Sunbeam has mixed things up for over a century

You may know a classic Sunbeam Mixmaster by the sight of its sweeping white arc. If you grew up with one, you know how durable they are – made with tough American steel and proud U.S. manufacturing. Their electric motors were probably strong enough to propel a small fishing boat. Many of them still run as strong as ever. Those Sunbeam stand mixers – Mixmasters by name - were one of the gold standards of kitchen appliances for decades.

Sunbeam began in the 1890s as the Chicago Flexible Shaft Company founded by industrialist John K Stewart (who also co-founded gauge manufacturer Stewart-Warner). Originally, the company manufactured livestock grooming tools like clippers and sheep shears. In the early 20th century, the company added household appliances to its lineup with the popular Princess Electric Iron. In the 1930s, Sunbeam offered a line of toasters including the stunning 1939 Art-Deco T-9 model which drew design inspiration from the New York World's Fair. The name "Sunbeam" sprung from a contest to rebrand their burgeoning home appliance line.

Sunbeam introduced the Mixmaster in 1930. It was the world's first mixer featuring two interlocking and detachable blades. Sunbeam added accessories like a meat grinder and juicer to expand the machine's capabilities. The Mixmaster was so popular, that even during the Depression, Sunbeam sold hundreds of thousands of them.

The first model offered to the public was the Mixmaster M4 series, hitting retailers around 1931. That preliminary model improved in subsequent releases. Sunbeam added accessories like the juicer with the next year's models, M4F and M4H. Around 1933, the company added a three-speed model M4J. It was the first model with a handle, which allowed the head to be removed to use as a hand mixer. The speed control was also relocated to the rear of the mixer.

In 1935, Sunbeam introduced the Model 1. It came with a more versatile 10-speed



design trends of various eras. This 1950s advertisement attested to post-war optimism and suburban life in the fifties.

motor and had a fan in the housing to cool the motor. That year, Sunbeam also introduced a small-scale, 25-watt, onespeed children's mixer which had two mixing bowls and most of the accessories available on the full-size mixer.

Industrial design was in its infancy in the 1930s but Sunbeam was quick to

incorporate machine-age and Art-Deco detailing to make their products appealing. Art Deco's influence showed up on the Model 3, introduced in 1936. The front grille was redone in Streamline Moderne style, complete with vertical openings reminiscent of a train engine of the era. The patented speed control, known as the Mix-Finder Dial, displayed aviation influences. Four years later, the Model 5 sported modernist elements - that would continue into several subsequent models. Vent openings went horizontal, and a new color scheme with a cream body and jadeite bowls was added to the popular white-onwhite lineup.

Automobile museum houses unique Cord prototype

AUBURN, Ind. – In a northeast Indiana museum full of classic cars, a oneof-a-kind prototype built 90 years ago stands out.

The Cord Experimental can be found at the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum in Auburn. Manufactured for the 1932 model year, it was meant to be the beginning of a next generation of Cords, replacing the Cord L-29. The L-29 was the first mass-production frontwheel drive car in the United States. During the planning and manufacture of the Experimental, the country was in the midst of the Great Depression. Company officials eventually decided the new, more expensive car wouldn't sell, and scrapped the plan after it was built, said Sam Grate, the museum's curator.

"It's an excellent representative sample of how the company was thinking forward after the Cord L-29, even if it didn't end up happening," he noted. "It was the next step of what might have happened had the Depression not occurred."

The Experimental weighs more than 6,000 pounds and is 20 inches longer

than the L-29. It has a wheelbase of 157 inches. It was originally built with a 16-cylinder engine. The company decided it was too uneconomical and too costly to sell, so it was replaced with a 12-cylinder engine with the same output as the 16, Grate said. He estimated the Experimental might have sold for more than \$5,000, while the L-29 started at more than \$3,000.

The museum's records seem to indicate two other experimental cars were at least considered for manufacture, though the museum staff is only aware of the one in the collection, Grate said. A note in the museum's archives, handwritten in August 1932 by the vice president of engineering, says, "EXPR Cord-12, three sedans."

"At least three were queued to be produced," he stated. "But this is the only one that is and ever will be. There's not going to be a second one found."

After plans for mass production of the Cord Experimental were nixed, the car was dismantled and the parts set aside, Grate said. "Since they were not going forward with the Experimental, it made sense to disassemble it," he explained.

Macintire portrait of Washington at Bonhams Skinner

MARLBOROUGH, Mass. – A relief-carved double-sided portrait of Gen. George Washington by architect and craftsman Samuel Macintire (est. \$60,000-80,000) will be one of the highlights of an upcoming auction conducted by Bonhams Skinner. "This remarkable plaque offers a glimpse into the revolutionary spirit that accompanied the neoclassical style Macintire is so known for today," the firm said. Possibly used as part of a trade sign, this early homage to Washington bears the natural weathering of several centuries of American life. Bonhams Skinner has two upcoming auctions of Americana this month. An eclectic range of historical American antiques will feature across both sales, including museum-worthy items from early and influential collectors associated with several New England institutions and The Rushlight Club. An online auction, taking place August 6 to 16 will be accompanied by a live sale on August 13 in Bonhams Skinner's Marlborough galleries.

Another highlight includes a painted Liberty cap, carved from pine and gilded on the bottom rim (est. \$4,000-6,000). "It



personifies our nation's earliest ideals. Used as a symbol of freedom since the halcyon days of the American Revolution, this Phrygian cap was often depicted on the head of Lady Liberty herself, most famously in the "capped bust" coins of the early 19th century, which this fine carving predates,: the firm said in a press release.

The sales also offers a microhistory in the advent of American yachting, including a yachting scene "Sweeping Along, Yachting at Cowes, Isle of Wight" by renowned maritime artist Montague Dawson, (\$60,000-\$80,000). One of the most important lots in the maritime section of the sale is the original manuscript journal "Cleopatra's Barge On A Voyage Of Pleasure" documenting the voyage of George Crowninshield's famous yacht (est. \$75,000-100,000) - the exguisitely detailed account of what is considered to be the earliest pleasure yacht made in America, which took its maiden voyage between March and October of 1817. Bound in red Moroccan leather and containing a complete narrative of the trip and illustrated with 22 finely painted watercolors and pen and ink drawings of the harbors and towns Crowninshield encountered on his journey, this unique item presents the very

an American perspective. With no comparable precedents in its field, the sale of this manuscript is sure to be closely watched. Paring patriotism and the rise of the

"Some employees might have taken some of the parts for themselves. There were no future Cords planned at that time. Once plans were scrapped, they all just became used parts. They weren't thinking about the future or if the parts would be useful back then."

The Experimental's journey to restoration started when the body – from the end of the hood backward - was discovered in a barn near Chicago. It was found by Paul Bryant, a Cord historian, Grate said

When it was found, the body was missing the engine, fenders and radiator shell. The fenders and radiator shell were found in other states, but the engine, it turns out, hadn't strayed far from home.

"The engine was found not more than 500 feet from where it was produced," Grate pointed out. "The Auburn Automobile Co. had a power plant on the same grounds, and the Cord V-12 engine was in that building as a backup generator."

Bryant began restoring and reconstructing the Experimental in 1986. He donated the car to the museum in 2004. Bryant died in 2013.

"I think (Auburn Cord Duesenberg) members probably helped him to be on the lookout for parts," Grate explained. "There were a number of side drawings, renderings and measurements to go by.'

The hood had to be reproduced, he noted, and the wheels were fabricated for the restoration. The frame is from a production L-29 and was lengthened to fit. When found, the body's interior was down to the wood framing where the seats would be, Grate added.

"The majority of the exterior is as close as we can get," he said. "As far as we know, all the parts out there have been found.

"The color is similar to what it probably was. When the body was found in the barn, they did the 1980s version of color costume designers, re-enactors, and antique enthusiasts will choose from thousands of collectible sewing buttons offered by East Coast dealers. Door prizes add to the fun and creativity will be in the air. matching and came up with that color. It's pretty close."

The Experimental has a window between the driver's area and the passenger section. The body interior had a slot that made sense for the window to be there, Grate said.

The car has about 780 miles on it. He said it does run, but it's not driven because it has an L-29 transmission, which isn't made for an engine as large as what's in the Experimental. "The sound it makes when running is different from cars today. It's definitely audible within the cabin. In those days, you could definitely hear the transmission whining when driving and shifting."

The Cord Experimental isn't the only one-of-a-kind car at the museum. The collection includes a unique Duesenberg Model X speedster. In 1927, five Model X cars were built – the one speedster, plus two sedans and two phaetons, Grate said.

"The Model X was an experimental production line between the Model A and Model J," he explained. "It was experimental filler."

The museum is housed in the 1930s national headquarters of the Auburn Automobile Co. The art deco building is a National Historic Landmark. The museum has a collection of more than 120 classic, unique and antique cars. It owns the majority of cars in the collection, while others are on loan. About 50,000 people visit the museum annually, Grate said.

A new, permanent exhibit – the E.L. Cord Gallery of Entrepreneurship – is scheduled to open by the end of August, he said. Cord was hired in 1924 as the Auburn Automobile Co.'s vice president and general manager. He became president and majority stakeholder by early 1927.

Other current exhibits include those focusing on John Dillinger, contemporary automobile and motorcycle painting, and car mascots and hood ornaments. For more information about the museum, including hours and admission fees, visit www.automobilemuseum.org.

train in the American landscape, the Americana sale features two Andrew Clemens sand bottles, including one 1880s bottle with a locomotive on one side and an eagle holding the flag on the other (est. \$50,000-75,000). The sale also features a diminutive Clemens sand bottle with a floral composition bearing the date 1890, made to commemorate the birth of a girl.

Both auctions are also notable for their range of home goods, including a remarkable New York collection of approximately 40 extraordinary needlework pictures from the 17th and early 18th centuries, and a large and important collection of fine wicker furniture from Norman and Diane Bernstein's Cape Cod estate some of which is featured in "American Wicker Woven Furniture from 1850-1930" and some previously exhibited at the Renwick Gallery of the National Museum of American Art. Also featured is an extensive collection of early American lighting from the Leonard H. Chace, Jr. collection including wrought-iron rushlights, unusual tin lighting devices, and a large selection of whale oil and fluid lamps made at Boston Sandwich Glassworks in the 19th century.

Additionally, both sales will present significant collections of Chinese export silver including hollow-ware and flatware, alongside esoteric pieces of 18th and 19th century Chinese export porcelain, including a plate used in Ulysses S. Grant's dinner service. Several China Trade Paintings will also be featured,

including "Portrait of High Imperial Commissioner Kiying/Qiying/Ch'i-ying" (est. \$15,000-20,000), a watercolor and gouache painting of Praia Grande Harbor, Macau (\$10,000-\$15,000) and from another collection a diminutive early 19th century School of Spoilum, View of the Hongs, Canton (est. \$8,000-12,000).

Go vintage not repro when decorating in costal style

This month, some end-of-summer thoughts on how to live the beach life (and, by extension, the mountain lake life), no matter where you rest your head most nights of the year. All that's needed, of course, is a bit of vintage style.

Let's begin with some signs of the times, literally. We've all seen those faux driftwood plaques, the ones with cutesy mottos that read things like "Beach rules: relax, unwind, enjoy" and "Life's better at the beach." And then there's my personal (un)favorite, "Sand by me." They vary in shape and size, sometimes in the form of a whale or a surfboard, other times arrows pointing the direction to the beach or the tiki bar. You get the idea. I think you might have figured out by now that I'm not a fan of phony vintage anything.

One thing is clear, though, and that's the fact that these quasi-vintage accessories are plentiful and prominent in home decor shops. And as it happens, they appear to be good sellers, in light of the rising popularity of what has been dubbed "coastal style." Inspired by surf, sand, and sky, coastal style is embraced by those who live at the water's edge or wish that they did. Although there are regional variations on coastal style, all have in common a casual, relaxed feel, with an emphasis on easy care and easy maintenance (let's face it, no one wants to spend time at the beach polishing furniture). This has all been confirmed to me by my friend Carole, who can smell





salty ocean breezes from her condo balcony. But, she noted, this has not always been the case.

Back in the day, the beach house where her family vacationed was furnished with old comfy couches and assorted accessories, afghans and other homey items, things demoted from the living room of a primary home to the beach. As it turns out, at least one highend designer has furnished his lakeside cottage in a style that used to be called "shabby chic." It seems that what some are labeling the "grandmother look" might well be the next trend for vacation homes, be they oceanside or lakeside retreats or mountain cottages. Once again, what goes around comes around.

Meanwhile, in a quest for coastal style, there's no need to furnish our evervday homes with rattan chairs (with broadly striped cushions), nor to install a squeaky wooden screen door to keep alive memories of lazy days by the water. Instead, some small touches will do the trick.

Did you bring home some shells (and,

if you're lucky, some sea glass)? Display your collection in a piece of vintage glass (I have an Early American pattern glass compote that's perfect for this). If you have larger pieces (lucky you), they can stand alone as handsome examples of natu-


ral art on a bookshelf, or perhaps used as a doorstop. For pottery collectors, check out Stangl's "clamshells," which can double as a catchall for buttons, pins, and other odds and ends, or Van Briggle's conch shells, which are stand-alone beautiful.

On the other hand, there are those of us who prefer to enjoy the cool breezes of the mountains rather than worship the sun with sand between our toes. My suggestion for them (us?) is to buy as many maple sugar sap buckets as you can. They're perfect for use as wastepaper baskets or outdoor flower containers. Looking ahead, I suppose they could easily be worked into Christmas decorations.

Whatever the case, whether you head for the water or head for the hills, once you're back home, consider beginning a collection of vintage postcards from your favorite destination. Frame them, prop them up, or stash them in a vintage box to be enjoyed later. But in the end, remember the immortal words of Dorothy: "There's no place like home."







PAGE 14 **Bidders shouted for silent movie posters at Heritage**

DALLAS, Texas — What was almost a lost art form lit up the auction marquee the weekend of July 15-16. Heritage Auctions' Treasures of the Silent Screen signature movie poster auction attracted more than 11,000 bids. Two floor sessions along with phone, mail, and internet bidding generated over \$2.2 million.


The auction contained 556 lots from the 2,100-piece Dwight Manley collection, considered to be the largest collection of silent movie posters in existence. For over a decade, Manley combed the world building the collection. It is so vast and significant that Manley engaged the services of a professional curator to ensure its safety.

Manley admits he's parting with much of the collection because he hasn't been able to display the posters or make them available for others to enjoy. Bruce Hershenson, founder of the movie memorabilia site eMoviePoster.com said, "It is extremely unlikely that there will EVER be another auction to bring together even a small fraction of the many wonderful silent movie posters that this one does." Much of what is not auctioned Manley may donate to the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences

While silent film posters are exceedingly rare, until recently they have been unappreciated or even unknown to collectors. They hail from the beginnings of the


movie industry - from the late 1800s when Edison first invented moving pictures to the 1930s when Hollywood released its last silent pictures. Like barkers at a carnival, movie posters of the era lured patrons from the sidewalks into the theaters to see "picture shows."

It was a time when live orchestras performed in theaters, complementing what the audience was seeing on the screen. Silent films were the first form of mass media and one of the first mediums to create stars like Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford, and Douglas. It was the era when studios like Warner Brothers, Fox, and United Artists came to be.

Adding to the posters' historical significance is their artistic merit. Silent movie posters are often so striking because they were printed using stone lithography, in which different stone plates individually printed each color. By the 1930s stone lithography had been abandoned in favor of cheaper but inferior-looking offset printing.

Sadly, silent films and their playbills were lost to time when "talkies" were introduced. Studio executive Harry Warner once claimed, "Who the hell wants to hear actors talk?" Yet, that is exactly what people wanted and the era of the silent film came to a quick end.

With the transition to sound, most old posters were simply discarded. That means, there are very few existing examples. In some cases, only a single copy exists.

What makes the posters even more significant is that many of the films of the silent era were destroyed in a 1937 Fox film vault fire. In some cases, the posters are the only remaining record. According to the Museum of the Moving Image, by "some estimates, 80 percent of American silent films are no longer extant," making any artifacts that much more important.

In the 1930s a few museums and private collectors started assembling artifact collections. The first to promote a collection was the Smithsonian.

Most definitely, bidders recognized the auction's historic significance. Many of the high bids were staggering. The auction's "centerpiece" was an early Oscar that sold for a whopping \$144,000. cinematographer Clyde De Vinna received the statuette at the second Academy Awards ceremony in 1930 for White Shadows in the South Seas. Scarcely any Oscars have been available to the public; this was one of the earliest editions and the first for a silent film ever offered at auction.

Posters did not take a back seat to that statue. Reaching \$114,000 was the only known copy of the one-sheet for the 1921 Charlie Chaplin film, The Kid. Considered somewhat autobiographical, Chaplin starred, produced, directed, and edited the flick. The poster was in excellent condition with only a few tears, pinholes, and some light touchups.

Another 29 posters sold for five figures. A one-sheet for another Chaplin film, the 1918 A Dog's Life, grabbed \$72,000. The poster had provenance to director Richard Attenborough and was graded in fine condition.

While not from a silent film, another \$72,000 winning bid went for a 1938 onesheet for King Kong starring Fay Wray. It was one of likely only three copies in existence. The piece was expertly restored,

fine condition, backed on linen, with only light touchup fold wear, and pinholes.

Nine posters featured legendary actor Douglas Fairbanks, known for starring in films like The Mark of Zorro and The Three Musketeers. Much anticipated was the poster for the 1922 United Artists version of Robin Hood. The one-sheet, which reached \$21,600, was in very good/ fine condition with some touchup and airbrushing.

Fortunately, bidders with modest budgets found not every poster reached a meteoric price. Some 180 lots sold for less than \$1,000 and 36 were below \$500. Three different lots sold for just \$288: a good-condition three-sheet for Fox's 1920 A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court; a six-sheet for the 1925 North of Nome; and a fine/very fine one-sheet for 1927 King of the Jungle.

Added to the Oscar statue were a few other non-poster lots. One was a collection of 22 Theda Bara lobby cards grabbing \$3,240. The cards were in fine+ condition, with varying degrees of imperfection. At the low end, going for just \$408, was an autographed Theda Bara framed photo portrait from 1915.

backed on linen, and had only light touchups to the fold lines.

Close behind, at \$63,000 was a onesheet for the 1919 Paramount film The Grim Game, featuring Harry Houdini. The movie was Houdini's first feature film. The very-fine condition poster backed on linen had some minor airbrushing.

Posters from films featuring stars like Houdini and Chaplin were understandably popular. Those included pieces featuring the era's most beloved actress, Mary Pickford. Eleven Pickford lots were available. They topped out at \$10,200 for a one-sheet for 1917's Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm. The nicely-restored poster had minor chips and tears and was touched up around the folds.

Another famous actress, Theda Bara, ranked behind only Charlie Chaplin and Mary Pickford in popularity. Posters for her films didn't do as well as anticipated. Of the ten lots, the highest bid of \$9,000 went for a French half-grande of the 1918 Fox Biblical drama Salome. It was in very-

Zorro still leaps into the hearts of those looking for a hero

In the days of early California, when tyrants tried to rule the land and enslave the people, one man, a Spanish nobleman, stood between the people and injustice. His name was Zorro!

As a Baby Boomer, born in the 1950s, I still fondly remember my entire family gathering around the television set to watch the latest black and white episode of Disney's Zorro. The character, Zorro, was actually featured in 10 television series, but the one we watched, and the most beloved, was Zorro starring Guy Williams, which aired from 1957-59. The final network broadcast was July 2, 1959. In all, 78 episodes were produced. Four hour-long specials were aired on the Walt Disney anthology series between October 30, 1960, and April 2, 1961.

The name "Zorro" is Spanish for "Fox," and Johnston McCulley, an American

pulp writer, created the character in 1919. Set in the early days of Los Angeles, California, Zorro is portrayed as a dashing, masked vigilante who defends the common, indigenous Mexican people of California against corrupt political figures and other bad people. Zorro hid his identity so that he might live a life among the people without being recognized as the hero who rode against injustice. To protect his identity, Zorro wore an all-black costume, consisting of a cape, a flat-brimmed hat (known as a sombrero cordobés), and a mask that covered the upper half of his face.

The Spanish government placed a bounty on Zorro's head for his interference with local problems. His ability to get out of trouble led people to call him El Zorro — the fox, because his foxlike cunning and sharp rapier kept him from getting caught. A rapier is a type of sword with a slender, sharply-pointed two-edged blade that was popular in Europe and brought to America by Spanish nobility. Zorro used his rapier



to carve his signature "Z" on the neck or clothing of his defeated enemies and on objects to signify that he had been there. As the need arises, Zorro also arms himself with a bullwhip and black powder pistol, and he is an expert with both. Like all western heroes, Zorro depended on his trusty horse, a black stallion called Tornado, to whisk him away from danger.

Zorro's true identity was Don Diego de la Vega. In order to complete his disguise, Don Diego hides his advanced fighting skills by pretending to be a coward and something of a dandy.

Zorro's first appearance was in the 1919 novel "The Curse of Capistrano," which became an overnight success (it eventually sold more than 50 million copies and became one of the best-selling books of all times) and people clamored for more Zorro stories. But it wasn't until 1920, when McCulley saw the success of the silent film movie "The Mark of Zorro" that he decided to write more Zorro stories. In all, Zorro was featured in five serialized stories and 57 short stories, the last short story appearing in print in 1959. Today, the original serialized story, "The Curse of Capistrano," is highly regarded as the Holy Grail of Zorro collections. It appeared in the pulp magazine All-Story Weekly in 1919 as a five-part series running between August 9 and September 16. Most collectors cannot find copies of All-Story Weekly, so they settle for reprints of McCulley's story in novel form.

The character Zorro also appeared in 40 movies, comic books, cartoon strips, stage productions, games, television promotional items, and radio programs,

giving collectors a wealth of Zorro material to search for and collect.

Collectors who enjoy reading Zorro stories, more than watching the swashbuckler's movies, search for the six-volume set of "El Zorro" released by Venture Press and appropriately called "Zorro: The Complete Pulp Adventures." Some collectors prefer the comic book Zorro, so these collectors search for Top, Dell, and Gold Key Zorro comic books. Although there doesn't seem to be a set price for these comics, allowing the seller to realize what the

market will bear, the Zorro comics that are sought the most are from the 1960s.



Sunbeam

Just before World II, Sunbeam introduced the Model 7. It was the first Mixmaster featuring a handle-based beater ejector. Production was halted during the war, then restarted in 1946. The Model 7 continued as Sunbeam's flagship product until the 1950s.

Sunbeam's jet-age Model 10 arrived in 1950 sporting fins and a futuristic front grille. An adjustment lever for various bowl sizes was added to the base and clear glass bowls were adopted. This was also the first model to come in chrome.

With Model 11 came a round vented front grill, a design feature that lasted for more than a decade. In 1957 Sunbeam brought out an enhanced Model 12 with a 12-speed motor, sold in chrome and several popular colors.

In the 1970s, Sunbeam re-engineered the Mixmaster, abandoning the tradition of steel bodies in favor of cheaper plastic. Those, too, have stood the test of time, and many are still in use. Models with an MM designation or a "1-" identification (i.e., 1-7, 1-8) are from that era and have electric cords that detach from the right side of the body.

By the 1950s, Sunbeam was a household name and the company added hand mixers to its lineup, beginning with a six-speed model in 1952. Throughout the subsequent years, Sunbeam made everything from waffle irons to coffee makers. In the 1960s, the modernist Vista line of appliances hit the shelves, which featured additional stand mixers, electric can openers, and blenders.

Sunbeam also expanded its product line via acquisitions of several other household brands in the latter half of the 20th century. In 1960, Osterizer came under their umbrella with the acquisition of the John Oster Manufacturing Company. In the late 1970s, Sunbeam secured the Crock-Pot with the acquisition of Rival.

Yet, the Mixmaster remained Sunbeam's immortal product. It was so impactful that in 1998, the US Postal Service dedicated a

stamp in its honor. Sadly, as consumers' buying preferences turned from quality to price, the public lost sight of the value of longevity and good engineering.

Many of these kitchen staples ended up at yard sales, in thrift stores - or worse, sent to landfills. Don't let that castoff stigma fool you; even at 50 or 60 years old, Mixmasters and other Sunbeam appliances still work like champs. Surprisingly, purchasing one of these workhorses will typically cost you less than one of today's cheap substitutes. It may look a little worse for its years of wear, but it's common to find a solid-condition 50s-era Mixmaster in an antique store for around \$30 (half of that at a yard sale). The plastic-bodied models from the 60s and 70s are often about one-third of that!

The real grand-slam is finding a mixer

with its affiliated accessories – attachments like blenders, juicers, meat grinders, and even ice cream freezers were available at one time. A well-outfitted set can raise the price three-fold. Keep an eye out for original manuals and cookbooks to round out the collection.

Whatever you discover - whether it's a working model with just its beaters and bowls, or a more complete outfit with all the accessories, you are certain to appreciate it just like your mother or grandmother did. Even the most stubborn batch of gingerbread is no match for one of these workhorses. Plus, a classic Mixmaster will still be working when today's cheap, big-box equivalent is broken and its warranty expired!
