After 50 years; collectors still gather on Walton's Mountain

It began with the plaintive song played on a trumpet. For many viewers who tuned into their local CBS television channel on Thursday, September 14, 1972, they were hooked. At a time when there were three major broadcasting networks, audiences could have checked out "The Mod Squad" on ABC or "The Flip Wilson Show" over on NBC. But many chose to follow the story of a three-generational family trying to make it through the Great Depression (and beyond), living in a fictitious Virginia mountain community. For them, their assets included little more than a lumber mill, the ability to live off the land, and a strong family bond. All the while, they were able to survive, mainly because they were the Waltons.

This year, as the show marked the 50th anniversary of its debut, fans of the show continue to watch the 221 episodes of the series over and over again, thanks to DVDs and reruns. Many times, they stay connected with other like-minded folks on social media to compare notes. Some make the pilgrimage to the hometown that inspired the story. And then there are those who collect souvenirs related to the television series.

Even before the premiere of "The Waltons," fans were well acquainted with the family, thanks to the 1961 book entitled "Spencer's Mountain" and the subsequent 1963 film of the same name, followed by a

1971 made-for-television holiday movie ("The Homecoming: A Christmas Story"). All were based on the childhood memories of Earl Hamner, Jr., who grew up in the real-life rural Virginia town of Schuyler, population 349. Later, Hamner, the original "John-Boy," would be credited with the creation of, among other things, "Falcon Crest," a popular television series that was

> the diametric opposite of the tale he spun about his rural childhood. But that's another story.


> For much of his writing, Hamner was profoundly influenced by his hometown, originally called Walker's Mill, nestled in the actual county of Nelson (not Jefferson, as it became

known fictionally), situated 25 miles south of Charlottesville in the foothills of Virginia's Blue Ridge Mountains. In spite of Hamner making up names rather than use the actual names of places from his past, fans of "The Waltons" continue to flock, to this day, from around the world to the town of Schuyler. On a pilgrimage, their goal is to visit, live, and breathe in the place that inspired the television show that presented a nostalgic lifestyle.

These days, Nelson County's Schuyler is a mecca for fans of "The Waltons," but it's more than that, a "must-visit" for nature-lovers and history buffs, according to local travel specialist Maureen Kelly, speaking for "Visit Nelson County." Thanks in large part to Hamner's reminiscences of growing up here, Schuyler is, Kelly said, "on the map" and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Getting there is half the fun. Kelly's colleague, Becky Howard, pointed out that "quiet two-lane roads, and a much smaller one" lead into town. At that point, things change, as miles of quiet countryside lead into a place that is "buzzing." It's not unusual to see license plates from Mary-land and Pennsylvania, Virginia and Florida (and beyond), all in town for a single purpose, Howard noted. Furthermore, the town frequently hosts European travelers (recent guests include those from Poland and Germany), all fans of "The Waltons" and an attestation to the show's continued international popularity.

For those spending a day or two in Schuyler, their itinerary is clear. They begin with a guided tour of the Walton Hamner House, "John-Boy's" childhood home. Next comes a visit to Walton's Mountain Museum. Located in what was once Hamner's boyhood school, the muse-

Tomte toys were easy on the furniture and washable

If you were a kid in the 1960s or early 1970s, you might recall displays or trays on toy store counters loaded with bright, colorful toy vehicles which were molded in what seemed to be a kind of soft rubber. You also might remember that the toys were miniatures of mostly British, French, German, and American vehicles. Others were models of Japanese, Italian, and Swedish cars.

Originally sold as inexpensive yet durable playthings for young children, these miniature toy vehicles were manufactured by Tomte Laerdal in Stavanger, Norway.

Asmund Sigurd Laerdal founded his company in 1940 as a small publisher of children's books and greeting cards. Laerdal expanded into the manufacture of wooden toys in 1943, using the name of Smavare Industry. The name Tomte Laerdal (a "tomte" is a Scandinavian elflike winter creature, associated with farms and Christmas) came about in 1951, and soon the company began making dolls, and manufacturing rubber vehicles. In 1958, they produced five 1:40 to 1:30 scale vehicles (the 747 series) which were made of rubber.

Unsatisfied with these initial toys, Tomte Laerdal started experimenting in 1961 with vinyl. The vinyl vehicles, which premiered in 1962, were marketed as

"furniture-friendly." The idea was that, unlike the hard metal parts of diecast toys, the soft pliable material of the Tomte cars,

trucks, and tractors wouldn't scratch the coffee table, floors or walls during collisions or upsets. Another friendly feature of the vinyl toys was that they were washable. In fact, Tomte Laerdal even issued instructions on how to go about the cleansing procedure.

Most of these vinvl vehicles were made in green; yellow; red; blue; orange; and uncolored, or white/beige. Excepting white/ beige or colorless, green is the scarcest color. (Note: Dark green, dark blue and white/ beige were used in the early 1960s, olive

Chinese Ming-style ewer poured sweet money at Cottone auction

GENESEO, N.Y. - The proverbial "Best of the Best" characterized the Fine Art & Antiques Auction hosted by Cottone Auctions on September 23. "We were expecting a good auction, but were thrilled when things turn out even better than we hoped, as many, many things went over the high estimate, exceeding our expectations," said Matt Cottone, owner of the house which has been in business for over 35 years. "We turn more down than we take in and have been fortunate enough to build a good relationship with an elite group of buyers and sellers. People were pursuing the collection from all over the country."

The top lot was a rare Chinese Ming-style blue and white ewer with a mark and period of Qianlong (1736-1795). "There was tremendous competition for this piece, which ultimately sold to an overseas bidder," Cottone said. It commanded an outstanding \$282,000, far exceeding the estimate of \$50,000 to \$80,000. The 10 ½ inch high hand-painted porcelain was in excellent condition and carried an impressive provenance. The catalog noted in part, "This exact ewer was photographed, circa 1900, in the United States legation drawing room, Peking, China. The ewer has descended in the family of the Hon. Edwin H. Conger (1843-1907) & Mrs. Sarah (Pike) Conger. Sarah Pike Conger's letters also describe her growing friendship with the Empress Dowager, the flight of the



Imperial Court to Xian to avoid capture by Western forces, and Cixi's return to Beijing on January 7/8 of 1902."

Period stained glass lamps and architectural elements were in full demand, according to Cottone. "There was so much heavy bidding and the phones were full. Collectors will not settle for even the best reproductions. They want the real deal. A Tiffany lamp that only had a 14 inch shade sold for \$163.200." The Tiffany Studios, New York "Jeweled

Dragonfly" table lamp, circa 1910, stood 18 high with an 18 inch shade diameter brought \$103,200, against a \$40,000 to \$60,000 essigned "TIFFANY STUDIOS NEW YORK 1475." It was also referenced in literature by Alastair Duncan, Tiffany Lamps and Metalware.

green in the late '60s, and apple green replaced orange from 1972 on.) The 750 series models are generally in the familiar 1:43 scale, though the Tomte Major Models vary from 1:30 to 1:18 scales. The toys were manufactured until 1978, having by that time sold over 100 million models across the globe in 110 countries. Tomte Laerdal then focused its resources on medical and emergency first aid equipment.

There are quite a number of classic and sometimes fairly exotic cars amongst the Tomte vehicles. These include the VW Pick-up, Sunbeam Alpine, Mercedes Benz 300 SL, Renault Floride, Jaguar D-Type, Mercedes Benz 180, Peugeot 403, Ford Vedette, Citroën DS, Opel Rekord, and Bentley. Some classic Americana by Tomte includes a Ford Thunderbird, Chevrolet El Camino, and a Studebaker Pick-up. Tomte also produced a small train set, No. 757/7570, consisting of a Locomotive, Passenger Car, and Coal/Goods Car.

A number of the 750 series models share a farming theme: the Fordson Tractor and Trailer, LWB (long wheelbase) Land Rover, Chevrolet Stake Truck, and the Dodge Kew Truck. The four-wheeled farm trailer can be towed not only by the Fordson tractor, but by any of the vehicles with a towing eyelet. These include the Dodge Kew Truck, the SWB (short wheelbase) Land Rover, and the LWB Land Rover.

Examples of Tomte models which still have a Tomte adhesive label affixed sometimes have more collectable value. The label is circular, about one centimeter in diameter, and is partitioned one half into a gold section, the other into a black portion. In the black section "Tomte" appears in gold lettering; in the gold portion, "furniture-friendly" is lettered in black.

Collectors should note that the last several 750 series models (Nos. 27 through 32) had the shortest production runs of the series, so tend to be rarer than the other cars. The Renault R5 Le Car, Alfa Romeo P33 Pininfarina and Renault R12 TL in particular are known to be relatively scarce.

One of the most collectible of Tomte models is the large scale Volkswagen Pick-

up "Special" (No. 754). Made from 1963, this is the only Tomte vehicle which has an enclosed cab with interior, including driver and passenger figures seated inside. This model was succeeded in 1967 by another VW Pick-up (No. 756) with the characteristic silver-painted simulated windows.

The first 12 750 series Tomte vehicles were sold in individual boxes. Later there came the more familiar mass-display countertop boxes which held 12, 18 or 36 models. You would simply select which models you wanted from the tray-like box, and purchase them without individual packaging. The vertical portion of the display often showed an illustration of a kid with one of the models, and wording which emphasized the rubbery pliability of the vinyl toys.

Earlier-generation 750 series models were also sold as gift sets in window boxes containing three, six, nine, or 18 vehicles.

Later-generation 750 series vehicles also appeared in blister packs. These included three-packs, four-packs, and five-packs, as well as farm sets and more. On the reverse of the packaging were printed reassurances about the toys' furniture-friendly qualities, as well as washing instructions to keep them like new. Of the Major Models, the Fire Engine was marketed in its own box, while the other models were sold variously in window boxes, on cards, and in blister packs.

In the USA, Tomte vehicles were marketed by Creative Playthings, Inc, sometimes in cardboard slipcase boxes under

the "mini-cars" moniker. You could slide out the inner box to reveal a single-layer tray divided into compartments, with 16 models inside.

In case you have doubts about the collectability of these classic Norwegian toys, let's take a look at some recent auction values of Tomte vinyl vehicles. These range from \$25 for a Major Models Ford Pick-up, to \$420 for an Alfa Romeo Pininfarina. And please keep in mind that examples from the early rubber 747 series are scarce and can command impressive figures! But don't be dissuaded if you are thinking of starting a collection on a shoestring budget: Many 750 series Tomte models can be had for just a dollar or few each.



Another standout among the table lamps was a rare Duffner & Kimberly Italian Renaissance lamp, circa 1906, 34 inches high with a 24 inch shade diameter, that set a record when it achieved \$96,000, once again outdistancing the estimate of \$40,000 to \$60,000. The catalog cited Mosaic Shades Volume II by Paul Christ, in which it states that lighting designer Hamilton Tappan Howell (1872-1952) created a series of approximately twenty-five lighting designs for Duffner & Kimberly Co. These were made in period styles that emphasize a departure from Tiffany's repertoire. They were complex designs, made up of thousands of individual glass tiles, and often incorporating extensive cast bronze elements. The workmanship of the bronze and quality of glass was on a par with Tiffany's lamps.

A Tiffany Studios, New York four sided hanging Turtleback lantern galloped past the \$8,000 to \$12,000 estimate realizing a staggering \$49,200. The lantern itself measured 12 inches high by 7 ½ inches wide and hung 22 inches in total. It was made in bronze and turtleback glass and was impressed with an early TIFFANY STUDIOS NEW YORK tag. A similar example can be found in the Charles Hosmer Morse Museum of American Art, Winter Park, Florida.

A highlight among the architectural elements was a Tiffany Studios leaded glass Romanesque ornamental window, circa 1890. It was over 9 feet high, cased in an arched rectangular panel depicting a foliate landscape surmounted by a radiant crown. It is cited in Alastair Duncan's Tiffany Windows, and realized \$117,000, passing the \$50,000 to \$80,000 estimate.

Silver was well represented by a pair of

Gorham sterling silver Art Nouveau candelabras that hailed from the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair. They were designed by Edwin E. Codman (American, 1876-1955), Gorham Manufacturing Company, Providence, circa 1904, and were created with a figural long haired maiden standing as the central column with her hair flowing over the arms of the candle holder. The bases were marked on the underside with Spaulding & Co., A4464 & A4465, and also with the St. Louis Fair mark. Their total weight was 122.58 troy ounces and the pair sold for \$84,000, against an estimate of \$15,000 to \$25,000.

Jewelry also performed past expectations. An 18K yellow gold and diamond ring, set in a flat fold-over form with 46 encrusted old

It was marked with an eagle head and makers marks and was estimated at \$2,000 to \$4,000, but flew past that mark to yield a sensational \$44,400.

Modern art was topped by a 1963 Alexander Calder (American, 1898-1976) gouache and ink on paper, titled "The Beams." It was in excellent condition and signed "Calder 63". The work is registered in the archives of the Calder Foundation, New York and was exhibited at Perls Galleries, New York, in Alexander Calder: 1963. It brought \$90,000, against a \$40,000 to \$60,000 estimate.

DALLAS - There's a particularly charming scene in Quentin Tarantino's most recent movie, "Once Upon a Time in Hollywood," when Margot Robbie, playing Sharon Tate, takes herself to the movies to sit among the audience of a screening of "The Wrecking Crew," in which Tate co-starred. Tarantino's scene, set in 1969, is memorable for its verisimilitude; the sunny outside of the Westwood Village movie house, where Tate convinces the ticket seller that she is indeed in the movie, is a perfect time capsule of stucco walls lined with one-sheet posters and lobby cards of scenes from "The Wrecking Crew." As seen through the eyes of Tate, the camera lovingly pans along the cards. And once Tate convinces the staff she's the real deal, they ask her to pose for a photo in front of a one sheet for the film. She happily strikes a pose.

Collectors of movie memorabilia will be touched and impressed by Tarantino's love letter to this hallmark of cinema culture. The highly visual and aesthetic promotional materials used by movie houses are favorites amongst collectors, and on Nov. 19, Heritage offers a bounty of them, ranging from industry treasures that are a century old to more contemporary finds.

"Heritage is privileged to offer The Wood Hall Collection, one of the world's premier compilations of lobby cards," says Zach Pogemiller, Heritage's Associate Director for Movie Posters. "While many large collections have been built, few rival Wood Hall for its impeccable curation, with items selected for their rarity, visual impact, and cultural import. The collection contains material on virtually every significant, industry-shaping film in motion picture history, and represents an incredible opportunity for collectors of all concentrations."

Highlights of The Wood Hall Collection reveal a particularly desirable (and fun) theme for dedicated collectors. See if you can spot it: We've got Boris Karloff in the 1932 Universal release The Mummy: The masterful makeup skills of Jack Pierce are evident on this rare lobby card with two great images of Karloff as the high priest in the scene, and as the Mummy as seen in the border artwork. Also on offer is a lobby card from 1931s Frankenstein, the second film in the annals of Universal's classic monster movies. Collectors will be thrilled to see this lobby, referred to as the "torture" card.

Here's The Golem, released domestically by Paramount in 1920, considered a landmark of early German Expressionism. "The striking cinematography of Karl Freund (who would go on to shoot Metropolis, Dracula, and direct The Mummy) and highly stylized sets made this film profoundly influential in the development of horror cinema," says Pogemiller. Also on offer is a lobby card from Goldwyn's 1920 Cabinet of Dr. Caligari, which is exceedingly scarce. "It showcases the film's surreal, nightmarish production design," says Pogemiller. "The fantastical film's exploration of insanity and human subjectivity would have a profound influence on the genre."

Not to mention a title lobby card from Universal's 1935 release Werewolf of London. "This superb title card rivals almost any Universal horror title for rarity. A genre fan favorite, the film represents the first attempt by Holly-





The Wood Hall Collection is not all chills, however: How about a lobby standee, from 1915, of the great Charlie Chaplin? Says Pogemiller: "This impressive standee is one of the scarcest and best examples of theatrical advertising from the silent era we've ever encountered. Standing 59 inches tall, Chaplin is depicted as his signature Tramp character, with iconic mustache, bowler hat, and cane; this persona captivated world-wide audiences during his time with Essanay beginning in 1914."

Aside from The Wood Hall Collection, but back to some scary stuff, because in movie land, horror is never out of season: Heritage offers an abundance of rare and coveted one sheets and more, and fans of the genre will be on the lookout for one sheets for the Son of Frankenstein (Universal, 1939) and Forbidden Planet (MGM, 1956); an exceedingly rare reissue six sheet of King Kong (RKO, 1942); a British quad for The War of the Worlds (Paramount, 1953), and original artwork for Creature from the Black Lagoon by Greg Hildebrandt, the internationally renowned designer and painter who produced artwork for the British release of Star Wars, illustrations for Lord of the Rings and Marvel and DC comics.

Other sought-after highlights in this auction include a three sheet from Howard Hawks' The Big Sleep (Warner Bros., 1946. Bogie and Bacall took their off-screen relationship public during the production of this definitive film noir, and the artwork shows some sizzle); an Italian quattro fogli for The Lady from Shanghai (Columbia C.E.I.A.D., 1948) with Orson Welles embracing then-wife Rita Hayworth; and a remarkable Advance Crown Style British Quad from 1965's Thunderball. This rare country-of-origin quad features Sean Connery as 007 in four action-packed scenes by artist Robert McGinnis depicting both the pitfalls and pleasures the international superspv lifestyle.



Delbert Cox celebrating 55 years in the bid-calling business

While many auction houses have gone to online bidding platforms, there are still some who prefer chanting to a live audience.

Delbert Cox is one such auctioneer. Cox, who just turned 84, has many years of auction experience under his belt -55 to be exact. And he shows no signs of slowing down anytime soon.

"I still have the passion for this business that I had 55 years ago," Cox said. "It never gets old and I find it relaxing to some degree. It's work and at times it's not easy, but what else would I do? I love what I do."

Though he's based in southwest Ohio, this veteran of the gavel has been hired to auction estates all over the Midwest from high end antiques to household appliances. Just recently, Cox fetched top dollar for a vintage cider press, a hand-crank washing machine from the 1930s, a dozen handmade quilts, a box full of vinyl records and a few dozen ceramic dolls. He's auctioned everything from toy trucks to farm tractors, from pop bottles to huge storage tanks.

While some young boys fall in love with trains, trucks or baseball, Cox was infatuated by auctioneering. He accompanied his dad to livestock auctions, his dad being the auctioneer on duty most of the time.

"When I was born my dad was already a livestock auctioneer, so I've been around the auctioneering business all my life," Cox said.

Delbert's father, James, was the manager of Comer and Jordan Livestock Company in Springdale, Ohio. James traveled extensively, buying and selling horses and livestock all over the country for that auction. James used to buy stock sight unseen, and have it delivered by rail car to the Glendale Station.

James would go and inspect the herd,

and have them off loaded onto trucks there and brought to the sale barn.

"My dad sold one of the horses to Hollywood, a horse that was used in the making of the movie Cisco Kid," Delbert said.

James eventually ventured into the equipment for horses and livestock, which included harness and saddlery. That year was 1945 and Delbert was just seven years old. Delbert learned the art of auctioneering at the sale barn by selling saddles for his dad.

Delbert accompanied his father at auctions, oftentimes performing the task himself. But he also was employed fulltime at National Distillers in Cincinnati. When he was up for a promotion and offered a foreman's job, Delbert declined and simply quit. The following day he was a fulltime auctioneer. "I never attended any auctioneering school," Delbert professed. "There was an auction held at the farm of my first cousin. That auction caught the attention of my cousin, who soon after attended an auctioneering school. He begged and begged me to go with him, but I refused. He returned home with a pamphlet of tongue-twisters and a little record he was told to listen to. I read the pamphlet a few times and listened to the record a few times and went from there. I was hooked."

Ask Delbert about his first auctioneering gig and he has little to say about the experience. It has slipped his mind. Performing any demanding task for 55 years can cloud one's memory banks.

"At first I liked it but I never gave thought of becoming a seasoned auctioneer," he said. "I'm glad things turned out the way they did and that I got into it fulltime, because I've had the opportunity to meet a lot of real nice people. That's a big part of it. A few years back I told a couple of ladies that I was thinking of retiring from this business, and they jumped all over my case and told me I shouldn't be thinking of retiring. The truth is, I still love doing it after all these years."

At the onset of his career, Ohio was his territory. In a short time he was working in Indiana and Kentucky as well. Over the course of his career he has taken his auction talents to 44 states, including Alaska and Hawaii. Just last month he worked a four-day estate sale in California.

While the items found on auction tables seems to have changed over the years, the audiences, Cox says, remain about the same.

"They're about the same, only better," he said. "You get to know them better as years pass and most of them are attuned to antiques. What's changed is the age of those in the audience. Most of our buyers nowadays are 45 and over. At one time many in the audience were in their teens, but you don't find many teens at all at auctions these days. They don't covet antiques like people used to. Young people are living in the future.

"We also don't see the large crowds like we used to. And, we see a lot of the same people, and that can be good. They're the followers of your auctions."

Cox recalls when some auctions houses were standing room only. He is quick to point out that what was once hot in years past has been put on the back burner today.

"Certain items are not bringing what they used to," Cox said. "Furniture is down. Gold coins, sterling silver and guns are the best markets right now. In fact, any type of gun is a hot item. I like to sell coins. There's a good market for coins. People are into coins and they know the conditions and price of these coins, so it's easy to sell them.

"Baseball card collectors are honing on those from the 40s and 50s, but at auction you often don't come across those early day baseball cards. Stamp collections are OK, but I don't see many buyers of those out there. When you're an auctioneer you never know what you'll come across."

Indeed. A few years, an elderly woman asked Cox to appraise a few lamps she had stored in her attic. Turned out the lamps were genuine Tiffany lamps, each valued at roughly \$11,750.

Delbert's son, Jimmy, will become the third generation of auctioneers from this family. Jimmy has been taking bids since 1997.

"God's been good to me, he's kept me healthy and led me to something I've enjoyed all my life."

Cox Auctioneers has been a family-owned and operated business since 1967. The family holds licenses in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky.

Aaron Willard clock ticks way past its high estimate to \$18,000

WINDSOR, Conn. — An Aaron Willard Chippendale mahogany tall clock ticked way past its \$3,000 to \$5,000 estimate when it finally chimed sold at \$18,000 during an Oct. 22 auction conducted by Nadeau's Auction Gallery.

This handsome, 94-inch tall timepiece was detailed with a fretwork top and brass finials, an arched top door, brass stop fluted quarter columns, an inlaid base, and ogee feet. Its dial was marked Aaron Willard, Boston, and it retained traces of its paper label inside its door.

A Queen Anne walnut highboy, made \$10,800. This two part example measured 87 inches high and 38-1/4 inches wide and was made in Salem, Mass., in the mid 1700s. The upper section had a bonnet top and three turned finials over a fan carved center drawer flanked by two short drawers over four drawers. The lower section featured one long drawer over three short drawers, a fan carved center drawer, and carved skirt and cabriole legs on pad feet. This outstanding highbov had provenance to John Walton in the 1950s and was previously sold through Kenneth Tuttle Antiques of Pittston, Maine, in May 2008. A Bidjar or Bijar Oriental carpet, was estimated at \$2,500-4,500 and sold for \$8,125. This 12 by 6 foot example was hand woven in the small Iranian city of Bijar. These rugs are legendary for their toughness, intense colors, and distinctive patterns.

bor, was estimated at \$1,000-2,000 and made \$5,700. This oil on canvas work featured three fisherman and several boats in a foggy harbor. It was signed by the artist on its lower right corner. Forrest King Moses' (1893 - 1974) Busy Railroad, was estimated at \$2,000-4000 and sold for \$10,800. This oil on panel piece was signed and dated by the artist on it lower right corner and pictured an idyllic small town in winter.

Asian decorative arts were also well represented at this auction.

A Chinese four-panel screen, was estimated at \$300-500 and traded hands at \$9,600. This stunning piece measured 94 inches tall and 144 inches long overall and was decorated with figures in a courtyard scene. This screen was from the estate of Alexis Gregory (1936-2020) and was sold to benefit the Alexis Gregory Foundation. This organization supports fine arts and music.

A bronze and gilt bronze Buddha, was estimated at \$300-500 and sold for \$7,500. This 19th century or earlier seated figure measured 8 inches tall. A pair of blue and white porcelain dishes, was estimated at \$300-500 and realized \$6,875. These marked examples each measured 6-1/2 inches in diameter and were decorated with stylized wildflowers and scrolling vines. A Chinese hardwood alter table, was estimated at \$1,500-2,500 and served up \$10,800. It featured carved detailing and square legs. It was from a fine collection from Irvington, NY.

A collection of 13 Chinese scrolls, was estimated at \$500-1,000 and sold for \$16,250. All featured hand painted Chinese characters.

This sale's painting selections also generated impressive sales results. Emile Albert Gruppe's (1896 - 1978) Fishing HarThis event closed the loop with currency and other items that defied traditional auction categories.

A handsome, hand carved carousel horse, was estimated at \$1,000-2,000 and realized \$6,400. This nearly life-sized outside row stander was detailed authentically with a brindle, blanket, and saddle with stirrups.

According to Eddie Nadeau, President of Nadeau's Auction Gallery, "Again, our robust selections of category-spanning Asian arts caught the attention of collectors worldwide. 

um recreates multiple rooms used on the sets of the television show, with a few of the actual props on the premises. Check out the living room and kitchen, John-Boy's bedroom and the pony cart room, as well as the Baldwin sisters' room (with an actual "moonshining still" that was seized by local authorities) and the newly added recreation of the Baptist church where the family worshiped. An exhibition room, with Walton-related memorabilia on display, as well as a video featuring Hamner's reminiscences, are also offered. Shop in Ike Godsey's General Merchandise Store for a variety of souvenirs, which may well be tomorrow's collectibles, local crafts, and postcards. For those planning an extended stay, overnight accommodations are available at John & Olivia's Bed & Breakfast; the aforementioned Walton Hamner House can be rented by larger groups.

But fans of the show need not travel in order to own a reminder of their favorite television series. Some collectors might choose to read the writings that inspired the show and for that, many of Hamner's books are widely available for every budget. Ranging from rare editions to readers' copies, hardbacks or softcovers, and even ex-library copies, all are available at a wide range of prices.

For those seeking Walton-related items produced at the height of the show's popularity, there is a variety of souvenirs available, some of which can be purchased for just a few dollars at online sites, but others that have sold at auction for hundreds of dollars. Among the licensed items still available are a 1974 set of paper dolls produced by Whitman, as well as Whitman jigsaw puzzles and a series of books featur-




Above: At the Walton's Mountain Museum, visitors can view a faithful reproduction of the family's kitchen. (Courtesy of "Visit Nelson County")

ing members of the Walton family. Thermos included several "The Waltons" lunch boxes in its line, and View-Master offered reels with scenes from the show in 1972; all are collectable today. Hallmark introduced "Keepsake" Walton Christmas tree ornaments in the 1970s and continued to keep up this tradition into the 2000s. Topps produced collectors' cards (plus chewing gum). Still available for purchase today on the secondary market are Mego eight-inch dolls ("Collect the whole family"), and a 1974 Christmas LP, not to mention "The Waltons Game," a board game by Milton Bradley. Waltons fans also seek a number of issues of "TV Guide," ones that featured members of the cast pictured on the cover. And even "MAD" magazine got into the act, with a 1974 issue (numbered 165) with a nod to the cultural icons. Many of these items are available online or in antique shops and malls. Autographed photographs are also highly collectable, many of which might sell for \$100-plus.

Even though "The Waltons" has endured for many decades, the series never hit number one in the Nielsen ratings, topping out at number two. It was nominated for 39 Emmy awards, but only took home 13. But in the hearts and minds of many fans of the show, those who wish to relive the memories or at least own a little piece of it, it remains first and foremost.


