Vintage washers and dryers find their way into homes

Some folks collect teacups. Or thimbles. Maybe even swizzle sticks. Tiny treasures that are compact, easy to display, and even easier to store.

Other folks collect washing machines. And dryers. And washer-dryers. These are definitely not tiny. Displaying (or even storing) them requires a generously sized (and otherwise empty) basement or garage. But these jumbo collectibles and their colorful accouterments — from clothespin bags to dealer signs, vintage soap boxes to wicker laundry baskets are cleaning up among today's collectors.

The reasons? For baby boomers, the answer may be a fond rekindling of childhood memories. For fans of mid-century modern, the streamlined design of these machines is a tangible representation of the space-age technology that fueled the 1950s and '60s. For the rest of us, they're just fun to look at.

Before the advent of the automatic washing machine, a housewife's lot was not a happy one. When we watch an episode of Little House on the Prairie, "laundry day" seems wonderfully nostalgic but "doing the wash" was actually a backbreaking, all-day affair. Prior to the introduction of indoor plumbing, water was hauled from the pump or well, and

ed "Clothes Washer With Ringer Rolls" was patented by John F. Turnbull of Canada, in 1843. Although today's automatic washer tubs spin to remove water from clothing, early housewives had to make do with the mangle. As each piece of laundry was fed between two handcranked "ringer rolls," the water was squeezed out.

With the dawn of the electric age in the early 1900s, those involved in the budding business of providing industrial

Mark Twain's last typewriter to highlight Heritage auction

DALLAS, Texas - The tale of Heritage Auctions' Feb. 22 Historical Manuscripts Signature® Auction simply can not be told without a good typewriter ... specifically without a typewriter that was one of the last owned by one of the most popular and important American authors.

The love-hate relationship Mark Twain (whose real name was Samuel Clemens) had with typewriters is well-documented. The author known best for his stories about Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn soured on the devices — he acquired his first in 1874 — that were, according to Twain, "full of caprices, full of defects — devilish ones.'

He was so firm in his dislike for typewriters that he took his disdain a step further in a letter to the Remington Company on March 10, 1875, shortly after they began marketing the device, steadfastly refusing to lend his name to a testimonial.

"Please do not use my name in any way," he wrote. "Please do not even divulge that fact that I own a machine. I have entirely stopped using the typewriter, for the reason that I never could write a letter with it to anybody without receiving a request by return mail that I would not only describe the machine, but state what progress I had made in the use of it, etc., etc. I don't like to write letters, and so I don't want people to know I own this curiosity-breeding little joker."

But the fact is that the beloved author did own typewriters, one of which will come to auction for the first time in

the upcoming Heritage event. Twain's Williams No. 6 typewriter has become one of the most remarkable American literary relics of the 20th century.

"Mark Twain's dislike for typewriters is well documented, but he was one of the first authors to own one and eventually warmed up to them," says Sandra Palomino, Director of Historical Manuscripts at Heritage Auctions. "In 1883, he became one of the first authors to type a manuscript when he delivered a typed copy of Life on the Mississippi to his publisher."

Toward the end of his life, Twain purchased this beautiful and impeccably provenanced Williams No. 6 "grasshopper" typewriter, which he owned from 1908 until his death in 1910. The company produced it from 1904 to 1909, but the serial number on this example dates its manufacture to 1908; the Twains moved to Stormfield, his beloved mansion in Redding,

Connecticut, in the spring of that year. This model also marked a significant improvement from the earliest machines, because its design allowed the typist to view text as it was written thanks to the "grasshopper" mechanism that pushed the typebar up as the key was struck.

This remarkable relic was given by Twain's daughter, Clara, to Harry B. Iles, the Superintendent and Groundskeeper at Stormfield, to thank Iles for his years of service. It remained in the Iles family until it was sold in 1982, and again in 1990 to the consignor, a close friend of Iles' son, Harry.

Provenance documentation accompanying the item includes the 1982 purchase receipt signed by Harold Page, Harry B. Iles' great-grandson, and a signed and notarized statement of provenance from the current consignor, which details the 1990 purchase as well as their decades-long relationship with the Iles family.

Other highlights in the auction include:

· Martin Luther King Jr. Inscribed and Signed Copy of Ebony Magazine. [Chicago]: Johnson Publishing Company, 1965 is from the May 1965 issue covering the historic Selma-to-Montgomery marches in Alabama. The front wrapper is inscribed and signed in blue ballpoint pen by King: "To my Friend / Claude Wyatt / With Warm Personal Regards / Martin Luther King Jr." Rev. Claude S. Wyatt Jr. and his wife

Plate walls are 'in'; so get out those cushioned plate hangers

So this is what is now "Out," according to a list recently published in "The Washington Post": phygital, Boston clogs, and permacrisis. In the "In" column for 2023 are bleisure, shearling

sandals, and eternatragedy. Perplexed? So am I. Read on.

It turns out that Barbiecore is so last year, as are pickleball and crypto, but party barns, werewolves, and drippy candles are on the cutting edge. At least, I thought, I know what they're talking about, but somehow, I just wasn't feeling the connection. And then my eyes zoomed in on "gallery walls" (out) and "plate walls" (in). Aha!

As luck would have it, I know some-





one whom I affectionately refer to as the "Queen of Plate Walls," and I was certain that she would not be surprised by this revelation. And I was right. Julie that the plate wall trend has indeed

gone from "serious DIY to something quite fashionable." These days, she is fielding inquiries from designers seeking suggestions. But why?

A product specialist at Replacements, Ltd., Julie suggested that in the case of gallery walls, an organized

grouping of photographs, there's the "constant pressure to upgrade." That makes sense, since not only do families change in size but kids grow up and styles come and go. Then there are the competing colors from the melange of photos, all of which can end up feeling like "organized chaos," Julie said.

Not so with plate walls. Julie encourages mixing and matching plates, based on motifs and colors, or, for a calm-

ing, soothing effect, blending cream-colored ceramics. When it's starting to feel a little too predictable, or in order to keep up with changing seasons, simply swap out a plate or two with something of the same size.

This might be the excuse you've been looking for that lets you pick up that pretty one-off plate that you see at a flea market, one that you have no idea what you're going to do with once you get

it home, she continued. On the other hand, if you've already assembled a collection, or you've inherited someone else's, this is the perfect way to repurpose it and enjoy it.

As for "how to," Julie recommends spreading a piece of butcher paper on the floor. Attach hangers to the plates







Rev. Addle L. Wyatt were prominent civil rights activists who founded Chicago's Vernon Park Church of God in 1956 and were closely affiliated with King until his 1968 assassination, and marched with him at the 1963 March on Washington and the 1965 Selma to Montgomery march. Five months later, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the 1965 Voting Rights Act into law. The photograph on the cover was taken March 25, 1965 shortly before the final rally at the state Capitol where King delivered his "How Long. Not Long" speech. Pictured from left to right are Rev. Ralph Abernathy, Ruth Bunche, Ralph J. Bunche, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and Coretta Scott

Confederate Colonel John S. Mosby's Farewell Address to His Rangers is one of the most important military addresses of the Civil War. Then a colonel of the 43rd Virginia Cavalry, popularly known as "Mosby's Rangers," Mosby issued his famous farewell order to his cavalrymen in the closing days of the Civil War. The April 9, 1865 surrender of Robert E. Lee at Appomattox meant the end for Mosby's Rangers. Rather than surrender his command to the Union, Mosby chose to formally disband the regiment.

· Three Fair Copy Letters Between Generals George Washington and Thomas Gage in the Hand of John Hancock Regarding the Treatment of Prisoners capture an exchange between Washington and Gage on the

treatment of those captured at the Battle of Bunker Hill, one of the most significant battles in the American Revolution. In the first letter, sent Aug. 11, 1775, Washington protested Gage's treatment of American officers imprisoned in Boston before warning that he would regulate his own conduct toward British prisoners according to Gage's. In the second, sent two

days later, Gage assures Washington, in part, that American prisoners "... have hitherto been treated with Care and Kindness, and more comfortably lodged than the King's Troops in the Hospitals," before accusing the Americans of abusing British prisoners: "My intelligence from your Army would justify severe Recrimination." Washington replied Aug. 19, informing the British general that he has found no evidence of mistreatment of enemy soldiers before launching into a passionate defense justifying the American's quest for liberty.

The first two letters were later published in The London Gazette. Rather unsurprisingly, the British government chose not to print Washington's Aug. 19 reply.

· A document signed by George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, appointing "Samuel Tredwell of North Carolina...Inspector of the Revenue for the Port of Edenton and do authorize and empower him to execute and fulfil the Duties of that Office according to Law..." This document is signed as president, "Go: Washington" and countersigned by Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson, and features an embossed paper presidential seal intact at lower

· A John F. Kennedy Autograph Letter Signed to a Crew Member of the PT 109 - in 1943, Kennedy, then a 26-year-old Lieutenant, commanded a Navy patrol torpedo boat that the Japanese destroyer Amagiri cleaved in half in the South Pacific waters surrounding the Solomon Islands. The collision sent a fireball of igniting aviation fuel 100 feet into the sky and flung 13 crew into the water, killing sailors Andrew Jackson Kirksey and Harold Marney. Kennedy personally rescued the most seriously wounded of the survivors and ultimately guided his remaining crew on a four-hour swim to the closest island tiny enough.

(more about this later) and play around with the design. Stand on a step stool and check it out. If it looks good, trace around the plates, mark where the nails will go, and remove the plates. Tape the template to the wall in question with painter's tape and then sink the nails. Remove the paper, hang the plates, and await the compliments.

"I can't think of any place I wouldn't display a plate wall," Julie continued, including in the kitchen or a powder room (where plates require more than just a light dusting to keep them fresh). Architectural features (say, a staircase) can be accented with plates. In the case

of high traffic areas, apply a bit of museum wax or a similar product to keep the plates from swaying. Don't overlook a wallpapered space as a background.

So far, so good. But I still had three final questions for Julie. First of all, how did she get to be so good at this? Without hesitation, she credited her grandmother, who taught her to quilt when she was a girl. It was then that she learned to train her eye to see patterns and colors.

Number two: I thought plate holders were a no-no. Turns out that the ones on the market today are greatgo gently and don't snap the holders

ly improved over those from several years back. Look for stretch hangers with cushioned holders. Easy does it:

onto the plates. Although they provide a good grip, she recommends checking the fit before hanging any plate, just to be sure. And remember to work over a blanket or quilt to protect the floor or furniture beneath what you're hanging (not to mention giving an errant plate a soft landing).

And finally, what should I do with the handful of Beatles' collectors plates I still have ("Imagine" was broken years ago, but that's a sad story that needs not be repeated here)? Her answer: mix them in with some colorful plates and enjoy them. Why didn't I think of that?

\$2.76 worth of pennies sell for more than \$7 million at Great Collections

IRVINE, Calif. - Who says a penny won't buy much these days? A 1958-dated Lincoln cent mistakenly made with doubling in some letters of the design has sold for a record \$1,136,250. It was owned by a New York City collector who died soon after consigning his pristine condition coins to be sold at auction.

"The million-dollar penny is known as a 'doubled die' and it is the finest of only three known 1958 U.S. cents that have severe doubling of letters in the motto IN GOD WE TRUST and the word LIBERTY on the front of the coin," explained Ian Russell, president of GreatCollections of Irvine, California (www.GreatCollections.com).

It was owned by numismatist and sculptor Stewart Blay of New York who died at age 71 in November. His set of 276 mint-condition Lincoln cents dating back to 1909 with a combined face value of only \$2.76 sold for \$7,731,811 in a series of six auctions by GreatCollections that ended on Sunday, January 29.

A total of 117 bids were placed for the mismade 1958 penny. The winning bidder was described by Russell as an advanced collector who needed this coin to complete his collection.

Doubled dies occur when the metal die used to make coins is incorrectly struck twice, resulting in all coins minted with that die to appear double-struck.

"In addition to setting an auction record for the first million-dollar Lincoln cent, 13 other superb-condition pennies in Mr. Blay's painstakingly assembled collection sold for record six-figure prices, ranging from \$120,937 for a 1911 cent to \$601,875 for one of the approximately 50 known doubled die

cents made in 1969 at the San Francisco Mint," said Russell.

"My brother began collecting coins when he was eight years old and started assembling the finest known collection of early Lincoln cents about 50 years ago," explained Blay's sister, Mariette Blay of Oregon. "He was extremely proud of what became known as the Red Copper Collection and many of the pennies were exhibited at coin shows."

"Stewart Blay spent decades traveling the country, visiting coin shops and coin shows on his quest for the very best, while also sharing his knowledge with fellow collectors and dealers," said Russell. "He spent his life procuring the absolute best-of-the-best Lincoln cents and they were very well received by collectors. It might be another generation before these coins appear on the market again."



Cigar bands smoked a \$7,000 bid at Freedom Auction

SARASOTA, Fla. — Freedom Auction Company always impresses with their events. From their celebrated circus memorabilia auctions to sales of pedigree mid-century modern furniture, their offerings are always worth getting into your calendar.

Freedom's January 14 Gentleman's Americana Auction was a prime example. Over 800 high-caliber lots of advertising, military, transportation, tobacciana, and vintage toys were available.

Tobacciana may be fairly common but it is unusual to see collections of cigar bands. Over sixty lots of bands were included in this sale. Twenty-two came from the estate of Joseph J. Hruby. The Cleveland, Ohio, native started collecting cigar bands in the early 1920s in response to a local contest. His collection grew to over 200,000 pieces dating as far back as the 19th century and earned him a spot in the Guinness Book of World Records. Ironically, Hruby never smoked cigars!

The auction's top bid of \$7,000 came




Below: In addition to coins, banknotes and other paper currency were available. This

from the Hruby collection. It was huge (over 189,000 bands) and considered to be the world's largest existing collection. Later, a single binder containing approximately 200 extra-large bands went for \$750. And, a set of three binders with 1,500 bands featuring presidents and world leaders sold for \$550.

Sixty-plus numismatic and philatelic lots may have appealed to many of the cigar band bidders. Overall, the postage stamp lots sold well, with five collections reaching three-figure sums. One, with four boxes totaling 75 pounds of unsorted U.S. and foreign stamps, sold for \$550. Another, containing 3 boxes of commemoratives and first-day covers weighing in at 88 pounds, reached \$425.

On the coin front, a group of over 200 certified U.S. gold coins from 2007-2015 garnered \$1,100. A roll of

Speaking of coins, several antique slot machines were offered, including a Jennings Standard Chief 25-cent machine that scored \$2,000. The 1940s machine had its original finish and key and was ready for play. Another 40s-era machine - a Mills Black Cherry 5-cent machine - grabbed \$1,200. It also had its original paint and keys and was fully functional.

Fans of the slot machines may have found the twelve-dozen lots of signs and related advertising pieces appealing. Featured was a recently restored single-sided porcelain neon Packard dealership sign. Bidding on the beautiful piece reached \$13,000 but failed to hit the reserve. However, a 78-

inch porcelain Goodrich tire sign in good condition reached an impressive \$1,500. Close behind, at \$1,300, was a new old stock Jenny Super-Aero gas pump plate. The very rare piece was in fine condition with only a minor chip.

Plenty of the advertising lots went for prices fitting smaller budgets. They included a 70-inch aluminum Sealtest Ice Cream sign that was grabbed for just \$60 and a metal Walker Mufflers sign that went out the door for \$40.

Sign collectors often value clocks, especially those that served as promotional tools. Nineteen advertising clocks were Included in this sale, including a 16-inch Quaker State Motor Oil advertising clock in working condition. Bidding took that to \$275. A non-functioning Lux animated shoe shine table clock was right behind at \$190. On its heels was an Oswald terrier "rolling eyes" clock that sold for \$250 even though it was wound tight.

More than a dozen pedal cars were on the block, including a fendered 1929 Nash by Steelcraft. Selling for \$2,000, the car featured headlights, fender-mounted horn, optional fog light, license plate, and boy driver figure. Thirty years more contemporary yet steaming away with a \$475 bid was a 1950s Casey Jones Cannonball Express train pedal car with its cowcatcher. Also from the 1950s, hitting \$300, came a Garton hot-rod racer sans its windscreen but with its original box.

Also on wheels were five vintage

Schwinn bicycles from the 1960s. The highest of the group, rolling off for \$750, was a Stingray Fastback with its original glitter banana seat and all components. \$350 won another Stingray with its original stars and stripes banana seat and slick rear tire. Taking third position was yet another Stingray intact, down to the glitter seat.

Those pining for their youth also had over 250 lots of vintage toys to chase. The array was immense, spanning everything from tin-litho vehicles and model trains to military toys and castiron banks. A lot of eight Billy dolls from the 1990s snagged \$550. According to Wikipedia, "Billy - The World's First Out and Proud Gay Doll (a.k.a. The Billy Doll and Billy The Gay Doll)" was introduced in the United States in 1997. Billy was created by artists John McKitterick and Juan Andres.

A lot with over 20 Lionel cars, most in their boxes, went for \$450. Toy buy-

ers were able to score some interesting bargains, like a 1950s Remco drive-in theater set for only \$40 and a Structo steam shovel for just \$30.



Train shows appeal to transportation collectors of all types

As we enter a new year, it's heartwarming to glance back at the numerous railroad and model train shows that dotted the holiday season. Their popularity is driven in large part by nostalgia. There's just something about a model train display during the holiday season!

For the legions of train fans, these shows beckon "all aboard" promising interesting railroad artifacts and memorabilia or rolling stock and lifelike scenery for their setups. Yet, train shows offer plenty for collectors whose interests run to other forms of transport. Whether it's steamship artifacts, airline memorabilia, or even space exploration collectibles, train shows have a lot to

At first glance, it may seem extraneous for non-rail merchandise to appear at a train-themed event. Yet, railroad history is rife with intersections with other forms of transportation. Consider the various rail lines that operated train ferries. One of the most famous, Seaboard, not only ran ferries in the Mid-Atlantic but offered connections to several airlines including Pan Am. The former Northeast Airlines was formed in the 1930s by the Boston and Maine and Maine Central Railroads. Perhaps the most famous confluence was the first transcontinental railway service, the Transcontinental Air Transport (TAT). Started in 1929, the New York to Los Angeles trip paired rail segments with plane flights aboard Ford Tri-Motors. It eventually became Trans World Airlines (TWA).

So, it's not odd for train show vendors to include collectibles and memorabilia from

other forms of transport in their wares. Show promoters are even starting to integrate other forms of transportation into the mix. Many events now bear names that openly embrace the diversity of interests - like the California Express Railroadiana & Transportation Show and Golden Spike Enterprises' Gaithersburg Railroad, Steamship, and Transportation Artifacts

Collectors whose interests run as much to nautical dinnerware as dining car china, or bus schedules as train timetables, most any train show could be a good hunting ground. Here is a sampling of what is often

bans relied on tracks, they bear a close kinship with rail enthusiasts. Collectibles from these transit forms tend to be well-represented at train shows. Shoppers can usually find conductor uniforms, caps, and buttons, along with items like tickets and tokens. Often seen at train events are early castiron pieces depicting horse-drawn trams, omnibuses, and cable cars. Plus, there are plenty of toys and models - whether they are scaled to be used on model train layouts or were manufactured as pressed steel, tin, or plastic toys.

Bus-related items are also prevalent at train shows. Not well known, several noteworthy railroads, like the Santa Fe and the Baltimore and Ohio ran subsidiary bus companies. For many railfans, that's reason enough for related merchandise to show up. Typically, bus collectibles found at train shows parallel those for streetcars and trams. That means it's common to see uniform paraphernalia along with ephemera like tickets, schedules, and photographs. Additionally, there are plenty of vintage toy buses, whether they are of the early pressed steel and tin litho or the later diecast variety.

A certain amount of automobilia can usually be found at a typical train show, which is ironic considering the automobile had so much to do with train travel's demise. While automotive merchandise shows up in dealer booths, it's never so much that it overshadows the focus on mass transit. Much of what is available are pieces scaled for popular train layouts. However, shoppers can easily find road signs and paper items like road maps and dealer catalogs. There are also toys, like slot cars and popular Matchbox and Hotwheels, plus larger-scale metal and plastic models.

Nautical, steamship, and cruise-line collectibles are quite popular and often make their way into train shows. Nautical antiques and marine salvage draw a lot of at-



tention, particularly ship dinnerware which sometimes sits alongside railroad china on dealer tables. Uniforms and their accouterments - whether from commercial or military vessels - are sometimes available. Additionally, ephemera like steamship travel brochures, ship documents, and menus provide a wonderful glimpse into maritime history and are often inexpensive finds.

Airlines, like the automobile, eventually usurped train travel. Still, some of the most popular non-rail collectibles found at railroad shows are airline related. Airline pinback buttons and service pins often sit next to those for rail lines. As with ship lines, glass, and dinnerware from airlines - particularly celebrated ones like Pan Am - are quite popular and relatively easy to find. Items from military aviation are generally less prevalent, except for vintage plastic and wood model aircraft.

Quite off the rails are space exploration artifacts and sci-fi "vehicles" that are sometimes available. Buyers may find NASA memorabilia or vintage models of world spacecraft. Toy collectors might find the occasional Star Wars vehicle or even a fu-




turistic Buck Rogers spaceship toy from the 1930s.

This all equates to railroad and model train shows being good options for transportation collectors whose interests do not necessarily follow the rails. All year long, there are plenty of train shows available.



products for the home soon saw the light. Ads for the earliest "electric washer" date as far back as 1904, although Alva J. Fisher's 1910 patent credits him as the originator of the first one, 1908's "Thor." By the late 1920s, over 900,000 homes in the United States had electric washers. During the 1930s depths of the Depression, however, that number plummeted to less than 600,000. But as the economy picked up, so did life in the laundry room.

In 1937, Bendix introduced its first "automatic washing machine," much like today's front-loaders in appearance and function. However, with no drum suspension, floor anchors were required; otherwise, the machine "walked" when in use.

By 1940, sixty percent of American homes with electricity had electric washers, but further innovations stalled with the onset of World War II. Research continued, however, and after the war, the automatic entered its days of sudsy glory. The first top-loading automatics came courtesy of Whirlpool and General Electric in 1947. And, while many homemakers still preferred clotheslines in the fresh open air, the electric dryer also made great strides during the late '40s.

By the 1950s, no up-to-the-minute American home was complete without an up-to-the-minute washer and dryer. In 1953, automatics finally outsold traditional wringer machines, becoming the biggest users of energy in the average household.

Once simply utilitarian, washers and dryers were now important decorative components of the thoroughly modern home.

That new arrival, television, provided visuals of additional must-haves. Consumers wanted their very own Westinghouse "Laundromat," just like the one extolled by Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz of I Love Lucy fame. And, when Ozzie & Harriet featured a Hotpoint washer/dryer pair as perfectly matched as the show's stars, appliance stores were flooded with customers.

There was always something new on the washday horizon. Futuristic machine control panels adopted the same silvery, space-age stylings popular in autos of the era. The similarities weren't surprising: some of the best-known appliance brands were actually auto company offshoots, including American Motors' "Kelvinator," and General Motors' "Frigidaire." There were also teamups

been sold. \$400-500.



with detergent manufacturers, giving buyers a little something extra for their money: a brand-new box of Tide, for instance, lurking inside that brand-new washer.

Although early automatics took pride in their pristine whiteness, the 1950s and '60s saw the arrival of appliance colors intended to complement the home environment. Relatively innocuous "coppertones" and "pastel pinks" opened the floodgates for shades less appealing to today's eyes: lurid lavenders and seaweed greens.

Automatic washers and dryers from the late 1940s through the late 1960s, and their accompanying paraphernalia, are what set the hearts of today's collectors on spin cycle. While most of the

best-known vintage machines were U.S.-made, the interest in them is worldwide. Aficionados from locations as disparate as Minneapolis and Trinidad, Russia and Boston, Omaha and Australia, share photos and tips on websites devoted to automatic washers.

The ongoing goal is the restoration of these artifacts (as closely as possible), to original operating condition and sparkling showroom appearance. And, even though most washer and dryer collectors are self-taught "garage mechan-"."

ics," the restoration process moves along fairly rapidly, ranging from just several weeks to several months.

Often joining in online repair discussions are now-retired service techs, who once worked for the companies manufacturing the machines. Their memories and maintenance hints are invaluable, as are highly sought-after original instruction manuals. "After all," notes one collector, "if the machines don't work, they're pretty much junk."

Some collectors are interested in any and all automatics and their assorted trappings (soaps, sales displays, ads, laundry room necessities, and so on). Others specialize, collecting machines by a specific manufacturer, those made during a certain time frame, or machines that represent a "first" (for instance, the first top-loading washer, or those that are otherwise unique in design or function.) There are even "Holy Grails": the oh-so-rare Maytag washer/dryer combo, and the limited-production "Lady Kenmore" dryer of the early 1960s. Regular collector gatherings are held. With storage trucks in tow, attendees bring along their latest restored acquisitions for a super-sized show-and-tell.

Although calling for a certain degree of mechanical aptitude (and, of course, plenty of storage space), collecting automatic washers and dryers offers a fascinating take on mid-twentieth century design. The technological advances that followed World War II exemplify the "can-do" atmosphere of the times. Ingenuity and imagination were at the fore-

front. These simple-yet-sophisticated everyday housewares provide a valuable window on the past, letting us witness just how that past moved boldly into the future. . . our present.


