Newsboy badges bring history to light

Forget the Hummel statue of the pinkcheeked newsboy reading his newspaper. Kick that plush Disney "Newsie" bear toy to the curb.

To be serious about collecting items that tell the colorful story of America's newsboys you need to know some history.

One image of newsboys that might come to mind stems from 19th century author Horatio Alger who painted a "rags to riches" picture of a bedraggled, barefoot newsboy hawking papers on a street corner to earn money for his widowed mother. In that popular myth, the newsboy sells a paper to a sympathetic Wall Street banker or oil baron. That man admires the boy's empathy and determination - maybe seeing his younger self in the boy's eyes - and gives him a break, which changes the youngster's life forever.

"In the 1840s and '50s there were juvenile authors focusing on that kind of bootstrap message," according to Vincent DiGirolamo, an author and history professor at Baruch College of the City University of New York. "They became like temperance or religious tracts, where the father is an abusive alcoholic and the

kid is the virtuous one" who supports the

DiGirolamo literally wrote the book on this era called "Crying the News: A History of America's Newsboys," published in 2019.

Like books by Alger and his

contemporaries, early silent


movies also perpetuated the image of the virtuous newsboy. "That taps into a prevalent myth American culture: Hard work, the ordinary kid and the capitalist system that allows him to show true his grit, DiGirolamo says. "Upward mobility is a central tenet. Ironically the most exploited, the most endangered in society become symbols of this unlimited opportunity."

In reality, newsboys (and a few girls) as young as age 6 took to the streets of American cities in the early 1800s to earn a few pennies a day selling newspapers. Long before laws were passed to protect children in the workplace, youngsters made up a large and easily exploited labor force for the newspaper industry. Newsboys helped publishers' bottom lines while keeping readers informed of the latest "Extra!" on everything from the '49er miners and the California Gold Rush, to the stock market crash of 1929.

DiGirolamo says the thirst for news during the early days of the Civil War spurred large numbers of boys to become newspaper hawkers for a penny or two per copy. Although many people considered them trouble-making street urchins, DiGirolamo says newsboys were "more welcomed than disparaged" as they yelled out headlines to lure customers to buy the latest papers, hot off the presses.

But with more children selling newspapers, politicians and educators worried that youngsters were skipping school and being exposed to street vices,

including gambling, smoking, drinking and prostitution. To address those concerns, many cities started requiring newsboys to be licensed, with a stipulation they not sell newspapers during school hours. For example, in 1874 the Minneapolis Tribune editorialized for a local ordinance requiring newsboys to



Great weather, wonderful merchandise combine at Elkhorn

ELKHORN, Wis., - Crowds of shoppers were greeted by hundreds of dealers along with sunny, breezy mild weather at the Aug. 13 Elkhorn Antique and Flea Market.

The Walworth County Fairgrounds offered buyers a wide range of vintage and antique items priced from \$1 to \$4,850.

Automotive sign collectors hovered around the 5-foot-diameter 1940s porcelain Oldsmobile advertising sign that could hang in your garage for\$4,850. Toy collectors loved a 1920s Sturdy Toy Co. 32-inch-long fire truck with original paint and ladders, offered for \$1,500. Both were offered by Jack and Katie Pfeifer, Birch Hill Farm Floral and Antiques, Jackson, Wis., who were also promoting the opening of their newly expanded store at the end of August.

More than 100 smaller advertising signs, priced from \$10 and up, filled the booth of Steve Penhaker, Grant Park, Ill. Many people stopped to check out his 1930s vintage doctor tin advertising sign priced at \$125.

Visitors stopped to tap their toes to tunes from several restored early 1900s wood phonographs playing music from Keith Iverson of Cranky's Phonographs, Rockford, Ill. And, if visitors wanted to take some vinyl records home, Cranky offered two big boxes of vintage L.P. r albums priced at \$1 each and up.

Fireman memorabilia collectors checked out a 14-inch-tall 1930s cast iron fire alarm box, complete with working mechanism and original paint, offered for \$575 by John Turney of Chica-

go. Radio collectors took a close look at his 8-inch-long catalin plastic Motorola radio, with one small crack, priced at \$500.

Professionally restored vintage 1928-1940s outboard motors priced from \$1,000 to \$1,600 each caught many shopper's eye along with original boating advertising pieces shown by B.J. Pawlaczky, who's business card states: "Cool stuff that belongs in a museum."

More than 3,000 milk and other vintage bottles, priced from \$1 to \$300 each, filled multiple tables from Cream City Collectables, Milwaukee. Serious collectors checked out their 12-inch-tall am-

Tourist attraction will turn into fabulous auction event

RIVERSIDE, Mo. - In 1948, Edward Young opened a gas station in this small Kansas City metropolitan area that would blossom into an iconic "Xperience" for generations of local shoppers.

Despite three floods (1951, 1952 and 1993) and a fire in 1957, Young persevered, each time re-building his RED X store bigger and better. As a young entrepreneur, Young began to sell convenience items, then groceries and liquor and ultimately became a general store and ultimately a tourist destination.

Antiques, live animals, collections of eyeballs, teeth and countless curiosities were displayed among the merchandise. Over the years, RED X was home to a racetrack and even a miniature amusement park.

Young was not only a savvy businessman, but also a passionate collector. At first, he began with bells. At one time, he had the largest bell collection in the United States. Church bells, locomotive railroad bells, early American art glass bells, school bells; Young had a bell for nearly every occasion. A family member



estimated he had more than 10,000 bells at one time.

During his search for bells, Young

got off track and began buying other curiosities: a cabin washstand from the ocean liner Oceanic, the dining room set from the R.A. Long mansion "Corinthian Hall," a 1910 structure that cost \$1 million; a cast iron jail cell, railroad items, nautical equipment, African items and Asian antiques and bronzes.

Young died in 1999, but RED X remains a family business. In February, the store with the big red X posted high outside the structure moved to a new store, with more than 60,000 square feet, on the southeast corner of where it all began.

With the move to the new location, RED X cannot take everything that Young had collected. As a result, Pence Auctions will be selling thousands of items to the highest bidder on Sept. 9-10.

"Because of the magnitude of the collection we will sell by the box lot as well as individually," Auctioneer Rick Pence said. "On day one, we'll be selling all the advertising and promotional items plus hundreds of boxes of antiques and collectibles. There will a little of everything for everybody.'

On the second day, Pence will be selling the bell collection of more than 1,000 bells, including 20-25 railroad locomotive bells. Among the many choice examples of bells is a cast steel bell manufactured in 1860 by the Naylor Vickers Company

in Sheffield, England. The bell, with a diameter of 30 inches, is one of almost 1,000 cast steel bells, produced by the company in the second half of the 19th

Traditionally, bells are made of an alloy of bronze and tin.

A Navlor Vickers advertisement from 1850 claims the cast steel bells "have a very pure melodious sound, peculiar to

cast steel; and as the elasticity of this material seems to produce more powerful vibrations, their sound penetrates to a greater distance."

Bidders poured \$2,650 for a Blenko decanter at Pyle glassware sale

EVANS, W.Va. — West Virginia's Joe R. Pyle Auctions always has something brewing. That's not cliche by any means; just consider their current auction calendar where you'll find everything from player pianos to a 1958 Chris Craft runabout!

Pyle's July 26 event, the second half of a two-day personal property auction, had scores of West Virginia's finest — famed Blenko glass. The sale in Evans, W.Va., was only about an hour from Blenko's home base in Milton. In addition to pieces from Blenko and other glassmakers, there was furniture, lamps, antiques, and household goods on the block.

This second day of the sale consisted of 295 lots presented on Bid.com. The day opened with 23 lots of Blenko glass. Many of the best-selling items were attributed to glass artist Wayne Husted, who was hired as Blenko's director of design in the 1950s, and responsible for many of the company's most celebrated pieces.

The appeal of Husted pieces was apparent. The auction's highest bid went for an 11-inch Husted amberina sun face decanter. Almost 100 bids took it to \$2,650. Half of the escalation came from two motivated bidders.

While only that one item sold in the four-figure range, plenty of pieces sold in the hundreds. Another 11-inch amberina sun face jug attributed to Husted hit \$600 on 55 bids, also from heavy bidding among two principal parties. Then there was a 2004 green and yellow vase attributed to

Husted, numbered 42/200, that landed \$270. A Blenko 32-inch round glass bowl in cobalt blue, with a clear wave patterned

bottom, went for \$240.

Blenko items also caught a lot of midrange prices. A 1976 Blenko pear-shaped paperweight got \$55. A mid-century lightgreen vase sold for \$40 and a 9-inch round cobalt blue sold more modestly at \$22.

Only 4 Blenko lots sold for under \$25, which probably made some bidders with limited budgets happy. A 10-inch clear petal bowl went for \$20. Later, a 9-inch clear Blenko vase made it to just \$16, while a pair of 1960s slab glass icicle candle holders pulled just \$9.

Overall, colored glass did better than clear glass pieces, with a couple of notable exceptions. A clear water bottle with a red dab signed by Wayne Husted generated an impressive \$140; and, a 10-inch clear vase with an amethyst heart and trim fetched a

Certain items of non-Blenko glass also did quite well. Those included a 12-inch unbranded hand-blown blue vase that sold for



The video game crash of 1983 meant gamers could get some deals

In 1983, I was 16 years old and living the dream. I had a car, I had money, and I was unencumbered by anything resembling real responsibilities, other than my job as a Quality Supervisor at a barbeque restaurant.

Before I digress into my life story, let's zero in on a certain newspaper ad I saw during this time. Yes, teenagers and even people younger read the newspaper in those pre-social media days. Not only for the funnies, and not only for baseball box scores, but also for celebrity gossip, headline news, local interest stuff, and more.

Each Sunday, the paper was massive, thanks in part to ads from retail stores. I would scour these ads for gaming bargains, and one day I found a whopper: a variety of Atari 2600 titles for \$9.99 to \$14.99 each, including popular first-party titles like Asteroids and Space Invaders. This was a huge discount from the regular selling price of \$30 to \$45 or so for most video games.

Over the next few months, I began seeing titles for the Atari 2600, Intellivision, ColecoVision, Odyssey 2, and other consoles selling for \$4.99 each... then \$2.99...then .99 cents. Yes, brand new video games for under a buck! I've spoken to certain people around my age who recall seeing new video games marked as low as .25 cents each. Amazing!

As a hardcore gamer and collector, I was driving from store to store, adding to my collection. I would buy pretty much any game that looked fun to play, and I would buy pretty much any ColecoVision game no matter what it was because that was my favorite console. Stores like Toys "R" Us, Kay Bee Toys, Circus World, and even Walmart and Target would have huge bins with tons of discount games, and I would practically leap into these pits and swim around, catching as many "fish" as I wanted and throwing back what looked unappealing.

It was exciting and fun, but I had no idea what it all meant beyond being able to purchase video games for pennies on the dollar, amassing a cool collection, and playing a bunch of games that I would never have had access to without the Video Game Crash of 1983. I had no idea it meant the video game console industry in North America was dying. It didn't really sink in for me until 1984, when the writing was on the wall that my beloved ColecoVision was on the way out. It was officially discontinued in 1985, and I was incredibly bummed. The Atari 2600 and Intellivision hung on for a few more years, but just barely.

Video game sales dropped 97 percent from \$3.2 billion in 1982 to \$100 million by 1985. The reasons for the Crash are many. Too many random companies had jumped on the video game craze of the early '80s and were cranking out lousy games for the Atari 2600, the most ubiquitous console of the era. There were also too many consoles on the market in general. This created consumer confusion and dissatisfaction, and retailers struggled to find adequate space for new games on store shelves.

Two of the most highly anticipated 2600 titles, Pac-Man and E.T. the Extra Terrestrial, were big disappointments as the former was a bad port and the latter was confusing for most kids who played it. These and other titles were over-produced, and Atari ended up burying thousands of games in a landfill in New Mexico, as told in the 2014 documentary, Atari: Game Over.

By 1983, many gamers who had grown up with the Atari 2600, which was released in 1977, were moving on to other interests like cars and dating.





\$270. A very similar 12.5-inch hand-blown blue vase hit the same figure.

Six lots with pieces of popular crackle glass took an array of bids. On the higher end, a cobalt blue crackle bottle with a glass stopper brought \$70. A 4-inch aqua blue crackle glass pitcher yielded a humble \$14. Two lots with mid-century amber crackle glass swung vases went home for \$16 and \$12. A 9-inch Viking crackle vase in spring green color also managed just \$12.

After the glassware, seventeen lots of furniture, ranging from antique to contemporary, were offered. The highest for furnishings, at \$250, went to a 60-inch tall antique etagere cabinet. A 36-inch-wide Eastlake-style two-drawer server brought a modest \$140. Later, two different 1940s-era Federal-style ball and clawfoot secretaries

(one mahogany) with beveled drawers and glass cabinet doors hit \$100 and \$70 respectively.

A few items of furniture did better than one might expect at auction. A contemporary full-size oak rolltop desk - which are often passed over because of their size and weight - grabbed \$110. A typical 1950s-era

school desk plastered with patriotic stickers went for a fairly generous \$40. And, a 1940s gateleg accent table reached high market value at \$30.

Among more than 100 lots of mainly home goods and garage items were also some interesting antique and vintage finds. One of them was an unusual antique metal match holder with bird decorations. It bid to \$90. More modern was a flat of drafting accessories that drew \$24. And for anglers, a box-lot of vintage fishing gear that included a fly reel, minnow trap, and several lures, went for \$14.

The 1982 follow-up to the 2600, the Atari 5200, was largely a bust, thanks in part to its fragile, imprecise, non-centering joysticks. Coleco had announced they were going to produce a Super Game Module for the ColecoVision that would have meant games with more levels, better graphics and sounds, etc., but they cancelled that eagerly anticipated peripheral and released the Adam Computer instead. While great in theory, the Adam was a huge failure because so many units were bug-ridden or downright inoperable right out of the box.

Speaking of computers, they were a big reason for the Crash. Many parents felt more comfortable purchasing a computer for their kids than a "mere" video game console. Most of the big consoles at the time promised computer add-ons, but those were all unsuccessful, such as Mattel's Entertainment Computer System for the Intellivision. The Odyssey 2 had a computer-style keyboard, but it was a video game console, not a fully-functional computer.


The Commodore 64, which Guiness cites as the top-selling computer model of all time, played a big role in the Crash. Why buy a console when you can get a computer that also plays games

that are at least as good as the ColecoVision and in some cases better and more sophisticated? And you can pirate those games for free? I saw evidence of this first-hand. After my best friend's dad brought home a C64 with around 200 games copied illegally onto floppy discs, his family rarely touched their ColecoVision.

While the video game market in North America crashed in 1983, the industry didn't stay dead for long, thanks in large part to a certain Japanese company's cool console, savvy marketing, and mustachioed Italian plumber. Test-marketed in 1985 and released nationwide in 1986, the Nintendo Entertainment System, which was the North American version of the Japanese Famicom, introduced a new generation to

video games, with Super Mario Bros. taking center stage. More than any video game before it, SMB dazzled gamers with expansive gameplay, cartoonlike graphics, hidden secrets and surprises, and pitch-perfect controls.

When I received my NES for Christmas in 1987, I barely believed what I was seeing. The closest experience I can think of to playing Super Mario Bros. for the first time was my initial reading of Lewis Carroll's Alice in Wonderland—simply mind-boggling!

Numerous great games followed on the console, including such legendary titles as Contra, Castlevania, Metroid, The Legend of Zelda, and Super Mario Bros. 3, the last of which was heavily marketed in 1989s The Wizard. An entire culture was built around the NES. Players would exchange tips and tricks for beating games (as well as call Nintendo's hotline number), bring issues of Nintendo Power magazine to school, rent games from movie rental stores, pause their system all night so they could continue that long adventure game the next morning, etc.

Even more than Atari, Nintendo brought video games into the mainstream, and the industry has been thriving ever since.

Collectors are in love with the detail of Brooklin Models

Since 1974, Brooklin Models has been the largest producer of handmade, white metal, 1/43rd scale models in the world. The company's line primarily consists of vintage American cars and trucks; even though, Brooklin Models is located in Bath, England, where all of the company's models are produced.

White metal is a type of cast metal where an alloy based on lead or iron is used. White metal alloy may include tin, lead, antimony, bismuth, cadmium, and zinc, but not all of these metals are found in all white metal alloys. Companies mix these metals to achieve a desired alloy for the item being manufactured. Brooklin Models mixed white metals to produce a strong yet inexpensive tin alloy that contains some lead for casting vintage model trucks. White metal alloys are easily castable, have excellent flow characteristics, and are used to cast models needing fine detail. As the Brooklin website states, this process works better for producing hundreds of vehicles, not hundreds of thousands, or millions, so this process is best used on limited production runs.

When Brooklin Models wants a new model line, a prototype is hand made out of brass by a master model builder. The builder uses sheet brass and often takes hundreds of hours to produce a prototype. When the brass master model is

completed, rubber models are cast for the various parts that will be needed to make a finished model. Each model is cast one at a time. The alloy is brought to a specific temperature, poured into the rubber molds, and allowed to cure.

After removing the parts from the molds, the flashing (excess metal around the molded part) is carefully filed off, and the parts are then prepared for chrome plating or painting. Windows for each model are vac-u-formed and installed, and rubber tires are made from a special compound. When all the parts are ready, each model is assembled by hand. Finally, any additional detail painting, such as taillights or chrome features is done and decals are added, and the final model is ready for market.

All of Brooklin's model trucks are hand made in small quantities, making each model part of a limited production and highly collectible. The average run for a Brooklin Model toy, in the 1990s, was 3,000 toys; although, there were several special runs of 1,000 toys or less. One notable exception was Brooklin's run of a 1953 Chevrolet panel sedan delivery van or livery van, which is a van marked with an identifying company design or symbol, such as a company logo. Brooklin's '53 Chevy van was offered as many different promotional vans, such as Trans-Canada Airlines and Gulf Oil. Like most of Brooklin's toys, these vans were produced for a five-year period and then discontinued; making sure Brooklin's model line is always new and exciting.

Brooklin Models took its name from Brooklin, Ontario, Canada, where John Hall founded the company. The small town of Brooklin is located approximately 40 miles northeast of Toronto.

Brooklin's earliest models were resin cast and represented model vehicles not generally produced by other toy manufacturers. For instance, Brooklin's first model was a replica of a 1933 Pierce Sil-

ver Arrow, which was followed by a Tucker Torpedo and a Ford Model A.

In 1979 Hall moved his family and company back to Bath, England, where he had been born and raised. Hall resumed making Brooklin 1/43rd scale models until he sold the company to Nigel Parker and Tim Fulford in 1998. Today, the Brooklin Models toy factory covers over 5,000 square feet and employs 21 people.

Brooklin collectors quickly introduced divisions in their collections. Most Brooklin Models collectors actively search for the company's earliest models, which were made in Brooklin, Canada. These early models are also the most valuable Brooklin toys.

Today, collectors customize many Brooklin models, often by painting and re-detailing, into specialized, one-of-a-kind models. Customized Brooklin models are hot items on secondary markets, adding renewed interest and excitement to an exciting cast metal toy company.



Newsboy Badges

"wear some badge of their public office" as a way to control their number and behavior.

Mistreatment by publishers, and the struggle to get more of a share of the profits, led to union organizing and scores of newsboy strikes from the mid-1800s well into the 1900s. The 1899 newsboy strike in New York City was the basis for Disney's "Newsies, The Musical," which opened on Broadway in 2012, with its souvenir "Newsie" bear toys.

The rise of child labor laws around 1900 led to further limits on the hours when children could work, and the minimum age of newsboys and girls. Even as late as the 1930s, the limits on newsgirls were far more stringent than on boys. A 1934 "minor's license" issued in Somerville, Massachusetts, stated, "No boy under twelve and no girl under eighteen shall ... sell, expose or offer for sale any newspapers, magazines, periodicals or exercise the trade of bootblack or scavenger in any street or public place."

By 1900, more than half of the 45 states then in the union had adopted child labor laws, although most of those were aimed at factory work, not the street trades of newsboys and shoeshining bootblacks. By 1902, Massachusetts had passed a statewide regulation giving authority to license newsboys and girls to the Boston school board, a practice that spread to at least 10 other Bay State cities by 1906.

Eventually, as daily newspapers shifted to early morning home delivery by adult drivers on suburban routes, the traditional newsboy jobs faded away. Today, of course, most people who read a newspaper see it on their computer or phone. But the rich history of some 150 years of newsboys as regular fixtures on every street corner lives today in the wealth of newsboy badges, pinbacks, books and artwork available to collectors.

At the lower end, a collector can expect to pay \$10-25 for one of the more common

Toledo Newsboy Association badges, which were issued in the 1890s. The association was formed by John E. Gunckel, dubbed "the Newsboys Friend" who founded the National Newsboys Association of America as a charity to help young street vendors. That association also led to formation of newspaper "goodfellow" groups, made up of civic leaders and businessmen who had sold newspapers as youths. Each year the men would don canvas newspaper bags and hawk souvenir newspapers to raise money for charities. Although the days of the goodfellows ended in the 1950s and '60s, the "Goodfellows Day" badges they sported show up frequently online and sell for as little as \$5-10 each. Keep in mind these were badges worn for promotional fundraisers, not 100-year-old newsboy

Detroit issued newsboy pinback-style celluloid badges in the late 1800s that bore the year and city seal. Because of the fragile nature of the badges, one in good shape can sell for \$100 to \$300.

Many badges issued by school boards or city departments display the year of issue, the name of the city or town and a number assigned to that particular newsboy. Some badges, especially in New York State, were made with a rectangular opening through which the boy's signature was displayed. That requirement was meant to cut down on boys sharing or renting their badges to unlicensed hawkers.

New York and Massachusetts communities were zealous when it came to requiring newsboy badges from the late 1800s until the 1960s. In general, the smaller the community issuing the badge, the fewer badges issued and the scarcer the item is on the collectibles market. A badge issued by a town of 5,000 – which might have had just one or two newspapers and a few dozen newsboys – would be harder to find than

one issued in the cities of Boston or New York, where thousands of newsboys, most of them wearing official badges, worked the street corners.

Newsboy union movements led to creation of campaign buttons for those running for a union office. Those buttons are scarce, with price tags north of \$50.

Some of the larger city newspapers held summer outings for their legions of newsboy to both reward the kids and discourage any rumblings by unhappy newsies about forming a union. Often, those outings featured swimming, track and field events, and even tug-o-war competitions, with medals and ribbons awarded to winners. Those awards are quite scarce and sometimes carry a date, which increases the value. Collectors can expect to pay \$50 or more if they find such an award from a newsboy competition.

Collectors can also hunt for engravings of newsboys which were used in editorial cartoons or illustrations in such mainstream newspapers as Harper's Weekly and Leslie's Illustrated. Engravings from those early newspapers

tend to be very affordable (around \$10-50 each) and suitable for framing, as well. Besides the Horatio Alger series of books, a handful of other authors published tales of newsboy life as well. Most volumes can be found in the \$10-25 range.

The serious collector can also keep an eye out for metal tip trays showing newsboy images, which are quite rare. The trays were placed on the counter of a newsstand to collect the few pennies or a nickel left when someone would buy a paper. A colorful example of a Boston Herald tip tray from the early 1900s can sell for \$100.

"Newsboys were the product of the existing economy to which they had no choice but to adjust," DiGirolamo says. "They were both winners and victims, not above taking advantage of customers by, for example, dirtying their faces to make people feel sorry for them. They reflected the complex, busy society they were part of. They were not islands of individualism and moral character, but necessary participants in penny capitalism."

The knife was used to cut the twine holding bundles of newspapers dropped off by delivery trucks from the printing plant; a retractable-chain pin from the National Newsboys Association; and a brass belt buckle bearing the logo of the Newspaper Boys Association.
