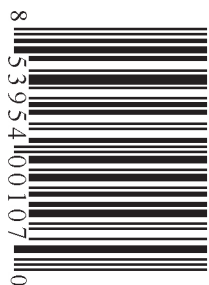

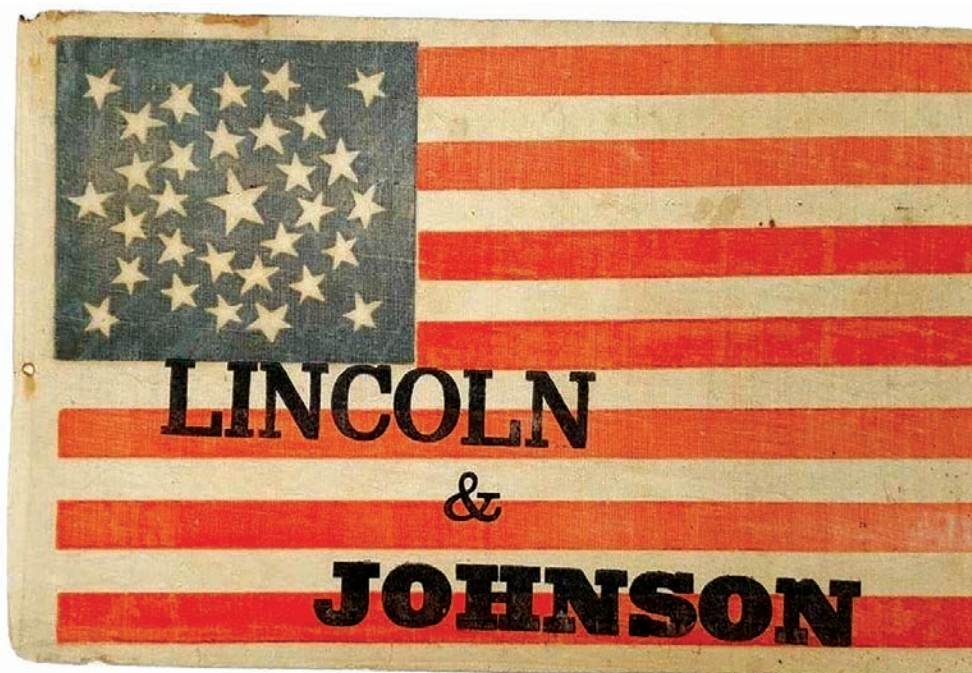

Collecting President Lincoln remains popular

Respected, memorialized, oft-quoted: Abraham Lincoln continues to top lists of America's best presidents, earning the respect of scholars and historians. The Lincoln Memorial, dedicated 100 years ago and inscribed with words from two of his most famous speeches, remains the most popular monument in Washington, D.C. But on the subject of last words, it wasn't those uttered by Lincoln that left a lasting impression. Instead, that honor goes to the sentence pronounced at the moment of his death by Edwin Stanton, the country's Secretary of War: "Now he belongs to the ages."

What ensued was a frenetic scramble by those in close proximity to the body of the 16th president of the United States, the crime scene, and the D.C. boarding house in which he died. Out came the shears to clip his hair. The rocking chair in which he was sitting at Ford's Theatre when he was shot? Chopped into bits. The sheets on the bed (and the bed itself) in which he died? Ditto. Seemingly everyone wanted to possess something with a connection to the martyred president. Not much has changed: As it turns out, in the 157 years following his death, Lin-



Above: This campaign flag is among the Lincoln-related artifacts that continue to increase in value.

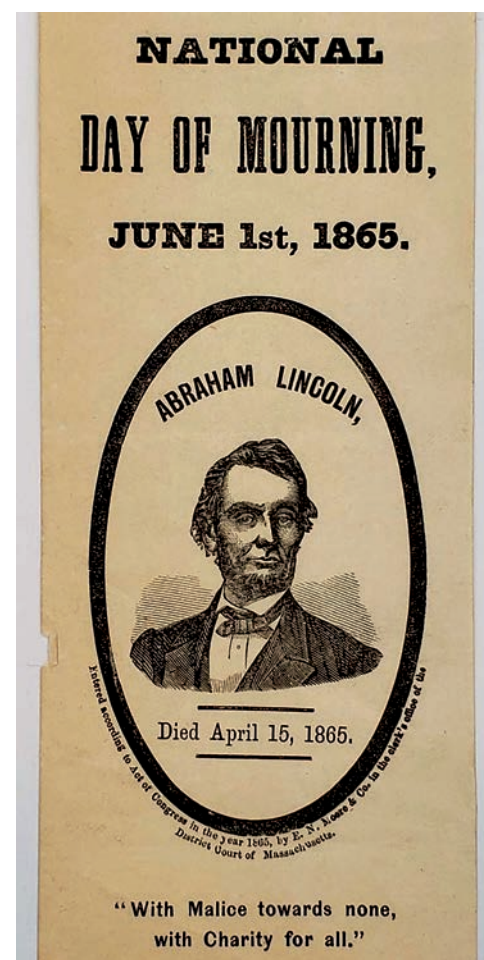
coln (along with John F. Kennedy) shares the distinction of being the country's most collectable president.

These days, a Lincoln-related item can be purchased for as little as one dollar (or less), thanks in large part to the sheer volume of souvenirs that have been produced over the years. From vintage postcards, thimbles, and ashtrays, to souvenir booklets, mugs, and pennants, Lincoln's readily identifiable image graces a variety of wares. Commemorative china plates, sterling silver spoons, and downsized versions of the colossal marble statue that overlooks the Reflecting Pool regularly sell for less than \$50 online.

But a serious Lincoln collection need not cost a small fortune, according to Steve Ferber of Lori Ferber Collectibles. Based in Scottsdale, Arizona, Ferber and his wife Lori have dealt in presidential collectibles and memorabilia for more than 42 years. And, as he pointed out, there is a range of historically important, original Lincoln items well within the reach of many collectors. In his words, "We are often asked why we will have an item that sells for \$200 and another for \$35,000, and why we don't just focus on expensive items. Our answer is always the same, because collecting isn't just for the wealthy."

Not surprisingly, items related to his assassination are of particular interest to Lincoln collectors. Ferber noted that these include tickets, playbills, and posters from Ford's Theatre, which presented, on the night of Friday, April 14, 1865, the otherwise unremarkable three-act play, "Our American Cousin."

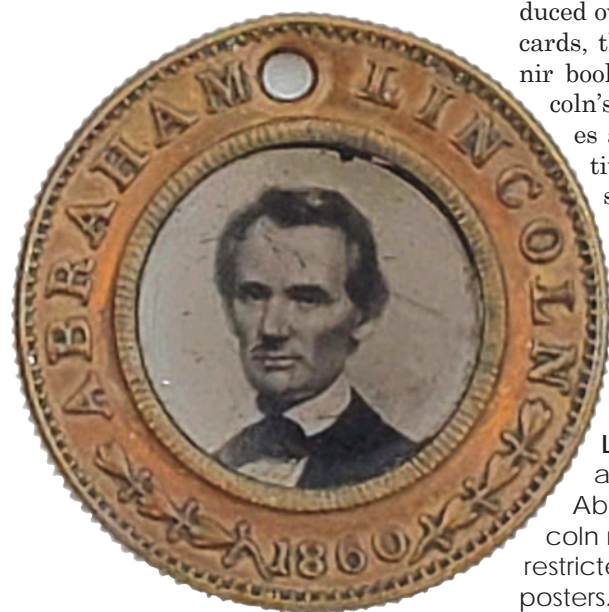
It doesn't stop there. "We recently sold a letter signed by Laura Keane, the actress who performed on the night of Lincoln's assassination, for \$1,595," Fer-

ber said. It would seem that the connection does not have to be direct to attract the attention of Lincoln collectors. Furthermore, judging collectors' interest is hard to predict: A fraction of the amount of money realized for a lock of hair removed by attending surgeons (\$7,500) pales in comparison to an 1864 "scarce parade flag," which recently sold for \$35,000.

It only costs one cent to start collection of Lincoln pennies

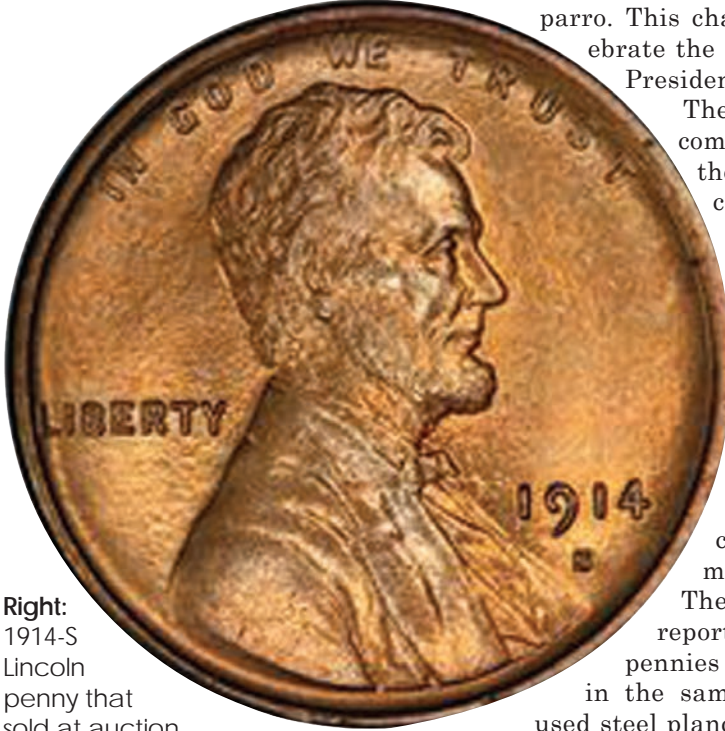

Nearly all children have, at one time or another, collected Lincoln pennies. President Lincoln’s face has adorned the US penny since 1909, making this its 114th year in production. More than 170 billion Lincoln pennies have been produced since 1959 so children have always had an abundant supply of pennies to save in jars, piggy banks, or drawers.

President Theodore Roosevelt considered the penny so uninspiring as a coin that he attempted to get the motto “In God We Trust” removed from the penny since he thought having it on such a lowly coin offended Christians.

The Lincoln penny was commissioned based on a bas-relief portrait of Lincoln made by Victor David Brenner. Lincoln’s bust on a coin marked a radical departure from accepted US coinage since Lincoln represented the first portrait of an actual person used on a coin. A strong prejudice prevailed in America against portraits on coins, but with the 100th anniversary of Lincoln’s birth in 1909, public opinion changed to favor the Lincoln penny.

Lincoln’s image on the penny is famous for another reason too. Joe Began, in *Theory and Practise of Numismatic Design*, said, “because the Lincoln Memorial is shown in sufficient detail to discern the statue of Lincoln on the reverse of the cent, Abraham Lincoln was

the only person to be depicted on both the obverse and reverse of the same United States coin. This remained true until the New Jersey state quarter, which depicts George Washington on both sides, was released in 1999.

In 1959 the most dramatic change to the Lincoln penny took place when the reverse picture was changed from the original Brenner design, commonly called a “wheat” penny to a design of the Lincoln Memorial, by Frank Gas-

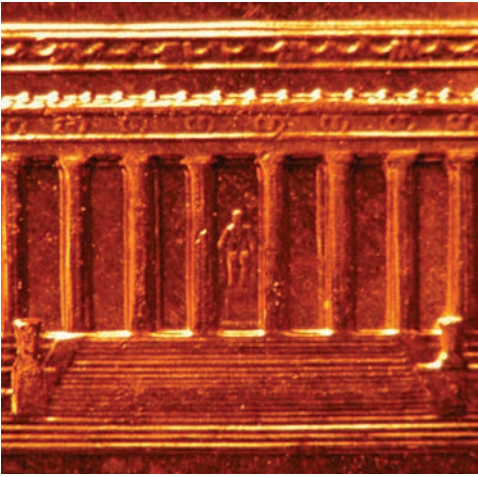
parro. This change occurred to celebrate the 150th anniversary of President Lincoln’s birth.

The only change that comes close to rivaling the 1959 change occurred during the peak of World War II when copper pennies were replaced with zinc-coated steel pennies. The 1943 Lincoln steel penny is not as rare as the reported 1943 copper pennies (minted from 1942 copper planchets remaining in the bins). There have also been reports of some 1944 steel pennies that were minted in the same fashion, from unused steel planchets left in the bins. These are coins that collectors eagerly watch for since they are quite rare and quite valuable.

Other rare pennies, associated with World War II, are the pennies minted using salvaged ammuni-

And then I was presented with a copy of “Happy Living! A Guidebook for Brides.” This vintage book is still on my shelf, and copies are now available for resale from used book outlets (I guess some 20th-century brides decided enough was enough). tion shells. These cents, from 1944 – 1946, have streaks of brass running through them, making them a numismatic oddity.

For true numismatists, Lincoln pen-



nies offer an intriguing, diverse collection. In addition to the 1959 change, there have been modifications to the obverse, modifications to the reverse, weight changes, metal changes, large and small dates within the same year, missing mint marks, and a slew of other penny varieties, making the Lincoln cent one of the largest fields of any US coin collected. Beginning in 2009 the field grew larger when the “memorial” coin was dropped and four new reverse coins were minted.

The Presidential \$1 Coin Act of 2005 required that the Lincoln cent’s reverse be redesigned in 2009. Beginning in 2009, Lincoln pennies show four different scenes from Abraham Lincoln’s life, honoring the bicentennial of his birth.

In August 2006, a 1914-S Lincoln penny sold at auction for \$105,800. The penny was not rare — over four million were minted, but it was in un-

circulated, pristine condition, retaining its original bright red-orange copper color and patina. It was the coin’s condition that made this penny so valuable.

And, for all of you hoping to hit the lottery without buying a ticket, according to Gainesville Coins (www.gainesvillecoins.com) a 1909-S VDB Lincoln penny, that originally was worth only 1¢ and is still worth only 1¢ in monetary value, is now worth a staggering \$117,500 on the secondary market. Few collectibles ever obtain such a huge percentage increase in value.

to understanding mid-century interior design.

Moving forward, these days, registering is something that couples do together and often online, selecting items as diverse as luggage and camping gear to workout equipment and food service subscriptions. But what about china, crystal, and silverware, I repeat?

I checked in with Julie Robbins of Replacements, Ltd., the world’s largest retailer of same, and, to my surprise and delight, I learned that today’s couples are more tradition-minded than we might have thought.

Replacements provides registry services through MyRegistry.com, and although sign-ups remained

“steady” during the pandemic, sales were down in 2020 and early 2021, as weddings were postponed or “reimagined.” These days, “Purchases are now up, for both active and discontinued patterns,” Julie noted. “Many of the patterns we see added are older patterns, formal dinnerware, and sterling.” She suggested, “This may mean that couples are inheriting and adding to family collections.” Lennox remains a strong contender, and Waterford, “unsurprisingly,” is the “go-to for crystal.” How traditional can you get? Julie added that there remains a lot of interest in “simple casuals.” And “Bernardaud’s lovely white ‘Louvre’ pattern is very popular.”

So there’s hope. Vintage style lives. You decide which of the three aforementioned songs ought we to be humming. (Hummin’?)

One other thing. With the beginning of summer, opportunities to get out there and find treasures are better than ever. With that in mind, I asked a few dedicated collectors what’s on their summer wish-list. Not surprisingly, two members of

For myself, I’m looking for previously loved “Mountain Weave” cotton napkins, made in Vermont (they wash up great); Fire King stackable mugs (my grandkiddos maintain Jell-o tastes better when served in these); Christmas-themed iced tea tumblers; and, of course, postcards to adorn this year’s Christmas greetings. Shopkeepers: Now you know!

Recovered treasure touring before it heads to auction block

RENO, Nevada – After a century and a half on the ocean floor, nearly 1,000 historic California Gold Rush-era sunken treasure items from the 1857 sinking of the fabled SS Central America, have been brought together again, cataloged, and conserved for upcoming public displays.

“Among the notable, recovered items are a unique lid to the remnants of the oldest known Wells Fargo treasure shipment box; clothing including a pair of the oldest known Gold Rush-era canvas work pants jeans with a button fly that may have been made by Levi Strauss in his early years in business; three Brooks Brothers logo shirts; photographs; jewelry made from California Gold Rush ‘mother lode’ native gold in quartz as gemstones; and personal grooming items such as combs; hair-brushes; perfume bottles; buttons; and buckles,” said Fred Holabird, president Holabird Western Americana Collections, LLC (www.HolabirdAmericana.com) of Reno, Nevada.

One of the important, recovered jewelry items is a large 18 karat gold ore engraved brooch that California’s first millionaire, prominent San Francisco businessman Samuel Brannan, was sending to his son in Geneva, Switzerland as a gift to the son’s teacher.

“These historic items are a time capsule from the California Gold Rush,” Holabird said.

Many of them will be publicly displayed for the first time at collectors’ shows across the country, then offered in public auctions this fall by Holabird.

“These incredible artifacts that were in secure storage in three different states now are giving us a glimpse of Gold Rush-era daily life for passengers and crew in the 1850s,” said Dwight Manley, Managing Partner of the California Gold Marketing Group of Brea, California, which owns the recovered items.

The jeans were discovered in a trunk belonging to passenger John Dement who survived the sinking. They are

now insured for \$1 million, according to Manley.

Some 19th-century photographs were also recovered. One daguerreotype metal plate photograph of an unidentified young woman was nicknamed, “Mona Lisa of the Deep,” by the scientific mission recovery team that retrieved the mysterious photo from the seabed where it was discovered in a scattered pile of the ship’s coal.

“The ‘Mona Lisa of the Deep’ half-plate daguerreotype with exceptional depth of field resolution is by far the finest such image of the 1850s era that I’ve seen in my 50 years of working with historic photographs,” said Holabird.

“Other items recovered include pistols; brass luggage tags; passengers’ ticket receipts; galley utensils and dishes; wine and spirits decanters that appear to have been a standard amenity in the first-class staterooms; eyeglasses in solid gold frames; and even chewing tobacco in a pouch apparently from the 1851 London World’s Fair,” Holabird revealed.

Another item is the Central America brass name tag attached to a set of keys that belonged to the ship’s purser, Ed-

ward W. Hull.

“Because these keys are larger than the type usually used for passengers’ rooms, we think these purser’s keys were for the locked room where the gold treasure cargo was kept on the ship,” said Holabird.

The estimated values of the artifacts range from a few hundred dollars each to over \$1 million.

Manley plans to donate some of the items to museums. Many of the other recovered treasures are being displayed in educational exhibits.

Upcoming displays include: National Bottle Show (www.fohbc.org) in Reno, Nevada, July 28-31; American Numismatic Association 2022 Chicago World’s Fair of Money (www.WorldsFairOfMoney.com) in Rosemont, Illinois, August 16-20; Papermania Plus (www.papermaniaplus.com) in Hartford, Connecticut, August 20; and Hardrock Summit 2022 gem and jewelry show in Denver, Colorado (www.HardRockSummit.com), September 8-11. Arrangements are being sought for a venue and dates for a possible public display in the New York City area.

feet deep in the Atlantic Ocean off the North Carolina coast during a hurricane on September 12, 1857. She was on a voyage from Panama to New York carrying tons of California Gold Rush coins, ingots, and gold dust from the San Francisco and Northern California area. The tragedy took the lives of 425 of the ship’s 578 passengers and crew-members, and the loss of the gold cargo was a major factor in the economically devastating financial panic of 1857 in the United States.

DALLAS, Texas – If one needed further proof that funny books have become serious business, look no further than the results from Heritage Auctions’ July 16-19 Comics & Comic Art Signature® Auction.

The headline-making event realized \$24,262,303, attracted nearly 4,900 bidders worldwide and was a near-complete sellout. This was among Heritage’s most successful Comics & Comic Art events in the auction house’s 46-year history. The record was April’s record-setting event that realized more than \$27.67 million.

The \$2.4 million realized for Frank Miller and Lynn Varley’s original cover for 1986’s Batman: The Dark Knight Returns Book One garnered international headlines following its sale. The image is as simple as it is powerful – a silhouette of The Dark Knight in front of a bolt of lightning, splitting a cobalt-blue sky. So immediately recognizable is the image it is instantly identified by readers ... and often imitated by other artists.

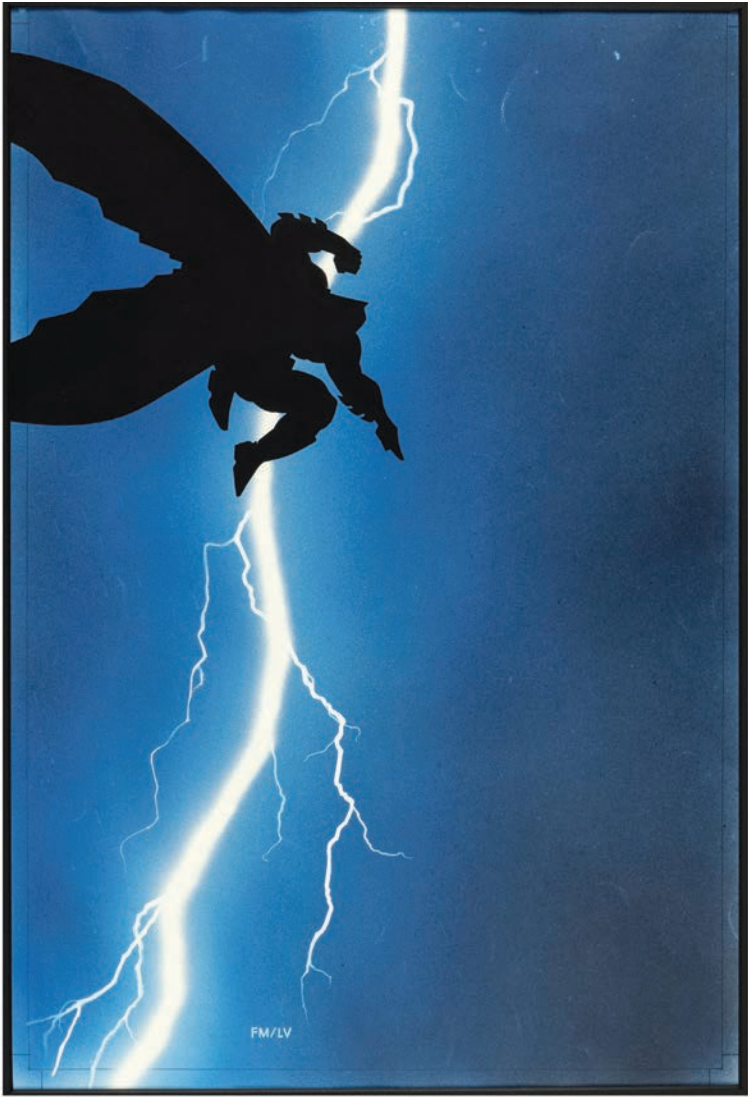
“This is an iconic piece of comic art, of comic history,” said Todd Hignite, Vice President at Heritage Auctions. “Even the most casual comic fan identifies this artwork right away; it is one of the most recognizable images of one of the most popular superheroes ever created.”

But the Dark Knight cover art was far from the only storyline coming out of the event, and not even the only lot to reach a seven-figure result. So, too, did All Star Comics No. 8 (DC, 1942) CGC NM 9.4 Off-white to white pages, featuring Wonder Woman’s debut, which drew 35 bids before finishing at \$1.62 million. Heritage Auctions experts never have seen a blue label copy of this issue with a grade higher than VF 8.0 before the copy offered in this sale. In other words, this is one of the most important issues in DC’s history – it is tied for the No. 12 position on Overstreet’s list of Top 100 Golden Age Comics – and it is one of the toughest to find in high grade.

Batman made four appearances among the auction’s top 10 lots, including two of the top three: After the Dark Knight cover, Jim Lee and Scott Williams Batman No. 619 Triple-Gatefold Allies Cover “Hush” Part 12 Original Art (DC, 2003) finished at \$504,000, the highest price paid for a Lee original at auction. The story arc has been credited with rejuvenating the Batman franchise, in part through exploration of the romantic relationship between the Batman and Catwoman. Fans were treated to a handful of variant covers including this “Allies” scene that consists of three masterful pages.

Other Batman lots that finished among the top 10 included Jim Aparo and Mike De-Carlo Batman No. 428 “A Death in the Family” Part 3 Complete 22-Page Story Original Art (DC, 1988), which sold for \$288,000, and Mike Mignola’s Batman No. 428 Cover Original Art (DC, 1989). This iconic cover, from the “A Death in the Family” story arc, prompted 58 bids before ending at \$228,000. This issue was notable for the fact that DC set up a hotline to allow callers the ability to vote for or against the death of Jason Todd’s Robin – the results from the poll were printed in the issue that bore this art on the cover.

Batman appeared on a fifth lot in the auction’s top 10: Detective Comics No. 29 (DC, 1939) CGC VF+ 8.5 Off-white pages, which drew a winning bid of \$276,000. The second Batman cover is rarely found in such a high grade; this copy is by far the finest offered by Heritage Auctions. This issue, featuring the first appearance of Dr. Death, is ranked

No. 14 on Overstreet’s Top 100 Golden Age Comics list.

Two copies of the first Fantastic Four issue, which heralded the Marvel Age of Comics and bolstered Marvel’s stature in the superheroes wars, drew six-figure results: Three dozen bidders made a play for Fantastic Four No. 1 (Marvel, 1961) CGC VF/NM 9.0 White pages until it closed at \$420,000, while more than 40 bidders went after a CGC VF+ 8.5 copy until it brought \$240,000. A third Fantastic Four lot, Fantastic Four No. 5 (Marvel, 1962) CGC NM 9.4 Off-white to white pages, reached six figures, at \$162,000.

Spider-Man swung into the event’s top 10 lots in Todd McFarlane Spider-Man No. 16 Cover X-Force Original Art (Marvel, 1991) “X-Force Joins Spider-Man” – which ended at \$408,000. McFarlane ended his time on Spider-Man and left Marvel with a unique offering: a crossover with Rob Liefeld’s popular mutant super-team X-Force. But what makes it really special is that the book was created in a sideways landscape format. McFarlane’s definitive look for Spidey, with his exaggerated pose and “spaghetti webbing,” is front and center, flanked by Warpath, Shatterstar, Boom-Boom and Cannonball, on this final Spider-Man cover by the fan-favorite artist.

The event also featured the first Bob Kane original cover Heritage Auctions has offered: Detective Comics No. 59 from 1942, featuring Batman and Robin. This work by Batman’s co-creator and Kane’s collaborator

Jerry Robinson realized \$180,000.

This auction also saw a new record for a 21st-century comic book: Gabrielle Dell’Oto’s variant cover for The Amazing Spider-Man No. 677, published just 11 years ago, is one of the rarest books of the modern era; only 200-500 copies were made available to comics retailers upon its publication in 2011. This 9.8-graded copy of the rare book climbed to a new high of \$43,200, shattering its previous record of \$33,600 set at Heritage one year ago.

Recovery from the shipwreck site of what has been described as “America’s greatest treasure” occurred in several stages between 1988-1991 and again in 2014. Thousands of retrieved gold coins and hundreds of gold bars have been sold since 2000; however, these latest items were kept in storage until a court-approved settlement was reached ending a decades-long ownership dispute.

“Seemingly ordinary items from the passengers and crew today give us extraordinary insight into the everyday lives of the people who traveled on the steamship,” said scientist Bob Evans who was on each of the recovery missions.

“They show the kinds of day-to-day clothes that normally ended up in the rag bin after ten years of wear,

such as gold field miners’ work pants, long underwear – some of them still not worn -- as well as the fancier spats and cravats. The common, everyday clothes rarely are represented in historic costume collections, which are dominated in the antique category by things like formal gowns and dress uniforms,” explained Evans.

ical females, rang up \$750; a first rendition Sutro Tunnel (Nev.) stock certificate #68, datelined New York October 18, 1868 and issued to Solomon Haas of New York for 100 shares, achieved \$625; and a 1902 Yosemite Valley (Calif.) Railroad Company specimen bond, with a spectacular Yosemite Valley vignette, rose to \$671.

Top lots on Day 3 included a copy of Brown & Dallison's Nevada, Grass Valley and Rough and Ready Directory (Calif.), 133 pages, with ads, compiled by Nat P. Brown and John K. Dallison, San Francisco (\$5,375); a rare 1853 copy of Hale and Emory's Marysville City (Calif.) Directory with residents alphabetically listed by occupations and addresses, plus businesses (\$9,150); and the original Placerville (Calif.) Directory of 1862 by Thomas Fitch, printed by the Placerville Republican, 128 pages, with a soft-cover reprint by the El Dorado County Museum (\$5,125).

One of only two known Nevada directories from 1868-69, a database of over 4,000 settlers, with addresses and often occupations, found a new owner for \$3,416; an authentic ore car for Caird Engineering Works, about 3 ½ feet tall, 4 feet long and 2 feet wide, with the end dump, switches and wheels all in working condition, went for \$3,375; and a Confederate D guard short saber Bowie knife, 22 ½ inches long with a 17 ¼ inch blade, the maker unknown, garnered \$2,625.

The auction's final day featured art, Native Americana, transportation

(railroad and steamer passes, ephemera and artifacts); plus many bargain and dealer specials that included general Americana, stocks and bonds and numismatics – a total of 625 lots on Day 4.

Art was led by a classic oil on canvas Western cowboy hunting scene by F. W. Trautwein, titled on the frame Meat's Not Meat Til It's In The Pan (1972), depicting a cowboy who's just shot a mountain sheep (\$1,875). Nothing could be found regarding F.W. Trautwein, or anyone of a similar name in Falk. But the quality of skill in artisanship of the horses and man was excellent.

A group of 18 railroad lock keys from multiple Iowa railroad lines (Newton & Northwestern RR, Cedar Rapids & Iowa City RY, Des Moines & Central Iowa RR, Mason City & Clear Lake RY and many others) went to a determined bidder for \$2,500. Also, a Carson and Colorado Railroad (Virginia City, Nev.) lock and key, stamped "Union Brass Mfg. Co. / Chicago", made \$1,708.

A Hudson River Line steamer pass, no. 1206, with a maroon title and lovely vignette of a paddle steamer that fills almost the entire upper half, issued for 1898 to B.P. Holland of the Norfolk, Virginia Beach & Southern Railroad, brought \$1,375; while a Utah Central Railway annual pass for 1885, issued to W. H. Hurlburt and signed by Mormon leader and important Utah figure John Sharp (as superintendent), made \$1,312. The Utah Central connected Salt Lake City with Ogden.

Overbeck vase featuring unusual war scene mounts a \$33,000 bid

HUMMELSTOWN, Pa. — Eastern Pennsylvania auctioneer, Jay Ziegler, of Ziegler Auction Company in Hummelstown recently came upon a very unexpected find — a 15 inch Overbeck vase which hailed from Indiana. More intriguing, the vase featured an unusual design not found in most Overbeck.

Overbeck pottery was made by a family of sisters in Cambridge City, Ind. It was a small Arts & Crafts home studio pottery established in 1911, operating until the last sister's death in 1955. Overbeck has now come to be esteemed as one of the premier American Arts and Crafts potteries.

The discovery of this vase spurred fascination and curiosity among Overbeck collectors. First of all, how did such a significant piece of Overbeck end up in an obscure Eastern Pennsylvania estate? Second, what was the explanation or story behind its unusual design or decoration? Most Overbeck vases had panels of carved Arts & Crafts-styled conventionalized flowers, plants, birds, or animals. Later works incorporated typical Art Deco-styled designs. This particular vase had a realistic scene encircling the entire circumference of the vase. It appears to show a realistic scene of a World War I parade. There appear to be marching soldiers, mounted men on horses carrying a flag, a band with trumpets and bass drum, and marchers carrying placards, etc. Other than a few figurines depicting historical Americans, such as Lincoln, Washington or Lewis & Clark, no other pieces with a patriotic theme are known to exist.

Overbeck collectors turned detective and began searching for answers. Shaun Dingwerth, director of the Richmond (Indiana) Art Museum convinced the auctioneer to inquire further from the 80-year-old consigner. The vase had belonged to his father who had studied at the Alfred (NY) College of Clayworking receiving a degree in ceramic engineering. The owner had studied under the famous Arts & Crafts teacher, artist and lecturer, Charles Fergus Binns. Students familiar with Overbeck history, know that Elizabeth, one of

the sisters, had also studied under Binns during the 1909-10 college term. The original owner had purchased the vase at Alfred.

With this new information of the Alfred connection, I decided to contact the Library Historian at Alfred University to see if they might be able to shed any light on this story. I was referred to an assistant. What a fortunate experience. This lady became so excited about the story of this Overbeck vase and immediately began to delve into research. She found that the University has much material on the Overbecks. With the original owner's name, the Library assistant was able to pinpoint the exact years he had been at Alfred and forwarded copies of college newsletters from those years. He had been a high jumper on the college track team as well as a member of various college drama productions. The Librarian forwarded two significant college newsletters. One from 1918 told of an exhibition of ceramic works by college alumni. The article said a shipment had been received from the Overbecks. However, the most pertinent article was from March, 1919 telling of a temporary exhibit on campus. The exhibit contained some hand-woven textiles, two or three paintings, a selection of French War posters and three Overbeck vases. The article concluded saying: "These pieces show us that the spirit of the war can be successfully applied in Ceramics as well as paintings." That news item seems to suggest that this Overbeck vase very possibly could have been one of those three vases.

Ziegler decided to list the Overbeck piece in an online auction. In the ensuing weeks interest and excitement mounted for area Overbeck collectors. Typical spirited bidding in the last hours of the auction led to a final tally of \$33,000. This does not include the auction's 20% buyer's premium, nor the 6% Pennsylvania sales tax. Those pushed the final price to almost \$40,000. Beforehand, many were estimating the vase could easily sell for \$30-50,000 and they weren't far off.

While the buyer was not named, the auctioneer said the piece was returning to Indiana.

On the other hand, items related to Lincoln’s presidency but lacking a tie-in to the assassination are comparatively affordable, Ferber continued. “We recently sold a letter written to Abraham Lincoln, asking to be appointed to a position within the Lincoln administration.” That brought a relatively modest price of \$135. Similarly, an 1864 presidential ballot ticket from Ohio changed hands for “just \$195.”

So who buys these items? “In our experience, there really is no ‘typical collector,’” said Ferber. “Collectors come from all walks of life.” Some fall into the “hardcore collectors” category, those seeking investment purchases. “A lot of time,” he said, “it is simply someone who works for a boss, or has a friend or relative that they know who has a special affinity for Abraham Lincoln.” In other words, it runs the gamut.

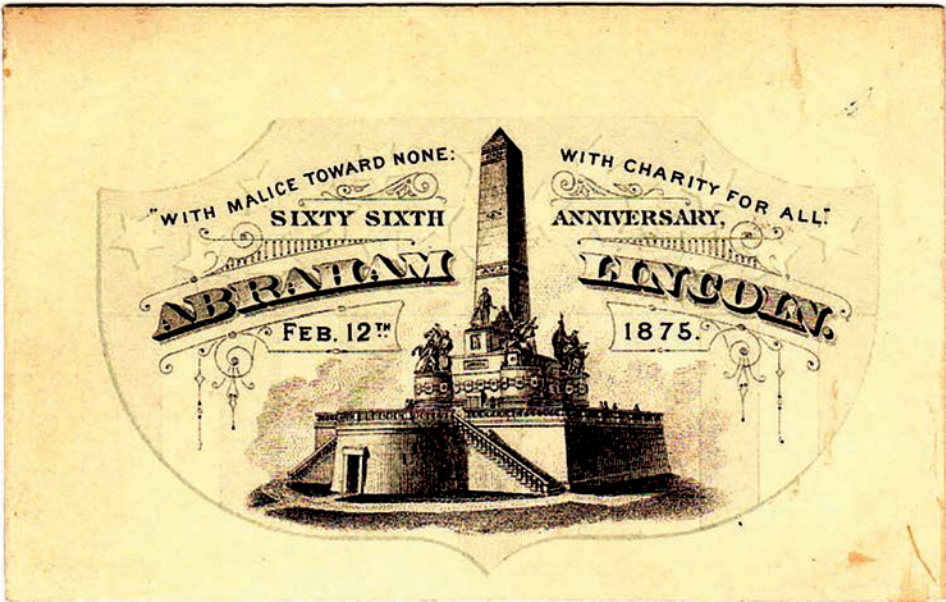
“Right now, the market for Lincoln collectibles is ‘hot,’” Ferber said. “The demand is very strong, especially for the more unique items.” That market is continually refreshed when older “hardcore” collectors pass away; their survivors are “just not as interested in collecting as their parents and grandparents were,” he continued. The bottom line is that, thanks to the estates of dedicated collectors, another generation can take advantage of the influx of items offered, thereby building their own collection. Noted Ferber, “We never know what will be in that next box that the mailman delivers. It’s like Christmas every day.”

As for what the future holds for Lincoln collectibles, Ferber said this: “In my opinion, there will always be a strong market for Lincoln material, especially the rare and unusual items.” And anniversaries, as well as new movies and documentaries, certainly have an impact on the market. “When things are top-of-

mind, they tend to increase collector interest.”

That said, he conceded there is no “holy grail” for collectors, although Abraham Lincoln parade flags are “one of the highly coveted items.” Less than a decade ago, one could be bought for “around \$10,000.” Today, “the demand far exceeds the supply, so it is extremely difficult to find one available for less than \$40,000. He added that some “particular unique versions” now sell for more than \$100,000.

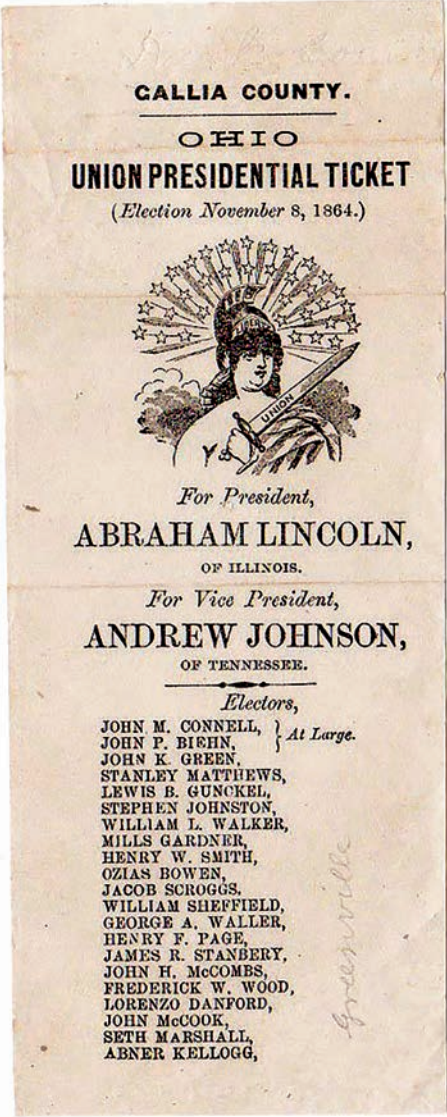
So how to begin a serious Lincoln collection? “Specializing in ephemera might be the most affordable path. But as with all things, passion sometimes gets in the way. “If you get bogged down worrying about whether you picked the right specialty, you’ll miss the fun and wind up saying to yourself, ‘I wish I had bought that item when I had the chance.’”

Meanwhile, there’s no telling what people seek to add to their collections. As Ferber said, “People collect the darndest things.” He remembered, “We once had a Lincoln collector who wanted us to find him a fragment of Lincoln’s skull from the autopsy performed after the assassination.” Ferber paused. “We turned down

that request as just not something that we felt comfortable searching for.”

Meanwhile, he encouraged collectors not to underestimate what they might be able to own. “The fact that someone can still purchase campaign items from the 1860 presidential campaign for under \$200 still surprises us,” he concluded. “How much longer will that be true? I can’t imagine it will be much longer.” loriferber.com

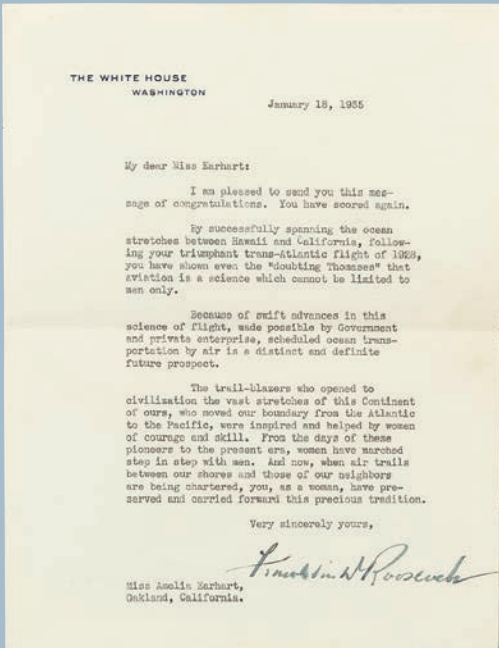

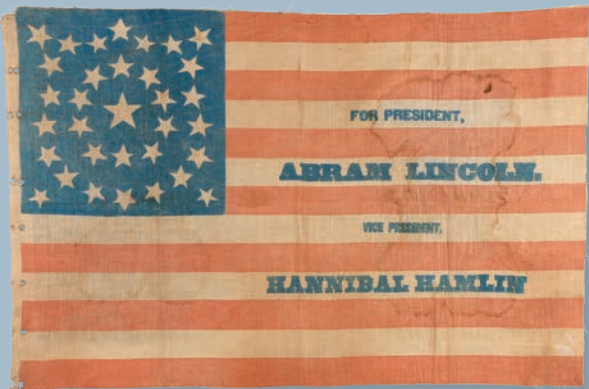
