Store containers helped spur last minute purchases

You've finished shopping and are about to pay what you owe when, lo and behold, you find yourself picking up gum, candy, or breath mints. Or maybe it's lip balm, hand sanitizer, or tree-shaped car fresheners. No need to hunt them down: They're right in front of you as you stand in line. Are these impulse purchases, or things that you meant to buy and forgot about until you were reminded at the last minute? Either way, you, like other shoppers, have been targeted with "point-of-purchase display bins," carefully staged to take advantage of your "decision fatigue."

Enticing shoppers at checkout time is practically a science these days, but it's nothing new, as this marketing strategy has been employed for at least 100 years. In the early 1900s, manufacturers supplied shopkeepers with a variety of containers, often bearing the names of the items inside, intended to attract the attention of customers and, in turn, to boost sales. Although many of those early products have long been forgotten, the store countertop dispensers in which they were displayed have survived and are often highly collectible.

Among those preserving these examples of Americana advertising is Warren Kirk. And ironically, his interest in these dispensers began with an impulse purchase.

About 50 years ago, while driving southward from his home state of Washington to college in California, Kirk decided to stop at an antique shop. There, he found himself drawn to an old Planters Peanut jar. As he recalled, "It caught my eye." The jar, having originally sat on a store countertop near the cash register, was still working its magic.

The hunt for more containers ensued, and a casual quest soon turned into his lifelong pastime. Now retired and living in Indiana, Kirk is a former Procter & Gamble employee-turned-Methodist minister who has taken advantage of travel opportunities. Over time, he has amassed a collection that now includes approximately 50 store countertop dispensers, double that number if you count auxiliary pieces such as scoops and measures. Speaking of their original purpose, Kirk pointed out that national manufacturers had limited ways to advertise their wares, a reality that made in-store displays integral. Without automated packaging, many products were sold "loose," including snacks (peanuts and candy, sweets and gum), as well as what would now be labeled as "over-the-counter" health and

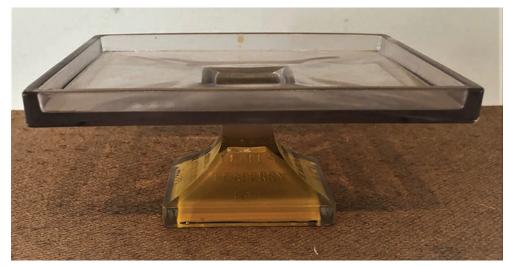

product. In many of these examples, the manufacturers' names were prominently molded onto the sides of the jars. Other times, the company's name would be displayed on a decal or a label (Kirk offered Dad's Oatmeal Cookies as one example of that). Other examples in Kirk's collection are store countertop displays, rather than dispensers, made and distributed with the sole intention of catching the eye of shoppers, in hopes of making them aware of the item advertised. Think Listerine and other

beauty supplies (from Ludded's Cough Drops to bars of soap made by Swift & Co.). Bulk lots packed in boxes were sent to

To determine exactly what falls into the category of "vintage store countertop dispensers" is not a black-and-white matter. There are few hard-and-fast rules. But a few assumptions can be made. Many of the surviving examples in Kirk's collection are made of clear glass, a fact that is not surprising because these containers were made so that customers could see the

Double-faced squeaker delights bidders to the tune of \$1,000

GRAND LEDGE, Mich. — The Masonic Temple located in Grand Ledge, Michigan was the site of a unique and educational auction of toys and antiques conducted by Americana Auctions.

Featured lots were selected from the toy collection of the late Jeffery J. Ashley. A graduate of Western Michigan University and the National FBI Academy; Ashley spent 30 years in law enforcement and three tours as a UN police officer/station commander for the United Nations Mission in Kosovo. He also had a keen interest in quality antique toys.

Of particular interest at the auction were several windup mechanical tin toys by the Lehmann Toy Company, of Brandenburg, Germany. The company was founded by Ernst Paul Lehman in 1881 and was soon known for its vivid and detailed toys. Not incidentally, the lightweight toys were made even more popular by their patented locking mechanism for the clockwork motors that powered the toys. The Lehmann toys were also sought by buyers for their brightly colored lithography and sophisticated looks. As a practical matter, parents were also pleased by the fact that tin toys were easier to play with and less expensive than the cast iron toys of the time.

Lehmann's toy company named most of their toys and marked the product with the

founders' initials "EPL" or "e". The demand for good examples of these toys continues today as the auction in Grand Ledge revealed.

A popular Lehmann dancing figure entitled "Oh My" (with box) sold for \$600 and was quickly followed by a Lehmann "Naughty Boy" which also reached \$600. A Lehman "Also" tin windup sold for \$500. "Jazzbo Jim" (with box) another tin dancing toy, this time by Strauss Toy Co. pulled a \$525 bid, while a

Parthena's memorial wreath weaves a fantastic story

I went to the online auction preview with a lengthy list of items to check out. Not on my list was Lot 383, described as a "Walnut Shadow Box Wreath w/Bird". I'd seen this item in the online photos and quickly passed it over. Even with 42 years in the casket industry under my belt I never developed an interest in mourning wreaths made from human hair. I found them somewhere between macabre and downright creepy.

Hung on the wall as it was, positioned near a canning jar that was high on my list, I couldn't help but be drawn to the wreath. The workmanship was incredible. So much effort put into weaving tiny memorial flowers from presumably dead folk's hair. This wasn't creepy, instead it was a work of homespun art crafted by an accomplished artisan. I noted a faded inscription beneath the wreath. It read "Made by Mrs. Parthena R. Barton of New Haven, Vermont, 1889 at the age of 88, without glasses". Half the fun of acquiring antiques is doing the research and ferreting out the

object's back story. Clearly, this wreath had a story to tell. The next day I placed my online bid and won Parthena's masterpiece.

It wasn't until after I'd picked up the treasure and got it home that my

tered envelope read "Key to Aunt Parthena's Hair Wreath". Inside the envelope was a single page, double sided letter covered with flowing, faded handwriting naming 42 different individuals that octogenarian Parthena had chosen to memorialize with a handmade flower. A description of each personal flower and its position in the frame followed.

Victorian Mourning Wreaths became popular about the time of the Civil War. Women would collect hair in specially made hair receivers, and when they had enough or when family events dictated, they let the weaving begin. Sadly, these spectacular works of folk art were almost never signed by the artist, and only rarely could the identity of the wreath's focus be determined. For our newly acquired

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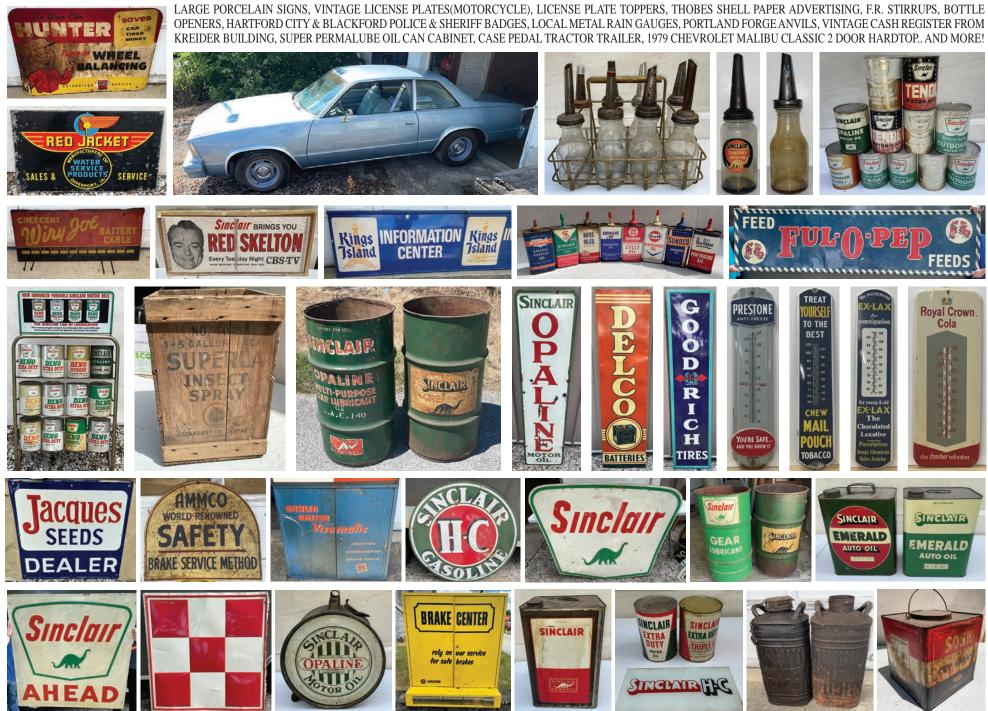

classic Arcade cast-iron thresher sold at \$350.

Also popular at this auction where fine examples of German "PipSqueak" toys. These interesting toys, generally representing animals, were constructed of papier-mache, wood and a cloth bellows that produced the toy's signature "squeak". A pipsqueak lion, standing only 6½ inches, sold at a respectable \$250, and a 4-inch dog was won by an absentee buyer for \$225. An absentee bidder from Texas secured a rare "political" squeaker with a mechanical action "human face/animal head" at \$1,000.

Americana Auctions owner Glen Rairigh and associate auctioneer Perry Gregory completed the 350-item auction, which included a wide array of antiques and collectibles, in exactly three hours. According to Rairigh, this mixed auction format will be the model for the upcoming auctions, allowing for both a fast-paced auction, and the opportunity for buyers to obtain specialized items for their collections while offering classic antiques to

PEQUANNOCK, N.J. — While BreyerFest once more had to be a virtual event due to health concerns related to the pandemic, that did not stop model horse lovers from spending money at the annual auction. Fans from 125 countries participated in the event

One of the highlights of BreyerFest is the live auction. There, a handful of plastic models are created in test colors that are hand-decorated at Breyer Animal Creations®, a division of Reeves International, Inc., in Pequannock. There were only 31 lots offered, yet an amazing total of \$238,000 was raised. The money will be donated to horse-related charities, including the Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship (PATH) International, the Cloud Foundation in support of wild horses on public lands, 4H Eastern and Western Round-Ups, HSUS, and the ASPCA.

wreath we not only knew the artisan, but we also knew who Parthena intended to memorialize.

So, what do we know about Parthena other than the fact that she was a patient and accomplished weaver, and that she had really good eyes? Well, she was born in the Town of Broome in Schoharie County, New York on February 25, 1802, to Revolutionary War veteran Ezra Rood and Parthena Marece Warner. In 1826 (or 1823) she became the third wife of Walter Barton (1800-1876). They resided in New Haven, Vt. Together they had three children: Lee Harriet (1828), Alanson (1833), and George (1836). It is believed that only George survived to adulthood. Parthena died on Oct. 7, 1892, at the age of 90. She is buried in Evergreen Cemetery, New Haven, Addison County, Vermont. But that is far from the end of Parthena's story.

It seems Parthena Barton achieved a degree of notoriety with stories about her appearing in the St. Paul Globe (11/7/1888), the New Orleans Times Picayune (11/7/1888), and even a feature story in the New York Sun newspaper. And, what brought Parthena such unprecedented attention? You guessed it, a memorial wreath. It seems Parthena created a wreath to memorialize her husband Walter that was so unique a reporter for the New York Sun made the long and difficult

journey from New York City to rural Vermont to view it and to interview Parthena. The title of the New York Sun article isn't exactly flattering, "A Widow's Appalling Memorial. The Curious Tribute to the Memory of Her Husband to Which an Old Vermont Lady points with Pride".

To create her wreath Parthena took items from her husband's life and wove them into a memorial. As the Sun reporter wrote "the Memorial was arranged in the form of a wreath and the articles which were its component parts would puzzle a junk dealer".

Parthena made flowers from little bits of her husband's handkerchief, vest, coat lining, socks, necktie, boots, suspenders, and even from a portion of the cushion he sat on in church. She added pieces of his mother's dress; his first wife's hair; a smelling bottle used by Walter's second wife; and the glass knobs from his bureau. She included the spoon Walter used to take his catarrh medicine; a piece of the shirt he died in; shavings from his wooden coffin; a feather from a fowl that Walter had raised; a section of wallpaper from their parlor; and a locket of hair from his first mother-in-law.

Parthena wasn't done. Among the many other items included in the frame she added several of Walter's teeth strung on a wire and his toothpick; a vial of cheese made 30 plus years earlier by Walter's second wife; raisins from the last batch he purchased before his death; horehound candies that he used for his cough; cherry stones from some choke cherries that he'd picked; walnuts given by a neighbor; along with bean, squash, melon, and orange seeds that Walter had planned to plant.

Parthena's creativity in making this wreath knew no bounds. She told the Sun reporter, "T'ain't natural to build monuments an' put flowers on graves of friends. What you want is a memento that's a reminder. That's why I made that wreath as it is. Every piece of it has got a history". She went on, "I'll tell you what it's made of. No, they ain't no use of that either. I've got it all written down for my children, and you can copy it." Parthena concluded the interview by saying, "All of the work on the frame was the labor of my poor old hands. Many of these things are sacred to the memory of the precious dead".

The New York Sun reporter concluded his article by writing, "Mrs. Barton sees no incongruity in the above conglomeration. To her it is all pathos. She is proud of her work and is now engaged in making a memorial wreath for herself".

Did Walter's wreath survive? We don't know, but with all the organic materials that adorned the memorial I'm guessing that it didn't stand the test of time very well. The wreath may not have endured but it appears that Parthena authored at least two booklets: "Experiences of a Practical Christian Life" in the form of a journal (National number 119.104), and "History of Mrs. Parthena R. Barton's Memorial Wreath" (January 1, 1886). I have not been able to find copies of either of these works. They were likely printed locally with very few copies produced. were all part of the Traditional series, Breyer's largest scale of model horses, at 1:9 the size of live horses or roughly ranging from 8-10 inches tall. Collectors save for months to be able to afford one of these beauties, and as they are revealed just before BreyerFest the excitement grows. The anticipation soared as bidders watched the results online. Final prices ranged from \$5,500 to \$18,000 for the top bid winner!

There were a few that drew hefty sums, but the racking Saddlebred stallion in glossy dappled bay lead the pack with a final bid of \$18,000. This relatively new model was originally introduced as a red bay tobiano named Hamilton as part of the Premier Collection in 2019, and later appeared in dapple black and palomino. This handsome

Parthena's story was shared by Chris Woodyard in her book "The Victorian Book of the Dead", and on the Haunted Ohio website with a narrative entitled "Detritus of the Dead" (2/6/2019) also by Chris Woodyard.

So, let's go back a couple of paragraphs to where the New York Sun reporter reports that "she is now engaged in making a memorial wreath for herself". That was 1888. The newly discovered marvelous "Memorial Masterpiece" that Parthena made "without glasses" was produced in 1889. Parthena died in 1892. It is entirely possible that the wreath I purchased is the one Parthena made memorializing herself and 42 of her best friends and relatives. Did Parthena imagine herself as the unassigned bird in the middle of the wreath surrounded by those she loved as together they fly away to heaven through the mandatory gap in the top of the wreath. Victorian Memorial Wreaths were never enclosed. There was always to be a gap at the top of the wreath to let the soul freely escape.

It's ironic that the heartfelt yet unconventional and perhaps even controversial wreath Parthena made for Walter that gained her country-wide notoriety likely didn't survive, but the wreath she so painstakingly made for herself, and her friends lives on as a breathtaking memorial to a woman who truly grasped and ran with the concept of Memorialization.

model generated much excitement due to his unique coloring, glossy finish, animated pose, and newness of the model.

The next three lots all finished at \$17,000 thanks to their beauty and competitive appeal. First was a Breyer semi-rearing Mustang. This model is a vintage mold that has been around for decades, but with this unique paint job he became a highly desirable prize. He was an eye-catching glossy bay brindle reverse overo in a wild pattern. Next, the galloping Akhal-Teke model debuted in the Premier Collection in 2020 as a dappled buckskin sabino with a flowing mane. For the auction, Brever created a variation on the basic model by roaching (shaving) the mane to provide a very sleek, athletic look and then produced it in a high-gloss black bay. The result was stunning, and the bidders agreed. The third lot in this esteemed trio was the amazing opportunity to design your very own Breyer model. The winning bidder will pick the mold (with some restrictions) and decoration, and then the Breyer team of artists will bring their dream to life.

The Breyer Premier Collection debuts exceptional models created by hobby artists before the models become part of the regular run line. Several of these auction beauties started as Premier models, including a recently released 2020 handsome trotting Morgan. Moving forward in a relaxed trot with neck arched and tail held high, he was finished in a warm, sooty palomino with pearly mane and tail. Many of the auction models were produced in a glossy finish, but the matte finish on this one seemed very appropriate as it looked like a live horse. He was claimed with a high bid of \$11,000.

Fireheart was offered this year as a new Premier Collection horse, but he also made an immediate appearance in this year's auction. Created in a red roan sabino color, this Mustang stallion is in a prancing pose with a wildly swishing tail and flying mane. The dark head and four white stockings provided a handsome image, and he was claimed with a high bid of 10,000.

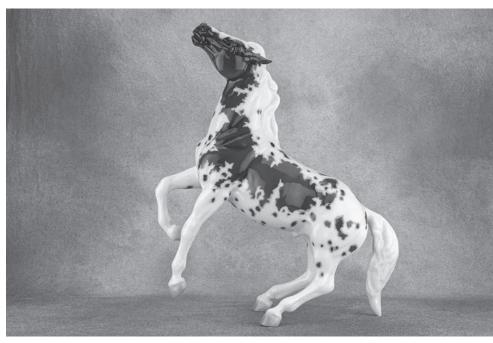
The theme of BreyerFest 2021 was "Horse of a Different Color", which provided the opportunity to showcase unusual horse patterns and colors. It also allowed the artists to be a little more daring and offer horses in non-realistic colors. The standing American Saddlebred stallion was one such fellow, presented in a glossy rainbow pinto with gold mapping. The colors were creatively displayed not as a rainbow of stripes (like a zebra) but woven into a realistic pinto pattern. The glossy finish helped to bring out the brilliance of the colors, and his attractive appearance drove the final bid up to \$10,000. Likewise, a



eye-catching glossy neon tiger pattern required a high bid of leopard Appaloosa coat and baby blue hat. He was eagerly \$9,500 to take her home.

tern of pink and yellow with blue interference (pearl coloring over a black body) really stood out as a colorful example. She required a bid of \$9,500 to claim her. Another model not found in nature was the glossy electric blue color shift zebra with a holographic base. Sporting a metallic sheen that a car enthusiast would be proud of, this incredible masterpiece was sent to a new stable with a final bid of \$6,500.

The vintage Old Timer model was given a new look as he was presented in a black leopard Appaloosa coat complete with partial harness and baby blue hat. This sweet old fellow, featuring halo spots, was claimed with a high bid of \$9,000. Another popular older model, Lady Phase, was offered as an attractive pearly leopard Appaloosa with ghost spotting. She also proved popular, requiring a final bid of \$9,000. A more recent addition to the Breyer regular line, the Rhenish-German draft horse, was finished as a glossy red pinto decorator. The gloss made the colors appear very deep and appealing. He was also claimed with a high bid of \$9,000.

There was a sweet dapple gray mare and adorable chestnut overo foal set offered. Susecion & Le Fire have always been popular with Breyer collectors and this duo proved the point, finishing

with a high bid of \$7,500 for the set. Other one-of-a-kind horses were sold for \$5,500-8,000.

In addition to the 18 unique models, there were various gift baskets, sets of horses from previous BreyerFests, and other generous donations. The total of \$238,000 was the highest that a Breyer-Fest auction has ever raised. The wide coverage provided by the internet live stream bidding, hosted by Dana Balsamo of Dana Auctions and carried on LiveAuctioneers, certainly helped drive those totals up.

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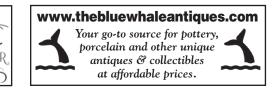

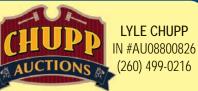

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PAGE 12 More gunfights fought in backyard than Old West

BY LARRY LEMASTERS

Contrary to television and movies, there were very few recorded gunfights in the old west. Individual gunfights, where two men faced each other in the street (like Marshall Matt Dillon did each week on Gunsmoke) were almost non-existent.

The most famous and best-recorded gunfight happened between Wild Bill Hickok and Davis Tutt on July 21.1865. in Springfield, Mo. Hickok and Tutt quarreled over cards and met alone in the street to settle the argument. With a single shot, Hickok shot Tutt through the heart when they were still 50 yards apart.

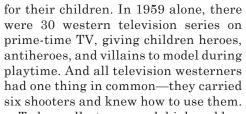
The Gunfight at the OK Corral is the West's most famous shootout (a shootout normally involved several gunmen). In just 30 seconds of shooting, Wyatt Earp and his brothers, along with Doc Holliday, shot and killed three of the Clanton-McLaury gang.

Still, with all the guns that were carried in the Wild West, it is a common fact that more gunfights and shootouts took place during the 1950s between Backyard Buckaroos than in all the Wild West combined.

In our politically correct atmosphere today, it is hard to imagine a time when parents eagerly purchased toy cap guns

While few true-life sheriffs and outlaws carried two-gun rigs in the west, television was full of hard shooting men who believed two guns were better than one. And these television westerners, armed with two pistols, often were ambidextrous, firing both guns at once, one in each hand. It was quite a sight, early on a Saturday morning, to see the Lone Ranger, Wyatt Earp, Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, or Hopalong Cassidy draw both of their six shooters and blast away.

While Mattel, Schmidt and other toy manufacturers made two-gun rigs for wanna-be gunslingers, it was Hubley Manufacturing Company of Lancaster, Pa., that truly popularized the two-pistol holster.

John Hubley founded Hubley Manu-

facturing in 1894, producing a wide range of cast iron, zinc alloy, and plastic toy cap guns. The first Hubley cap guns were produced in 1909, but it is Hubley's die cast zinc alloy western cap guns from the 1950s that capture collectors' imaginations.

Hubley quickly realized children wanted western character cap guns from popular television shows that would create a loud 'bang" and emit puffs of

showing gunslinger cap guns display.

smoke when the pistol's trigger was pulled. Cap guns were named for this small "cap" of exploding material.

Hubley gave kids what they wanted, manufacturing cap guns such as the Lone Ranger, Wyatt Earp, Wyatt Earp Buntline Special, Davy Crockett, Roy Rogers, and Gene Autry. As more and more western shows aired in the 1950s, Hubley produced more and more cap pistols.

Hubley also specialized, more than any other toy manufacturer, in manufacturing two-gun sets with holsters.

But being a cap gun toting gunslinger in the 1950s came at a steep price. A Sears Christmas catalog from 1958 shows four two-gun sets that sell in the range of \$3 to \$6. Compare those prices to food prices in 1958 when 10



pounds of potatoes sold for 39 cents and white bread, the only kind of bread sold in 1958, sold two loafs for 39 cents. Six dollars could feed a family of four for two weeks in '58, so spending it on a toy cap gun was truly extravagant. However, today, that same \$6 two-gun cap pistol set might easily cost \$600 or more

Times change, and cap guns have generally lost their appeal with parents and kids. But in the 1950s, with a broom handle for a horse, a ball cap for a Stetson, and a Hubley Lone Ranger cap pistol in his hand, many a Backyard Buckaroo fought imaginary outlaws while firing his trusty 50-cap six shooter in the air and screaming, "Hi, Ho, Silver. Away!"

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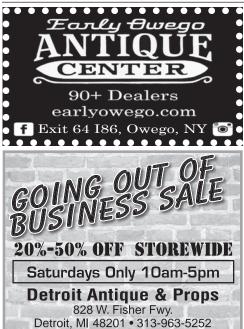

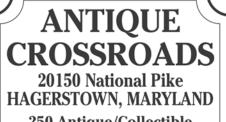

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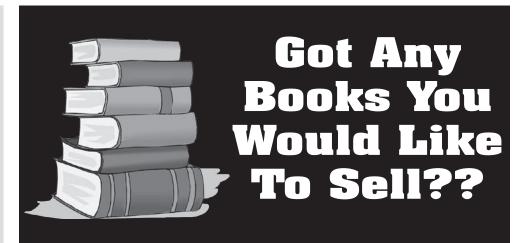

pharmaceutical-oriented products. Still other variations in his collection include oversized ceramic teapots (McCormick's, Nestea, and Boscul, for instance) and barrels (for Stewart's iced tea), all dispensers equipped with a spout. Calling them "a little different," Kirk agreed that these examples could be considered the forerunners of soda dispensers now found in convenience stores and casual dining and fast-food restaurants.

On the other hand, "pretty much" all dispensers were lidded, but not always in an expected way. One particularly quirky exception is a glass "log cabin" topped with a removable "roof." And then there is the relatively simple footed tray, uncovered, that was once used to display Clark's Teaberry Gum.

The most popular dispensers among collectors are Planters Peanuts jars, from which peanuts were scooped out and sold by the bagful for a nickel; in addition to jars, Kirk has also collected original glass scoops and bags. Due to their popularity, it is not surprising that Planters jars are the ones most reproduced.

To determine if a jar is old or a recently manufactured import, Kirk recommended feeling its underside. Because old jars underwent considerable handling over the years, the bottoms of these glass jars became smooth, the result of glass being rubbed repeatedly along a countertop. "The originals show wear on the bottom," he said. "Turn it over, and if it looks like it just came out of a factory, it probably did." Collectors not only accept signs of wear, but they also expect it.

As for the value of store countertop dispensers, Kirk said that a large jar "could run \$100 and up," but, he noted, "it depends on where it's sold." Jars sold in an area with local connections tend to realize higher prices. In general, collectors should look to see that there are no (or few) chips or cracks, and that they retain their original lid (where appropriate).

Sad to say, many of these items are becoming increasingly challenging to find. "I've been going a long, long time without seeing one in a store," Kirk remarked, adding that it has been about 10 years since he's made such a purchase. On the other hand, there are opportunities for beginning collectors, as older collectors begin to sell off what they've conserved for nearly half a century. Similarly, these jars are beginning to become available at estate auctions. Although there are no clubs specifically dedicated to his specialty; Kirk concluded that connecting with members of collectors' clubs dedicated to advertising items might be helpful.

As for Kirk, he is reluctant to break up his lifelong collection, hoping to maintain a

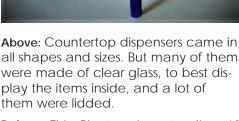
