There's plenty of spirit in collecting whiskey jugs

In 1847, a teen-aged innkeeper's son, Samuel Taylor Suit, left his Southern Maryland home to make his way in the world. He eventually landed in Louisville, Kentucky, and found work at a distillery. Ten years later, he acquired his own distilling enterprise.

Suit relocated back to Maryland in 1867 and purchased 450 acres on the edge of the District of Columbia and built an English-style mansion. Sometime after 1870, he started, "S.T. Suit, Fruit Grower and Distiller" which made rye whiskey and brandy from fruit grown on the property. Today's community of "Suitland" grew out of that estate.

Suit's products were packaged in stoneware jugs of various glazes, with lettering either impressed into the side or applied in black ink under the glaze. Most distinctive were the brown jugs inscribed, "Little Brown Jug. Whiskey in this jug was made in 1869 and jugged by me." The labeling was a bit deceptive given the distillery's actual opening date. Apparently, Suit was not averse to stretching the truth, as other company advertising suggested his distilling career began in Kentucky in 1839 when he would have been only seven years old!

To boost his sales, Suit came up with the idea to sell his spirits via mail order - an idea that paid off. Jugs of S.T. Suit whiskey were widely distributed throughout the country and even traveled westward with settlers.

Suit's story, like that of many distillers, is fascinating - as is the history of the vessels used to contain their products. Given whiskey's current rise in popularity, it's not surprising there are also highspirited collectors of whiskey containers.

In the 18th and 19th centuries, whiskey-making was a way for farmers to

convert bulky, spoilable grain into a liquid that was more lucrative and easier to store and transport. Distilleries typically filled 50-gallon barrels or smaller 10-gallon kegs. In those days, when someone wanted a personal supply, they would take a stoneware jug to the local tavern to have it filled.

Stoneware jugs have existed worldwide for thousands of years, used to hold everything from oils to molasses. Those best identified with the spirits industry

began inscribing stoneware jugs with their names and other information to help establish brand identity.

Stoneware remained the typical storage medium until the 1880s when machines were invented to manufacture glass. In particular, the Mason Jar almost single-handedly ground stonewaremaking to a halt. Then came liquified bottle molding which drove down the cost

Overbeck was on fire at Walther and Hawkins event

CENTERVILLE, Ind. — A lifetime collection of Overbeck Pottery including some rare and outstanding piece were offered for sale at the beginning of April by Walther and Hawkins Auctioneers of Centerville. This company hosted an online only event that ended April 5 to disperse this 72-lot collection. Though the number of lots was small, as were the items up for grabs, the prices were anything but.

Overbeck Pottery was produced between 1911 and 1955 in Cambridge City, Ind., in the home of the six Overbeck sisters; with four of the sisters being the main artists. Concise bios of the sisters can be found at www.waynet.org.

The eldest, Ida (1861-1946) opened a successful photography studio in Cambridge City. Married to Martin Funk, wheelwright and woodcarver, Ida was the only sister to marry.

The catalyst in establishing the pottery, Margaret (1863-1911) functioned as a teacher as well as an accomplished artist. She studied at the Cincinnati Art Academy, trained with Frank Duveneck as well as other well-known artists. She taught art in private schools in Kentucky and Missouri, then DePauw University, before returning home to help found Overbeck pottery.

Hannah (1870-1931) attended Cincinnati Art Academy and Indiana State University. She was the "ultimate designer", a perfectionist in sketching and watercolors. Listed in the American Arts Annual, her drawings were featured in Ceramic Studio, a magazine for china painters. She taught school before returning home

in poor health. Though bed-ridden with severe neuritis, she continued to design by having the pencil placed in her fingers.

An accomplished musician, Harriet (1872-1951) trained in Chicago, Cincinnati, and Leipzig. She played piano, organ, and violin; gave private lessons; and directed choirs. A proficient linguist, she spoke French, German, and Italian fluently. During the busy years of the Pottery, Harriet kept house for her sisters.

"The ultimate potter", Elizabeth (1875-1936) studied with Margaret in the early years and later at the College for Ceramics in New York with noted ceramist, Professor Charles Binns. As a teacher and lecturer, Elizabeth exhibited widely, bringing much honor and recognition to the Pottery. Listed in the American Arts Annual and Who's Who in American Art, in 1936 she was awarded the highest honor as a ceramist, being named a Fellow in the American Ceramic Society. Mary Frances (1878-1955) studied with Margaret and attended the Cincinnati Art Academy, Indiana State University and Columbia University. She taught for a time before joining her sisters at the Pottery. A talented designer, Mary excelled in a wide range of art. She sold original bookplates, sculpted, and painted in oils and watercolors in addition to the vases, pottery and figurines. She was listed in American Arts Annual as well as Who's Who in American Art. To amuse children visiting the Cambridge City library, Mary made the pirate ship, Don Quixote.


And it is important to note, there was an Overbeck brother. The only son and

up little spaces. Take, for instance, the "Ideas for Vintage Style" folder on my computer. Bear with me as I tackle three pieces of unfinished business.

And then there are calendar towels (remember that those from 1967, 1978, and 1989 work just fine this year), along with tea towels with mid-century graphics, that can brighten up most any kitchen. On the other hand, there are linen towels with interesting designs that are just too good to be used: frame them and hang them on a blank wall that cries out for something interesting.

youngest Overbeck, Charles (1881-1913), graduated from Purdue University, became an engineer and had two children, Charles and Virginia. Charles and Virginia and their descendants are the remaining members of the Overbeck family.

The Overbeck sisters frowned on copying pottery styles popular at the time in Europe and Japan. They described this mimicking saying "borrowed art is bad art." Instead, the sisters used their lives and their surroundings as inspiration for their painted porcelain, redware, and figurines.

It was examples of these figurines that made up the majority of the items selling via this April online event. The Overbeck sisters created figurines of people they saw in their everyday lives, but gave the figures character or as Mary called it "humor of the kiln".

The Overbeck sisters were also known for the subtle colors and hues of their glazes, though brilliant turquoise and heliotrope bright glazes were also employed.

Items that came out of the Overbeck pottery were celebrated for their charm and uniqueness and collectors participating at this spring Walther and Hawkins Auctioneers event agreed.

Leading the auction was a 4.25 inch tall Overbeck African-American figure which was holding a rolling pin. A bid of \$4,400 was needed to take this piece home. Prices do not include the buyer's premium. A young girl in a bonnet feeding a goose figurine was bid to \$775, and a Brer Bear figurine of Uncle Remus fame at 4.5 inches tall went for \$800.

Several paintings by Mary Frances were part of the offerings. A 9 by 9 inch framed painting of chick-a-dees on orange day lilies with the Overbeck family home in the background realized \$1,300, while an 8 inch by 10 inch Mary F. Overbeck work of a blue jay sold for \$950.

Rare Overbeck items also made an appearance. An Elizabeth and Mary Francis jar with an incised lid was bid to \$2,450. It stood a mere 2 inches high. A lot featuring four Overbeck Pottery test glaze tiles was highly prized commanding a winning bid of \$3,700, and an Overbeck family Easter greeting postcard measuring 4 inches by 5.5 inches sold for \$725.

"We are so excited to see an increased interest in Overbeck items outside of where these pieces were produced," explained Andy Walther. Items were purchased by collectors across the country including those in Arkansas, the state of Washington and New York. "It's also exciting to see an increase in new collectors of Overbeck pieces," Walther pointed out. "So much of pottery has been held in small collections and these are slowly coming on the market. The pieces sold here were from a longtime Wayne County collection where the owner had probably spent 45plus years putting it together. It is a wonderful time to collect Overbeck Pottery!"

Right before this auction took place, auctioneer Shane P. Hawkins of Walther and Hawkins Auctioneers died. "Gosh, we miss him grandly," Walther said. Though Walther is the sole owner of Walther and Hawkins Auctioneers, he said, "We had been at this together for more than 20 years. Moving forward, the company will continue to serve everyone, every day just



as we always have, despite the huge void of Shane's absence."

Or. . .maybe it's been in the family longer than that. Might it have originally belonged to his maternal grandmother, who lived in Virginia and later, Florida.? If this were the case, the bowl would be older than he had originally thought. Whatever, it has survived a number of long-distance moves and continues to intrigue its current owner.

As for a physical description, George says the bowl is "heavy," about five pounds, measuring 12 by 8.5 inches and standing about three inches high. "Smooth on the inside, raised on the outside, which gives it a sparkling appearance in light." In all, too nice to use as a receptacle for house and car keys.

An appraiser recently told George that he thought the piece might have been

made by an early-20th century Brooklyn glassmaker. If the bowl was purchased by George's father in New York, I would suggest that it might have been made by Corning.

I am not a glass specialist, but I know that some of you are. Asa Ames sculpture acquired by Colonial Williamsburg

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. — When the young sculptor Asa Ames (1823-1851) died shortly after his 27th birthday, he left behind nearly a dozen carved portraits, many of which are signed. Most of his sculptures portray family and friends, including a wooden bust of the artist's nephew Millard Fillmore Dewey (1845-1916) at the age of two. This likeness descended from the subject through his son and was recently given by bequest to The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. The bust of Millard Dewey is the third Ames portrait to join the Foundation's esteemed American folk art collection.

"This documented and well-preserved example of Ames' work is a particularly welcome addition to Colonial Williamsburg's outstanding collection of American folk art," said Ronald L. Hurst, the Foundation's Carlisle Humelsine chief curator and senior vice president for education and historic resources. "In addition to its obvious aesthetic appeal, the sculpture provides an important opportunity to better understand the artist's carving, painting, and construction techniques."


Ames's carvings are among the most celebrated in American folk sculpture, despite the artist's desire to align his work with fine art. Use of the word "sculpturing" to describe his occupation on the 1850 Federal Census suggests Ames considered himself more akin to a sculptor working in marble or stone. His familiarity with academic principles and formal artistic conventions can be seen in several of his figures. Ames's carved portraits are life-like in their simplicity and serve as poignant portrayals of the artist's subjects, residents of his Evans, New York, community. Examples of Ames's work include carved full-length, half-length, and bust-length portraits of his extended family, the children of his physicians, and a few yet-unidentified subjects. Sadly, his death just four years into his budding career did not allow him time for further artistic output.


Millard Fillmore Dewey, painted on what appears to be tulip poplar, shows the toddler with short brown hair, brown eyes and rosy cheeks wearing a white shirt with blue belt. It stands 14-1/2 inches tall, 14-5/16 inches wide and is 6-11/16 inches deep. Inscribed into the base of the sculpture is "A. Ames" and "Jan. 1847." At least two other sculptures of Millard's siblings were carved by the children's uncle at this same time suggesting the artist was living with the family when they were created.

Millard Fillmore Dewey is now on view in We the People: American Folk Portraits in the Gladys and

Franklin Clark Foundation Gallery at the Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Museum, one of the Art Museums of Colonial Williamsburg, where it is a focal point of the exhibition. A full-length carved portrayal of three-year-old Amanda Armstrong, also by Ames and owned by the Foundation, can be seen in the Art Museum's Wilson Family Gallery.

"Top Gun" was highest grossing movie but offers limited collectibles

In 1983, an article titled "Top Guns" was published in California magazine by Ehud Yonay. The article, highlighting an F-14 pilot as they went through the Navy Fighter Weapons School training program inspired the 1986 movie Top Gun. Distributed by Paramount Pictures and starring Tom Cruise as the young aviator codenamed "Maverick," Top Gun became the largest grossing movie of 1986 and ultimately earned \$357 million globally, even though its domestic opening weekend tallied \$8 million. The movie's longevity and success? Amazing special effects and action sequences coupled with a stellar cast and accompanying soundtrack.

Forty years later, why does Top Gun hold a special place in movie lore? Nostalgia is a powerful feeling, and those who watched Top Gun in the theater, on Betamax, or VHS recall the initial impact of being transposed into the cockpit with Navy fighter pilots. This nostalgia continued into 2022, when Top Gun: Maverick (the sequel to Top Gun 36 years later) earned an impressive \$1.49 billion global box office total. Post-pandemic, Top Gun: Maverick is often credited with saving the movie theater experience.

So how do collectors show their enthusiasm for one of the top grossing movie franchises of all time? This is where it gets interesting.

A quick internet search of "1986 Top Gun" yields very little regarding collectibles from the original movie. Given the popularity of the film, it is quite interesting that collectibles associated with Top Gun are few and far between. Standard Top Gun collectibles from 1986 and the following years include movie posters, magazine articles, an LP soundtrack, and Betamax/VHS cassettes. Mad Magazine spoofed the movie with their 1986 cover for issue 267. Konami released a flight simulation game in 1987 on the Nintendo Entertainment System sharing the namesake of the movie; a sequel (Top Gun: The Second Mission) followed in 1990.

One of the movie's endorsement deals was with PepsiCo., specifically their Diet Pepsi brand. In addition to commercials, Diet Pepsi had packaged inserts with the 1987 VHS release for a "Top Gun Cap & Patch Offer." Send the enclosed insert with three Diet Pepsi proofs of purchase and accompanying payment to receive a Top Gun baseball cap and/ or a collector set of seven Squadron patches and an American flag patch.

The Diet Pepsi insert adds a little more value to the standard VHS, but true collectors will seek out the Diet Pepsi promotional slipcover for the VHS release with a special front cover and "This Cassette Courtesy Of Diet Pepsi" sponsorship labeled on the back cover. Recent sold listings of this alternative VHS slipcover and movie range from \$50 - \$100, depending on the condition of the slipcover.

Model kits were a popular hobby during the 1980s. Plastic model kit company Testors had the official licensing agreement with Paramount Pictures to develop model kits for aircraft seen in Top Gun. The unassembled plastic model kits were released in 1987 and featured three aircrafts: A-4 Aggressor (No. 271), F-5 Adversary (No. 272), and the F-14A Tomcat (No. 273). These plane kits came in 1:72 scale and 1:48 scale. Collectors are searching for sealed, unassembled kits. These sealed kits can range anywhere from \$30 - \$40, with the 1:48 scale kits selling more frequently than the 1:72. The highly sought after Top Gun model kit is the Collector Set, a boxed set of all three model plane kits with a Top Gun hat. Sealed and in fine condition, the Collector Set is valued between \$100 - \$150.

The 1980s birthed the proliferation of TV and movie-themed action figures – Star Wars, Masters of the Universe, Transformers, to name a few. So if Top Gun was the largest domestic grossing box office movie of 1986, the action figure toy line must have been extremely popular, no? The original Top Gun had no action figure or vehicle toy production. According to various internet websites, such as BuzzFeed, it is rumored Tom Cruise includes in his movie contracts that his likeness cannot be used for action figures or toys. Though there is no concrete evidence of these conjectures, no toy or figure has been officially released depicting a character from any movie played by Tom Cruise. For the movie sequel Top Gun: Maverick, Mattel was awarded rights to develop toys and games. Yet, up to the writing of this article, the only toys developed include Hot Wheels and Matchbox die-cast vehicles and a Barbie Signature doll of the character Phoenix (which carries a value of approximately \$100).

of bottles. Glass bottles were more affordable than crockery, and provided volume consistency and additional quality control.

Around 1870, George Garvin Brown (who established brands like Old Forrester and Brown-Forman) was the first to begin bottling whiskey. His Old Forrester was the first bourbon sold solely in bottles.

Within a decade, most brands had transitioned to bottles, using an increasing variety of bottle styles. There were small flat-sided flasks, circular and oval-shaped options, and even the famous square bottle introduced by Jack Daniels in 1895. In the West, as an alternative to paper labeling, many whiskey makers embossed lettering and often popular graphics into their bottles

By that time, any stoneware jugs still employed were mainly used as nostalgic marketing tools. In particular, from the late 1800s to Prohibition distillers often released miniature whiskey jugs as advertising tools.

In the decades leading up to Prohibition, imbibers' tastes shifted away from whiskey towards gin. The exodus was exacerbated during World War II when troops were exposed to spirits like wine, rum, and vodka. American Whiskey makers needed a way to turn attention back to their product and in the 1950s. Jim Beam came up with the idea of a whiskey-filled commemorative decanter intended to be given as a gift. The decanters became popular collectibles and Beam started releasing new models annually. Seeing their popularity, other brands started mimicking the idea. Decorative decanters remained popular until the 1980s; Beam ceased production in 2005.

The popularity of mid-century collectibles combined with the surge in whiskey fandom has led to piquing interest in those commemorative decanters. According to Bottle Club Pub in San Francisco, there are still plenty of whiskey decanters still around, providing plenty of fodder for collectors.

Then, there are whiskey water jugs also known as "pub jugs." Typically looking like a small pitcher, they were used to hold water which many imbibers added to their pour, particularly in whiskey's birthplace in the British Isles (spelled whisky, by the way, if in Scotland). The vessels date from the turn of the 20th century and were often given away by distillers to promote their brands. Pub jugs for popular Scotches like Dewars and Cutty Sark are prevalent but they can also be found for Irish, Canadian, and American brands.

Varieties exist in glass, ceramic, metal, and even plastic. The most desirable are from prominent ceramics makers like Royal Doulton and Staffordshire and are often part of commemorative or limited releases.

Whether it's stoneware jugs or commemorative decanters, most collectors favor a particular type of container. Condition, rarity, and a brand's popularity determine the desirability of a piece. Sometimes collectors are "single brand" and specialize in the wares from a single distiller across its history.

Identifying and dating stoneware jugs is a bit involved. Since jugs were often used to store various contents, it's often difficult to peg them strictly as a whiskey jug unless they are identified in some way. Maker's marks are among the best identifiers and help establish vital provenance. Of course, the most revealing information is if the distillery and perhaps the year of production are marked.

The color of the glaze can help establish a jug's era. Brown or green glazes often point to vessels made in the 19th century or prior. Blue, pink, or yellow glaze often indicates a jug made in the 20th century.

Things are often easier with bottles because identification is often molded into the glass or remains on any remnants of the label. As far back as the 19th century, many bottle manufacturers molded the manufacturing year into the glass, although that's not necessarily a good indicator of when the contents were bottled. If the distillery is named, it will help establish a timeline, particularly for a defunct company.

liquor bottle permit numbers (used from the 1930s-1980s) typically denoted the company in the first two digits and the bottle manufacturing date in the last two. The phrase, "Law forbids sale or reuse of this bottle" found particularly on decanters but also bottles, dates the container to sometime between 1932-1964.

A subject worthy of its own discussion is tax strips which were required on liquor containers from the post-Prohibition years through 1985. Although this is a simplified explanation, red strips were generally applied from 1934-1944 while green strips ran from 1945-1973.

Jumping to decorative decanters and pub jugs, assessment is fairly straightforward. Since those vessels are relatively recent and mass-produced, condition and the brand's popularity typically drive prices. Thus, a chipped piece or one from a very common distiller will be priced much lower than a pristine example or one from a more obscure distillery.




