As long as humans have had fire, fires have been an issue if they get out of hand. The first recorded structure fire in the United States occurred in 1608 in the colony of Jamestown. A fire leveled most of the fragile colony which was barely a year old. In 1630, Boston residents were ordered "not to build a chimney with wood, nor cover a house with thatch," to prevent fires.

Various firefighting equipment began out of necessity to help fight fires more easily. Later badges were added to uniforms to help identify individuals and to identify various companies or battalions. Those badges are now highly collectible.

Fire buckets in colonial towns had the owner's names painted on them and laws were in place that required residents to purchase them and keep them in repair. Thus came the name "Bucket Brigades," which were two lines of people stretching from the town well to the fire.

In 1648, Governor Peter Stuyvesant of New Amsterdam (New York City) was the first in the New World to appoint fire inspectors with the authority to impose fines for fire code violations.

In the early days, most fire companies were volunteer or privately operated. Water tanks on wheels did the trick. The equipment at the time was simple and included leather buckets, hooks, chains, swabs, ladders and archaic pumps. (Fabric and rubber-treated hoses didn't come into use until 1870.)

In 1736, Benjamin Franklin urged readers of his "Pennsylvania Gazette" to establish fire-fighting companies in Philadelphia. By 1752, there were six volunteer corps established.

During annual town parades in the early 1800s, the firemen would dress in colorful uniforms, fancy fire axes, decorative parade torches, hand-painted fire hats, fancy painted fire buckets and more.

By 1832, firefighters no longer pulled engines, instead they were pulled by horses. Dogs (yes, Dalmations, a symbol associated with firefighters to this day)

worked well with the task of protecting not only the equipment but the horses as well.

The first self-propelled steam fire engine appeared in New York in 1841, and eventually in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1850. In 1852, William F. Channing of Boston used telegraph technology developed in the early 1840s to create the first alarm box system. Later that year Boston had fire alarm boxes all over the city.

According to fire badge aficionados, the first firefighting badge appeared in 1852 in Blackinton, Mass. These were stock badges, many of which were crowned by eagles and featured blank shields and ribbons where the name of the town, city, county or state could be added. Devices on these badges included helmets, ladders, sections of hose, fire hooks and horns (or trumpets), the latter which were used by early firefighters to communicate over

the din of roaring flames.

Badges (those for the hats and lapels) were shield shaped in 1855, followed by round badges in 1860. Later, square badges were added. Pentagon-shaped badges resembling the five-sided nuts on the tops of fire hydrants were introduced in 1884 and used through 1937. All these badges were a part of the firefighter's uniform and became mandated by uniform codes.

From the mid-1800s to the present,

untold numbers of firefighter badges have been produced, mostly in a copper alloy made with nickel and zinc, and brass. Shapes have ranged from simple ovals and thumbnails to more elaborate shields.

One symbol is that of the Maltese cross. The eight-point Maltese cross originated during the Crusades. The Knights of St. John were fighting for possession of the

New museum looks at those who lived in Gettysburg

GETTYSBURG, Pa.— Etched into America's psyche are the words spoken by President Abraham Lincoln in Gettysburg on Nov. 19, 1863: "Four score and seven years ago. . . ." For that matter, many of us can, with but a few promptings, recite the entire speech, delivered at the dedication of the Soldiers' National Cemetery. "We are met on a great battlefield of that war," Lincoln continued, calling it "hallowed ground" where the bloodiest single battle of the Civil War was fought.

But combatants were not the only ones who made sacrifices during the three-day engagement, and beyond. And now, nearly eight score years later (that is, 160 years after the Battle of Gettysburg), a new museum features an exhibit that focuses on the battle from the townspeople's perspective.

"Caught in the Crossfire" is an immersive experience at the "Gettysburg Beyond the Battle Museum," opening on April 15 as an entity of the Adams County Historical Society (ACHS). While in a gallery that is a meticulous reproduction of a typical Gettysburg farmhouse of the day, visitors can

hear the distraught cries of family members seeking shelter in the cellar, as well as feel the reverberations from the shelling outside. A one-of-a-kind experience, the "crown jewel of the museum" is intense, noted Michaela Shaffer, speaking for the ACHS. She pointed out that except for the Jennie Wade House and the Shriver House Museum, little attention has been paid to those living in the town at the time of the battle until now.

Shaffer explained that not only were Gettysburg residents in danger during the three-day battle, but it took them months to recover and rebuild. In the aftermath, they had to cope with dead, dying, and injured soldiers; horse carcasses; and the damage sustained to their homes and other buildings. In their honor, and relying on a "huge collection of civilian accounts of the battle," a "wall of faces" at the museum shares the stories of some 40 civilians who were present during the battle. Ranging in ages from three years old to 70-something, these people represent different genders and backgrounds, she added.

Within 12 museum galleries in all, the history of Gettysburg is retold, from prehistoric times to the present. Visitors are reminded that this town

The Flinstones live on in the hearts of Bedrock collectors

Every Baby Boomer knows The Flintstones' theme song by heart: Flintstones... Meet the Flintstones, They're a modern stoneage family. From the town of Bedrock, They're a page right out of history.

In the years since his birth on television, Fred has become a household name to millions of children and adults through his continued presence on TV, the big screen, and product endorsements.

Premiering September 30, 1960, The Flintstones broke new ground on television. Airing on ABC, the show ran

for six seasons (166 episodes), with the final episode airing on April 1, 1966. Produced by the team of William Hanna and Joe Barbera, The Flintstones broke television tradition by becoming the first animated situation comedy on television and the first true prime-time cartoon.

The storyline closely duplicated the classic television show The Honeymooners, starring Jackie Gleason. The four principal characters in The Flintstones were Fred Flintstone, his wife Wilma, his best friend Barney, and Barney's wife Betty. Each of these cartoon characters' personalities closely resembled the four principal characters of The Honeymooners.

Originally designed as a program for the "entire family," The Flintstones became primarily "children's television" when syndicated in 1967. The story line each week revolved around a workingclass man and his family and their dayto-day activities. They suffered from all the maladies of a modern family.

Collectors love The Flintstones for the enormous amount of items available on the secondary market. John Michlig (Baby Boomer Collectibles, August 1994) argued that The Flintstone's collectible field began in their first year on TV. "Before The Flintstones' first season was over, one could play "The Flintstones Pre-Historic Animal Rummy Game" by

the light of a handsome Fred-shaped Flintstone lamp. Fred and friends were merchandized to the hilt." In fact, during

the first minute of each show, Fred would come into the house plugging the sponsor's product, whether it was Alka-Seltzer tablets one week or Winston cigarettes the next week.

Following The Flintstones original cancellation, a 1966 movie—The Man Called Flintstone—enjoyed minor success. The Flintstones received a new lease on life, of sorts, in the 1970s with a series showing Pebbles (Fred's daughter) and Bamm-Bamm (Barney's son) as teenagers. In addition, two live-

action films have been made of The Flintstones—The Flintstones in 1994 and The Flintstones in Viva Rock Vegas in 2000. If all of this exposure were not enough, Flintstone Theme Parks, called Bedrock City, appeared all around the world, and is one still operating in Arizona as part of the Raptor Ranch Conservation Park.

While Flintstone items routinely show up at auctions, in 1994 one of the largest comic character auctions ever held (at that time) was almost exclusively a Flintstone auction. Held by Ted Hake (owner of Hake's Americana and Collectibles in Pennsylvania), the Baby Boomer Comic Character Auction had so many Flintstone items that Hake held some of the Flintstone material back so the auction was not completely "Fredfilled and Barney-bursting."

Hake said at the time, "The Flintstone loot was easily the most popular up for bid. Every item sold." Hake attributed the public's interest in the Flintstone auction to their exposure "to so many generations that they're not 'timebound.' There're so many different items that you see quite a bit of crossover interest—people who collect by the type, be it cookie jars, salt and pepper shakers or puppets."

Michlig called the entire range of Flintstone collectibles "staggering." He said, "Flintstones printed matter is predictably extensive—from comic books to Little Golden Books to puzzles. Flintstone comic book series have run variously under the Dell, Gold Key and Charlton publishing labels." However, Hake said, "First time around' items (primarily items from the 1960s) certainly have the most value."

Among the "first time around" items that collectors look for are the tin toy Flintstone collectibles. A "Fred Riding Dino" wind-up toy is especially popular. Made by Marx in 1962, the sheer size of it makes it a popular collectible. One of these toys sold for \$418 at Hake's auction in 1994. Today this same collectible routinely is offered on eBay in the range

of \$250 - \$700.

The list of Flintstone collectibles is so extensive that Michlig stated the list of domestic licensees for the 1994 movie was "long enough to test any stapler; 32 typed pages consisting of approximately 260 different product-types ranging from embroidered boxers to Flintstones medical scrubs." It would take a lifetime just to collect one each of these 260 items.

While some of you may wonder why Flintstone items have remained popular with collectors, Joe Barbera, one of Fred's original creators, summed up the appeal best, "Great characters and great stories" make The Flintstones "timeless." Moreover, as Fred celebrates his 63 birthday this year, there appears to be no end in sight for the "timeless" TV celebrity and the huge amount of collectibles he generates.

The Flintstones Collectibles by Debra Braun (Schiffer Publishing, 1999) is an excellent history and pricing guide for collectors interested in Fred, Barney, and the rest.

Bollheimer makes MAA history with double award

MOUNT PLEASANT, Mich. - Ridge Bollheimer of Clarklake, Michigan, won the titles of Michigan Auctioneer Champion and Michigan Ringman Champion for the year 2023. This is the first time that one contestant has won both competitions in the same night. The Championships took place on Feb. 3 at the Michigan Auctioneers Association Annual Conference held at the Comfort Inn & Suites in Mount Pleasant. The five Finalists in the Auctioneer Division were Kurt Mingerink (Byron Center, MI), Caleb DeKorne (Cedar Springs, MI), Ridge Bollheimer (Clarklake, MI), Colt Johnson (Clare, MI) and Darby Walton (Upper Sandusky, OH). For winning the title Michigan Auctioneer Champion, Bollheimer received a championship buckle, trophy, and he will compete in the International Auctioneer Championship in July in Oklahoma City, Okla.

The contestants were judged by accomplished auctioneers, including National Auctioneers Association Director, Mike Fisher, International Auctioneer Champion, Bryan Knox, Michigan champions Art Smith and Doug Sheridan and perhaps the world's most recognizable Ringman, Sam Grasso. The Michigan Ringman Championship contestants were judged on four categories: Crowd/Buyer Interaction, Performance, Relaying Bids and Communication with their Auctioneer, and Appearance/Presence. Also taking home honors were Brad Stoecker (Dimondale, MI), 1st Runner Up, and Greg Holiday (Belleville, MI), 2nd Runner Up.

Ridge Bollheimer was born and raised in Clarklake, Michigan. He was first introduced to the world of auctioneering at

a young age, while attending many livestock and machinery auctions with his father. Toy tractors harvested sizeable bids at Sheridan sale

LESLIE, Mich. — Collectors of farm toys and diecast vehicles had a field day on March 2 during Sheridan Realty and Auction Company's toy tractor and shop tool liquidation auction. 540 lots were offered online via bid.com, spanning everything from a vintage horse-drawn buggy to hundreds of diecast tractors and vehicles, to enough tools to fill a garage.

The auction's calling card was toy tractors. More than 160 lots held models in every scale from 1/16 to 1/87, from makers like ERTL, Toy Farmer, and company brands like Case.

The highest sum for a model tractor lot went to a complete set of 18 vintage 1/64 scale International Harvester toy tractors. The collection sold for \$181.50 on 21 bids. Coming close at \$170.50 was a new-in-box ERTL 2005-era Oliver 2655 Tractor in 1/32 scale. A 1/16 scale, Firestone branded 1970-72 Massey Ferguson diesel 1150 went for \$154. It was new-in-box, complete with a disc attachment, and had its serial number document.

Not all the tractors went for such outstanding bids. Many bidders picked up models for under \$10. Among them was a lot of three that went for the opening bid of \$5. It contained a 1920s antique Case, a 70s-era International, and a fertilizer tanker attachment.

Another auction draw was the 230 lots of diecast model vehicles that included everything from trucks and semis to race cars and even snowmobiles. As with the tractors, a spectrum of scales was represented, from Matchbox-type 1/64 scale to shoebox-size 1/18. Many were new-in-box.

The auction's highest figure for a diecast vehicle went to a 1/24-scale Danbury Mint 1972 Chevrolet Cheyenne pickup truck with a Danbury title. 18 bids took that to \$412.50. Another Danbury Mint vehicle, a 1957 Dodge Sweptside D100 pickup sold for \$115.50. Yet

another Danbury pickup truck - a 1957 Chevrolet Cameo Carrier with its title went for \$71.50.

The lineup of diecast vehicles included antique cars, which don't attract much attention these days. Yet, old-time vehicle models did quite well at this sale. A Danbury Mint 1/24 scale 1931 Ford Model A Pickup grabbed \$71.40 and a Danbury 1931 Chevrolet roadster pickup came in solidly at \$44. Even a collection of eight antique car banks did nicely at \$66.

As with the tractors, there were plenty of diecast vehicles acquired for moderate bids. For example, a lot with a pair of 1/32-scale truck banks in original boxes - a 1942 Chevrolet delivery truck made by Liberty and a 1940 Ford pickup originally sold by Tractor Supply went for the opening bid of \$5.

Not everything on wheels was a scale model. Four pedal cars attracted plenty of attention. A blue Ford 6000 Commander pedal tractor in good condition sold for an impressive \$1,210. A contemporary pedal fire truck went for about 3 times its market value at \$412.50 on 22 bids, while a 1966 International Harvester pedal tractor, in as-found condition with worn paint, reached \$330.

Not surprising, a handful of full-size commercial vehicles commanded the auction's highest bids. The auction's top bid of \$4,180 went for a 2002 PACE former Matco Tool sales trailer with two roof A/C and heater units, steel drawer storage and shelves, and an Onon Cummins quiet diesel 7500 generator. Bidding was competitive, sometimes jumping by \$500 per bid. A Layton Bunk House travel trailer, weather-damaged but restorable, went for a modest \$577.50.

For the mechanic, 54 lots of tools were available. The variety was considerable. It included power tools like a Campbell Hausfeld air compressor (\$104.50) and a die grinder (\$33) as well as hand tools like a Lufkin fiberglass long tape measure (\$22) and a collection of chisels (\$5).

Several interesting one-off items rounded out the sale. Two noteworthy ones were a vintage GasBoy 190 farm gas pump made by William M. Wilson's Sons in Lansdale Pennsylvania. Seventeen bids landed \$302.50. An old horsedrawn buggy attracted intense bidding among three prolific bidders; one took the rig home for \$302.50.

the museum, appropriately, is family friendly, with a number of hands-on opportunities. Among the "touchable" artifacts on exhibit are a dinosaur footprint, a replica of the Mason-Dixon crownstone, and a Civil War cannonball that was found in a tree on the Sherfy Farm. For the younger set, there are three age-appropriate scavenger hunts, each designed to spark an enthusiasm for museum going.

Even sports fans have their day here, thanks to an exhibit dedicated to Baseball Hall of Famer "Gettysburg Eddie" Plank, a left-handed pitcher who played for the Philadelphia Athletics (yes, you read that right) a century ago. Additionally, history lovers will revel in the multitude of artifacts on display, some of which have been in storage for the past several years. Highlights include an original animal hide map of Gettysburg and an original program from the dedication ceremony at which the Gettysburg Address was delivered, as well as the manumission by which Francis Scott Key freed his enslaved people. In honor of the fact that Gettysburg was the retirement home of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the voting box that he used when casting his vote in town is on display, as is a hat once worn by his wife, "Mamie."

That a historical society continues to exist, much less thrive and be able to fulfill a years-long dream, is extraordinary, Shaffer agreed. With its first home in the basement of the town's courthouse, the ACHS has been blessed by the fact that interest remains high. "There's so much history here," she said. "Others don't have

the advantage that we do."

To be sure, generations of tourists have long been fascinated by Gettysburg and the battle fought here. But that interest has subtly shifted, according to Carl Whitehill, speaking for "Destination Gettysburg." He noted that "over the past several years, visitors are increasingly interested in stories about the people that were at the center of this historic event." This new museum, located less than a mile north of the center of town on Biglerville Road, "helps remind visitors that Gettysburg wasn't just a place where the Civil War's largest battle was waged." All the same, he concluded, the town "was, and still remains, a community of people who have both heroic and tragic stories to tell. This new museum helps bring to life these stories and how the epic battle changed this community forever."


Finally, check out the gift shop, which stocks related books, locally made products, and "the usual," (magnets, postcards, and the like).








Above: The story of Gettysburg extends beyond the Civil War, as seen in this gallery dedicated to the town's involvement in World War II.

holy land. During an epic battle of that fight, located on the island of Malta, fire was used as a new weapon of war against the Knights. In response, the Knights banded together to fight the flames and rescue injured brothers from a fiery death. Later, these fighters were awarded a badge of honor similar to the Maltese cross. It has come to symbolize the protection provided by the wearer of the cross and the loyalty with which they serve.

The center seal of the firefighter badge typically depicts a grouping of fire symbols. The elements of this "scramble" can vary from department to department. Typically scrambles contain a ladder and an axe. Some contain more modern tools of the trade, such as a helmet or a fire hydrant. Others contain some more traditional tools such as a pike pole. The elements of the scramble symbolize preparedness.

Bugles adorn many of the early firefighting badges as they represented one who gives the orders at a fire. Bugles were used long before the appearance of the wireless radio. Bugles signified the leader, perhaps a lieutenant or chief.

The color red is found on many badges and the origins of its use are twofold. First, the color red is most commonly associated with flames. Second, fire trucks and engines have historically been red for visibility purposes.

Firefighting badges have strong appeal to collectors since their shapes were often custom made rather than taken from stock designs and their surfaces were chased or engraved by hand rather than stamped, and their materials sometimes included sterling silver and even solid gold.

The value of these firefighting badges is based on condition, rarity, material and history (who owned it when and where).

Dale Fenton, collector and dealer of antique badges, said on his website (badgevalues.com) that "fire departments have long operated as regimented and hierarchical groups."

"The badges given to firefighters help identify their position (captain, chief, firefighter, etc.) but also their battalion and company or other organizational information," he wrote. "This serves a useful purpose while the men are working to identify

them as firefighters who are trained, but also help in the event of catastrophe to identify remains so that the fallen can be properly honored."

Collectors should be aware fake badges are out there. "Many counterfeiters know that high ranks bring more value and there are a lot of fakes out there," Fenton warns. "One way to spot fake badges is corrosion, rust, rough texture or pitting of metal that is either poor quality, or has been manipulated to look older. Silver badges will not rust."

According to Fenton, rank, the badge's owner, badge type and provenance are a few of the categories that determine if a badge is rare. Badges owned by famous people or high-ranking officials bring more value and are highly collectible. Badges made of sterling silver or gold are more valuable than those made of brass, steel, tin, copper or other materials. Unique badges with special engraving, or made with silver, gold or gemstones, are called presentation badges. These are among the most collectible badges.

"A maker's hallmark is one of those things on collectible badges that doesn't have to be there, but can be a nice bonus when it is," Fenton says. "Maker's marks or hallmarks are stamps on the back of the badge that identify the company that produced it."







