good or better condition and in working order regularly sell for over \$100. If your speaker with its "replacement base" works, its value is between \$50 and \$60.

I have a Baker dining room china cabi-, net and large buffet. The drawer of the buffet is marked "Shop /BAKER / ALLEGAN, MICH / Mark" in an octagon. The china cabinet is marked "H. P. Co. "4 1824." The dining room set also contains a large buffet with a Paine Furniture Company label. Using the images that accompanied my email, can you provide information as to the age and value of my Baker furniture?



Your dining room furniture is a harle- ${
m A}$  quin set, meaning it consists of pieces from several different manufacturers. Such sets were common in the 1920s and 1930s when individuals purchased furniture from large furniture stores that offered furniture from a variety of makers. Many individuals chose to mix and match.

Your two Baker pieces are confusing because they have different maker marks. However, they are a perfect match in terms of their stylistic design elements. They obviously were meant to be sold as a set, possibly with other matching pieces that you do not have.

The style is 1920s/1930s Colonial Revival. The pieces contain design elements from a variety of earlier period styles with a "Spanish" theme being the most prevalent. Note the large buffet is missing its apron on the left side.

Siebo Baker, an immigrant from the Netherlands, founded an interior woodworking and door company in 1890 in Allegan, Mich. Three years later, Baker made its first piece of furniture, a combination bookcase and desk. In 1910, Siebo's son Hollis graduated from the University of Michigan and joined the Baker Furniture as a salesman. Hollis would eventually succeed his father.

In the mid-1920s, Baker Furniture had achieved a national reputation for design and quality. In 1925, Baker Furniture introduced a Modernist furniture line designed by Donald Deskey. In addition, it continued to manufacture furniture in multiple Colonial Revival styles.

According to WorthPoint.com, Baker used the octagonal mark from 1927 to 1935. Your piece appears to have an early version of the mark. I could find no reference to Baker using an "H. P. Co." mark. Perhaps, it is a store brand for pieces Baker made exclusively for the store.

Your furniture is known in the antiques and collectibles trade as "brown goods," a type of furniture that has fallen on hard times in today's secondary market. While there are rumors that younger buyers are starting to become interested in Colonial Revival pieces, especially in large urban markets, I have found no field evidence to support this.

The secondary market value of your Baker china cabinet and buffet is between \$100 and \$125. This price reflects the fact that a portion of the apron is missing on the buffet.

## Dark Night Returns changed how people thought of comics

photo copier machines and got my lifelong dream gig of working at a comic book store, Lone Star Comics in particular. Ironically, they hired me because I had experience in delivery, not because of my prodigious comic book knowledge. They needed someone to drive the company van, pick up comics at the local Diamond distributor, and take the comics to the various locations of the eightstore chain.

The new job was a cut in pay, but I loved it. I sorted and bagged comic books, cleaned and swept the "Batcave" (which is what they called the backroom), and, of course, delivered boxes and boxes of the new releases each week. After a short time, I began working out front in the store area, waiting on customers and ringing up sales, and within a few months I worked my way up to store manager.

One day, while I was manning the register at the main Lone Star location in Arlington (home of the Dallas Cowboys and Texas Rangers), a customer came in who I knew from working at Luther's Barbeque when I was in high school (I graduated in 1985). He was eight years older than me, but we had been good friends as we shared a lot of common interests, including rock music and old horror and science fiction movies. I had absolutely no idea he cared anything about comic books, as I rarely discussed my interest in them with "civilians" (admitting you liked comics during the 1980s was basically like saying you were a child or hopelessly brain damaged), but there he was, checking out the new issues-it was great catching up with him, and we had a lot of laughs over the old days at Luther's. Better yet, we struck up a (now lifelong) friendship and discovered we had something else in common: "funny books."

Glenn had grown up reading The Amazing Spider-Man, The Avengers, Iron Man, and other Marvel staples, but, like many fans who reached adulthood and became distracted by cars, girls, bills, and the like, he abandoned them. However, in 1986 he read a review of DC Comics' mature-themed The Dark Knight Returns in Rolling Stone magazine, and it drew him back in. Not only did Glenn purchase each issue of the groundbreaking, four-part series, he began collecting again in earnest, purchasing Marvels he had grown up reading and even buying new issues of such DC titles as Justice League

In 1989, I quit my job delivering ators, such as writer Dennis O'Neil and artist Neal Adams. had treated Batman seriously, but The Dark Knight Returns garnered much more mainstream attention. Plus, it was published in a prestige format, with each issue costing \$2.95, which was about four times as much as a standard comic book.

> DC Comics printed 125,000 copies of that first issue. According to then-DC Comics Executive Vice President Paul Levitz (writing for 13thdimension.com), this was a huge gamble as Ronin, Frank Miller's prestige format project from three years before, had a first-issue print run of around 87,000.

"If we were wrong, we could actually lose money on the project," he relates.

It turns out that DC was indeed wrong, but in the other direction. They had printed far too few copies as the issue quickly sold out and stores were putting in heavy re-orders.

"It was good news," Levitz writes, "EXCEPT we hadn't done a second printing of a comic for decades. I think the last may have been the Batman 3-D comic magazine in the '60s fad, or it may even have been one of the earliest Superman titles in the Golden Age. All long before comic shops and serious collectors. So, there was a real debate around the room about whether we should print more. Were we going to be unfair to collectors who had bought second, or multiple, copies in hope of appreciation? They were an appreciable portion of our audience at the time, we thought. If we didn't, were we going to lose out on the biggest opportunity DC had since the comic shop market began? Sounds silly now, but then it was a serious conversation."

Of course, DC printed more. In fact, they did four printings of that first issue for a total of approximately 400,000 copies. To appease collectors, they labeled subsequent printings as such in the indicia, making first printings more desirable and ultimately worth more in the collector's market.

Levitz recalls, "[This was] a massive number for an expensive book (our regular titles were 75 cents), an emerging market (that was around the time comic shops would pass the newsstand in sales), and a publisher that was a distant No. 2."

Calling the phenomenon "unforgettable," Levitz further explains that strong sales were just one aspect of the wide-ranging influence of The Dark Knight Returns: "It was just the beginning. The trade editions would really change the field, establishing the graphic novel format in America (along with Watchmen and Maus)."

and Superman.

Glenn's story is hardly unique. Not only did The Dark Knight Returns, a grim, gritty alternate future story of a grizzled Bruce Wayne coming out of retirement to be Batman again and battle a gang called the Mutants, attract many people to comics books who had never read them before, it also brought many lapsed readers back into the fold.

Written and drawn by Frank Miller, with pencils by Miller, inks by Klaus Jason, and colors by Lynn Varley, The Dark Knight Returns took an aging Caped Crusader back to his 1939 roots (more or less) as a grim avenger of the night, as opposed to the sci-fi stuff published in the '50s or the campy Batman inspired by the Adam West TV show of the late 1960s. Miller was clearly influenced by manga (Japanese comic books), especially in terms of panel flow and dynamic page layouts. Other cre-

The series influenced future Batman (and other superhero) comics and movies as well.

The trade edition of all four issues of The Dark Knight Returns were collected into one book that Levitz refers to has gone through numerous reprintings itself and has also sold a ton of copies. To read the story today, this is the easiest and cheapest way to go as you can hop on Amazon or eBay and grab a dog-eared copy for just a few bucks, or you can get a new edition for about \$20. If you want a complete set of the four individual issues, all first printings, and all in nice condition, it will set you back around \$200 to \$250.

## JUNE 1, 2021 Antiques and Art Emporium celebrates 20 years in business

BURLINGTON CITY, N.J. - In June 2001, the Historic Burlington Antiques and Art Emporium opened its doors. Scott Carlbon purchased the buildings between 418 and 426 High Street in 1998

The building which now houses the Antiques and Art Emporium was constructed by Edward Super between 1915-1924 as one of the world's first auto dealerships and it is on the National Registry of Historic Buildings. In 1926, the Anderson Motors Company, a Chrysler-Plymouth dealership, purchased Super's building where they sold and repaired automobiles until 1972.

In 1998 many of Scott's family, friends and colleagues thought he was crazy to undertake this massive task of renovating a 15,000 square foot condemned building with a close to 30 foot wooden arched truss ceiling. It took Carlbon two and half years to repair, refurbish, reinforce and replace the entire roof of the building. The Emporium is now home to more than 65 antiques and art dealers.

As a young boy, growing up on a farm in northern New Jersey, Carlbon learned to appreciate the value of recycling items; buying and selling antiques at local flea markets, while also learning about the construction and renovation of historic structures.

It took almost five years to completely fill the Emporium with dealers selling items from the 1700s to collectibles of today. The Emporium, an eclectic co-op, is a thriving source for movie, television, and restaurant set designers and decorators, collectors and unique gift buyers.

As years passed, the Emporium grew in size and activities offered to its customers. Approximately Above: The Antiques and Art Emporium is home to more than 60 dealers. two years ago, Scott broke through a wall to one

of the street front buildings, adding an additional 1,000 square feet to the co-op. On Oct. 26, 2014, the Emporium ran its first bi-annual fall and spring Antique Shows. The Emporium ran its first live auction in November, 2019, and then Covid19 hit. Presently the Emporium is running an online only auction every other month.

In the large parking lot next to this historic structure, the Historic Burlington Antiques and Art Emporium would like to throw a great celebration in the fall with an Antique Show, music and food. The date will depend on when the New Jersey governor relaxes rules on gatherings. Carlbon is glad to see Historic Burlington City thriving again, despite the pandemic, and looking forward to seeing it become the destination place for diners and shoppers it is meant to be.



# DC Modernism Show said, 'the show must go on (line)'

JUNE 1, 2021

The 38th running of the annual Washington DC Modernism Show took place April 23-25 featuring machine age decor, vintage fashion, modernist furniture, World's Fair memorabilia, barware, and 20th-century art. Yet, after two unsuccessful attempts to hold a live show over the last year, promoters opted again to hold the event online, in partnership with Ruby Lane.

While perhaps viewed as a COVID-era "punt," trade groups hosting these types of virtual events have seen some obvious benefits. Virtual shows can potentially reach more attendees than in-person shows because they overcome geographical limitations. That means guests and vendors alike can attend the show from around the country - or even the world - without wrestling with transportation and lodging concerns. Time barriers are also mitigated since keynotes and other segments can naturally be recorded for later review and portions can be kept running past a traditional show's end. There's also a convenience factor for dealers who, rather than transporting merchandise, setting up and tearing down a booth, focus on shipping purchases from home.

The previous DC Modernism show held last October was also virtual and attracted thousands of online attendees who combed through around 5,000 product listings. Conducting each event with Ruby Lane proved sensible since that platform is al-

ready home to approximately 2,000 online antique vendors and attracts well over a million visitors from around the globe each month. Plus, Ruby Lane has cut its teeth on these types of virtual events, working with other well-known events like the massive Brimfield Antique Show.

For dealers, participation in the DC show was a mere \$60, which allowed for up to 250 items to be displayed. An 8 percent commission (capped at \$250 for higher-priced items) was charged, split between the show's promoter, the Art Deco Society of Washington (ADSW), and Ruby Lane. Antique malls and multi-dealer shops were encouraged to participate and offer items by their member dealers. Forty-five vendors signed on, offering merchandise as far-ranging as mid-century lighting to aviation pieces and even antique tile.

Once onboard, dealers received prominent listings on the show website's Exhibitor page. Likewise, Ruby Lane promoted the show on its site. Email blasts, called "Meet the Dealers" spotlighted special items the dealers would be offering; those items were then featured in the Gallery page of the show's website. Dealers also benefited from social media exposure on ADSW's Facebook and Instagram pages and advertising in the online program. For motivated buyers, \$20 provided access to an Early Bird preview which opened on Thursday, April 22, no doubt spurring sales.

The Washington show differs from many modernism shows because of its

deep dive into the "Gatsby" decades from the 1920s through the 1940s. The ADSW, which stewards preservation and appreciation of the era in the city, started the show in 1983 mainly as an Art Deco show – at the time called the Exposition of Decorative Arts.

Three decades after its founding, the Washington DC Modernism Show has expanded to include other design movements of the 20th-century, including Streamline Moderne, Arts & Crafts, Art Nouveau, and the popular mid-century modern. Today, buyers are as likely to spy an Eames table from the 1950s as a Jean-Michel Frank lamp from the 1920s.

ADSW's affiliation with the International Coalition of Art Deco Societies helped to expand the show's reach this year. Art Deco International, the name under which the coalition functions, declared April 2021 as "World Art Deco Month" and designated April 28 as "World Art Deco Day," chosen because it was the date in 1925 when the International Exhibition of Modern Decorative and Industrial Arts opened in Paris.

Rich in its own Art Deco heritage, DC Mayor Muriel Bowser jumped onboard, proclaiming April 22-29, 2021 as "Art

Deco Heritage Week" in the city. DC lays claim to a vast array of significant buildings from the first four decades



of the 20th-century, including the Hecht Company warehouse, the DC Greyhound bus station, and the headquarters of the Federal Reserve. And, it's not just architecture — deco-era sculpture by artists such as Michael Lantz and Paul Manship dot the landscape, particularly at public buildings. As well, the city many famous performers of the era, including Duke Ellington, Kate Smith, and Helen Hayes had roots in Washington, DC.





## Marx Steel Toys

Arguably the most popular lithographed tin wind-up toy ever made by the Louis Marx Company was the Marx Merry Makers mouse band. Originally marketed in 1931, the Marx Merry Makers band was of die-cut tinplated steel and sold for 91 cents. The Marx Merry Makers band was a group of four lithographed tin mice playing as a band. The overall form of this toy was a nod to the orchestras of the 1930s like Cab Calloway and others. The mice are dressed in period tuxedos with a white shirt, black tie and red vest. The dancer, pianist, drummer and fiddler move when the toy is wound with its key. The fourth mouse either serves as the band leader or plays the violin.

Marx cars often featured unexpected and lively elements. Comic Car, a 1932 jalopy featuring four college boys, curved forward, stopped, and then backed in an arc. This car, like the 1940 Charlie McCarthy Buggy, had big rear wheels, a pattern that could also be used for a tractor. The 1932 Amos 'n' Andy Fresh Taxi would move forward, stop, and shake.

Sometimes Marx failures are the most treasured today. A 1936 tin train called Bunny Express, with a rabbit-shaped engine and open cars meant to pull candy, instantly flopped when it was released for the Easter season. Since few were made, collectors are always looking for this toy.

Marx supported the war effort in World War II by converting his toys factories to make munitions, detonators, bazookas and other war-related materials. Realizing a metal shortage, Marx began developing plastics that could be used to produce 100piece playsets. These elaborate scenes, first issued in 1948, featured a structure like a fort or castle made out of lithographed tin, which formed the backdrops for scores of plastic figures in conflict, like cowboys and Indians, or Union and Confederate soldiers.

Almost any fictional or historical scene you could imagine was created by a Marx playset. While they came stuffed to the gills with toys, these sets usually sold for \$4-\$7 apiece. Many were made based on popular TV shots such as "Gunsmoke," "Ben Hur," or "The Untouchables." As space toys exploded in popularity, playsets with themes like moon base or Cape Canaveral were offered. The 1961 Prehistoric Playset, with its plastic dinosaurs, cavemen, trees, and rocks is particularly rare

Not until the early 1950s did Marx stray from making die-cut tinplated steel toys to making cheaper plastic toys.

Thanks to the efforts at all three manufacturing locations, Marx became the largest toy maker in the world in the 1940s and 1950s. By the 1950s, Louis Marx & Co. was employing 8,000 fulltime workers. In 1955, Time magazine named Louis Marx "The Toy King."

The Erie factory produced mechanical windup toys and mechanical trains. In the 1950s the plant produced millions of mechanical cars, tanks and tractors annually. In the 1960s, the Erie plant began to produce blow-molded plastics including many of the ride-on toys.

The Glen Dale factory produced dollhouses, trucks, service stations, airports, and the popular Big Wheel tricycle. The factory also made play sets with plastic miniature figures, including Johnny West, Fort Apache, Roy Rogers, Flintstones, knights, Vikings, cowboys, Indians, soldiers, astronauts, U.S. presidents and the Sindy Doll.


In 1972, Marx which was too slow to jump on the electronic toy bandwagon, was purchased by Quaker Oats, and by 1975, its manufacturing facilities were closed.
