Scottie dogs took the 20th century by storm


Scottie Mania was a craze that swept Great Britain and North America shortly after the stock market crash of 1929, and it lasted well into the late 1950s.

While the Scottish Terrier had been around in Great Britain as a working dog since the mid-1800s, it didn't make it to American shores until 1883. A few years later the breed was recognized by the American Kennel Club, and by 1900 thecottie American Scottish Terrier Club was formed. With this, the Scottie Dog made a huge leap from the barnyard into the show ring, and by the late 1920s the spunky little pooch had made its way from the show ring into the hearts and homes of dog lovers everywhere.

The kick-off for Scottie mania began with a book written by Rudyard Kipling called, "Thy Servant a Dog." It was told from the perspective of Kipling's pet Scottie named Boots – and in an amusing way that expressed how a dog understands the English language.

Kipling filled the pages with adventures of Boots and his sidekick Slippers, the shenanigans of their scallywag friends, encounters with a spiteful kitchen cat, and the love, guidance and protection of the people with whom they lived. It hit store shelves on both sides of the Atlantic on June 6, 1930.

To whet the appetites of readers and drum up interest, the day after the book appeared, excerpts from Kipling's story—illustrated by Herbert M. Stoops—appeared in America's Liberty Magazine. Cassell's Magazine in England followed suit and released the same story with

illustrations by George L. Stampa — a popular British artist for Punch magazine.

The marketing ploy was a huge success, and the book sold 100,000 copies in the first six months.

Two versions of the first edition were printed, one for America and the other for England. Kipling chose famous dog artist Marguerite Kirmse, of Bridgewater, Conn., and George L Stampa, the Englishman who illustrated Cassell's Magazine article on Thy Servant a Dog, to illustrate the books.

Since there was only one printing of the Kirmse edition, as opposed to three reprints of the Stampa version, it is a

Western Inn sign did not disappoint during Jeffers Thanksgiving event

DELAWARE, Ohio — Great Estates Annual Thanksgiving Weekend at The Garth's Barn continues to be a "must attend" event kicking off the holiday season. Amelia Jeffers Auctioneers & Appraisers, under her "Great Estates" company name offered material during this two-day event that was astounding.

The first day featured the Lifetime Collection of Robert Horn. Taking top honors was the "Western Inn" tavern sign thought to have once hung on the Stage Coach Inn in North Georgetown, Ohio. Dated 1851, the sign was two-sided with one side being a a forest scene with a tom, hen, and jenny turkey family; reverse with a dreamy oasis scene with palm trees and water. Gray shaded in red lettering on the sign declared "WESTERN INN by G. ABRAHAM" with the 38.25 inch high by 40 inch wide sign presented in a forged iron oval frame with a scrolled sheet metal crest. This beauty sold for \$102,000. Prices include a 20 percent buyer's premium.

According to the auction catalog, research on the potential origin of the sign lead to the discovery of a historical marker on the former "Stage Coach Inn" in North Georgetown, Ohio (which burned down in 2019) that read "Stage Coach Inn; Built in

1822 by Samuel Long Sturgeon as "Western Inn." A favorite stop for stage coach-

es enroute from Pittsburgh to Massillon, where travelers continued by boat on the old Ohio canal or by other coaches to the west. Presented by Tjaatje Dewitt Chapter, National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century."



offered with the 23 inch high by 40 inch wide, full-bodied steer attributed to Cushing & White (1870-1920) bringing \$24,000. This example featured a bovine with a cast iron head, copper ears, and a copper body. An American late 19th century copper, zinc, and lead full-bodied running horse with jockey weathervane sold for \$8,100.

Folk art of all kinds was prevalent. A carved and inlaid slide lid wood box or etui by John Nicholas Matthesiee (1805-1880) sold for \$15,600. Made of stained tiger maple, the box featured an incised design and inlaid ivory and nacre flowers, an inlaid brass shield with the letters "AKB", and a shell-carved lid with a push-button mechanism and dovetailed incised brass butt plate revealing a blue velvet-lined interior. The underside had three ivory button feet and was signed "J.N. Matthesiee" who was a gunsmith in Bedford County, Pennsylvania.

Leading the furniture this day was a mid 18th century, diminutive American (New England) Queen Anne tavern (or tea) table made of maple and pine which realized \$16,200. Having an oval two-board top which wore its original worn blue gray paint, the pegged constructed base featured tapered turned legs and biscuit feet, and an apron with quarter round edge, all wearing original reddish-brown paint.

A painted, pine Pennsylvania bucket bench with a deep top shelf, lobe shaped ends, two lower single panel doors with center stiles and shaped cut feet; all dressed in its original dark red paint made \$10,200, while a miniature transitional chest of drawers by Andrew Shelter sold for \$9,900. Made of cherry, pine, poplar, with birdseye maple veneered drawers

fronts, this Sheraton to Empire-styled mini at 11.25 inches high was signed on the back of its top drawer, "Made By Andrew Shelter for Glizo Potts 1837."

Day Two brought to buyers the Lifetime Collections of Carol Schulman, Joanne and David Woodyard plus additions. Day Two also marked a milestone event around lot 772.

"It hit me around lot 750 that we had to be closing in on the million dollar hammer mark for both days," Jeffers said. "With some quick number crunching, I figured out, as I opened lot 772 for bids, if it sold for more than \$200, we'd be there. When those four wallking brought \$325, I stopped selling and told the audience what had just happened. It was quite an exciting moment for us all."

Getting to that milestone was made easier with the selling of the day's headliner; a chip carved maple box incised and painted

red, black, and green; the top being decorated with flowers, a willow tree, scrolls, and geometric motifs. The front was also decorated but with a colonial house surmounted by birds along with trees, flowers, and geometric motifs. The sides were done in a checkerboard pattern with floral and geometric motifs with carved, shaped, and sunken nail holes along the edges. This beauty measured 8.5 inches high by 14.5 inches wide and 8 inches deep and sold for \$66,000.

Other folk art items that surprised included the two figural carved butter paddles both sporting carved birds at the ends of their handles. One paddle was tiger maple; the other simply maple. Each measure around 8 inches high. They sold together for \$16,800.

A full length folk art portrait of a mariner's daughter, circa 1810, New England oil on canvas mounted on board image showed a sweet young girl wearing a full-length white dress with pink trim. She also held a bonnet decorated with cherries and was wearing a necklace. The background of the portrait shows an American sailing ship. This image sold within estimate bringing \$18,000.

A Massachusetts diminutive Chippendale block front chest of drawers crafted

"The block front sold to a buyer in the room," Jeffers said. "Towards the end of the bidding, when it was down to two people, the buyer in the room was pausing; hesitant to continue, so I said, 'Imagine what it will cost to ship one to you from New York, if you are able to find another like it.' This buyer continued, won it, and took the chest home that same day."

Jeffers continued, "I am tired of seeing Ohio and Indiana collections go to New England to be sold; even if its New England material. I feel there is no need, especially with today's online marketplace. Consignors are recognizing our auction company, here in Ohio, can get the same dollar amount; often more, than if the pieces were taken somewhere else to be sold."

The final sale total for this 2024 Thanksgiving event (including buyer's premium) was \$1.4 million.

Crocker Farm to offer impressive Wahler collection of Southern stoneware

SPARKS, Md. — Crocker Farm, Inc. will be selling the collection of Knoxville, Tenn., ceramics collector, Carole Carpenter Wahler, in an online auction running from Jan. 22-31. Featuring 300 lots of American stoneware and redware pottery, the sale is heavily focused on major 19th century potting centers of the South and will include representative pieces from Tennessee, Alabama, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Virginia. Wahler, a leading scholar on Tennessee pottery, spent 50 years studying Southern-made ceramics and amassing her impressive collection, which includes a number of iconic, published works. "Much of what is known today about Tennessee stoneware and redware is thanks to Carole. She was both a collector and an educator on the material. Her astute eye for exceptional examples of Southern pottery is evidenced by this sale," said Crocker Farm, Inc. principal, Anthony Zipp.

Several of the sale's highlights are masterworks from Tennessee, where Wahler lived most of her life. Among these is an outstanding salt-glazed stoneware face jug marked by Cookeville, Tenn., potter, John A. Roberts. Featuring the highly important inscription, "The Hon. Frederick Dougless," on the reverse, the jug was likely made to commemorate abolitionist, Frederick Douglass, upon his death in 1895. Mark Zipp, partner at Crocker Farm, Inc., said, "The sculptural quality, condition, and large signature make this one of the best Tennessee pottery face vessels known, but the inscription for Douglass places it on an

extraordinary level of historical significance."

Another Tennessee highlight is an extremely rare stoneware water cooler with incised floral motif inscribed "Made by Jn Floyd / June 30 1857 / Knox Couty Tenn." Its decoration was inspired by earlier Manhattan motifs, suggesting Floyd, who was born in Virginia, had spent part of his life working with a New-York-trained potter.

Redware from the state is headlined by an extremely rare lead-and-manganese-glazed jar, stamped "J.A. LOWE,"

for Greene County, Tennessee potter, John Alexander Lowe. Made circa 1852-1862, the jar survives as one of a few intact, signed pieces known by this potter and set an auction record for a

piece of Tennessee-made pottery at Case Auctions in 2008. The work of an associate of Lowe, Christopher Alexander Haun, will also be represented. Known as both a highly skilled potter and Civil War hero, Haun participated in the burning of a Confederate railroad bridge along Greene County's Lick Creek in an act of solidarity with the Union. Captured and convicted of treason by Confederate forces, Haun was hung on December 11, 1861, asking his wife in a moving letter shortly before his execution to "have Bohanan, Hinshaw or Low to finish off that ware and do the best you can with it for your support." A marked Haun jar with lead-and-manganese glaze and an unmarked jar with copper glaze are among his works to be sold.

Among Wahler's most famous pieces is a Union County, S.C., alkaline-glazed stoneware jug bearing the elaborate incised inscription, "Aug the 30 / 1864 / Maid an Sold at / A low price fore Confedeent / Money by me Thomas Ownbey." She had acquired it at Harmer Rooke Galleries auction in 1992, when it was sold in part one of the collection of legendary stoneware authority, Georgeanna Greer. The jug, now estimated at \$20/40,000, was the top lot of auction that day, drawing interest for its humorous slogan and rare signature, ultimately selling for

depicting a Federal eagle, this circa 1817 jug (est. \$5/8,000) bears the elusive stamp, "WHEELING POTTERY."

\$18,150 including buyer's premium.

Also from South Carolina is an alkaline-glazed stoneware face harvest jug made in Edgefield, dating to the third quarter of the 19th century. Acquired by Wahler in 1987, the jug is noteworthy for its large size and unusual harvest or "monkey jug" form with rear-facing spout. Also from Edgefield is a very rare alkaline-glazed stoneware jug attributed to enslaved African-American potter, David Drake. Incised "17th october 1836," it dates to an earlier period in Drake's body of work when he was still active at Pottersville, the site where he likely learned to pot. Other Edgefield highlights include an alkaline-glazed stoneware pitcher and jar with two-color slip floral decorations, attributed to Phoenix Factory, circa 1840.

Wahler's interest in Alabama stoneware is shown in a diverse array of pieces from the state's various potting schools. Leading this group is a large alkaline-glazed face vessel in the form of a man's torso made circa 1850-1880. Surviving in remarkable condition and previously owned by collectors, Tony Shank and Pria Harmon, this figural piece is hailed as one of the finest face-decorated pieces known from the state. Other alkaline-glazed pieces include several featuring distinctive sine wave incising as well as an outstanding open-handled jar with lid and profuse impressed decoration. A rare, circa 1830 alkaline-glazed stoneware jug bearing the mark of Tuscaloosa pot-

tery owner, Daniel Cribbs, and a circa 1900 salt-glazed pitcher with profuse incised decoration by C.T. Brown of Rock Mills will also be sold.


North Carolina pottery is headlined by a 15-gallon alkaline-glazed stoneware jar by Vale, N.C., potter, Daniel Seagle, circa 1840. Due to its massive size, the vessel was made with four handles, one of which bears Seagle's impressed initials.

Highlights from other states include

a late 18th or early 19th century Pennsylvania redware charger with inscription, a circa 1900 Georgia stoneware face, which is attributed to William

Anthony Zipp continues, "Wahler's collection has had few rivals. For those interested in Southern pottery, this auction is a once-in-a-generation opportunity, a sale not to be missed."

Willie the penguin made smoking 'Kool' for this brand

Willie the Penguin became the animated mascot of Kool cigarettes in 1934; however, Willie evolved from a much more primitive penguin.

The Brown & Williamson Corporation launched Penguin cigarettes in 1931. Penguin cigarettes were unfiltered 70-millimeter menthol cigarettes that featured a penguin with its beak raised as the cigarettes' mascot. Brown & Williamson changed their cigarette brand's name from Penguin to Kool in 1933. The penguin mascot was kept in order to create an aura of "coolness" and due to its popularity with younger smokers and children. The penguin remained unnamed and was simply called "the penguin."

In 1934, the Ted Bates Advertising Agency created Willie the Penguin as the Kool cigarette mascot by transforming the unnamed penguin and giving him a personality. During the 1930s, cartoonish mascots were popular, such as Kellogg's Snap, Crackle, & Pop, Buster Brown, and Campbell's Kids.

Kool used Willie's image on a number of collectible products, including ashtrays, wooden match holders, salt and pepper shakers, and even air-conditioning units. Willie the Penguin also had his own line of comic books when Standard Comics licensed Willie to appear in six comic issues; however, Standard Comics insisted that the Kool cigarette brand be dropped from the comic books.

Like all good mascots, legends swirl around Willie. For instance, Willie & Millie plastic salt and peppershakers are, arguably, the most popular of all Willie collectibles. The manufacturer of these salt and pepper shakers (F&F Mold and Die Works of Dayton, Ohio) printed Willie's and Millie's names on the chest of each molded shaker. These figural salt and peppershakers were a mail-order premium for Kool cigarettes. For 25 cents and two Kool package wrappers, Kool would mail a set to anyone


Left: Willie the Penguin, circa 1938, Kool bar and tabletop electric lighter. In working order, this electric cigarette lighter is valued at \$1,400.



guin with a black bow tie and top hat, but Millie came from a whole different mold. She was one "Kool" woman with dreamy bedroom eyes and painted lashes. She appeared ready for anything with a big red bow on her head and red beads around her neck.

Another area of Willie collectables is found in old advertising posters. Kool wanted its cigarettes to be popular with men, so in the 1930s Willie started appearing in all types of masculine activities, such as fishing, golfing, sledding, sailing a boat, and participating, wearing a little jockey cap, in the 1936 Kentucky Derby. In one ad, Willie is seen floating down a river in a bright red lifesaver, suggesting that Kool cigarettes are "as refreshing as a dip in the ocean." Most of these poster ads depict Willie smoking or holding a Kool cigarette.

While Willie's name was not mentioned in the earliest Kool advertising posters, by the late 1930s the posters called Willie by name. As his popularity soared, Millie was added to the fun and excitement depicted in the posters so women were sure to get the message




Above: Willy the Penguin World War II poster, circa 1945, that is valued at \$400.

that Kool cigarettes were for "Kool" women.

The manufacturer of these salt and pepper shakers (F&F Mold and Die Works of Dayton, Ohio) printed Willie's and Millie's names on the chest of each molded shaker. These figural salt and peppershakers were a mail-order premium for Kool cigarettes. For 25 cents and two Kool package wrappers, Kool would mail a set to anyone

Willie was something of a plain pen-


Left: Willie the Penguin, circa 1938, Kool bar and tabletop electric lighter. In working order, this electric cigarette lighter is valued at \$1,400.



guin with a black bow tie and top hat, but Millie came from a whole different mold. She was one "Kool" woman with dreamy bedroom eyes and painted lashes. She appeared ready for anything with a big red bow on her head and red beads around her neck.

Another area of Willie collectables is found in old advertising posters. Kool wanted its cigarettes to be popular with men, so in the 1930s Willie started appearing in all types of masculine activities, such as fishing, golfing, sledding, sailing a boat, and participating, wearing a little jockey cap, in the 1936 Kentucky Derby. In one ad, Willie is seen floating down a river in a bright red lifesaver, suggesting that Kool cigarettes are "as refreshing as a dip in the ocean." Most of these poster ads depict Willie smoking or holding a Kool cigarette.

While Willie's name was not mentioned in the earliest Kool advertising posters, by the late 1930s the posters called Willie by name. As his popularity soared, Millie was added to the fun and excitement depicted in the posters so women were sure to get the message




Above: Willy the Penguin World War II poster, circa 1945, that is valued at \$400.

that Kool cigarettes were for "Kool" women.

Even as cigarette smokers have dropped in number, collectors of cigarette memorabilia have grown. Today, there are several different types of cigarette collectibles, but as Willie the Penguin collectors have discovered, Willie is the "Koolest" cigarette item to collect.



Scottie Dogs

coveted rarity to collectors and commands a much higher price than the English

Suddenly Scottie Dogs were all the rage and the breeds' popularity soared. Thousands of Scottie images appeared in newspapers and magazines, and spilled over onto greeting cards, household goods, knick-knacks, toys, textiles, jewelry and more.

There were several famous artists whose subjects became Scottie Dogs during the early years of Scottie mania. Lucy Dawson, a well-known dog artist from England, signed her work "Mac." Her drawings were featured on many types of early ephemera including collectible canine series cigarette cards and postcards. Lucy also invited Scotties into her studio while she sketched, and many of her works feature the names of her dog models.

Beatrix Potter of Peter Rabbit fame also owned a Scottish Terrier. In her book, "The Tale of Samuel Whiskers," Potter illustrated a brave and resourceful Scottie named "John Joiner" who rescued Tom Kitten from certain death.

Daisy was the name of writer E.B. White's (Charlotte's Web) black Scottie Dog. Daisy was tragically killed in New York City after being struck by an out-of-control taxicab in December of 1931. White was heartbroken and wrote a touching obituary for her that appeared in The New Yorker — it ended with these words, "She died sniffing life, and enjoying it."

The most influential artist of the era, however, was Morgan Dennis — owner of two Scotch Terriers named Jock and Jill. Dennis was one of America's most famous dog book illustrators.

In 1930, he sold the rights to his drawing called "Listen," which featured a pair of black Scotties with their heads cocked, to Texaco Oil Company. Soon thereafter, Listen appeared in printed advertisements encouraging patrons to switch their automobile oil to the Texaco brand, and the imagery was accompanied by the slogan "Listen (to the engine) You can hear the difference!"

Texaco also hired Hubley and Vindex (a division of National Sewing Machine) to duplicate "Listen" into cast iron door stops and lamp bases. They gave these away to employees and contest prize winners, and sold them at their service stations.

In 1931, black Bakelite Scottie pins, mounted on Texaco advertising cards, were given away as premiums and Listen was also duplicated on celluloid pin-back buttons, framed prints, key fobs, decals, stickers, matchbooks and store signs. The Texaco Scotties, sitting with the company's Star logo, were used in magazine advertising as late as 1959.

Morgan Dennis was also approached by Black & White Scotch Whiskey in 1930 to create advertising based on his Scottish and West Highland Terrier drawing titled Black and White. Dennis agreed to the proposal and created "Blackie & Whitey," the most dynamic advertising duo of all time. The Scottie and Westie mascots still appear, to this day, on the bottle label.

The silver screen also helped to catapult the breed into fame. Grace Drayton, creator of the iconic Campbells Kids, was hired by RKO to draw a pair of impish black Scotties that appeared in promotional material for the 1930 film Check & Double Check, which featured



comedians Amos and Andy.

When famous people and movie stars began to appear in public with their pets, the Scottie's popularity soared and it suddenly became all the rage to own one. Joan Crawford, for instance, had several Scotties and used them to promote her fame. In 1933, Morgan Dennis drew a portrait of Joan with her puppy Sadie, which was named after a prostitute character she played in the 1932 film Rain.

In 1935, Joan got a new Scottie Dog that was named Woggles, after it was chosen from hundreds of entries in a Find a Name for Joan Crawford's New Pet Scottie contest. Woggles became so popular he even had his own fan club. Her other Scotties were named Typhoon and Puppy Dearest.

Throughout the 1930s and 40s there were many famous owners of the breed including Bette Davis, Humphrey Bogart, Julie Andrews, Jane Wyman, Mrs. Wallace Simpson, and America's child sweetheart Shirley Temple, who owned a Scottie named Corky. In the 1935 film Our Little Girl, Shirley co-starred with a black Scottie named "Sniff."

Several presidents also owned Scotties. Franklin Roosevelt's constant companion was Fala, who became one of the most famous presidential dog of all time. Fala helped to popularize the breed throughout the 1940s. Dwight Eisenhower's favorite dog was a Scottie named Telek, and George and Laura Bush had two Scotties named Barney and Miss Beazley.

Throughout Scottie Mania, the jaunty pup found its way onto hundreds of decorative household items, novelties and personal accessories. From trendy clothing decorated with whimsical embroidery and appliques, to silhouettes that were hand-knit into vests and sweaters, the Scottie was a stylish fashion icon. And because there were a multitude of Scottie products made from cast metal, plastics, glass, chalkware, wood and paper, there are no shortages of antique and collectible Scottish Terrier items today.

What began as a book published in 1930, became a national obsession with the spirited little dog. And through the artistic expression of writers, illustrators and filmmakers, and the affection of celebrities, presidents and dog lovers everywhere, the Scotch Terrier reigned happily as the Top Dog of the 20th century.
