Ceramic Arts Studio wares still delight collectors

"An amazing sight meets your eye as you enter Ceramic Arts Studio in Madison, Wisconsin: hundreds upon hundreds of imaginative porcelain figurines, ready to grace whatnots all over the country. Each is imaginatively conceived, true to anatomy, free of flaws, and beautifully finished. Behind every design is a keen awareness of 'what Mrs. Jones likes'—an awareness sharpened by contact with buyers, by vision, and by common sense." — "March of Progress, "December 1945

Knowing "what Mrs. Jones liked" — in other words, what décor items a typical consumer of the 1940s and '50s would be most eager to purchase — is certainly one reasonable explanation for the phenomenal popularity of figurines produced by Madison's Ceramic Arts Studio. Although most ceramic firms of the era were located on the West Coast, this little Studio in the Midwest, operating out of a converted garage, quickly outpaced its better-known California contemporaries. Ceramic Arts Studio was in operation for 15 years, from 1940 until 1955. At its peak, the Studio turned out over 500,000 figurines annually.

The "Mrs. Jones" factor is just one reason why CAS figurines have managed to capture and hold public interest. Among the others:

* Demand. In the early 1940s, World War II closed off the import of giftware from overseas, greatly increasing the demand for domestically produced decorative items.

* Detail. Ceramic Arts Studio figurines combine imaginative design with a high degree of skill in execution. The CAS decorating technique focused on finely depicted features and intricate nuances of costume; vivid colors and a characteristic high gloss glaze added to the effect. Each Studio figurine seems captured in motion, a three-dimensional snapshot preserving a very specific moment in time.

* Design. Most importantly, Ceramic Arts Studio owes its success to the artistry of designer Betty Harrington. Prior to her arrival in 1942, CAS was a struggling pottery firm. Afterward, it was a force to be reckoned with. Founded in 1940, was a collaboration between entrepreneur Reuben Sand and potter Lawrence Rabbitt. Finding little success with hand-thrown pots, Sand began looking for other opportunities. Betty Harrington became that opportunity. She was the right person, at the right time, in exactly the right place.

only brief formal training. Since childhood, she had kept a scrapbook filled with her sketches, as well as illustrations that inspired her. Betty said that her interest in art was "just always there, like your nose or your eyes. It was just second nature."

A secretary for the state of Wisconsin, Harrington happened upon Ceramic Arts Studio while searching for a source to fire a figurine. That first figure, a "Blue Nude Incense Burner," was sculpted on impulse, from blue clay excavated during a well installation at the Harrington home. Impressed with the quality of the piece, Sand asked Harrington if she would be willing to make other figures, bring them in, and have molds made. The answer was an enthusiastic "yes!" In Betty's words, "I was surprised and a little flattered, I think, and ready and willing — I mean, it was such fun to try!"

Juggling two jobs along with an active home life was strenuous, but Betty never regretted the frantic pace. After a year, she began a full-time association with Ceramic Arts. Her pleasure in finding this ideal outlet for her creative energies remained

Worthpoint offered treasure hunt at Tri-State Antique Market

LAWRENCEBURG, Ind. — Worthpoint joined the action at the Tri-State Antique Market the weekend of July31-Aug. 1, hosting two events for attendees. An eBay selling workshop was held Saturday afternoon at the Lawrenceburg Doubletree and on Sunday they guided an all-day "treasure hunt" teaching attendees how to pick like a pro.

For those unfamiliar with Worthpoint, it's world's largest antiques and collectibles pricing and research resource. The suite of tools is anchored by the Worthopedia price guide that gives subscribers access to more than 560-million historical prices and over 1.2-billion pictures compiled from online marketplaces ranging from eBay to many of the leading auction houses in the country. Additional resources include a digitized library of over 1,000 antiques guides, a maker's mark and autograph gallery with 130,000 identifiers, a subscribers' newsletter, a prolific blog, and a popular podcast. Subscriptions currently start at \$22.99 per month with free trials available.

Worthpoint launched the treasure hunt idea in 2017 in Long Beach, Calif. Nearly

Cigar store Indian topped Pook auction at \$63,000

DOWNINGTOWN, Pa. — The May 21 Americana and International auction continued a season of very strong results for Pook & Pook Inc. It was the first event at which face masks were not required for everyone. Seeing old familiar faces brought visible smiles. The air of festivity fueled some spirited bidding.

First on the block was a collection of 15 antique historical firefighting items and Americana from the vaults of a New Jersey museum. The first item sold turned out to be the top lot of the auction. It was a cigar store Indian by Thomas Brooks of New York. Standing 88 inches tall, this beautifully carved and polychromed sculpture towered over the sales room. Purported to have been made in 1882, it

was in a wonderful state of preservation and retained its original plinth. After a lively bidding war, the statue commanded \$63,000. Other spectacular prices for the New Jersey collection included two Philadelphia painted fireman's parade hats. One came from the Taylor Hose Company and was decorated with a vignette of President Zachary Taylor. It brought \$22,680. The second hat was from the United States Hose Company, with a vignette of a seated Liberty and inscribed United We Stand, Divided We Fall. It sold for \$25,200.

An early fire pump wagon, circa 1747, purportedly made in England for a Philadelphia volunteer fire company, rolled in with a cool \$8,820.

these events from the beginning. The veteran eBayer has been selling online since 1997, has served as an eBay education specialist, and was inducted into eBay's "Hall of Fame" in 2008. She's even provided eBay training through the U.S. Postal Service. In addition, she runs the Power Selling Mom website and co-hosts Worthpoint's "Flip It or Skip It" podcast. So, participants got to learn from an expert online seller and someone who knows her way around the vintage world.

The treasure hunts, of course, provide exposure for Worthpoint and allow the company to share its brand. Yet, Crawford stressed, "There's no pressure. We're not pushing the product. We welcome anyone to participate." She went on to say, "We want to genuinely show that we're more than a company. We're a community of like-minded folks. It's all about enjoying the company of people who love what we love!"

Sunday's event was free and open to the public, although spots were limited, and advance registration was required. Worthpoint even furnished perks - free entrance to the show, lunch at a nearby restaurant, and entry into a drawing to win \$500.

About 58 people signed up for the treasure hunt. Crawford expected about 75 percent would show. By 8:45, about 20 people had arrived at the Worthpoint tent where company staff greeted them and provided a tote bag containing a Treasure Hunt 2021 t-shirt, additional Worthpoint and eBay premiums, and a discount coupon for a Worthpoint subscription.

Introductions were the first order of business. Participants noted where they hailed from – it ranged from urban locales like Cincinnati and Indianapolis to rural spots like Medford, Ind. - and whether they were collectors or resellers. This group, unlike many which tend to be split evenly among collectors and dealers, leaned clearly towards collectors. Those folks were looking for everything from fishing lures

and Disney items to stereoviews and even rolling pins. Resellers specialized in categories like vintage clothing and jewelry, mid-century modern furniture, and barware. Only a handful of the participants were already familiar with Worthpoint.

While the guests' backgrounds diverged, their shared passion for antiques and collectibles was clear. One owned an 1890s sewing machine that she still uses. Another described her house as looking like a department store, complete with mannequins outfitted in attire spanning from Victorian and 1920s flapper garb to 1950s sportswear. Yet another was a worker at an Indianapolis Goodwill store where she could be "close to the finds."

After introducing Worthpoint and its benefits, Crawford chronicled several prior treasure hunts, acknowledging their appeal. "We recognize that one of the joys is the thrill of the chase," she proclaimed.

As the group readied themselves to scour the show, Crawford invited anyone interested to shop alongside her and other Worthpoint staff to benefit from their insight, while also lauding those who preferred to hunt on their own and trust their instincts. Everyone was encouraged to use Worthpoint during the hunt to buy right and ascertain possible market value.

After approximately three hours of rummaging, everyone met for lunch at the waterfront RiverWatch restaurant and a "show-and-tell"

where each participant had the opportunity to talk about their finds and the deals they made. One of the day's noteworthy picks was a limited-edition Disney giclee entitled "Villains. All Their Wicked Ways" valued around \$700-\$800 but snagged for well under a quarter of that amount. A three-piece 1950s blonde wood living room set made by Cincinnati's Philcraft was purchased for \$30 and was expected to sell for around \$200 in the dealer's shop. Even modest finds were among the bounty like a few carefully selected vintage fishing lures for one of the collectors and a 1960s stainless steel cocktail shaker discovered on a bargain table for \$5 destined for that dealer's store at a likely \$20.

The afternoon prior, Worthpoint also offered an eBay selling workshop, with



Crawford at the podium. The three-hour seminar had about 22 enrolled and covered everything from basic and advanced eBay listing techniques to international shipping, and even details on eBay's newest features. While the training didn't get as fundamental as opening an eBay account, it was for all experience levels. Crawford explained, "In the eBay training, we don't start with the account setup. We ask for a show of hands for where people are with their experience. We begin there." She added, "There are people there who've been selling on eBay as long as I have and still pick up something new!"

a Christian Alsdorf ink and watercolor book plate with its original German scrip song book bringing \$10,080.

Painted furniture was in high demand. A Pennsylvania painted pine drysink with an old pale green surface over the original red, and an irresistible original blue interior, crossed the auction block at \$6,930. A diminutive 19th century Pennsylvania painted pine bucket bench with an old red surface inspired spirited bidding, selling for \$5,292.

Pook & Pook continued to feature exceptional tall case clocks. A Chester County Chippendale cherry tall case clock, circa 1770, signed B. Benjamin Chandlee, Nottingham, and descended in the Chandlee family, brought \$23,940. American artists were widely represented. Of note was a Wilhelm Gottfried Bauer oil on canvas family portrait hammered down for \$8,820, and a rare collection of Civil War drawings. Confederate soldier John Jacob Omerhausser, an Austrian immigrant candy maker, was a prisoner of war at Point Lookout, Md., who whiled away the time by drawing everything around him. Omerhausser detailed many aspects of daily life for the prisoners as well as interactions with the Black soldiers assigned to guard them. Sold in pairs, and originally bartered for food and art supplies, they were in high demand, with lots 185 and 190 each bringing \$5,796.

The Gold Rush show is back with sellers eager to meet buyers

ROCHESTER, Minn. — The Gold Rush (show) is back, and expectations are high among those with "antiques fever," when this Minnesota town will be bursting at the seams on Aug. 20-22.

After 49 years, the Gold Rush has become one of the best (and oldest) antiques show in the country. It has become a special meeting point for many of the top dealers in United States, particularly the "Road Warriors" who spend much of the year traveling from show to show.

However, during the past two years there has been a great lapse in time since these buyers and sellers have been able to get together. Covid-19 closed the two spring shows in 2020 and 2021, with the fall show in August 2020 also falling victim to the pandemic.

The show traditionally has been scheduled for the third weekends of May and August. Due to the capricious nature of the virus and government decisions, show promoters don't get much notice that their show is being cancelled. The Spring show in 2020 was canceled by state government notice on March 20.

"There's not much you can do about it," said Richard Townsend, who owns the show with his wife, Rae. "You just have to move on."

But this year will be different. The indoor/ outdoor event at the 52-acre Graham Park, close to downtown Rochester will have 705

dealers under the roofs of eight grand old stone Depression-era buildings. Up to 600 more dealers are expected to set up throughout the spacious park. There is outdoor lighting throughout much of the park after dark.

There is more than ample parking, with RV electrical and water hook-ups available. Accommodations are also available to bus tours and special collector clubs.

"We're as happy as larks; this year we are rearing to go," Richard Townsend said. "We're getting quite a few calls, asking whether we're still having the show, and I want everyone to know that we have clearance from the State and County."

Masks will be required for all indoor activities at the Gold Rush, per government orders. Outside buyers and sellers will not be required to mask up.

"We'll have dealers coming in from New York to California, Minnesota to Florida. You'll be able to buy anything from five cents to \$50,000. We're talking tons of antiques; anything you can think of. We have dealers in the 90s who still drive and get into the show. One 82-year-old lady from Phoenix called a few days ago and said she's on her way ... it's exciting to hear from our friends."

Townsend sees himself as "somewhat of an Ambassador for the Antiques Business."

"I try to encourage others to stay in the business, to keep in the hunt and enjoy life,"

he says. I'm 79 years old and I tell people I'm going to keep running this show until I'm 94 years old, 'so you can't quit until I do."

Townsend nearly has a lifetime relationship with the Gold Rush show. After starting an antiques show with another dealer in 1959, he helped the original founder of Gold Rush get the show rolling. He was also a dealer at the very first show.

"The man who started it was Earl Berg," Townsend recalled. "At the time, he asked me to come out and offer advice. I was happy to do so, not even thinking that I would one day own the show."

Twenty years after helping start the show, Townsend Shows purchased the show.

"We've run it for 29 years now," he said. "When I married my beautiful wife, she knew very little about antiques, but she jumped right in and has been a huge asset."

"I think we have become a "destination stop," Rae Townsend said. "Lots of people schedule their vacations, or Mayo Clinic (which is in Rochester) appointments around the show. It's a family-oriented environment, and a great chance to show history to children."

And it's easy to find, according to Rae, at the intersection of Highway 63 South and 16th Street. From that point look for the 151-foot "Ear of Corn Water Tower." The landmark relic from the local historic Seneca Foods canning factory adjacent to Graham

Park was built in 1931 as an acknowledgement to one of the main vegetables processed in the facility which closed in 2019. The former factory was razed, leaving only the iconic water tower standing. During the Covid-19 shutdown, workers began renovating the park, which included re-painting the Ear of Corn Water Tower.

"It looks great." Rae Townsend said. "A lot of people from the area know they're home when they see the water tower."



Estate of Col. Howard Johnson to highlight Kaminski offering

BEVERLY, Mass. — Kaminski Auctions' Aug. 28-29 auction features the estate of Colonel Howard "Scrappy" Johnson of Palm Beach Gardens, Fla. Colonel Johnson retired in 1972 from the United States Air Force after an illustrious career where he was awarded two Silver Stars, two Legions of Merit, seven Distinguished Flying Crosses, and 18 Air Medals. In 1958 he set a record altitude in the F-104 Starfighter in "Operation Sky High" and received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

A veteran of World War II, Korea, and Vietnam, and one of the founders of the Red River Valley Fighter Pilots Association, Howard "Scrappy" Johnson died in December 2020 at the age of 100.

He was awarded the Collier Trophy for one of the most outstanding aeronautical achievements of 1958 by President Richard Nixon for his record-setting flight.

His wife was Elena Rova O'Brien Johnson, the north county founder of True Treasures consignment shops. Johnson moved in 1987 to Palm Beach County, where she worked for an interior designer and later opened her own business True Treasures Consignments.

Their collection includes Asian and European decorative antiques, and furniture, as well as USAF uniforms and United States Air Force memorabilia. Of particular interest is a Coromandel 12-panel screen having incised carved Chinese figures, measuring 95 inches high with each panel measuring 17 ½ inches wide and a Chinese portrait of a seated Empress, watercolor on paper, framed.

Furniture highlights include a pair of burled mahogany bow-front chests having banded inlay, a late 19th-century German walnut library table having exotic wood inlays, pierced Gothic stretcher fretwork, and carved bird heads, an Italian four-drawer burlwood serpentine commode, and a pair of decorative Louis XVstyle fauteuil chairs.

Other items of interest include an Art Deco style vanity table a pair of Italian alabaster urn shape ceiling fixtures, a pair of iron X-form benches having tooled leather upholstery, and a green-painted gilt foliate framed mirror having a carved shell crest and Gothic arches.





Toy semis pulled in big bids at Vander Kolk Auctions

DORR, Mich. — Leo "Beck" Smith spent most of his working life as a truck driver. He remained active in retirement, traveling, collecting, and by local accounts "baking the world's best cookies". Vander Kolk Auctions was given the opportunity to disperse the estate of this interesting and active 92-year-old, which featured 716 lots of tools, yard equipment, household items, and more. The over 350 lots of collectible trucks and tractors offered were a logical tie-in to his career on the road. This was an online-only auction, and local pick up was available for the three days following the close of the auction. Prices here do not include the buyer's premium.

With his mechanical background, the yard equipment and tools offered were impeccably maintained by their former owner. Taking top honors in this category, was the John Deere X300 lawn tractor with 127 hours, bagger, hydrostatic transmission, and a 42-inch midmount mower deck. This exceptional work horse was claimed with a high bid of \$1,325. A particularly useful Bolens 1981 H16xt garden tractor also with a 42-inch deck had the additional feature of a 36-inch rototiller. In fine working order, this specimen closed with a high bid of \$386. Other handy yard equipment included the Troy-Bilt 2600 psi pressure washer with a Honda 5 hp engine that finished at \$155, a Yard Machines 3-in-1 chipper/shredder/vacuum unit with a 4.5 hp Brigg's engine at \$56, and a Spirit 24-inch snowblower with a 5 hp Tecumseh engine for \$51.

The workshop was well equipped with quality tools that were appreciated by the bidders. The Ridgid 13-inch thickness planer was listed with the comment that it was maybe used once. The shiny steel infeed/outfeed table extensions looked as if they had just come from the factory. This rugged machine found a new job with a final bid of \$365. Other items by this same company included the Ridgid 10inch contractor table saw that closed at \$231 and a Ridgid 16-inch variable speed scroll saw for \$58.50. Waiting for its next job, a Werner 24-foot orange aluminum extension ladder left with a final bid of \$130. The Porter Cable 135 psi Jetstream air compressor with a 15-gallon tank and 4.5 hp motor finished at \$77.50, and a 3 by 21-inch Ryobi electronic belt sander topped out at \$56. Two more items to help keep a workshop running were the Coleman Powerbase 5000 generator that left for \$200 and the Remington 40 torpedo heater for \$90. Finally, who could pass up a Shark IQ Robot vacuum, that was taken with a high bid of \$200. Numerous other tools by Craftsman, Schumacher, Delta, DeWalt and more rounded out this impressive set up.

Turning to the fun side of the auction, there were collectibles that represented the owner's interest in trucks and tractors, and they included some unusual and eye-catching items. Still packaged in the original royal blue box and looking sleek, a brilliant orange diecast 2002 Collector Club Exclusive Edition Franklin Mint 1977 Pontiac Trans Am was taken away with a high bid of \$170.50. A close second was the vintage red Buddy L truck with carriage headlights, black running boards, and a large radiator grill plus a boxy trailer, both with spoked wheels. It was previously equipped with battery operated lights, but pieces were reported missing. However, that did not deter the high bidder who might have plans to restore it after successfully securing it with a high bid of \$166. The next remarkable vehicle was the Franklin Mint Bigfoot #14 precision diecast 1:24 Monster truck in metallic blue with flames on the sides and floatation tires. This exceptionally accurately detailed prize in its original box was claimed with a high bid of \$132.50. The SpecCast Gardner Stone's "The General" Stage IV Grand National Champion Unlimited Modified Pulling Tractor Transport left with a final bid of \$142.50. Groups of vehicles also proved extremely popular. A lot consisting of four DCP by First Gear Tov TruckN Construction 1:64 collectible semis were outfitted with a variety of items. They included accurate replicas of Peterbilt trucks and trailers featuring a mac end dump

truck, transport trailers with sleeper trucks, a dry goods trailer, spool loads, and many other precise models. Each example had been featured as official models for the National Toy Truck and Construction Show over various years. Each was still in its original box complete with documentation. This highly desirable package finished with a high bid of \$405. Three similar groups closed for \$165-210. A catchy group of four diecast cars featuring vehicles from Charlie's Angels, American Graffiti, a 1964 Shelby Cobra, and a1955 Thunderbird left with a final bid of \$121. There was a vast number of other vehicle models, including NASCAR, agricultural equipment, trains, product delivery trucks, and semis representing a huge variety of businesses. 

proved particularly popular in major metropolitan areas, as well as in California, despite stiff competition from the local product.


CAS retailers were assiduously cultivated; both Sand and Harrington took note of their comments and interests in planning additions to the line. When Dutch or dancer couples, for instance, proved strong sellers, variations with a similar theme were introduced. Even an extended "skunk family" came about as the result of one prominent store's desire for figurines which would appropriately accent its perfume displays.

Betty firmly believed that "any little novelty thing is good in decorative pieces; people always want something to talk about, you know." One such innovation was the CAS shelf-sitter. These were figurines designed to perch on a shelf with their legs (or, in the case of animals, their tails or paws), dangling over the edge. Betty's interest in the costume designs of modern dance pioneer Martha Graham led to a series of arts-inspired draped figures, with arms and legs fully, or partially, concealed under flowing garments. This simple and modern styling elevated CAS design to a new level. Not only did the body draping produce what Betty called "beautiful, graceful forms," it also had a more practical purpose: exquisite detail was realized with a minimum of time and labor.

Harrington's work embraced themes popular with buyers of the time such as animals (one top seller, "Frisky Lamb," sold over 100,000 units), children, and figures in ethnic or period attire, as well as arts-related, fairy tale, and fantasy figures. Some CAS pieces also had practical applications: banks, bells, candleholders, salt-and-pepper shakers, and head vases.

With every new design, extensive research went into making certain each detail of attire and pose was authentic and suitable. Research and authenticity, however, would have been nothing without the added ingredient of Harrington's creative spark. It often took the designer to new and uncharted realms of the imagination. "You took a piece of clay," she recalled, "and you formed it into whatever was in your mind. Sometimes along the way, the clay would sort of take over and do its own thing, and you'd get something into it that you hadn't intended in the beginning. Especially on people figurines — they took on their own personality - a tilt of a head, a position of an arm, making it look different. And it wasn't intentional in my mind, but I'd see it there when I was doing it, and it looked good, so I'd do it that way."

With the end of World War II, and the resumption of overseas imports, Ceramic Arts Studio went into a gradual, but irreversible decline. Lower operating costs, cheaper materials, and inexpensive labor meant overseas manufacturers could supply giftware at a fraction of the CAS cost. WWW.ANTIQUEWEEK.COM

In 1955, the studio finally closed.

What accounts for the ongoing, and irresistible appeal of Ceramic Arts pieces? In addition to their obvious high quality of execution, there's also an underlying sense of joy that permeates and enlivens every piece. It's a joy that can be directly traced to the designer. Of her years at Ceramic Arts Studio, Betty Harrington once said "I just loved every minute of it." Her work reflects that love.
