Safford decoys are taking flight with collectors

When craftsman Charles Augustus Safford carefully measured, cut, and mortised pieces of wood into a life-sized Canada goose decoy around 1920, he no doubt expected the bird to weather many New England hunting seasons. It's highly unlikely he imagined it would surpass the century mark and top half a million dollars on the auction floor.

Earlier this year a Safford sleeping goose decoy set a world record sale price of \$594,000 for the maker at the Copley Fine Arts auction in Hingham, Mass. Just six years earlier the same decoy - a complex creation of some 20 pieces of crosslaminated wood - sold for what was then a record \$517,500 at Guyette & Deeter's auction in Portsmouth, N.H.

This rare bird by Safford helped propel the once-obscure carver into the spotlight.

In a 2009 Decoy Magazine profile, Gwladys "Gigi" Hopkins, a curator, carver author of "Massachusetts Masterpieces, Decoy as Art," proclaimed Stafford's sleeping goose decoy "leaps into the pantheon of the greatest American goose decoys ever made, sculpture and function in perfect marriage."

Born in Gloucester, Mass., Stafford spent most of his adult years along the same Atlantic coast in and around Newburyport. A multi-talented artist and craftsman, he hammered out items in tin, brass, copper and silver. As a cabinetmaker at his great-grandfather's shop in Newburyport, he built everything from coffins to workboats.

He built himself a cottage on Plum Island, a barrier island joined to Newbury and Newburyport by a narrow road and drawbridge, and from there he engaged in his greatest love, hunting ducks and geese.

As a market hunter, Safford shot waterfowl for local restaurants and sent other gunners in his day, he often hunted







similar to a kayak with a squared-off stern which was camouflaged along the sides and bow with tufts of grass and salt marsh hay. He carved decoys in various poses (like his "sleeping" goose) and placed them in small groupings or "rigs," anchored by metal weights. The floating decoys gave live birds flying overhead a false sense of safety, which often brought them within range of Safford's shotgun. He made his decoys to last and left them outside season after season, which is evident in their faded and worn paint.

When Stafford was in his mid 50s, he made a remarkable career change - and laid down his shotgun. In 1934 the Federation of the Bird Clubs of New England received a donation from Annie Hamilton Brown, a lifelong Massachusetts Audubon member, for the purchase of 1,500 acres on Plum Island for a bird sanctuary. Safford, who was living yearround in his cottage on the island, went to work as the resident game warden for the sanctuary, and as warden, he had to keep his former hunting colleagues in line to protect the birds on and around the island. (He himself didn't give up hunting entirely,

Antique and art lovers flocked to Maryland's Waterfowl Festival

EASTON, Md. — Hunting and fishing is deeply rooted in our culture. Its roots stretch back to the to the people who had to rely on nature's bounty to put food on their tables. Waterfowl hunters around the Chesapeake Bay celebrate that heritage at the Waterfowl Festival, held annually in Easton. Now in its 52nd year, it is one of the nation's premiere events dedicated to waterfowling and its related traditions.

Delmarva (the eastern peninsula of Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia) was mostly isolated and rural before the Chesapeake Bay Bridges were built in 1952 and 1973. Hunting and fishing were centuries-old staples for Delmarva families before the development and tourism the bridges brought began taking their toll. Sensing the trans-

formation, around 1970, a group of Eastern Shore sporting enthusiasts began working on a way to bolster the region's sporting traditions before they were lost to change. The Waterfowl Festival was born.

The inaugural event, coinciding with the opening of goose hunting season in November of 1971, featured just three modest exhibits. Today, the three-day festival attracts 18,000-20,000 attendees, fills a dozen venues, and occupies blocks in Easton's historic downtown. Although the event celebrates SEE MARYLAND WATERFOWL FESTIVAL

Fortune teller machines predicted bright futures

LAS VEGAS, Nev. - Morphy Auctions has returned to Vegas, and West Coast collectors are loving it. After a four-year hiatus, the Pennsylvania company's \$5.1 million sale held at its new Vegas location on October 27-30 was the first step toward re-establishing Morphy's presence in America's entertainment capital. Motivated bidders, including many who have been loyal Morphy Auctions customers for years, came from literally all western states to attend the 2,214-lot sale of premium-quality coin-op and gambling machines, antique advertising and country store

awaited bidders at the October sale formed a visual history of machines whose original purpose was to entertain, dispense goods or offer patrons the chance to hit a jackpot, all for the cost of a coin. More than 15 coveted upright slot machines highlighted the offering, including several early rarities manufactured by Caille Bros of Detroit, Michigan.

A circa-1903 Caille 5ϕ and 25ϕ double musical Puck upright slot machine displayed not only mechanical ingenuity but also great decorative beauty with its colorful gaming wheels set behind two cherub decals. Complete with a rare

waterfowl hunting, it draws outdoor enthusiasts of all types - anglers, hunting dog fans, aficionados of wildlife art and artifacts, and visitors hungry for local seafood. Over 1,000 volunteers, many who've contributed their time for 40+ years, work year-round to make the festival a success.

From its inception, the Waterfowl Festival supported a dual mission: to share the Eastern Shore's sporting heritage and help preserve it. To date, more than \$6 million in festival proceeds have been donated for wildlife, conservation, and environmental education projects throughout Delmarva. This year, funds will help restore 40 acres of wetlands at the Wellington Wildlife Management Area in Somerset County, Maryland.

While not purely a marketplace, there is plenty for sale - particularly wildlife antiques and art. This year, six venues hosted working artists, two held waterfowling and related artifacts, and two offered regional wildlife-related antiques for sale.

For art lovers, over 100 of the nation's best wildlife carvers, sculptors, painters, and photographers had works available.

Paintings, prints, and photographs featured subjects like migrating birds, retrievers bounding through tidal waters, and serene images of fishing boats at harbor. Carvers brought game decoys that looked stunningly real, and sculptors displayed pieces that portrayed everything from eagles to egrets. Guests had the opportunity to watch many working artists actively craft pieces onsite.

Purchasers could buy directly from the artists or attend multiple art auctions. Prices for pieces ranged from the low \$100s to five-figure sums.

North Carolina's Joe Seme, was selected to design the festival's official poster available at the show for \$35 unframed or \$135 framed. It depicted a Federal-style cabinet filled with Delmarva paraphernalia, like oyster cans, Tidewater books, and duck decoys. Featured sculptor, Pati Stajcar unveiled a 27-inch bronze, "Aesop's Fable" depicting the tale of the Crow and the Pitcher. Nine full-sized renditions were available for \$13,000 each, while nine smaller 14-inch editions were \$4,100 each.

Two popup galleries were filled with




wildfowling artifacts on loan from private collections and museums. There were antique decoys, vintage hunting guns, hunting memorabilia, and historic waterfowling photography. Some of the pieces dated back two centuries.

For those wanting antiques of their own, there was a Buy/Sell/Swap venue with around 50 vendors. A second location hosted additional sellers at a decoy tailgate. Vendors' tables were filled with everything from century-old waterfowl carvings and antique fishing lures to vintage shotguns and hand-built wood fishing boat models. Prices ranged from a few dollars to several thousand. Most prominent were antique and vintage waterfowl decoys, typically priced in the hundreds of dollars. Additionally, stores in Easton's historic district were open for shoppers, including six antique and vintage shops showcasing Bay-area merchandise.

A unique section within the Buy/Sell/Swap venue held wildfowl philatelics that came alongside the annual Federal and Maryland Game Bird Stamp Design Contests. This year's winner was Montana artist Chuck Black's rendition of a northern pintail which will appear on the 2024-2025 Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp.

When not shopping, guests could watch

or participate in a variety of activities. There were adult and youth wildfowl calling competitions, field dog training, fly fishing workshops, and raptor demonstrations. A crowd favorite was the DockDogs dock jumping competition, with multiple breeds participating.

The Waterfowl Festival is family-friendly, with plenty to keep younger ones occupied. Kids could try their hand at bird calling, decoy painting, and soap carving. At the local library, a mermaid show introduced kids to conservation and a fishmobile had touch and non-touch tanks with live Chesapeake Bay creatures.

Some notes for attending - the festival takes place annually, the second weekend of November. Parking is available in designated free and paid locations. A shuttle bus system is available to ferry visitors between venues. The festival is dog-friendly and well-behaved dogs are welcome at many locations.

Tickets this year were \$25, good for all three days. Active and former military members received discounted admission. Children ten and under were free. VIP packages and certain special events were extra.

interchangeable cylinder music box, it sold above its high estimate for \$74,400.

Another top seller was the circa-1910 Caille "Tourist" cast-iron slot machine. Tolworthy observed that this particular model is "unique among the single-reelers produced in the early 20th century." The player would choose a country from the list provided, deposit a nickel, and pull the handle. If the chosen country appeared after the handle was activated, the machine would pay out accordingly. In wonderful overall condition with an attractive natural patina, it sold within estimate for \$66,000.

Caille's versatility and awareness of its competition led to the manufacture of its circa-1902

Hy-Lo 1-cent cast-iron "draw poker" cigar trade stimulator. This ornate design was Caille's answer to Mills' "Hy-Lo," but today, the Caille machine is far more rare. In untouched all-original condition, including the regal scrolled marquee and paper award card, the example offered by Morphy's was fresh to the market, having come directly from a 30-year-collection. It achieved its exact auction high estimate of \$60,000.

Bidding paddles were airborne for one particular arcade machine, an original circa-1904 Mills 1¢ novelty "Hats Off" lung tester. Its design incorporated the faces of eight different-looking men whose tin (designed to replicate "straw") hats could be blown off if a user's lung strength was sufficient. A message on its front panel enticed potential players with the message "Come On Boys... Who Blows Best." One of fewer than a handful known, the machine sold well above high estimate for a powerful \$119,000.

Several fortune tellers were on hand. A later production, a circa-1970 floor model machine known as "Ask the Judge." was designed to accept quarters. Upon the deposit of a 25c coin, the judge raises his gavel, speaks his decision, then issues a card with jokes on it. The machine's manufacturer is






unknown, but its nice condition suggested it might never have actually been placed at an arcade or elsewhere. It sold for \$22,800 against an estimate of \$1,000-\$3,000 - a price that Morphy's didn't predict, but maybe the judge did.

There's never a shortage of interest in fine, early breweriana, as reflected in the prices for two handsome pre-Prohibition signs. A scarce eight-color porcelain corner sign advertising Excelsior Brewery of Buffalo, New York presented in clean 8.5 condition and was described in the catalog as "the better of only two known examples." It doubled its high estimate at \$44,280. The second notable entry, a circa-1910s 'Jackson Brewing Co Beer San Francisco' reverse-painted on glass sign with the image of Andrew Jack-

son rose to \$36,900 against an estimate of \$3,000-\$6,000.

The pursuit of neon automotive dealership signs continues to grow. At the October sale, a rare and outstanding Chevrolet Art Deco single-sided porcelain neon sign with a Telechron clock sold above estimate for \$98,400, while a circa-1930s Oldsmobile single-sided porcelain neon sign, also with Art Deco styling, brushed its high estimate at \$49,200.

A collection of more than 150 antique occupational shaving mugs crossed the auction block, boasting some of the finest examples ever to appear at auction. The mugs attracted intense bidding and chalked up extraordinary prices. The top seller was a mug dated "1924" with the image of a policeman riding on a motorcycle. It raced to a \$30,000 finish

against an estimate of \$1,000-\$1,500.

Also worthy of note was an extremely rare "Bambino" tin tobacco canister with appealing graphics depicting a baseball player in silhouette. In 9.0 condition and possibly the only one of its type in circulation, the tin knocked it out of the park, commanding \$25,830 against an estimate of \$5,000-

Kennedy Presidential Library selling unmarked reproductions

This fall I had the opportunity to travel to Boston for work. While there, I scheduled a visit to the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum. The museum itself,

which is located on beautiful Dorchester Bay, was very enjoyable with a nicely laid out chronological history of JFK's public service, campaigns and presidency.

At the end of my tour, I had to, of course, visit the museum gift shop. I was immediately drawn to a display of "Students for Kennedy" picture key chains. Neatly designed and measuring approximately 1 7/8 inches across, they pictured Kennedy and the year '60.

Unfortunately, they also were not marked as being reproductions as required by the Hobby Protection Acy of 1973. A little more searching around the gift shop revealed a basket of metal PT-109 lapel pins and tie bars, John F. Kennedy Presidential Signing Pens, and Students for Kennedy picture coffee cups, all also new and not marked as such. I mentioned my concerns to the register clerk, but they didn't seem interested in discussing the problem.

Around 20 years ago I visited the Presidential Library and Museum of Kennedy's

Nixon, and found the same problem pervading their space.

At that time, I wrote an article revealing the situation, and even caught the interest of a couple national political news outlets that wrote about situation. As a result, the questionable items were pulled from sale and as far as I know, the Nixon gift shop has been following the letter of the

law ever since.

A little background from the Federal Trade Commission's website: "The Hobby Protection Act, passed by Congress in 1973, covers imitation political items (e.g., buttons, posters, stickers, etc.), as well as imitation numismatic items (e.g., various coins, tokens, paper money, commemorative medals) that are required to be marked with certain

identifying information in an effort to flag them as imitations. The FTC's Rule establishes the size of the required disclosures, their location, and the manner in which items may be marked."

The language of the law has been updated and tweaked several times over the past 50 years, but the intent and spirit of the act remains the same...if you want to produce and sell fake or reproduction political (and other) items, they must be

marked as such.

The hobby of collecting political items is not unique when it comes to the problems of fake pieces which can deceive new and sometimes even seasoned collectors. While the JFK ceramic mugs and plastic keychains may possibly look "new" enough to arouse suspicion in the secondary market, the PT109 tie-bars and lapel pins are identical in size, shape and style to their now 60+ year-old counterparts. Not to mention that once any of the listed items get a little bit of aging on them, all could easily deceive.

I guess as in all areas of collecting, that "Caveat Emptor" or "let the buyer beware" is always the case. Collectors should bone-up on information about their areas of interest to better prepare themselves to not be taken. However, when trusted institu-



tions like the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum which is part of the Presidential Library System, and administered by the Office of Presidential Libraries, a part of the National Archives and Records Administration, chooses to offer items for sale that are in violation of federal law...Houston, we have a problem.

These bowls may cost a lot of dough to take them home

If you are lucky, at least once in your life, a certain antique or collectible, found in the back of a flea market or laid out upon a table at an auction house, reminds you of a family piece that Grandma had in her home. When this happens, a striking, nostalgic understanding of family or familial love envelops you. I recently felt such an epiphany while shaping a dough bowl from a pine beam left over from the construction of two friends' post-and-beam home. The beam vielded a crude but beautiful 6 by 4 inch dough bowl that is 20 inches long.

Of all antiques, dough bowls (also called dough troughs) seem to embrace the spirit of their owner or maker. Walk through any antique shop and you will find many dough bowls. Pick one up and shut your eyes and you might envision the firm, callused hands of a weathered farmer shaping the bowl for his wife to use in their kitchen.

Nearly every kitchen in every home in America, from the rich New England clapboards to the prairie shoddy of Oklahoma, had one or two dough bowls sitting around. Americans have always enjoyed bread as a diet staple, so these bowls were needed to mix and proof the dough before baking. Dough bowls served a functional purpose in preindustrialized America.

In the 1800s, most dough bowls were entirely shaped from a single log or beam, using ax, adz, or chisel and



mallet. A more prosperous man might have used an inshave to carve out the bottom, giving the bowl a more gentle rounded effect. Some dough bowls were crafted in two pieces. The top, usually 1 to 2 inches in depth, was sawed with handles or other ornamentation to meet the creativity of the craftsman. The bottom was then cut and carved out. The top and bottom pieces were then joined using wood dowels and whatever type of glue the farmer might have handy. Then a plane, rasp, or spokeshave smoothed the sides and top.

Nearly every type of wood imaginable has been used to create dough bowls. While pine was the favorite wood used for dough bowls, due to its easy workability and abundant accessibility, many dough bowls were carved from fir, spruce,

made from birdseye maple. It is possible to collect a potpourri of wooden dough bowls that, with a little oil and elbow grease, will radiate the warmth and beauty of the woods, making an eyecatching collection.

Today, collectors pay top dollar for well-preserved, authentic dough bowls. In fact, at first glance, one might think dough bowls acquired their name because of their cost in any antique store. But that's the wrong kind of dough! But cost they do. While there is no average price





for dough bowls since each is unique, it is fair to state that a mid-size hand-hewn dough bowl in good or repaired condition will cost at least \$150 and some cost much more. I've seen authentic, 1800s American-made dough bowls on eBay offered for \$1,500 - \$2,000.

For a fascinating read on wooden bowls in general, try The Wooden Bowl by Robin Wood (Stobart Davies Limited 2005).

summer cottages and hunting shacks), usually on horseback. On his daily rounds he also kept a running list of bird sightings, filing regular reports for the monthly Bulletin of the Massachusetts Audubon Society. As a lover of the outdoors, he had always paid close attention to animals and hinds

His work as a warden sometimes made the pages of the Newburyport Daily Herald. On November 18, 1941, the newspaper reported Safford "apprehended two hunters on Plum Island and charged them with having 'unplugged shotguns.' Removal of the plugs of the guns allows the harboring of more than the three shells permitted by law," which meant the hunters could bag more birds from each passing flock. Each man was fined \$30 in district court.

Another article ran in the Daily Herald on May 26, 1942, just months after the attack on Pearl Harbor drew the U.S. into World War II. The newspaper reported that Safford was still welcoming bird watchers to the island, "although the Coast Guard and Army have issued orders that no person shall carry a gun or camera in the locality as long as the present war condition exists."

Later that year, the acreage then known as the Annie H. Brown Wildlife Sanctuary was incorporated into the 4,600-acre Parker River National Wildlife Refuge, and Safford was out of a job at the age of 65. At that point he retired and moved to Lynn, a coastal city just north of Boston, where he spent his last 15 years. In those years he carved miniature waterfowl; more than a dozen of those now reside at the Museum of Old Newbury in Newburyport. Safford died at age 80 in 1957 and is buried in Newburyport's Oak Hill Cemetery near his parents and sisters.

Geoff Walker, a contemporary decoy carver in Newbury, whose late father Hank set a high standard for carving, theorized Safford's fame was late in coming because he didn't carve many decoys.

"As I know it, he didn't build a lot of birds," Walker said. "He might have built them for his friends and for his own rig," but didn't turn out hundreds of decoys like more well-known carvers whose work shows up frequently in auctions today.

Casey Smolar, an antique dealer on the North Shore of Massachusetts who has discovered many decoys in his travels,

believes Safford only carved geese because that's what he hunted.

"He made a couple rigs of geese, probably one for himself and some for friends. He just didn't make a lot of decoys," Smolar said. "To my knowledge, I don't know if he ever made other species other than geese."

When Safford's now-famous sleeping goose decoy went to auction in 2017, the Guyette & Deeter catalog devoted four pages to color photos and details about his life and the carving.

"Charlie Safford's name is not nearly as well known as his work warrants," the catalog noted, "but the strength of this single carving is sufficient to place him in the pantheon of such famous carvers as Elmer Crowell of Cape Cod, Harry V. Shourds of Tuckerton, N.J., and the Ward Brothers of Crisfield, Maryland."

That "splendid goose, the pinnacle of Safford's work as a decoy maker, speaks volumes about his lifelong passion for wild birds and the prodigious talents he brought to portraying them," the catalog opined.

In the 2009 Decoy Magazine profile, Hopkins described one rig of goose decoys Safford made in the 1920s for his hunting stand. "These birds were unique, designed for attachment to flat iron triangles that were left out on the marsh for the entire season. The birds are intelligent in design," made from laminated boards of varying lengths instead of solid blocks of wood, which are more prone to splitting. Safford's earlier birds had plain heads, no glass eyes and little carved detail. "The best, however, are elegant, finely formed throughout with further delicate shaping around the head and bill," said Hopkins, adding, "Safford's paint is clean and certain."

Although the sleeping goose auctioned in July holds the record high price for one of Safford's birds, it's not the only one that put him on the map. In 1998, Bay State artist Bob Piscatori won the Massachusetts Waterfowl Stamp competition with a painting of a Charles Safford straightheaded goose.

Fred Thurlow of Newbury once owned the decoy pictured on the stamp, and believes it was the fame brought on by the stamp that sparked interest in Safford and his decoys.

Thurlow said that goose decoy was among several his relatives found in the attic of his great-uncle's house – rented for a time by Safford – where Thurlow lives now. A decoy-collecting friend of Thurlow's found out he had decoys and pestered him about selling a goose. "I sold him the decoy for \$500 quite a while ago," Thurlow said.

That bird became Piscatori's model for the waterfowl stamp, and, as Thurlow suggested, "That's the one that started the prices going up."

In 2022, a sleeping Canada goose carved from a single piece of wood by Safford sold for \$96,000 (with a presale estimate of \$100,000-200,000) at a Copley Fine Art auction. Although it wasn't as intricately pieced together as Safford's six-figure record-setter, this goose has a more detailed paint job than others found in the same rig on Plum Island.

In the Copley auction catalog, Robert Shaw, a curator and author, said the sleeping goose was elaborately detailed with "prominent wing and feather paint pattern ... unique among Stafford's full-bodied geese."

According to Shaw, "Safford rigorously planned every inch of his birds, using precisely measured patterns he sketched around on each side of their bodies before he started carving. The whole decoy is a symphony of interacting lines and fluid curves that keep the viewer's eye in constant motion."

So how do you identify a full-size Stafford decoy? Smolar says some of Safford's birds have "C.A. Safford" branded on the bottom, but even if they are unmarked, his style is unique. "They're easy to identify," he said. "Nobody else made a goose like him."
