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Lincoln Logs have been building memories for decades

Lincoln Logs have entertained children for decades.

What many don't know is that Lincoln Logs the toy was created by John Lloyd Wright, son of famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright.

Growing up in Oak Park, Ill., John Lloyd Wright spent many hours in the "wonderland playroom" designed by his father. Underneath a soaring vaulted ceiling he constructed his own wonders using just his imagination and a collection of assorted building blocks developed by Friedrich Froebel, the German educator who championed the concept of kindergarten.

At age 24, John was working sideby-side with his father as chief assistant on the design of Tokyo's Imperial Palace Hotel. Faced with the challenge of building a structure that could withstand the powerful earthquakes that regularly shook Japan, Frank Lloyd Wright sketched an ingenious design that relied on a system of interlocking timber beams that would allow the hotel to sway but not collapse in case of a tremor. His creation did, indeed, prove tremor-safe as it survived the Tokyo earthquake of 1923.

The relationship between father and son crumbled over money long before the earthquake-proof hotel was ever constructed, so John set out on his own. Out of work, the son turned his attention to a pint-sized design project that would eventually lead to the invention of Lincoln Logs as they are known today. The younger Wrights' toy log construction was influenced by the construction of his father's Imperial Palace Hotel in Tokyo.

In 1916, using the blueprint for the Imperial House as a model, John created a toy construction set that consisted of notched pieces of wood that children could stack to build log cabins and other rustic buildings. Unlike Forbel's building blocks, the interlocking system of miniature logs could withstand the shockwaves unleashed by children's playing roughly with the toys. Wright made certain his boxes included the phrase "for boys and girls." Gender-based toy segregation usually dictated the selling of dollhouses to girls and train sets to boys, but Lincoln Logs wanted a broad

appeal, a toy for everyone.

During World War I, when other toy manufacturers were slowing production to help build military supplies, Wright and business partner Walter Pratt Beachy started the Red Square Toy Company in Chicago, mass-producing Lincoln Logs for a country in need of tangible, vaguely nostalgic distractions.

ation a name that also evoked an American icon – Lincoln Logs.

Capitalizing on both a nostalgia for the frontier at a time when the U.S. was becoming increasingly urbanized and a wave of patriotism in the wake of World War I, Lincoln Logs became an instant success. He attempted to build on the success of Lincoln Logs in the 1930s with Wright Blocks, a toy construction set with interlocking wooden shapes that allowed budding architects to build castles or other complex designs. Wright Blocks, however, proved too intricate and lacked the same appear as Lincoln Logs. During the baby-boom following

"Red Square" was a reference to the red square logo that the elder Wright used on a lot of his official documents, but with anti-Communist sentiment on the rise, John wisely changed course and began selling his products under his own name within a few years. Wright patented his toy in 1920 and he bestowed upon his cre-

Tri-State Market continues to evolve after 30 years

LAWRENCEBURG, Ind. — This year's fourth Tri-State Antique Market, held August 1, sported a couple of special events, destined to help turn southeast Indiana into what show promoter Aaron Metzger believes will be the antiquing epicenter of the Hoosier state.

With thirty-plus years behind it, the Tri-State is already Indiana's largest antiques and vintage market. This round there was added fanfare with the debut of the nearby Vevay Antique and Collectible Flea Extravaganza the day before and Worthpoint's guest appearance for two days of workshops.

Vevay's inaugural show took place Saturday at the nearby Switzerland County 4-H Fairgrounds, hosted by Switzerland County Tourism as a fundraiser to benefit local charities. With around ten vendors, it was a modest start; but the show is predicted to blossom, and the plan is to continue holding the Vevay show the Saturday before each Tri-State.

Then, there was the buzz tied to Worthpoint's visit. On Saturday, staff from Worthpoint held a three-hour eBay training at the Lawrenceburg DoubleTree hotel. On

Collector brings mermaids ashore in new museum

Some people baked sourdough bread. Others adopted a dog (or two) or binge-watched "The Sopranos." And then there's Alyssa Maloof, a painter-turned-photographer, who, during the pandemic, "heard the siren's call." Heeding that summons, she began to amass a variety of mermaid-related artifacts and proceeded to open The Mermaid Museum in the coastal town of Berlin, Md., because, as she noted, "It needed to be done."

Maloof is not alone in her fascination with sea creatures. Legends surrounding mermaids are old and universal in nature, widely accepted by seamen and coastal dwellers well into the 19th century, as noted in the book "Folklore, Myths, and Legends of Britain." Among this publication's illustrations is a 16th-century sketch of a "seafolk," part fish but with the head of a lion. But an early woodcut from the following century features an image more in keeping with the modern-day concept of a mermaid, a seductive fish-like creature with the upper body of a woman (who just happened to have long, flowing hair).

As noted in "Folklore," published in 1977 by Reader's Digest, mermaids are "remarkably similar, whatever their country of origin." It was believed that encounters with them could sometimes be disastrous, as superstitious seafarers feared their appearance might be the portent of troubled waters and impending death; those lured by their sweet singing may well be carried away beneath the waves. On the other hand, "kindnesses" extended to mermaids could be "rewarded with life-long service and good luck." Whereas these beliefs were held in many communities until the late

19th century, there are those who still believe in mermaids, whether in earnest or as a pleasant diversion.

Regardless of the nature of her beliefs, it would seem that Maloof has done nothing to displease mermaids. Quite the contrary. Her first brush with these sea creatures was getting a mermaid tattoo at the age of 17. Although she had haunted favorite antique shops in Philadelphia during her college days, "I really didn't collect anything before the start of Covid," she explained. That's when everything changed. And on March 27 of this year, she opened The Mermaid Museum, the first museum in the world to be dedicated to mermaids, according to her website.

once an Odd Fellows Hall was underutilized during the pandemic.

Overall, the museum is aesthetically pleasing and one that takes several hours to thoroughly digest; thanks to her artist's sensibilities, Maloof has transformed the space into an inviting destination, combining historical facts along with fanciful exhibits. Those entering Maloof's museum are greeted by a full-size masthead ("the entry piece"). Among other stand-out objects in the cavernous oneroom space is a handsome fountain, bedecked with a circle of mermaids. Lining the walls

are what she characterized as the serious side of her obsession, including artwork, old publications, and documentation of the history of mermaids and explanations of their enduring appeal.

But the "centerpiece" of her collection is

Thanks to a fanciful imagination, a keen eye, and the wonders of the internet, her collection blossomed. Finding the perfect space for a public display was the easy part, as her in-town photography studio in what was what is known as a "Fiji mermaid," one example of freakish artifacts that were popular in the second half of the 19th century. They were made when a fishtail and the taxider-

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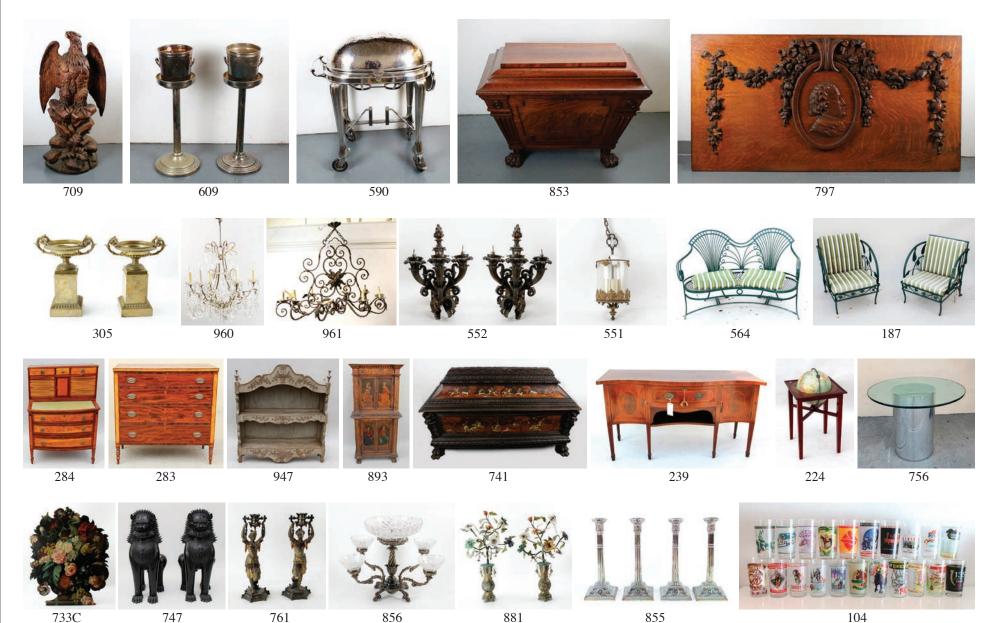

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Accompaniments like the above attest to how shows like the Tri-State are evolving to better appeal to modern audiences. The idea is to provide a "complete experience" with not only shopping, but food, activities, and sometimes even entertainment. For instance, in addition to enjoying the numerous food vendors, Tri-State goers can now sample wines and take home a bottle from Delhi Ohio's Homestead Wines.

Even with the additions, the show ran slightly smaller this time, with about 180 vendors and around 3,000 shoppers in attendance. The ebb didn't appear to faze an upbeat Metzger, who, reflecting on 2020's challenges, gladly exclaimed, "We're really happy getting back to normal!"

The market certainly attracted its share of both seasoned vendors and enthusiastic first-time sellers. One of the regulars, Jack Sparks from Louisville, Ky., has been selling at Tri-State almost since its inception. Tenure has its benefits; he was in a prime covered spot, the first vendor on the main concourse inside the gate. Out front, priced at \$375, he showcased a 15-inch museum-quality figure of a Native American planting corn. In its enclosure was a red ribbon labeled "First prize, Inter-Tribal Indian Ceremony, Gallup, New Mexico, 1970".

Adjacent to Sparks was By Design from Seymour, Ind. Prominent along their back wall was a rolled-iron 1970s wall clock with two matching sconces priced at \$250. Nicely staged near the front was an array of trunks — a wood camelback for \$60, a steamer case for \$25, and a small wood case for \$30.

Across the fairgrounds, another long-timer, Patrick Mayer from nearby Aurora, Ind., had parked an eye-catching motorized rickshaw. The running-condition vehicle was manufactured in the 1930s by the Mainland Carriage Company in what was then Taiwan. It was eventually brought to the U.S. and purchased by the Shriners on

the southside of Chicago. Mayer eventually acquired it from an estate. Not surprisingly, it spurred a lot of discussions, even with an \$8,000 price tag.

Although a newbie vendor, George from Lebanon, Ohio, had a professionally staged booth. Centerpoint in his space, priced at \$175, was a 1950s red Formica table with leaf and four chairs that attracted plenty of attention. Atop the table were several period-correct rotary phones priced at \$35 each.

On whole, furniture was a little sparse. This was consistent with many large shows after COVID lockdowns. It seems dealers are still a bit reluctant to tote out large pieces, unsure if shoppers are ready to buy bigger items. As expected, most of the dealers with furniture paid extra to be under roof in the pavilions. One of them, Carl Lingen of Lingen's Antiquities in Cincinnati, brought a dozen nice pieces of traditional antique furniture. Among them was an oak secretary priced nicely at \$675 and a Gerstner 10-drawer dental box for \$295.

The smaller items that made up the bulk

of available merchandise ranged from the typical glassware to more unusual items like surgical tools. In a booth stocked with transportation pieces, amidst the license plates steering wheels, was a Honda motorcycle gas tank for \$35 and a Kawasaki police motorcycle cowl priced at \$225.

Mid-century lovers had plenty to consider, including a jet-age two-shelf rolling hospital cart that will likely be repurposed as a bar cart. It was in very good condition but priced assertively at \$175. On the other hand, a futurist-looking Fairfax Industries (Canada) vacuum, in working condition, was only \$35. Shoppers with tastes more 1960s than 50s had an iconic ceramic matador and bull figure set priced at \$65. And, for the most serious Age of Aquarius buyer, there was a 1967/68 Vietnam War tour jacket, restored to original condition for \$650.

An overflowing wallet was also not necessary to shop the market. Plenty of merchandise was available for \$10 and under. One toy dealer offered a Hot Wheels Rod Runner speed control and a Hot Wheels speedometer for \$5 each. Another seller had a box of Big Little Books at \$2 each, filled with popular Disney and TV show titles like Donald Duck and Lassie.

Tri-State Antique shows run each first Sunday from May through October, rain or shine.

mied head and torso of a monkey were joined together. Maloof said that the one on display in her museum was originally featured at Col. Joseph Woods' museum in Chicago. Similarly, she added, P.T. Barnum once sold tickets to patrons in New York City to see his Fiji mermaid.

But that's not all. At The Mermaid Museum, there are dainty Victorian booties (mermaids wear them at their weddings) and fishing lures in the shape of mermaids, opals (mermaids' favorite gems) and cameos (mermaids excel at shell crafts). And then there's her "most prized possession," a Cheeto in the shape of a mermaid, exhibited under a dome.

Also among the mix of oddities and curiosities are souvenirs, including a pennant, from Weeki Wachee Springs, a Florida mermaid-centric tourist attraction, as well as a

mermaid's tail extends from an antique bathtub that emits "fog bubbles." And an old print pictures a merman: Maloof playfully suggested that the reason mermen are seldom seen is because they are at home on the seafloor, looking after the children. Because the mu-

seum is designed to appeal to visitors of all ages, Maloof has incorporated child-friendly features, including peepholes for viewing exhibits, touchable fish leather, and a dress-up box. She is pleased that even skeptical male visitors, after touring the museum, announce it to be "amazing."

Even though The Mermaid Museum is devoted to all things mermaid, Maloof is selective. "No tchotchkes" is the way she puts it. On the other hand, there are many mermaid enthusiasts who collect items including mid-century ceramic figurines and vintage wall plaques, as well as mermaid Barbie dolls and an array of "Little Mermaid"-related items.

So how is it that mermaids continue to cast their spell, even on landlubbers? And what prompted the tales surrounding them in the first place? Some suggest that the existence of these creatures was a way to explain the mysteries of the sea, calm and beautiful one moment, threatening another. Maybe it's some sort of prenatal memory of being in water. Whatever the case, Maloof is sure of one thing: "Everyone loves a mermaid."

IPSWICH, Mass. - Kaminski Auctions' Oct. 2-3 auction will be held on-site at the Waldingfield estate. Built in 1929 by Julia Appleton and her husband Charles Sumner Bird II as their quintessential hunting lodge, the estate sits on 40 acres overlooking the Ipswich River with formal gardens, French tree allée, and horse trails.

Waldingfield was purchased in 1984 by Arthur J. Finklestein, a noted conservative strategist. Arthur was described as "innovative and influential" in a New York Times article. He is credited with revolutionizing campaign polling and funding and was instrumental in the election and re-election of many conservative politicians, including Ronald Regan, U.S. senator Alfonse D'Amato, James L. Buckley, Orrin Hatch, and Strom Thurmond, to name a few. In his later years, Arthur was a close advisor to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of Israel and the President of Albania.

For over 30 years, Arthur and his partner, Donald Curiale, raised two daughters

MONROVIA, Calif. - The year 2021 marks the 45th birthday for Apple. The world's largest technology company is currently valued in the trillion-dollar range, and it all began with two Steve's, one garage, and Apple Computer 1, more commonly referred to as Apple-1.

John Moran Auctioneers is thrilled to give tech lovers the opportunity to own one of the few remaining Apple-1 Computers. This fascinating piece of technological history is in mint condition, featuring many period-correct and original parts, and is in working order. Moran's flew in the foremost expert in his field to authenticate, inspect, and generate a full condition report for the Apple-1. The Apple-1 computer will be offered at auction during the Post-war & Contemporary Art + Design sale taking place on Nov. 1.

The company was created in 1976 when electronic engineer Steve Wozniak (b. 1950) teamed up with marketing guru and industrial designer Steve Jobs (1955-2011).

The first version of the company's personal computer built by Steve Wozniak was essentially a motherboard and a manual with instructions on which components needed to be purchased in order to assemble and use the machine. Wozniak contemplated making instructions available on how to build the computer he designed from start to finish for free to anyone who had the patience to create one on their own. Steve Jobs convinced him to

instead combine the motherboard and its connections into a magazine box and sell them as a kit.

200 Apple-1 computers were hand-built by Wozniak, Jobs, and a skeleton crew in the garage that belonged to Jobs' parents. 175 of them were sold for \$666.66, a figure that catered to Wozniak's love of repeating numbers. 50 of the 175 computers were sold to Paul Terrell, owner of Byte Shop in Mountain View, Calif. When Jobs delivered the 50 Magazine boxes each containing an Apple-1 kit, Terrell was not happy. He anticipated 50 all-in-one units that could simply be plugged in by the consumer, an unheard-of concept at the time. Jobs defended his delivery by pointing out that each box included all necessary elements to compose the machine and further convinced Terrell that Byte Shop could make a profit by selling keyboards, monitors, and power supplies within their store as an opportunity to upsell the product.

The Apple-1 in the Moran auction contains all period-appropriate and original parts, and it is in working order. In addition to the motherboard, monitor, and keyboard, this lot is equipped with two cassette tapes, three wires, and a period Xerox-copy of the original owner's manual.

The wooden case that houses this computer is made from Koa wood and is in very good condition. In the 1970s Koa wood was abundant and easily accessible, especially on the West Coast because it was native to Hawaii, but due to cattle grazing and extensive logging, the Koa tree is now considered much rarer and more expensive. There are only six known examples of the Koa wooden case in existence.

The Apple-1 Computer on offer has only had two owners. It was originally purchased by an electronics professor who then sold it to his student.

The Apple-1 computers were built by hand and therefore carry celebrated imperfections. There are no serial numbers to accompany each board. Computer motherboards get their signature green color from a solder mask that is applied with a squeegee to protect it from dust, shorts, moisture and to control the flow of molten solder. The Apple-1 on offer has a slight dimple on the board indicating that something very small was on the actual squeegee when it was coated. Marks like that serve as a kind of electronic signature for the machine, forever distinguishing it from other known examples.

Boris Karloff still scares us with his monsters

William Henry Pratt was world famous, but few people know him by that name. He was better known by his stage name — Boris Karloff. Karloff (1887-1969) was an English actor who gained international fame starring as Frankenstein's monster in the classic 1931 horror film Frankenstein.

Director James Whale convinced Karloff to take the starring role as the monster in Frankenstein, which, at the time, was a new direction for Karloff. But the film was a huge success, and Karloff became an overnight horror icon. For most of his acting career, Karloff established horror as a legitimate Hollywood genre in such films as Bride of Frankenstein (1935), Son of Frankenstein (1939), The Mummy (1932), and The Ghoul (1933).

Karloff acted in 80 movies before being cast as Frankenstein's monster, and he almost was never cast for his most famous roll since Bella Lugosi, famed Dracula star, was originally cast to play the monster. Although Karloff had little to say as the monster, he found the roll physically demanding since the costume was heavy and bulky and required him to wear four-inch-tall platform boots to elevate his height with each boot weighing 11 pounds, making walking difficult. The best-known image of Frankenstein's monster, in popular culture, derives from Boris Karloff's portrayal of the monster in the 1931 movie Frankenstein, in which he wore makeup applied and designed by Jack P. Pierce. Pierce, famous Hollywood makeup artist, created the Frankenstein monster makeup design, and Universal Studios quickly copyrighted the image, which has become synonymous with horror. Hollywood scuttlebutt suggests that the monster's iconic look was the brainchild of several makeup designers, but whether any parts of the monster's final look were based on other people's suggestions, Jack Pierce is credited with coming up with the final design that was both horrifying and disturbingly logical given the plot of the original Frankenstein story. For instance,

there are scars where Dr. Frankenstein accessed the monster's brain cavity. And the famous "bolts" on the neck are electrodes used to carry the electricity when the stitched-up corpse is reanimated.

Karloff and Lugosi, although they were rivals for roles such as Frankenstein's monster, teamed up to star in several horror films, including The Black Cat (1934) and The Raven (1935). Lugosi starred as Ygor, along with Karloff as the monster, in the 1939 film Son of Frankenstein

fainted dead away behind home plate as the monster stomped across the plate.

By 1944 directors thought Karloff was too old to play the monster in movies, so in House of Frankenstein (1944) actor Glenn Strange played the monster while Karloff played second banana as the villainous Dr. Niemann.

Today, collectors search diligently for Boris Karloff movie posters, especially posters of his horror movies such as Frankenstein. Be aware that original, 1931 movie posters of Frankenstein are expensive. In 2015 one sold at auction for over \$385,000. Die-hard collectors also search for photographs of Karloff in makeup since it is Karloff's image on a movie poster that symbolizes the terror of Frankenstein.

Mary Shelley wrote the novel Frankenstein in 1818 when she was just 18 years old. It is the story of a young doctor, Victor Frankenstein, who reanimates a dead man, affectionately called Frankenstein's Monster. Shelley's story has become the most retold story in the horror genre, and Frankenstein's monster is the poster boy for fear and loathing in horror. Surprisingly, many critics argue that Frankenstein is not a horror story. They argue the novel and subsequent retellings should be considered the first science fiction story ever told. It has been argued Dr. Franken-

Tuckers utilized a re-manufactured Cord 810 vacuum-electric pre-selector four-speed transmission. When new, the Tucker sold for \$2,450.

stein "makes a deliberate decision" and "turns to modern experiments in the laboratory" to achieve fantastic results. Still, when movie fans want to feel a chill of fear on a dark autumn night, they put a CD of Frankenstein, starring Boris Karloff, on their TV and turn on a light to keep dark shadows off the living room walls.

One interesting aspect to Frankenstein's monster is that the monster is often simply referred to as "Frankenstein;" however, Victor Frankenstein often refers to his creation as "creature," "fiend," "the dæmon," "wretch," "devil," "thing," "being," and "ogre." Is it any wonder Frankenstein's monster has low self esteem? Ironically, it is

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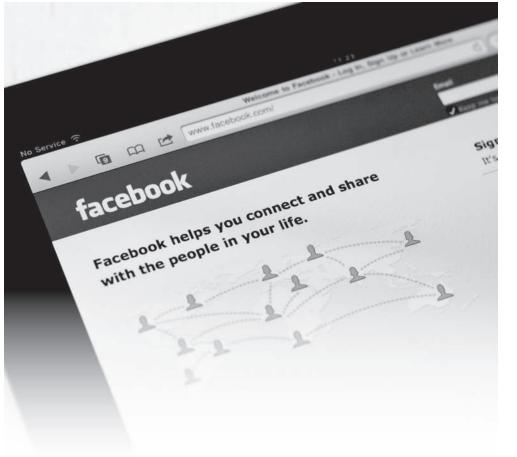
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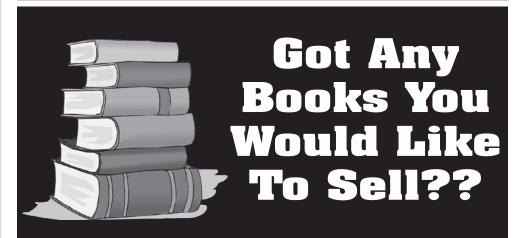
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Lincoln Logs

World War II, Lincoln Logs became one of the first toys marketed on television, with commercials appearing during shows like "Pioneer Playhouse" and "Davy Crockett."

The toy came with instructions to build not only Abraham Lincoln's Kentucky boyhood home, but a famous log structure from the pages of American literature, Uncle Tom's Cabin. The toy's packaging featured a simple drawing of a log cabin, a small portrait of Lincoln and the slogan "Interesting playthings typifying the spirit of America."

Lincoln Logs were originally carved from redwood, but then went to stained pine.

The educational benefits of children's toys were first popularized during the late 19th century, with scholars and teachers emphasizing the positive effects that open-ended building toys had on motor skills and critical-thinking abilities. Wright used this trend to his advantage by aiming his product at wealthier parents, using the tagline, "Interesting play things typifying the spirit of America." In 1943, before Lincoln Logs had truly become a household name, Wright sold the company to educational toy-maker Playskool for just \$800.

Although Lincoln Logs would prove to be the most successful version of this type of toy, log cabin building sets had been around long before John Llovd Wright debuted his brand. One of the earliest such toys was produced by Ellis, Britton & Eaton in Vermont under the name "Log Cabin Playhouse" during the 1860s. Other 20th century versions include the "American Logs" set by Halsam and "Frontier Logs" by Ideal.

The copyright for Lincoln Logs eventually passed to toy companies Milton Bradley and Hasbro. Since 1991, the rights to produce Lincoln Logs have been licensed by K'NEX, which announced in 2014 that the stackable wooden construction sets would again be manufactured in the U.S. after years of being produced in China. K'NEX changed to plastic logs in the 1970s, but these proved incredibly unpopular. The company soon went back to making sets made of real wood.

Lincoln Logs were inducted into the National Toy Hall of Fame in 1999.
