Collectors still wait for the burp with colorful Tupperware

You know the brand. You can sing the jingle. And you probably have some of it lurking in your kitchen cabinet. Even though other companies have successfully manufactured and sold plastic storage products over the years, there's just nothing like Tupperware.

Currently reports about this household name are likely to be found in the business section of the newspaper, as rumors swirl in regards to the fate of the company. Ironically, at the same time, Tupperware is enjoying a resurgence of interest on the secondary market, as collectors continue to appreciate the form and function of containers that burp.

Although the precise date is not confirmed, it is generally accepted that Earl Silas Tupper developed a container made of a refined version of polyethylene in 1942 (or thereabouts). He called his product, one which he had long dreamt would revolutionize refrigerator storage, "Tupperware." But although he seemingly did everything right to promote his line, Tupper, a New Englander, was unable to generate and sustain enthusiasm among the buying public.

Enter Brownie Wise, a middle-aged single mom living in Detroit. At the time, Wise was barely making ends meet, working as a door-to-door saleswoman, when she hit upon a successful marketing strategy. Her impressive sales figures came to Tupper's attention, and he soon learned that Wise, who had no formal background in such things, attributed her sales success to in-home Tupperware

parties.

Tupper took a bold move: He reorganized his business plan in 1951 and adopted Wise's marketing strategy, one that brought together neighbors and friends in a social setting studded with demonstrations, prizes, and, for the hostess, incentives. Long story short: Wise was promoted to vice president of Tupperware Home Parties Incorporated, and together with Tupper, the unlikely pair made business history. According to Alison J. Clarke, in her definitive book, "Tupperware: The Promise of Plastic in 1950s America," Tupper and Wise did not always see eye to eye. While Tupper aspired to selling cocktail shakers and hors d'oeuvre dishes, ketchup funnels and cake domes, all to an affluent clientele,

Stanely Steamer will ride to a new home at Valley Auctions

DUBLIN, Va. - Andrew Robeson was one of those meticulous tinkerers who, according to local lore, could fix anything - especially if it had wheels and an engine.

His 66-year-old son, A.G. Robeson, recalls growing up behind the steering wheel of a go-kart; or more precisely, several go-karts that his father was always tinkering with to make them faster, more stable in the turns and easier to handle.

"As a 16-year-old, I remember learning how to drive in 1930 Model A Roadster with rumble seats," he recalls. Earlier at the age of nine, he remembers accompanying his dad to one of the many auctions he attended.

"He was always buying car parts," he said. "At this sale he bought what he thought were old Model A parts. They were all rusty and corroded. Once he got them home and more carefully examined them, he found out he bought a pile of old Maxwell parts."

Undeterred, his father eventually found enough Maxwell parts to re-build the car from the ground up. It only took him 35 years to complete that project.

Born in Blacksburg, Va., in 1926, Robeson enlisted in the U.S. Navy shortly before he turned 18, shipped out on the USS Oglethorpe, a transport operating in the Pacific Theater at the end of World War II. After the war, he returned to Blacksburg to complete a BS degree in Physics from Virginia Tech (then called the Virginia Polytechnic Institute) followed by a MS and PhD from the University of Virginia.

Despite his busy career with Virginia Tech, Andrew Robeson spent much of his off-time tinkering. He had several restored cars, doing everything from building the cars to finishing the body works.

Around 2000, a friend introduced him to the driven world of steam in the form of a 10-horsepower Stanley Steamer. The Steamers were only manufactured in Watertown, Mass., between 1902 and 1924. Mounted on a wooden frame, the vehicle was powered by steam generated

by a fire-tube boiler mounted under the seat, with a vaporizing gasoline (later, kerosene) burner underneath.

In 1906 a Stanley Steamer (jocularly referred to as "The Flying Teapot") set the world record for the fastest mile in an automobile at a blistering 127 milesper-hour.

Given the technical ingenuity of the "teapot," the no-nonsense sound of its

Norwalk Tires sign rolled off with a \$79,000 bid at Matthews Sign Auction

Waterloo, Wis. - No one was worrying about fuel prices at the July 28-29 auction of petroliana and automobila conducted by Matthews Auctions, LLC offered. More than 1,000 lots were offered in a live event paired with absentee and online bidding.

Many of the items were authenticated by Matthews' division, The Authentication Company (TAC). The entity authenticates, estimates market value, and maintains an informational database on authentic collectibles ranging from sports cards to porcelain signs.

The first day held 615 lots, with an emphasis on the rarest signs. As visually stunning as they were rare, bidding reflected their caliber. The auction's highest bid — an impressive \$79,000 — went for a 17.5 by 22 inch metal flange Norwalk Tires sign from the 1920s. The piece, rated an 8.5 out of 10 by TAC, had good color and shine with only light wear.



Plenty of other signs went for substantial five-figure bids. Among them

sign reached \$37,500.

steam locomotive horn and its unique design, Robeson was immediately hooked.

Not one to procrastinate, Robeson began making inquiries. A Stanley Steamer aficionado and working expert, Daryl Kendall of Chambersburg, Pa., told him he had a lead on a Steamer which had been involved in a car crash, while being hauled in Iowa.

Kendall, after being strongly encouraged by Robeson, drove out to Iowa, inspected the horseless carriage, bought in and brought it back to Pennsylvania. Robeson visited Kendall immediately and bought it.

"He was like kid with a new toy," Kendall said. "It became his pride and joy, until the day he died."

Despite Robeson being highly familiar with mechanical engineering and the practical mechanics of gasoline-powered engines, Kendall knows more about steam-driven automobiles than nearly anyone else in the world.

Kendall currently owns three Steamers, one of which is a massive 4,000-pound 30 horsepower vehicle. He has travelled throughout the United States for the past 46 years repairing and restoring the antique horseless carriage.

He served 25 years as a member of the Physics and Engineering faculty at Tech, specializing in Nuclear Science.

He and Robeson became good friends, with Kendall riding along as the "mechanic" on numerous steamer and horseless carriage tours throughout the Mid-Atlantic states. They have also participated in several other tours where they were the only steam-powered horseless carriage. Kendall said there are about 500 Steamers in existence in the United States, with only 100 of them being "tour worthy."

The 67-year-old Kendall called Robeson in October, the year before the 96-year-old was to die. "I asked him if he wanted to take a ride," Kendall said.

was one of three

rare arrowhead-shaped Rand Mc-Nally Official Garage signs. The 17 by 14 inch" porcelain sign, landing \$49,000, was graded 7.5, with good color and some remaining gloss but showed some chipping and haze.

Reaching \$37,500 was an Oilzum Motor Oil & Lubricants porcelain curb sign with its original White & Bagley Company cast-iron base. The sign was graded 8.5, with excellent color and gloss but chipped in various spots.

As the day progressed, bidding tended to get more conservative, typically topping out at four figures. On the high end of this bracket were items like a Red Head Spark Plugs Authorized Dealer sign which bid to \$8,500. The cardboard-backed single-sided tin sign, marked Heuerman Litho Co. N.Y. was graded 8.5, with good color and shine, and only light crazing and chips.

An arrow-shaped Harris Oils "X" Crossing sign hit \$7,750. The circa 1912 die-cut metal sign was rated as 8.75 with excellent color and shine. Further down, at \$2,000, was a metal flange Fisk Tire Agency sign. The 15 by 16 inch die-cut sign by N.Y. Metal Ceiling Co. was rated 7.5. with some rust and heavy wear and damage to the rear.

Plenty of quality signs sold in the hundreds. A 27 by 20 inch professionally restored NMA Gas & Oil Coupon Station (Illinois) sign made it to \$700. Another \$700 won a hanging Virginia Official Inspection Station sign. The 22 by 20 inch colonial shield-shaped sign was dated 1951 and rated an 8.5, with only light wear and scratches. And, a freestanding Southern Oil Company "We Have Credit Cards" sign got \$500. The 48 by 24.5 inch double-sided wood sign featuring a boxer was dated 1973. It was graded 9, with good color and shine, and only light wear.

On the second day, 423 lots were offered. As with the previous day, some

exceptional signs were available that picked up some impressive bids. A vertical neon Packard "Ask the Man Who Owns One" sign soared to \$70,000. The 150 by 44 inch double-sided porcelain marquee was considered very rare. Its good condition, with only a few touch-ups, rated an 8.

A 79 by 77 inch Ford V-8 neon sign, consisting of two multi-piece signs mounted back-to-back, sold for \$33,000 even with most of its paint gone. It beat out a similar sign in better condition that went for \$12,000.

While a few gas pumps and globes were available on the first day, they held court on day two. Among the pumps was an Art Deco Wayne Model #60 Computing gas pump, won for \$5,250. The good-condition piece featured its original paint, two Mobilgas pump plates, and reproduction globe, hose, and nozzle.

A professionally restored Martin & Schwartz clock face pump done in Pure colors bid to \$3,000. Bringing up the rear was a Bowser Little Giant stoker gas pump in good original condition that left for just \$400.

Then came 56 globes; more than 30 of them sold well into the four-figure range. The highest sum for a globe - \$6,000 - went to an All Penn Gas with Ethyl logo globe with Gill lenses on a white ripple body. The body's base had been repaired but the lenses were each in excellent condition, rating 9+.

Another five-figure earner at \$5,250, graded at 8, was a Rex Gasoline globe with 15-inch lenses mounted on a new HP metal globe body. At the other end of the spectrum, an excellent-condition American Legion Auxiliary globe with 9-inc lenses caulked to a milk glass body on a copper base Below: Bidders with modest budgets picked up some nice pieces including this Royal Gas dish won for \$75.

brought just \$200.

While the entire auction appealed to commercial and automobilia enthusiasts, many lots contained something other than signs or petroliana. On the first day, a 16-inch classroom cutaway scale model of a 4-cylinder engine, in working condition, sold for \$1,700. A similar item, a 1/6-scale model of a 255 cubic-inch Offenhauser engine, new-in-box, picked up \$100. On the second day, a Caterpillar D-4 metal child's pedal tractor by New London Metal Products, in good original condition, landed \$6,500. Earlier, a ¼-scale metal Ford Model-T model, in frame only but with extra parts, went for \$3,750.



Colorful Quimper brightens many homes

Today, Henriot Quimper continues the tradition of Quimperware, began nearly 300 years ago, producing the traditional patterns featuring the Breton figures as well as many new more modern designs.

Quimperware, like many other types of pottery, refers to a region in France. Quimper (pronounced "kem-pair") is an area far more than a single pottery. Quimper, 300 miles southwest of Paris, is a French town where faience (tinglazed) wares have been produced since 1685

Jean Baptiste Bousquest founded HB Quimper, the earliest Quimperware pottery, in 1685. It wasn't until nearly 100 years later that Francois Eloury founded Porquier and Guillaume Dumaine founded Henriot Quimper. Porquier and Henriot Quimper merged in 1913, and in 1968 HB Quimper merged with them. The new pottery was called Societe Nouvelle des Faienceries de Quimper HB Henriot. Around 1984, an American holding company, Quimper Faience, took over the potteries. Quimper potteries

changed hands again in 2011 when Jean-Pierre Le Goff bought the company and changed the name to Henriot-Quimper.

All of these potteries produced similar pottery that was decorated with images of Breton peasants, sea and flower motifs, and geometric designs. Quimperware took its common name "Peasant Pottery" from the images of peasants, first used in the 1860s, that most people associate with it. The pottery is best known for its

colorful, hand-decorated designs that reflect the rural culture of Brittany, a region in France.

The term "Quimper Faience" refers to fine-grained earthenware that is decorated with an opaque, tin based glaze. Every piece of Quimperware is hand painted, and most of the patterns are painted on top of raw glaze. If the artist signs a piece of Quimperware, this indicates that one artist painted the piece from start to finish. Several different

artists may have painted unsigned pieces. Artists often apprenticed for two or three years to learn the quick wrist flick style of painting used on Quimperware. This painting technique is called coup de pinceau, and experienced artists can decorate a Quimper piece in 30 minutes to an hour, depending on the pattern used.

Most Quimperware looks like folk art pottery, not fine china. The peasant figures associated with Quimperware reflect a Breton (man) and Bretonne (woman), residents of Brittany, the region in France where Quimper is

pottery first became popular in the 19th century and has been continuously exported to the United States ever since. Peasant patterns show men and women figures in bright, traditional costumes. Birds and roosters (France's symbol) are found throughout Pottery. Peasant Thousands of different





establish large collections.

Quimperware includes most pottery ware pieces, including cheese dishes, vases, mustard pots, and all types of serving dishes.

Potters marks on Quimperware can be confusing. The "HB" mark first appeared in the mid-1800s, but it was still in use up until World War II in one form or another. "HB Quimper" is the most recent reincarnation of the "HB" mark. "HB Quimper" was used from 1968-1983; although, the mark reappeared on reissued pieces through 2004. Some historians have noted that "HR" and "HR Quimper" marks were used on Henriot pieces prior to 1922, but it is good to keep in mind that Quimper is a region, not a single pottery, so the marks, especially in the 19th century, represent the city and region, not the potter.

It is best to buy Quimperware from known dealers since reliance on pottery marks can drive a collector to drink. For instance, older Quimperware pieces are often unmarked. And unmarked pieces with bright decorations are often of post-World War II production. Also, experienced collectors have noted that the more complicated the mark, the newer the piece, and since the marks are all hand-painted, each one is slightly different than the next. Finally, it is a safe bet to assume that any $\operatorname{Quimperware}$ piece marked "Quimper" was made in the 20th century.

A number of other potters made similar wares in and around Quimper, including Fouillen and Keraluc. The

marks of these potteries can also add confusion to identifying authentic Quimperware.

Quimperware ordered for sale in department stores such as Carson Pirie Scott and Macy's in the 20th century carry both the store's mark and the potters' mark. Some collectors consider store-marked pieces to be less desirable and worth less than pieces without the store marks.

Collectors have paid as much as \$10,000 for a piece of vintage, authentic Quimperware at auction. Average pieces in America normally run between \$50 and \$200 with some unusual pieces going for a few hundred dollars more; however, novice collectors should be cautious when buying, especially if a piece is advertised as "Quimper-like." Quimper-like pottery is made in the style of Quimperware, but it is not original Quimperware.

Today, decorators use Quimperware when decorating in the French country style, and all Quimperware made since World War II is lead-free and safe to use.

While it is out of print and difficult to obtain, collectors wishing to study more

Quimperware should read Quimper Pottery: A French Folk Art Faience by Sandra V. Bondhus. Another good resource book is Quimper Pottery...A Guide to Origins, Styles, and Values by Mark and Adela Meadows.



The Hula Hop returns to Columbus after a five-year hiatus

COLUMBUS, Ohio - One of the Midwest's pioneer Tiki celebrations, the Hula Hop returned to Columbus on Saturday, July 29. The promoter, the Columbus chapter of the Fraternal Order of Moai (FOM), a group dedicated to preserving and celebrating Polynesian culture, last ran the popular event in 2018.

FOM's revival of the show was important because Tiki traditions run deep in Columbus. They span back to the opening of the Kahiki Polynesian restaurant in 1961. The almost unequaled Tiki palace was globally famous and hosted notables including Bob Hope, Andy Williams, and Disney's Michael Eisner. Almost anyone in Central Ohio over the age of 30 has fond memories of dining at the Kahiki.

Sadly, the Kahiki was razed in 2001, replaced by a CVS store. The next time Columbus was home to a Tiki bar was in 2012 when the Grass Skirt — one of the country's early Tiki revival establishments — opened its doors. Almost immediately, the FOM moved the Hula Hop from the suburbs to "The Skirt" where it remained until 2018 the Grass Skirt closed.

A year later, Huli Huli opened in the northwest Columbus suburb of Powell and quickly built a following. In 2022, Huli Huli partnered with Akron's Tiki Underground to host a very successful Tiki festival. That helped spur the FOM to approach Huli Huli about reviving their signature event.

The vendor lineup was small but exciting, with eight booths squeezed shoulder to shoulder on Huli Huli's back patio. The slate was divided about evenly between purveyors of Polynesian Pop and other vintage merchandise and artisans offering modern Tiki-inspired pieces. Most were staples in the Midwest Tiki show circuit.

Among the vintage dealers was Ohio Tiki Nuts, with a booth filled with a

great mix of vintage barware, Mid-century decor, and enticing modern Tiki mugs from makers like Tiki Farm. Another familiar face, Old Wahine Wares, had a booth overflowing with vintage clothing and home decor. Columbus' Neon Road Trip came with mugs from long-lost Tiki establishments, island carvings, and Polynesian-style wood tableware.

Then, there were the artists. Mark 'Topes" Thompson, just off hosting his own Michigan-based Tiki show, Tiki Inferno, brought his hot rod, lowbrow, and Tiki artwork. Ohio's Nick Elam, whose work now includes illustrating menus for various Tiki revival bars, had his impressive Witco-inspired carvings and 2-D artwork.

Tiki lighting specialist Lena Simonian, whose work dons commercial and home Tiki bars across the country, had pieces like puffer fish lamps and tapa-covered Tiki lighting. In the same booth was watercolor artist Justin Frehs. His pieces, done completely

freehand and often with custom-made palettes have appeared worldwide.

A special vendor was Doug Motz, co-author of the Kahiki Supper Club book and The Kahiki Scrapbook. Doug certainly knew a special visitor in the crowd. Sara Mercer, a former Kahiki Hula entertainer, made the rounds and shared her stories of the Kahiki.

A highlight for both vendors and guests was the unveiling of a special artifact — the framework of one of the surviving huge Moai figures that once graced the front entrance of the Kahiki. While reduced to just the rebar frame, it's in the process of being restored by Huli Huli. The restaurant is no stranger to stewarding Kahiki artifacts. Last year, they acquired and hung in their ceiling a 20-foot outrigger canoe that once donned the Kahiki's dining room.

Six bands provided entertainment. During the first half of the day, renowned local DJ and music historian Jeff Chenault (fellow author of the Kahiki scrapbook) spun exotica and other

lost music from Tiki's heydays. Jeff was followed by The Jimmy Psycho Experience, playing 1950s exotica and pop music covers, done Tiki-bar style.

Two surf bands, The Digs and The Bastard Sons of Neptune filled the late afternoon and early evening hours. Central Ohio Rockabilly artist Shorty Allen and the Skirt Chasers brought in the sunset with hard-driving instrumentals. Cincinnati instrumental surf rock band, the AmpFibians wrapped up the evening.

No Tiki celebration is complete without cocktails. In addition to Huli-Huli's regular offerings, the FOM offered four special libations as a fundraiser for Nationwide Children's Hospital. Among the concoctions was a grog sponsored by Deadhead Rum, served in a complimentary shrunken-head mug.

Putting icing on the cake and rivaling the vendor booths was a guest's fully-restored Shasta trailer looking like a mobile Tiki bar. If that wasn't enough, it was pulled by a 1953 Woody-style Chevrolet wagon completing the aloha effect.



incentives to those housewives-turnedhostesses who had suddenly found a way to earn extra income by selling practical kitchen aids to their friends.

But all good things come to an end, and, in 1958, the company underwent seismic changes, with Wise resigning from her vice-president position and Tupper selling the company to Rexall Drug. Tupperware sales peaked around the time of America's Bicentennial. As for the company, at this writing, it continues to maintain corporate headquarters in Orlando, Florida.

However, to be sure, the story of Tupperware is more than one of a popular household product. Because with that knowledge comes a better understanding of American life in the second half of the 20th century, according to Faith Davis Ruffins. "The iconic company's story is an American story," she said. A curator at the Smithsonian National Museum of American History, Ruffins explained that Tupperware was marketed for "women with families living in suburban areas after World War II." She characterized this as a period of a "reversion to the homefront."

Tupperware was not the first company to embrace home-based sales, she reminded. Traveling salesmen, selling Bibles, encyclopedias, and a variety of personal and home care products, had traced their history to a long tradition of peddlers. But at a time when many women did not work outside the home, Tupperware gave these women the opportunity to participate in a business model that was based on selling to their friends, a "friendship network."

As an aside, the earliest Tupperware catalogs, Ruffins pointed out, were produced inexpensively, with handdrawn graphics illustrating "containers of all sizes, pitchers of all sizes, picnicrelated containers with compartments

to keep the potato salad cold." Included were illustrations of kitchens with nothing but Tupperware products.

Beginning in the 1970s, American societal changes saw increasing numbers of women working outside the home, many of them single or divorced, and supporting a household. These women "did not have a great deal of leisure time, and their friends were all working, too," so home parties fell from favor. Instead, Ruffins continued, "office sales came in." Simultaneously, with women spending less time at home, appliances such as microwave ovens and dishwashers were suddenly "a given." Neither of these time-saving devices, though, were especially Tupperware-friendly.

Today, Ruffins noted that Tupperware company records help to fill in details of family life at this time, as well as providing business and advertising histories of the second half of the 20th century. Of Tupperware, she remarked, "Many companies come and go, but few make it to 50 years."

In addition to the Smithsonian housing business and sales-related items, including papers, photographs, and awards, it also holds a large collection of Tupperware products, not just for their historical importance but also for their aesthetic value. In Ruffins' words, "Tupperware was innovative, very much so aesthetically." Reflecting post-war tastes, "the design epitomized a functional, stream-lined, sleek look," she concluded.

Today, vintage Tupperware increasingly appeals to a new generation of buyers. Even as single-use plastic is considered to be environmentally unsound, reusable products are

preferred, thereby making Tupperware a natural choice. But there's more to it than that, according to Diane Luscombe.

Noting a nostalgia factor, Luscombe said, "Everything 'retro' and midcentury is back, so why not vintage Tupperware?" She continued that it elicits a "warm feeling" as people recall seeing the colorful and versatile kitchen items "in the home, at picnics, cottages, campgrounds, and at Gramma's house."

A resident of Beverly Hills, Mich., Luscombe knows for a fact that vintage Tupperware is increasingly in demand, as evidenced by recent sales on her Etsy shop

(http://www.etsy.com/shop/ RubysCollectibles). Having opened her online shop in 2013, it "didn't occur to her" to stock Tupperware, but then she "came across a cute pink and white creamer and sugar set." She sold the "Serve'n Store" set with snap-on lids for \$10.55 to an "excited" buyer in August of 2016. Today, Luscombe noted that this set would probably sell for between "\$12.75 to more than \$22."

In the subsequent seven years, Luscombe has gone on to sell an additional 71 vintage Tupperware products. Whereas she made six Tupperware sales in 2020, that figure more than doubled in the following year, topping out at 15. The trend continued into 2022, with 33 sales for the year; this year, 2023, she is once again on track to double last year's total. "Clearly, there is definitely more interest in vintage Tupperware by buyers and sellers alike."

Top Tupperware sellers include pitchers and large mixing bowls, as well as measuring cups, Jadeite vegetable crispers, and canisters. "However, everything goes when it comes to

vintage Tupperware," she said, including condiment caddies and cake carriers, colanders and cheese graters, and deviled egg keepers and ketchup dispensers. "And lots more!" she exclaimed.

Her customers have a variety of reasons for purchasing the vintage plastic pieces, she continued. A lot of people buy it to enjoy, a testament to its durability. Others buy it to use as theater and movie props. And then there are those who buy it because they like the look: a recent buyer purchased sage and light-blue Jello mods to hang on the wall in her kitchen. "It looked beautiful," Luscombe reported.

For her part, Luscombe's most interesting find might well be her most recent one: a 1970s three-tiered packet holder, originally designed to organize garden seed packets. "It's the only one I've ever found in all my years of selling on Etsy. I had no idea it even existed," Luscombe said. "It's definitely rare."

And you thought Tupperware only made containers for leftovers....






