## Phones were once only for making a call

Once upon a time, telephones had dials. And operators. And cords.

They didn't take pictures. They didn't send text messages. They didn't provide apps for our internet-ready fingertips.

For most of the 20th century, telephones were just for making or receiving calls. Where you made or received those calls was dependent on where in the house your phone jack was located. That's why telephones came in so many styles and colors. You placed a phone, and there it stayed; complementing the décor was a prime consideration. For the bedroom, a sleek pink "Princess" model. For the office desk, a practical black "Rotary 500." For the kitchen, a handy, hard-to-miss, red wall-mount "Trimline."

Mobile phones? Well, if you were a patron of an exclusive nightspot, there were obliging waiters on hand to rush a phone to your table, and plug it right in. Back on earth, however, the concept of a "mobile phone" was dependent on the length of your telephone cord.

Phones in cars? Well, that was the stuff of futuristic fiction For everyone else, making a call on the run meant finding a phone booth. No problem there, though. In every major city, a phone booth was usually on a corner within walking distance. (Why do you think Superman picked them?) As long as you had the right number of nickels, everything was swell.

Long before phone booths, however, there was Alexander Graham Bell, the name synonymous with the invention of

the telephone. Bell patented his creation in 1876, although there'd been rudimentary predecessors in Cuba (1849), and Germany (1860). But Bell's "electrical speech machine" (his name for it) was the first to successfully and reliably transmit multiple voice messages over a single wire, by first transmitting a current.

Bell's 1876 "aha!" moment was memorably recreated in the 1939 movie, "The Story of Alexander Graham Bell," with Don Ameche (as Bell) barking over the new device, to his assistant in the next room, "Mr. Watson, come here. I want to see you." For years following, a common slang term for the telephone was "the Ameche."

Initially, the telephone was just a curiosity (the first outdoor telephone wire ran only three miles). Even as lines expanded, phones remained a bigcity phenomenon, found primarily in businesses, public buildings, and some well-to-do homes. Three thousand telephones were sold during their first year of introduction, that number increasing to one million by 1900. By 1918, however, there were over ten million Bell System telephones in use across the United States, making Bell's patent one of the most valuable of all time.

Bell System's "global phone" ad of the 1960s proudly stated, it was "the next best thing to being there."

The earliest telephones were unwieldv wooden cabinet affairs, their size necessary to hold the wiring. An attached mouthpiece on the box allowed the caller to speak; a separate earpiece on a cord was necessary to hear the response. Even as new models made their debut, the wooden wall phone remained a staple in many American homes, particularly in rural areas, until after World War II.



with finger holes for each number (the letters above were for prefixes), made its debut in 1904, although the upgrade was not incorporated by the Bell System until 1919. Another major 1904 upgrade: the "French Phone" which finally combined the transmitter and receiver in a single handset. While the streamlined "Candlestick Phone" attracted consumer interest from the 1890s into the 1920s, the most ubiquitous phone design of the midtwentieth century was the rotary dial desk set, best popularized by Western Electric.

## William sburg show cases works of Black American artistans



WILLIAMSBURG, Va. — Bylines precede the words of writers. Artists mark their work with a signature. And any school-age child can tell you that forgetting to sign your paper might result in a failing grade.

But then there's the case of David Drake, a 19th-century enslaved potter who not only signed and dated his work, but sometimes added the words "I made this." Rare for the time when first he inscribed them into clay, Drake's words have now taken on new significance, thanks to a current exhibition at the DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Museum. From now until December 31, 2025, "I made this...': The Work of Black American Artists and Artisans" is among the current offerings at Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia.

The scope of objects on view in this new exhibition is broad, including items as diverse as paintings, furniture, and textiles; sculptures, quilts, and ceramics; and tools, metals, and even more. But what sets this exhibition apart, and earns it the label of "landmark," is the fact that, for the first time, the works on display here were all made by Black hands.

To be sure, the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation has long collected works by Black artists and artisans. Indeed, as Laura Pass Barry pointed out, an effort to collect works by these artists reaches back approximately 75 years to the mid-20th century. Suffice it to say, the current multimedia exhibition has been years in the making, even before meaningful dialogues began some three years ago. That is when a "large group of people" were

brought together for open discussions, according to Barry, Williamsburg's curator of paintings, drawings, and sculpture. She explained that a dozen people, representing a variety of

fields of expertise (including the trades, custodial services, orientation, conservation, and theater) met to discuss how art is perceived and what it means. "This was critical," she said, in order to realize an exhibition that would ultimately be progressive, innovative, and challenging. Charged with the task of selecting what should be displayed in this one-of-

a-kind undertaking, the diverse group settled on some 140 must-have objects for the exhibition. Trouble was, this was set to be an "intimate show." All the while, Barry said, "It was imperative to get multiple viewpoints from all over the Foundation."

Even though they did not participate in the earliest sessions, Barry and her colleague and fellow curator, Jan Gilliam, were brought in, tapping into their curatorial talents.

Discussions revolved around "gender, geography, and time," according to Barry. Considerations for "condition and conservation" played a part in the final decisions. And in the end, the panel's initial choices were whit-

## **Casting votes for toys in Hall of Fame**

When it came to deciding my vote this election season, there was no doubt in my mind what my strategy would be. Feeling strongly about my favorite candidate, I was determined to do whatever it would take to pave the way to victory, so I set upon a plan to vote early (and often). With a strong sense of commitment, I cast an absentee vote every day for several weeks. Surely we would be victorious. I mean, seriously, considering the competition....

But when final election results were announced on Thursday, November 10, Rack-O was not named as one of the three new entrants into the National Toy Hall of Fame. Losing to Lite-Brite and the top was understandable, albeit hard to accept, but when Masters of the Universe beat you out, well, talk about the agony of defeat.

A bit of history here: The Toy Hall of Fame was established in a children's museum in Salem, Oregon, back in 1998. Early inductees were rather predictable: Barbie and Monopoly, frisbees and Teddy bears. You get the idea. Then, in 2017, the Toy Hall of Fame moved cross-country to its new home, The Strong Museum of Play in Rochester, New York, where it has been enthusiastically embraced ever since.

long nominating process that begins as soon as the current year's inductees are announced. (Nominations for 2023 can already be submitted at museumofplay.org). Some 300 different toys were nominated this year by thousands of kids at heart, according to the chief curator at The Strong, Christopher Bensch. He pointed out that some toys have serious fans who organize among themselves and regularly flood the website (think Breyer Horses, Hess trucks, and Spice Girl dolls). When the nomination process closes, a panel of experts, including historians and educators, meets to hone the number down to a dozen finalists, all of which meet four criteria (longevity, recognizability, play value, and in-

novation). Learning of this year's finalists, and keeping score at home, I personally nixed bingo (ugh!), the tedious game of "Settlers of Catan," and Nerf toys (still now sure what they are). Ditto a card game called Phase 10 (a new one for me). I was never into Breyer Horses, Pound Puppies struck me as a bit silly, and the Spiragraph seemed a rather ho-hum. Having tracked the winners for several years, it seems that noncommercial toys (like sand and the cardboard box) often get a nod. Using this rationale, I guessed that the top, an ancient toy, would probably beat out the piñata.

I took her word for it. Meanwhile, having binge-watched Netflix's "Stranger Things" with Ruby, her older sister, I recalled that Lite-Brite was enjoying a resurgence in popularity. Well, the girls were right. But as for Masters of the Universe, well, He-Man and She-Ra never did it for me, but I'm clearly not in the mainstream of things there. If I had been paying attention, I might have noticed that there is, yes, a Netflix series based on Masters of the Universe. That explains that.

Missing in this year's inductees were board games, which are enjoying a resurgence, and dolls. I brought this up with Chris, and he suggested that maybe the selection committee decided to mix it up a bit this year, in light of recent winners (Jenga and Baby Nancy in 2020, and Risk and American Girl Dolls in 2021). As an aside, he said that folks are rediscovering low-tech Lite-Brite, which depends on an incandescent light bulb to light up little plastic pegs, and then making stop-action videos with their creations. Hmm, Santa, do you read me?

Every year, three new toys are inducted into the Toy Hall of Fame, following a year-

That said, I enlisted the opinions of my favorite pundits, and granddaughter Marigold said she thought that a line of really fast tops called Beyblade might give the top a boost. In the end, I suppose it doesn't hurt an old toy's standing when there's a current pop culture tie-in.

Finally, I believe that the election process was fair and honest, and I accept the results.

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


tled down to a number closer to 30 objects, with some of them chosen to be exhibited on a rotational basis to limit their exposure. Interestingly, one-third of the "finalists" were acquired by the Foundation in the past five years.

Appreciated strictly for their visual appeal alone, the objects on view provide a satisfying experience to even the most casual visitor to the museum, thanks to a fine mix of pleasing items. But this thoughtful exhibition invites a closer look, and those dipping a bit deeper are rewarded for spending more time there. Explanatory labels provide detailed information, Barry said, in light of the fact that in the case of "I made this. ..", the backstory of every piece deserves serious contemplation.

Even though the exhibition focuses on the work of Black artists and artisans, those represented had more in common with each other beyond their racial identity. Showcased are the works of creative people who happened to be sharecroppers, free people, or enslaved; man or woman; those overlooked by society as well as those in a relatively comfortable place. Many had Southern backgrounds, but not all. Furthermore, for some of the represented artists, this is not the first time that their work has been featured in a major museum or gallery.

Looking at the body of work, Barry noted there are several universal themes. One of the most obvious is religion. Representing the work of William Edmondson, a tinkerer based in Nashville, Tennessee, is a limestone crucifix from the 1930s. Esteemed for his carving abilities, Edmondson has been showcased in a one-man show at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

Echoing that same theme is the work of Clementine Hunter, who worked as a field hand on a Louisiana plantation that later served as something of an artist's colony. Here, she mingled with guests that included author William Faulkner. Today, Hunter is recognized for her artistic ability, largely because of her painted window shades.

Then there is the story of Elijah Pierce, a preacher and barber living in Columbus, Ohio. Pierce's contribution to this exhibition is a brightly colored, wooden relief carving of Marian Anderson, who sang at the Lincoln Memorial at the request of Eleanor Roosevelt.

Perhaps most notable, of course, is the aforementioned Drake, who worked in South Carolina. Thought to have learned to read and write by his first enslaver, Harvey Drake, at a time when that was illegal for enslaved people, the younger Drake signed his work and occasionally included verses. On display for the first time in Williamsburg is a rare two-handled, five-gallon jug of ashglazed stoneware, signed by Drake and dated April 26, 1842.

As for James Allan, little would be known about him were it not for the records left be-

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## Ascot racing trophy by Paul Storr will gallop into Moran auction

LOS ANGELES, Calif. – A silver horse racing trophy cup from one of the earliest and most prestigious English race tracks is expected to be "one of the most coveted lots" during the John Moran Traditional Collector auction on Dec. 6.

Historically important, the cup is engraved "Ascot Races 1822," measures more than 15 inches tall and weighs more than 111 troy ounces. Personalized, it is also engraved, "The Most Notable Marquels (sic) Cornwallis, Steward."

The Ascot Racescourse, located on Ascot Heath, in Berkshire, England, was founded in 1711 by Queen Anne. When out riding from Windsor Castle, she came upon an area of open heath that looked in her words, "ideal for horses to gallop at full stretch." It was, and still is, considered one of the major events of the British social calendar.

Only six miles from Windsor Castle, the late Queen Elizabeth II often visited the Ascot Racecourse and frequently bet on the horses.

Adding an artistic panache to the elaborately crafted cup, it was designed and crafted by the one of the most celebrated silversmiths of the 19th century, Paul Storr (1770-1844). In his usual Neoclassical style, he modeled the trophy after a large marble vase from the 2nd century A.D. that was found in pieces in a swamp near Hadrian's Villa, northeast of Rome, in the 1770s.

The lid and base have English hallmarks from Storr, who crafted the fine piece in London. How it came to America is unknown. "The only information we have

is a husband brought it for his wife as an anniversary present from an antique store in Louisiana," a spokesperson from Moran auction said.

Other "one-of-a-kind" silver pieces being sold on Dec. 6, include a Gorham five-piece tea set. The Gorham pieces were trademarked Martele', derived from the French word "marteler" (to hammer), denoting the distinctive hand-hammered surface to the

silverware. Martele' production line, produced at the turn of the 19th-20th centuries, was separated from Gorham's commercial line and its pieces were one-of-a-kind and exclusive objects for selected customers.

Along with the tea set, valued at \$15,000-\$20,000, there will be two lots of Martele' candlestick sets, each with \$3,000-\$4,000 estimates and a Martele' vase, estimated at \$2,000-\$3,000.

Among the more than 350 lots, cosigned by the estates of George David Sturges and artist Joan Strauss Carl, as well as other private estates and

collections are several high quality decorative arts pieces. One of the highlights of this category is a Riessner, Stellmacher & Kessel, Amphora Austrian Art Nouveau vase with a \$1,000-\$5,000 estimate.

Also included in the sale is fine art from such artists as Emil Prinz, Persis Kirmse, Robert Ladbrooke, John Frederick Herring, Sr., and Carl Jutz. The variety of decorative bronze sculptures, clocks, porcelain cockatoo figures and Chinese and Japanese offer unique choices. Furniture will include Louis XVI-style dining chairs and Louis SV-style lamp tables, cabinets,

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## **Brownies and animals highlighted Strawser event**

WOLCOTTVILLE, Ind. - Silver was definitely the word of the day at a recent auction held by Strawser Auction Company. A Tiffany and Company wave edge collection consisted of 45 pieces of flatware. The set included nine dinner knives, ten eightinch forks, ten seven-inch forks, eight 6 5/8 inch forks, twenty-three teaspoons, eleven demitasse spoons, five servings' spoons, and two butter knives. There were nine extra knives included at a half ounce each. The set was weighed at 106 ounces and sold for \$2.300.

A Towle sterling silver flatware set, still in the original case brought a high bid of \$2,000. The set consisted of 91 pieces which included twelve dinner and salad forks, nineteen teaspoons, twelve ice tea spoons, five soup spoons, three pickle forks, nine dinner, three steak and twelve butter knives, a meat fork, two serving spoons, and a gravy ladle. In total there was almost 124 ounces of silver. All handles were hollow.

If your taste ran more to the decorative rather than the useful, a sterling silver sailing ship might have been more your cup of tea. This was a silver Viking boat created by David-Andersen. It measured ten inches by nine inches and showed a weight of 8.6 ounces. The inscription on this sailing ship read "Minne Til Addison Outwater FRA Norge", which simply translates that it was made in memory to Addison Outwater who was from Norway. It could be used for serving crackers on a sideboard, so was still useful even in its decorative state. It sold for \$250.

A Georg Jensen sterling silver compote was 14.5 ounces of silver. It came with a spoon and sold for \$800.

A pair of Tiffany and Company American Indian spoons was sold one right after the other. The first one was 3.04 ounces and boasted a buffalo. This one measured seven and one-quarter inches and sold for \$950. The second one was a slotted spoon, also by Tiffany and Company. This slotted bonbon spoon featured an Indian Chief and measured 5 5/8 inches. It was numbered #665 and weighed in at 2.06 ounces. It sold for \$1,100.

A Galet Willis New York sterling pitcher kept the price going up. This silver pitcher was beautiful with embossed water lilies and cattails. It was monogrammed and measured ten and one-half inches tall. It brought the hammer down at \$2,000.

A rare MontBlanc Agatha Christie pen drew some attention. This fountain pen had

a sterling silver snake pocket clip which had ruby eyes. It was complete with the box and original packaging. This black pen with silver highlights sold for \$850.

A lady's ring drew much attention as it featured approximately 3.50 count of oval tanzanite and the gemstones were of the finest quality. The gemstone had a diamond halo which consisted of ten approximately .12 carat round brilliant-cut diamonds. There were also approximately thirty-one .15 tapered baguette-cut diamonds. The diamonds were rated F-G in color and VS in clarity. The total carat weight of the diamonds was approximately 5.85 carat weight. It took \$5,000 to be declared the new owner of this exquisite piece of jewelry. Moving on to some unusual pieces that

signed cards bearing the sentiment "With best wishes for a Happy New Year" were produced by Hallmark. The existence of this card was unknown, even by the Kennedy Library, until 1985.

Harry S. and Bess Truman: Signed Photograph 1946 Christmas Gift: The president and first lady presented these signed 8-by-10-inch photographs of them boarding "The Sacred Cow" (the Douglas VC-54C aircraft that was the predecessor of Air Force One) as their 1946 Christmas gifts to White House staff and Cabinet members. This photograph is inscribed to John W. Snvder and his wife, "To the Secretary of the Treasury and Mrs. Snyder, a Happy Christmas, 1946, Harry S. Truman, Bess W. Truman."


Franklin D. and Eleanor Roosevelt: Roosevelt Family White House Christmas Stocking: This red cotton stocking hung on the White House mantel during all 12 years of the Roosevelt administration. According to Season's Greetings From the White House, after the president's annual spirited reading of Dickens' A Christmas Carol for his grandchildren on Christmas Eve, each child would file up to the president's bedroom to hang their stockings on the mantel. No ordinary stockings, each one was custom stitched by Mrs. Roosevelt's maid, Lillian Rogers Parks. The first lady would fill them late that night and be the first one up Christmas morning. Jacqueline Kennedy: White House Green Room Gift Print Inscribed and Signed to Artist Edward H. Lehman: This 17-by-14inch print of the White House Green Room was reproduced from an original painting by Edward H. Lehman and is inscribed and signed by Jacqueline Kennedy to the artist, "For Edward Lehman, The President was the one who chose this picture to give to the White House staff this year. He loved it so much. Thank you for making him so proud of the Christmas presents he would give to those who made his life so happy these past two years. With deep appreciation, Jacqueline Kennedy. January 1964." Lehman was an artist and illustrator assigned by the Philadelphia Bulletin to sketch some rooms of the White House in advance of a CBS televised special on the first lady's extensive renovations. When

Mrs. Kennedy saw Lehman's sketches in the newspaper, she called him to offer her admiration and obtain his original artwork. His art was so beloved by Mrs. Kennedy and the president that they used his Red Room painting as their 1962 Christmas gift print and, as this touching inscription written shortly after the president's assassination indicates, distributed this Green Room print to White House staff for Christmas 1963

Harry S. Truman: V-E Day Proclamation Signed as President and Inscribed to White House Chief of Staff John Steelman on Christmas Day: To commemorate the end of the war in Europe, this multicolored lithograph printed May 8, 1945, proclaims "Sunday, May 13, 1945, to be a day of prayer." With a lengthy inscription and large signature in the lower left margin, the president, whose birthday was May 8. has written, "This was a happy birthday for me. I hope this will be a happy Christmas for you. To Hon. John R. Steelman and Mrs. Steelman. 12/25/45." Steelman served as the first assistant to the president of the United States (a position today known as the White House chief of staff) from 1946 through 1953.

Franklin D. Roosevelt: 13 White House Christmas Cards: This collection of 13









White House Christmas cards, many in their original transmittal envelopes, hail from 1933 to 1945. As Mary notes, even though there had been presidential Christmas greetings in the past, including these cards from Roosevelt's administration, the sending of a White House Christmas card only became an official tradition during the Eisenhower administration. "[The tradition] was never interrupted when there was a world war, when there was an assassination of a president or 9/11 or anything," she says. "It was always there and on time."

Ronald Reagan: Signed White House Christmas Card with Autograph Note: This 1986 White House Christmas card, which includes the original White House envelope, features an autograph note signed by President Reagan, "Dear Jean & Bill, Thank you for your greeting, the photo & beautiful calendar & Very Merry Christmas & Happy New Year from both of us. Nancy & I never cease being surprised & grateful for all you've accomplished in the 'old homestead.' God bless you. Dutch."

was offered up. This very unusual piece dated from around 1965. The gilt wood piece with a glass top sported five feet holding it up for legs. On the top were five hands holding the glass top. It was unsigned and measured twenty-three inches around and twenty-two inches tall. The hammer fell on this conversation-starter at \$9,500.

An oil lamp sold for \$17,000. This Mount Washington Napoli oil lamp was gorgeous with some enameled Palmer Cox brownies. The fact that it had a replacement font and stood only fifteen inches didn't seem to bother the bidders. The cute brownies danced around the lamp and added to the appeal.

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A stag standing on a rocky oval mount base drew attention. It had applied bulrushes and other grasses and was impressed with a double fish mark. This statue was attributed to Hugo Lonitz and was a large piece as it stood thirteen inches across and 10 <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> inches high. One antler been reattached, but that didn't seem to bother the bidders. The detail was so minute on this stag that it appeared the artist had just miniaturized a real stag and stood it on the rocks. The price kept climbing on this stag until it reached the \$8,000 mark.

If you wish to impress your friends, just use a George Jones majolica tray for serving them food. A three-lobed serving tray with the handle molded as a kingfisher holding a fish in his mouth was mounted on a lily pad. There were bulrushes and a blossom base on this twelve inch piece. It appeared as if the kingfisher had actually stopped to rest on the lily pad. The final sale price on this piece of pottery was \$7,000.

Sporting beautiful blue colors was a fan cheese keeper. This piece had great color and detail and stood ten inches high. A Wedgwood majolica cobalt servicing bowl with lid, this one could be used but would make a beautiful accent piece for a sideboard. A bird was sitting on a branch on the side of the bowl with paler blue fans spread around it. The dark blue made the fans really stand out on this exquisite piece. It brought a final bid price of \$9,000.

A monumental Minton majolica ewer was wonderfully detailed. Standing twenty-three inches high, this piece was modeled with a mermaid handle. The tail of the mermaid was wrapped around a horned Bacchus mask on the bottom of the handle. There were laurel leaf swags running along both sides and a putto below the spout who looked very angelic. There were panels in relief to either side. The bright greens blended perfectly with the dark browns on this ewer. It sold for \$17,000.

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

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

## Hull figural planters are fun, inexpensive collection

Addis Emmet (A.E) Hull founded Hull Pottery in 1905 in Crooksville, Ohio. Like many American potters before him, Hull began his pottery with the production of everyday, common utilitarian stoneware and decorative tile. Before starting Hull Pottery, A.E. Hull began his career working in Crooksville with his older brother J.J. Hull at The Star Stoneware. Hull's pottery company quickly became a pottery for the working family, and as its line increased, so did its reputation for producing quality, affordable ceramic pieces. Hull Pottery grew into a name brand pottery that was found in stores across America.

During the 1920s Hull experimented with a line of art pottery. The company also used a wider palette of colors and glazing techniques to achieve different looks, which further improved Hull's popularity and profitability. Hull became everyday pottery for every American home.

Addis Hull died in 1930, leaving the pottery to his son, Addis E. Hull, Jr. Hull, Jr. had a short career as general manager of the company his father founded. In 1937, Hull, Jr. left Hull Pottery to become General Manager of the Shawnee Pottery Company. Gerald F. Watts replaced Hull, Jr. as Hull's new General Manager.

The late 1930s through the 1960s were Hull's Golden Years of pottery production. Hull produced an amazing variety of pottery lines, including Little Red Riding Hood, which is still a favorite with Hull collectors. The Little Red Riding Hood line included the famous cookie jars, canister sets, creamers, and sugar bowls.


Art pottery became one of Hull's most dominant lines. Hull experimented with matte pastel finishes and floral themes, such as Calla Lilly, Orchid, Open Rose, Magnolia, and Tulip. Florist ware became one of Hull's bestselling lines of pottery. From the late 1940s through the 1960s, plants and flower bouquets from local florists often were delivered inside a Hull florist ware pot or figural planter. About this same time, Hull's product lines expanded to include all types of kitchenware, highly collectible liquor bottles, and a cute line of piggy banks.

As the mid-century approached and social taste changed, Hull tried to diversify its pottery lines to keep up with the changing social scene, making Hull Pottery a pottery for the times. New artistic pottery lines emerged, such as Tropicana, Parchment, Tokay, and Ebb Tide. These lines are still important to Hull collectors today.

Here is a rare, Hull Pottery Oriental chicken planter, called a Chinoiserie, that was produced in the 1950s and is valued at \$200.



As the 20th century moved on, foreign competition and union strikes crippled Hull Pottery, and in March 1986 the company closed its doors forever.

Hull Pottery produced more than a line of pottery—it produced a legacy of pottery that is still seen in collections across America. One of the most enduring and collected lines of Hull Pottery was its mid-century figural animal planters, which are still affordable for the average collector. Most Hull planters sell in the range of \$25-50, and there are dozens of different planters in antique shops and estate sales across America. A few of Hull's animal planters are both rare and expensive, such as Hull's Chinoiserie "Chicken Planter," that was produced in the 1950s and sells for around \$200 today.

Hull art pottery also produced many mid-century planters, such as the "Girl in Blue Bonnet" planter, circa 1960, that is highly sought after today since Hull art planters are popular with designers who are seeking a mid-century look. In good condition, this planter sells for around \$40. Hull art pottery also produced anthropomorphic planters, such as cute "Cherub" planters in the 1950s and '60s. These pink and white planters routinely sell for around \$30.

In 1993, the Hull Pottery Association (HPA) was formed to preserve, educate, and promote Hull Pottery, its collectors

T, the first 500s came in just one color: basic black. Best remembered by baby boomers, however, are the Model 500s of the 1960s and '70s. Among the enhanced rainbow of 25 hues that today's Model 500 series collectors can delight in: aqua, yellow, green, pink, and fire-engine red.

The "500" was the brainchild of prominent industrial designer Henry Dreyfuss. As the swinging '60s swung along, he continued to update the rotary phone design to suit the times. His curved "Princess" phone, in pleasing pastels was ideal for the boudoir; the sleek "Trimline" was a must-have for areas with limited wall or surface space. Even groovier was a non-Dreyfuss design: the sinuous Swedish "Ericsson Ericofon" (nicknamed the "Cobra"), with its dial concealed in the base. In 1962, "Touch-Tone" phones made their first appearance, and by the late 1960s rotary phones were on their way out, supplanted by the ease of push-button dialing.

Phone collectors collect. . .well, phones, but that's not where the conversation ends. Related telephone memorabilia is equally collectible, capturing a slice of American life once pervasive, now only dimly remembered. Especially sought-after are souvenir items distributed by phone companies to employees and business associates. Among them: company pins, ashtrays, sewing kits, tape measures, "operator" dolls, keychains, shot glasses, bell-

shaped paperweights, "little black books" for important phone numbers, and even miniature hard hats.

Consumer giftware also capitalized on the motif, with telephone-inspired salt-and-peppers, cookie jars, refrigerator magnets, ornaments, jewelry, and handbags (some using coiled plastic telephone cord for their exteriors).

Other collectibles are remnants of telephone technology: glass phone line insulators, switchboards, and abandoned phone booth relics, such as identification signs and pay phones. Some determined collectors even acquire and restore complete booths! And, for savvy home decorators desirous of vintage styling, but in need of modern capability, there are even new phones designed to recapture the look of the past. Their exteriors are deliberately retro, their interiors stuffed with the latest in micro-electronic technology.

els are an important facet of the hobby. Companies represented at the National Show included TOMY International, owner of the Ertl brand, SpecCast, Scale Models, and First Gear with its Die-Cast Promotions brand.

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Availability of models was challenging during the COVID-19 pandemic. The problem has improved but shipping and labor shortages continue to slow the process. "New models never slowed down in design or in tooling during the COVID pandemic. Shipments were disrupted as ports closed both in the US and China. Fortunately, we've experienced improvement but it's not back to normal," Dave Bell, owner of SpecCast stated.

The national show's display contest attracts great interest resulting from intriguing craftsmanship. There are three divisions, Large Scale Adult, Small Scale Adult, and Youth. The first-place winner of the Large Scale division was Seth Eberhardt of Mediapolis, Iowa. His display featured stages of farm silage. Through his creativity, Eberhardt demonstrated harvesting, storage, and silage feeding.

Another major attraction is the annual National Farm Toy auction. Cornwell Inc. of Aurora, Nebraska has managed the successful auction for 30 years. 
