Orange you glad this fruit came along to power collectibles

Santa Claus is coming with his "good things", the "Edgefield (South Carolina) Advertiser reported in December 1858.

"Little girls and boys get your bags and stockings ready to hang on Friday the 24th," the newspaper advised. Among those good things listed was the beginning of the tradition of giving oranges as Christmas presents.

One Michigan grandmother remembered receiving an orange in the bottom of her stocking as a turn-of-the-20th century child. It was a "mysterious fruit" shipped all the way from an exotic place called Florida, a small piece of sunshine in the midst of a blustery Midwestern winter, her grandson later wrote.


Another earlier 20th century woman got her Christmas stocking orange as a child along with a piece of coal. Hardly a punishment, the coal was a reminder of how her family kept their West Virginia home warm in the winter. But the orange she received was the only one she would eat until next Christmas in Depression-era America.

Orange is the favorite flavor among juices, and a top seller in candies, sodas, gums, and frozen desserts today. Over the years, orange flavor has also generated a steller assortment of antiques and collectibles that remain popular with collectors.

Before bananas became a standing

Vaudeville joke, orange peels were considered a pedestrian hazard in post-Civil War America. "Now that oranges

increases," a New Orleans newspaperman wrote in 1865. Shipped in wooden crates with a stenciled grower's name, fresh oranges became a seasonal staple in general stores with the spread of the railroads, especially refrigerated boxcars, over the latter 19th century.


To exacerbate the problem, both catalogers Montgomery Wards and Sears, Roebuck sold mass-produced orange peelers starting in the 1880s. Made of bone, ivory or metals like silver or steel, peelers were the civilized means to pare tough-skinned oranges. Most sell for less than \$50 in the present day depending on their material. Bright orange plastic Tupperware peelers could be had for less than \$10.

Wave your pennant high to support your favorite team


In the early 1900s, students didn't wear t-shirts and hats to show support of their favorite teams. Instead, they most often waved a felt pennant attached to a slender dowel rod. The pennant would be adorned with the name of the team or college and often a graphic representing a specific sport.

Football pennants were especially popular and followed the sport as it grew around college campuses.

For nearly 100 years one of the most popular stadium souvenirs has been the team pennant. Many pennants from the early 1900s were works of art and several of them were nearly 35 inches long.

It didn't take long for manufacturers to capitalize on this light-weight souvenir. In 1908, an upstart company named The Reproduction Co. of New York City changed the way pennants

were made. That's because this firm found a way to make screen printing commercially viable.

"One of the oldest pennant companies to manufacture these collectibles was the Reproduction Pennant Company," says Ben Kozik, founder and owner of Mantiques online antique shop out of North Carolina. "People see these and they think the pennants are reproductions, but that was just the name of the company. Pennants from this company are authentic.

And, there were many others jumping on this pennant bandwagon."

Kozik has been a pennant enthusiast and collector the past 40 years.

Pook & Pook's debut modern art auction surpasses expectations

DOWNINGTOWN, Pa. — On July 16, Pook & Pook hosted its first specialty auction devoted to modern and post-war art, benefiting an East Coast educational institution. The results were impressive: more than 500 exceptional lots of paintings, prints, quality posters, and sculptures drew over 8,500 registered bidders. The event generated a total of \$1.24 million and achieved a 100% sell-through rate.

Pook & Pook has earned a strong reputation for assisting museums and institutions — ranging from the Smithsonian to local schools — in the careful deaccessioning of collection items. Although the auctioneer is best known for its premier sales of period furniture and traditional art, this foray into a large-scale offering of modern and post-war fine art required thoughtful preparation. Marketing efforts reached hundreds of thousands of potential buyers through a variety of channels.

"In the early 1900s the pennants were either wool or felt, and they were stitched. Some were made of leather, and those are a bit harder to find and much more valuable," Kozik said.

"Any pennant that has that nostalgic look with a date, sports figure, or game score will draw more attention and draw the higher value," he said. "A pennant, say, from an obscure college may be worth more because they didn't make as many."

First-generation felt pennants around 1900 were hand-made. Many of them were cut by hand with scissors, causing slight variations from one pennant to the next. Within a few years, however, this would change. By

1910, power sewing machines and dye cutters helped manufacturers produce increasingly more intricate designs, which only made the felt pennant's popularity increase.

Mike Connor, a frequent vendor at

the monthly Urbana Flea Market in Ohio, collects and sells a wide range of vintage sporting goods. He recently sold a large portion of his collection of old college and pro football pennants at auction in Dallas, Texas. Connor found it difficult at time to accurately date some of his pennants.

"If you collect baseball cards, you know there's a bounty of books, websites and other materials available documenting everything you ever wanted to know about your hobby," Connor said. "You can find out who made the card, when it was made, where they made it and its value based on its condition. The same goes for stamp and coin collecting. I wish I

could say the same for felt pennants and banners. Sadly, we can only make assessments about the decade a piece was made. And that's usually where the information completely dries up."

Connor says pennant collectors have one resource, though, and that's Mike Egner's "Vintage Pennant Price Guide," a survey of the best pennants available for most professional sports teams through 1970. The guide includes 2,200 baseball and football pennants spanning 348 pages.

"Pennants generally bear little information on them identifying their date of production," Connor said. "Many early college football pennants lack any reference to a year."

The 1940s and 1950s are often considered the "golden age" of pennant making, with unique artwork and hand-painted graphics. In these two decades the mix of felt blends that contained increasingly less wool, cut with other materials such as cotton and rayon, a synthetic fiber. The trademarking of team logos and mascots in the 1960s led to a decline in pennant production, as many manufacturers couldn't afford licensing fees. Today, pennants are experiencing a resurgence, with fans and institutions looking to create custom pennants.

"We are particularly thrilled with the results of this auction," said cataloger Cynthia Beech Lawrence, adding, "In several cases, our auction prices realized crossed over into gallery price levels." Participants came from across the globe, with 70 percent new customers, contributing to many amounts soaring well above estimates.


Outstanding pieces crossed the block at all levels of bidding. The standout was a 1970s Salvador Dalí (Spanish, 1904–1989) bronze that commanded \$100,000 — twice its high estimate. Titled "Toreador hallucinogène aux cuillères," the 82-inch sculpture was created by Dalí using various objects from the home of his associate and financier, Alex Rosenberg, who later established the Salvador Dalí Research Center. Provenance was to the Alex and Carole Rosenberg Collection.

Two additional Dalí works claimed the second and third highest prices of the day. A set of original copper etching plates from "The Twelve Tribes of Israel" (1973), also with Rosenberg provenance, soared to \$88,750 — ten times the pre-sale estimate. Another complete set of 13 original drypoint etchings with watercolor from the same series, all pencil signed, brought \$78,750, similarly outperforming expectations. Fifteen other Dalí pieces fetched from \$550 to \$12,500.

Twenty-one more lots pulled solid five-figure sums. Nine were by Leonid Sokov (Soviet Russian/American, 1941-2018), a founding member of Sots Art, a nonconformist Soviet movement that defied the state-sanctioned style of Socialist Realism. His works ranged from "Stalin/ David - Underbirch," a 66 by 48-inch 1992 oil on plywood depicting Stalin as Michelangelo's David, which fetched \$10,625, to "Three Train Stations in Moscow," a 67 by 90-inch oil bearing a Soviet metal emblem, which topped out at \$37,500. In total, over 100 Sokov works were offered.

Also achieving five-figures was a 1976 lithograph portfolio titled, "Our Unfinished Revolution," by Alexander Calder (American, 1898-1976), pencil signed and numbered, which reached \$20,000. 

paper mounted to Masonite, which garnered \$9,375. A 22 by 17-inch color serigraph titled Air Frame (1965) by Helen Frankenthaler (American, 1928–2011) reached \$5,750. An offer of \$4,250 scored a 32-inch painted wood piece dated 1985 by Igor Chelkovski (Soviet Russian/French, b.

Over 300 lots sold in the hundreds, offering wide accessibility to collectors. Examples included a 25 by 20-inch signed/numbered Op Art serigraph from 1975 entitled, "Pengo-Z" by Victor Vasarely (Hungarian/ French 1906-1997) that made it to \$875. Vasarely is considered the father of Op Art, which uses brightly-colored geometric patterns that are perceived as fluctuating movement by the eye. numbered, matched that amount. A tidy \$500 picked up a 30 by 28-inch wall plaque crafted from found wood and metal by Giglio Dante (American, 1916-2007), while separate \$425 bids scored two 1970s-era steel stress sculptures by another Russian non-conformist artist, Oleg Sohanievich (Soviet Russian, 1935-2017). Six more of his works sold between \$200 and \$375.

Most works that brought under \$100 were photographs, posters, and prints. Notable exceptions included a 1992 oil on canvas by Maile Dickenson named "Spirit Walk to Find the Totem of Your Soul,"



which went for \$87.50, while a collection of four color etchings on BFK Rives paper by Michel Mathonnat (French, b. 1944), from the Rosenberg Collection, generated the same. Other items, like a 24-inch-tall gun metal water jug, crafted in 1973 by American sculptor Robert Blanchard, that was taken home for a mere \$62.50 were modest sales that contributed to this debut event's resounding success.



Minton boar head tureen eats up a \$32,500 bid

WOLCOTTVILLE, Ind. — A majolica Minton boar's head tureen turned heads and kept the bids rolling during a recent five-day auction conducted by Strawser. If you think the prices of glassware have dropped, consider attending an auction held by Strawser Auctions.

The boar's head was the lid of the serving piece and was cut just below the eyes to leave the bottom half for the serving portion. It was created in muted greens and browns, with just a touch of yellow added to complete the finished piece. It still had the original matching fitted tray and is considered the rarest of all Minton majolica game tureens. It sold for \$32,500.

A second Minton majolica piece brought an impressive final bid of \$25,000. This was a beautiful blue and green table tripod jardiniere that stood on three legs, featuring some amazing decorative elements. The top was a shallow bowl with a muted blue color, designed to hold any type of liquid, such as water or soup. Just below this bowl were three human faces with what appeared to have rams' horns and curly hair. There was a darker blue around the base of the bowl, which made the faces stand out wonderfully. Flowing down the three legs were some green ivy pieces that tied the entire piece together. It dated to 1858 and was made by Baron Marochetti, model number 718. It stood 40 inches tall. It was flawlessly made and presented a museum-quality

Bringing in an impressive bid of \$17,000 was a Minton fountain. It was in the form of a large acanthus leaf and had a floral base. It measured 8 by 17 inches with a large wicker and daisy basin which measured 10 by 23 inches. There was a dolphin on a rock base holding the wicker and daisy bowl.

A cistern also placed high in the selling price of Minton. Baron Marochetti designed this cistern. It stood on four paw feet with two entwined snake handles on either end. The body had some leafy and trailing foliage, and a lion's head mask was positioned on either side below the rim. It measured about 4 feet long and 28 inches wide. It had an impressed Minton mark and a shape number 719 on the base. It still retained

excellent color and detail. The final selling price was \$16,000.

A large Minton majolica harvest ewer sold for \$6,500. Pierre Emile Jeannest modeled this piece. The body had cherubs lying in a wood surrounded by vine leaves and branches. The base and body were molded with flower hops against textured gray ground. Below the spout was a pair of putti holding a head terminal. It had a Minton mark and model number 549 impressed on the base, along with a date code of 1861. It measured roughly 12 by 12 inches and still retained excellent color and detail, and was in great condition.

A very fine Majolica vase or umbrella stand sold for \$4,000. This was a stork with fish and three-dimensional flower blossoms. It was signed by Krause and stood 22 inches tall.

Switching just a bit to figurine pieces, a Staffordshire Naval officer figurine sold for \$4,500. This piece did have a professional repair to the base and the coat of the officer. This officer was holding the aristocratic pose with his righthand fingers tucked inside his shirt. The flowing jacket was a deep Navy blue, and his hat was settled just right on his head. He wore white pants and black boots that rose to his knees. This Staffordshire figure had found a new

Following not too far behind, the Naval officer was a Staffordshire pair of gilded rabbits. They measured about 5 by 10 inches. They did have a professional base repair to the right rabbit, but the selling price of \$2,400 showed this didn't bother the bidders too much.

Standing just over 13 inches tall was a Krause majolica decanter. This was a giraffe figural piece that had a professional repair to the ears and hat. This piece sold for \$5,500.

Selling for the same price of \$5,500 was a Hugo Lonitz pair of birds and bird nest wall pockets. There was a tiny hairline crack on the back of one. These measured about 9 by 7 inches.

was sold for \$2,750. This majolica maple leaf and wicker toast rack had one leaf that was professionally repaired. It measured 8 by 5 inches.

A beautiful conversation piece sold for \$2,300. A Sarreguemines majolica quail platter was responsible for this bid. There were three quail pecking wheat. It was set in a woodland scene and featured leaves, ponds, lilies, and foliage details. The rim was adorned with oak leaves and branches, set against a vibrant cobalt background. It measured 24 by 16 inches.

An item that surprised many people with its selling price was a lot of 15 castiron dollhouse furniture pieces. It consisted of a small table with two chairs, seven different small tables, a bed, two side chairs, a couch, and a three-legged footstool. They were in played with condition but still in excellent shape. It took a bid of \$3,750 to secure this tiny

A second set of cast-iron dollhouse items sold for \$2,000. These all came with their boxes, which were unpacked from inside the original shipping box. A granite-ware looking washer machine, a stand, and a kettle to heat the water on, a double tub rinsing area, and a mangle iron completed the set.

Three unusual oil lamps turned up the prices. Manufactured by the Consolidated Lamp and Glass Company was a miniature oil lamp that stood less than 10 inches tall. It was made to resemble Santa Claus, who was depicted standing with his arms crossed and wearing black boots that reached above his knees. This unusual piece brought a final bid price of \$2,750. A Vaseline uranium glass miniature oil lamp had clear feet. It stood just over 8 inches tall and drew a final bid of \$2,500.

A skeleton bisque figural miniature

oil lamp attracted a fair share of bids. This one stood just under 6 inches tall. It showed the skeleton from the waist up who appeared to be very happy with a big grin showing all his teeth. He was impressed with the bids to own him, which ran to \$2,000 before it was marked sold.





Jenny Lind continues to sing in collectors' hearts

The Dyer-Botsford Doll Museum in Dyersville, Iowa, features among other things a massive portrait of Jenny Lind.

James Dyer, a 27-year old Englishman, came to Iowa in 1847 and became immensely wealthy riverboat investments. He entertained President Ulysses S. Grant and other famous dignitaries. One such dignitary was the "Swedish Nightingale," Jenny Lind, who was called the "darling of Europe" before she toured America, singing opera and ballads in over 100 different shows for the famous showman P. T. Barnum. Most of her shows were held along the eastern seaboard, but she did venture inland for a few shows. One such show was held in the opera house in Dyersville, Iowa.

Lind was famous before coming to America in 1850, but by September of 1850 she was the most celebrated woman in America, and, in many people's opinion, she was the world's first entertainment superstar and America's "songbird." Her popularity and her wealth would easily have topped 21st century entertainers.


Barnum spent a fortune advertising Lind, before he ever met her, and offered her the largest singing contract of the 19th century when he paid her \$1,000 per night for 150 performances. On every poster advertising her performances, Lind was shown in often elegant, lowcut dresses. However, Lind was a morally straight, humble woman who wore plain white clothing while performing and always wore simple, plain makeup.

In her portraits, including the one at the Dyer-Botsford mansion, Lind appeared to be a self-confidant woman with average looks and above average clothes. Poet Nathaniel Parker Willis said of Lind's portraits, "Her likeness is never quite what the average person has of Lind in his or her mind."

In her short time here, Jenny Lind captivated American hearts and imaginations. Streets, cities, towns, buildings, ships, furniture and stagecoach trunks were named "Jenny Lind" in her honor. Arkansas has a town called Jenny Lind on its western border. It does not matter that the majority of Americans never saw Jenny Lind or heard her sing.

Today, Jenny Lind still has many admirers in the form of Jenny Lind collectors. When one walks through an antique store or previews items at an antique auction, one will probably encounter the name "Jenny Lind" on all types of furniture, including Jenny Lind baby beds, nightstands, and spindle beds. However, most collectors associate the name Jenny Lind with stagecoach trunks, dating to the 1850s and '60s. When Lind arrived in New York, she brought

several trunks with her, which had been made in London. Trunk makers all over America soon began copying Lind's trunks, calling them "Jenny Lind" trunks.

When looking at Jenny Lind antiques, it is important to remember that "Jenny Lind" is not a brand name. "Jenny Lind" represents a style of furniture and decorator items that began in people's imaginations of the 1840s and continues to this day.

One category of Jenny Lind decorator items that collectors search for is Jenny Lind dolls, which come in a potpourri of styles. There are Jenny Lind paper dolls, which are quite rare; Jenny Lind porcelain head dolls; Jenny Lind half dolls; and Jenny Lind play dolls, which are rare and are often far more valuable than porcelain or manufactured dolls.



Oranges



Post-bellum consumers assumed that all their oranges came from Florida if not overseas. When Western growers sought to enter the orange market, they created the Southern California Fruit Exchange and other cooperatives beginning in 1893. Using stenciled images first, then stone lithography and eventually rotary off-set printing, the renamed Sunkist Growers, Inc. and other growers created colorful labels to adorn their wooden orange crates and set them apart from their stenciled Florida competitors.

The cheapness of colorful lithographic printing and economies of scale meant that a collection of even very old orange and other fruit labels needed not to be overly costly. Most labels sell for \$5 to \$20 depending on the source. Popular themes such as cowboys and Native People, fanciful creatures, military images and pin-up women attracted the most interest and best prices.


Very popular and rare labels had a heyday in the early 2000s. Individual Western citrus labels and collections sold for from \$10,000 to \$250,000. An original "Million Dollar Emperors" label supposedly fetched \$1.5 million in a 2006 California auction with other labels selling for as much as \$20,000 at the same time. New supplies and diminishing interest have returned orange and other fruit labels to more reasonable levels. Even highly desirable labels featuring sports, athletes or politicians can be had for no more than \$500.

Most of Sunkist's early advertising was created by a Chicago-based

advertising agency, Lord and Thomas. Perhaps the best known early Sunkist collectible involved orange juice. Sunkist went to Lord and Thomas owner Albert Lasker with an overproduction problem in 1914. Lasker's famous advertising textbook solution was to re-imagine oranges from a once-a-year Christmas treat to an everyday necessity.

At Lasker's suggestion, Sunkist sold one-piece glass extractors/juicers/reamers for 10-cents in variety stores and 16 cents by mail and encouraged consumers to use two to three oranges per glass, not the previous one, in a "Drink an Orange" ad campaign beginning in the mid-1910s. The growers' overproduction problems were solved in short order.

The original American-made Sunkist reamers were produced in clear green glass followed by white milk, yellow, pink and more than a dozen other colors. Japanese-made reamers entered the market after World War II and U.S. production ended in the 1960s. Tuscan-colored Sunkist reamers sold for more than \$400. Vintage clear green and white milk glass Sunkist juicers can be had for \$30 or less, a cheap start to an orange flavor collection.

Bottled and barreled orange juice was available in colonial America as an alcoholic drink mixer, but the juice grew in popularity as a stand-alone drink in the latter 19th century along with a sweetened homemade version called orangeade. Beginning with the introduction of a non-carbonated version of Orange Crush in 1906, numerous soft drink manufacturers jumped on the Sunkist orange juice bandwagon in the 1910s and especially with the start of Prohibition in 1919.

Carbonated soft drinks were supposed to give the same kind of "burn" like hard liquor.


Chicagoan Amund G. Thompson came up with the idea of "crushing" different orange varieties together, especially "wild" Hawaiian and Sunkist oranges, to create the original Orange Crush flavor. Five years later, Clayton Howel and Neil C. Ward added orange oil, zested from previously tossed orange peels, to formulate a new, carbonated version of Orange Crush. Ward, an industrial chemist who attended Harvard for two weeks, had the better business mind and his Orange Crush memorabilia remains the gold standard for many orange soft drink collectors to this day.

Meanwhile, top-grade antique Orange Crush signs have sold for more than \$6,000. The presence of the "Crushy" character, first seen squeezing oranges in 1911, added to a sign's value. Intact Ward's Orange Crush dispensers, used in soda fountains, were valued at over \$2,000 but Ward's Lemon and Lime Crush dispensers have gone for as much as \$8,000. The dispensers were the front-line pitch in soda manufacturers' advertising strategies, brightly colored temptations that sat enticingly on soda fountain counters

Competitors, both carbonated and non-carbonated, proliferated in the wake of Orange Crush, especially with Prohibition. Also based in Chicago, Orange Kist (close but not quite "Sunkist", which wasn't made into a soda until 1979), appeared in 1919 and copied Orange Crush in any manner they could. Except for their pin-up girl signs, which were patterned on Coca-Cola's calendar women. Advertising and other collectibles for Orange Crush and Kist competitors such as Bireley, Green Spot, Mission, Nehi, Nesbitt's, Pal Ade, Sun Crest, Sun Rise, Tru Ade and Whistle vary in quantity and price but could create an interesting collection.

Orange Kist's management became a little too competitive in August 1933. suburban Chicago cocktail party, according to police.

"He tried to kill me," the wife complained. "He kept telling me 'I'm going to send you to hell'." She eventually dropped charges of assault with a deadly weapon against her husband, and they made up, court records showed. The company remained in business until 1965. All over love of an orange-flavored soft drink.

Ice cream covered with orange syrup was a popular combination in the latter 19th century. The early Orange Kist company also made an ice cream called Orangella before specializing in soda. Popsicle inventor William Epperson supposedly experimented with frozen orange juice "pops" in the early 1900s and Creamsicles, orange-coated ice cream bars, were marketed starting around 1938. Due to rarity some Creamsicle collectibles have sold at auction for more than \$1,000.

Orange juice was firmly established as a morning beverage by the 1950s, but General Foods wanted a powdered orange-flavored drink that was easier than squeezing oranges or adding water to a can of frozen concentrate. Their invention was adopted by the U.S. space program in 1962 because it masked the metallic taste of spacecraft water, and Tang, as it was called, rocketed to fame. So did Tang collectibles, from signs, pitchers and drinkware to Tang lunchboxes, backpacks, clocks and even telephones. Prices range from a few dollars to \$60 or \$70 or more.

Orange-colored telephones are a long stretch from Christmas stocking oranges, but orange remains one of the most beloved fruit flavors. In turn, it also makes for tasty antiques and collectibles. Who knows? With time, a collector might even develop an "orange crush".
