Celebrate the women who helped win World War II

"I wrote this because I knew their stories needed to be told..."

You'll see that sentiment repeated across the books in this article — each author compelled by a commitment to give voice to the often-untold stories of the women of World War II. They served at home and near the front lines, in factories, in uniform, and as civilians. Whether portrayed in a book or recounted personally, the stories of the women who served with strength and conviction during the war years are truly inspiring. For anyone drawn to their history, there's also a world of memorabilia that honors those women who sacrificed in so many ways during the Second World War.

Even before the U.S. officially entered the war, American women began stepping up. They filled vital roles — building aircraft, training pilots, interpreting radar, managing logistics, and keeping morale strong for soldiers and their families. Some were recruited straight from college for their language or science skills, landing in codebreaking units or laboratories. By war's peak, women made up nearly 40 percent of the entire U.S. workforce, proving themselves indispensable to the war effort both at home and abroad.

The welcome wasn't always warm. Women often earned less than men, were mocked for taking on "men's



work," and frequently faced sexual harassment. Women of color dealt with both racism and sexism. Many women worked in hazardous conditions, sometimes with such strict secrecy that many didn't speak of their roles for decades.

Women's military auxiliaries became

a visible way many women served. In 1942, Congress created the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC), and over 150,000 women enlisted, sometimes serving as cartographers, cryptographers, mechanics, and even meteorologists. Initially lacking formal military status, they became full

soldiers in 1943 when WAAC became the Women's Army Corps (WAC), gaining rank, benefits, and equal pay. WACs served in every theater, including Utah Beach after D-Day. Mollie Weinstein Schaffer's memoir, "Mollie's War: The Letters of a World War II WAC in Europe," offers a firsthand look at this experience.

Also in 1942, President Roosevelt signed the Navy Women's Reserve Act, creating the WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service). These women took on aviation support roles such as parachute rigging and radio communications, along with

engineering and other technical duties. In 1948, WAVES became a permanent part of the Navy thanks to the Women's Armed Services Integration Act.

With male combat pilots needed overseas, the U.S. faced a shortage of skilled aviators for support roles. In 1943, the Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP) was formed by merging two earlier groups. Over 1,000 women ferried military planes, flight-tested repaired aircraft, towed gunnery targets, and trained

Pocket watch ticked off a \$2,500 bid at Amanda fall sale

AMANDA, Ohio — On September 14, Amanda Auction Gallery hosted a 300+ lot sale, anchored by the second installment of Ken and Aggie Thatcher's well-regarded Aladdin lamp collection. Rare Aladdin examples in Alacite, Uranium Glass, and other styles — many complete with original burners and shades — drew strong interest. The eclectic catalog also included antique advertising, Persian and Oriental rugs, pocket watches, tobacciana, U.S. coins and currency, and vintage paper currency, among other offerings.

The Aladdin lots were among the strongest attractions of the sale, with two dozen lamps accompanied by a wide array of chimneys, globes, parts, and accessories. Leading the category was an 8-inch-tall base shaped like a rooster and made of beta crystal. Despite a few chips, it achieved the event's second-highest price at \$1,150. A pair of traditional oil lamp bases (one nickel, the other copper) sold for \$375. Close behind was a set of three glass shades (two clear and one frosted), which reached \$325. Also catching bidders' attention was a trio of oil fixtures and bases in red, green, and porcelain with gold trim, which jumped to \$300.

The momentum carried into the more modest end of the parts spectrum. Eleven Aladdin chimneys picked up a tidy \$150, while four assorted Alacite pieces landed \$100. Meanwhile, a bid of \$60 won a trio of milk glass oil lamp shades.

Full lamps, of course, made their mark at the sale. They were led by a duo of a 1939 XL943 and a 1938 G170 Alacite oak leaf ribbed mantel types that left for \$140. Bidding came close at \$110 for

a ruby Lincoln drape No. 23 burnerless model, while a cobalt blue Lincoln drape oil variety with its original box fetched \$100. On the lower end, a pink satin boudoir piece netted \$45, and an Alacite uranium glass table light \$35.

Lighting was just part of the story — the sale featured a rich assortment of merchandise, including eight heirloom rugs that drew notice. The standout was a 232 by 137-inch room-sized Her-

iz carpet from Iran that struck \$1,100, the third-best sum. A more diminutive 28.5 by 21-inch pure silk Turkish prayer rug pulled \$170, while a 42 by 34-inch Southwest storm-pattern rug, boasting strong condition and vibrant hues, found a buyer at \$50.

The variety didn't stop there; personal treasures also made their mark. Among them, eight pocket watches and fobs sparked lively bidding, highlighted by an Elgin 14K pocket watch that soared to the event's top price of \$2,500. While selling for much less, a Hamilton pocket watch held its own at \$180. Even humble watch fobs did nicely, like one featuring an onyx stone encased in a charm, snapped up for \$70.

Smoking and tobacco-related items also saw some surprising activity. Four lots of pipes drew notable bids, led by a \$220 offer for a Cosmoy's Grand Slam pipe store display that hailed from Cannon's Cigar Store in London, Ohio. A London-made GBD Prodigy straightgrain pipe, still in its original box, followed at \$120. Other tobacciana included an original Hassan Cigarettes wonder frame - also from Cannon's - which hammered down at \$450. Later, three separate groups of a dozen Red Man Tobacco Cards each changed hands for \$90.

Two dozen lots featuring silver certificates were presented, with final bids

Antiques in the Woods going strong with new name, owners

COLUMBIANA, Ohio — The lack of rain in northeast Ohio has become a constant source of contemplation and discussion. It's bad. But what might not be great for our flowerbeds and farm crops, lack of rainfall is much appreciated by any and all outdoor activities taking place. The Antiques in the Woods & Vintage Too show held Sept. 5-6 ended up with a strong gate and loads of sales, though the fantastic antiques offered had more to do with that than the lack of rain..

Held on the site of the Shaker Woods Festival; a two-day event in August that features over 200 craft vendors, food trucks and live entertainment, Antiques in the Woods was first introduced more than 20 years ago as an off-shoot of the SWF. Antiques in the Woods also has wonderful food and live entertainment.

And by woods; I mean woods. Throughout the 10 acres of trees and paths that make up the venue (with 60 additional acres of parking), there are small, rustic buildings (some with electric, some without) that dealer participants fill with antiques of all

eras. Fall décor items also make a showing, but the vast majority of items are vintage in the Woods, did some reassessing. Wilt's first love was the artisan-filled Shaker woods Festival and it takes TONS of operations.

While Antiques in the Woods has been a reality for more than 20 years, when Covid struck, Lana Wilt– show manager of both the Shaker Woods Festival and Antiques



ranging from \$20 for a pair of 1934/35 examples to \$70 for a lot of 25 mixed examples. In the coin realm, options ranged from two U.S. Mint proof sets containing all 2012 U.S. coins going for \$15, to a lot featuring a roll of Indian head pennies along with three 1875 Indian head cents, which landed \$110. Additionally, three tubes of 1964 90 percent silver quarters and dimes - containing 8.75 troy ounces of silver in quarters and 5.60 troy ounces in dimes - generated about half their metal value at \$300.

The auction also featured an appealing selection for vintage advertising enthusiasts. Among the highlights was a West German store display of papier-mâché eggs, once showcased in Macy's, won for \$100. A World War II-era "Cannons are Coming" cloth banner hammered at \$110, while a Camel Cigarettes metal door push attracted \$60. Complementing the lighting-themed items was a copper Aladdin hanging card and supply display, which changed hands for a modest \$25.



Fans of ephemera were also well accommodated, with choices like promotional labels, classic comics, and collectible cards. A 1948 Donald Duck Comic #199 reached \$250, whereas a trio of classic Dell comics - Porky #271 (1950), Mickey Finn (1950), and Terry Toons

(1946) - walked out the door at \$90. A well-stocked vintage trade cards album, with dozens of cards, also brought in \$250, while another album filled with advertising materials and postcards rang up \$150. Alongside those, two separate French marketing posters from the World War I era each commanded \$90

Those comic book enthusiasts may have lingered to browse a dozen lots of heirloom toys and childhood collectibles. Among the standout pieces was an Arcade cast-iron Toy Bus from the 1933 Chicago World's Fair, which scored \$220. A 1965 Munsters lunch box, missing its thermos, drew bids up to \$120. A sizable bag of over 200 clay marbles, including Bennington shooters, went home for \$80.

The variety was further broadened with a handful of jewelry items that supplied some sparkle. A 14K white gold diamond ring, adorned with seven diamonds totaling 6.4 grams, hammered at \$250. A Judith Leiber change purse, richly decorated with colored Swarovski crystals, matched that figure. Meanwhile, a more delicate 14K diamond ring weighing 1.9 grams and featuring

a central stone brought \$100. Such a diverse array, from classic lighting to luxury items, held bidders' attention right through to the final gavel.

the following year, but Michele Monstrola; an Antiques in the Woods dealer and friend of Wilt's discussed working together to keep it viable with Monstrola then taking over the show the following year.

This 2025 edition was Monstrola's (along with co-owner, Rege White) second year managing, and it is wonderful to report Antiques in the Woods & Vintage Too (new owners and new name!) is alive and very, very well! With more than 100 dealers strong, shoppers were out in full force making for a woods jammed packed with goodness resulting in a very successful event.

"We had a 20 percent increase in our gate and so many positive remarks about this year's edition; from both our dealers and those shopping the show," Monstrola said. "About 97 percent of the dealers said they had a great show which was so wonderful to hear. The weather was good, the food here is always great, and what our dealers brought to sell-there was so much variety and such quality. It was simply just the best."



Caesar Creek Flea Market closing after nearly 50 years

WILMINGTON, Ohio — On Sept. 22, officials from Caesar Creek Flea Market announced the facility will permanently close on Nov. 30, marking the end of an era after nearly five decades in operation. The news came as a shock to vendors and loyal customers alike, many of whom have frequented the market for generations.

Located just off Interstate 71 near Wilmington, Caesar Creek Flea Market has been a regional landmark. The sprawling complex includes eight indoor buildings with 500 climate-controlled vendor spaces and 60-plus acres of outdoor vendor areas. In recent years, the market added mobile boutiques and food trucks, keeping the atmosphere lively and fresh. On a typical weekend, more than 5,000 shoppers browse the offerings.

One of the market's long-standing appeals was its flexible vendor model. Spaces could be rented by the day, weekend, or month - no long-term contracts required. The closure has left many vendors scrambling, particularly those who relied on weekend sales to supplement their income. One vendor, Nicholas Starns, interviewed by a local CBS affiliate, expressed the sentiment, "It was a shock, you know. This place has been around forever," he said. "Now, we're all trying to figure out what we're going to do and where we're going to go." Another vendor, commenting on Facebook, shared, "I've been an outside vendor there since 1986." She added that many vendors are retirees who depended on the extra income to balance their budgets.

The loss is equally heartfelt by area collectors and antique resellers. Caesar Creek has long been a prime hunting ground for everything from vintage toys and art glass to primitives and antique furniture, often at bargain prices. One longtime visitor wrote, "So very sorry to hear this. It will be missed by many people. Our

family has loved going there for four generations." Another echoed much the same, "I remember going here around Christmas time with my parents. Both my kids have been here. We bought my daughter's first 4-wheeler here. Sad to see this place go."

The market has faced its share of challenges in recent years. A fire in 2012 disrupted operations, and the lengthy reopening process strained both vendors and customer turnout. By 2018, ownership began shifting focus to make Caesar Creek a family destination, introducing regular events such as DIY workshops, holi-

day-themed activities, live entertainment, local bands, and seasonal favorites like the James Miller Memorial Car Show. These efforts rekindled a spark for many visitors, even as the broader landscape for flea markets became more uncertain.

Market leadership offered this statement, "The decision was not made lightly, and we will be saddened to watch Caesar Creek Flea Market, a community gathering place for almost five decades, close the iconic red doors for the last time." They also noted that the adjacent storage facility will remain in operation, with a separate

announcement regarding its future expected at a later date.

Caesar Creek will remain open on Saturdays and Sundays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. through its final day on Nov. 30. Starting in October, the usual \$2 admission fee will be waived. Scheduled events, including car shows and Halloween festivities, will go on as planned. "We encourage our friends and customers to come and support the outdoor market and eight buildings full of local vendors and artisans who will remain open for business during this time."

Daisy helped Buck Rogers guns blast into the future

In August 1928, Amazing Stories pulp magazine first published Armageddon 2419 by Philip Francis Nowlan. The main character of Armageddon 2419 was Anthony Rogers, who later became famous as "Buck Rogers in the 25th Century."

The origin of Buck's travels to the 25th century, including Buck's actual first name, changed often during his first fictionalized years, but the one constant running through all of the Buck Rogers works, whether in the comics, on the radio, on television, or in the movies was his need for laser pistols.

Laser pistols are defined as "directedenergy weapons," that have, over the last 80 years, also been called rayguns, beam guns, death rays, blasters, and phasers, but the name for laser pistols that stuck was ray guns because these pistols emitted a ray of death.

While the properties of ray guns often changed, based on the needs of the science fiction hero using the gun, Daisy Manufacturing Company developed the basic design and properties of ray guns in the hopes of arming children everywhere with the weapons used by Buck Rogers.

Daisy, in 1934, manufactured the world's first ray gun, the Buck Rogers XZ-31 Rocket Pistol. Considered, by Doc Atomic (www.toyzine.com) to be "the finest space weaponry of the Thirties, Forties, and Fifties," this futuristic toy has an interesting history. Doc explained, "The XZ-31 was produced for the 1934 Christmas season. Macy's was granted exclusive sales of the gun for a whole week if they agreed to promote it. They set up an entire 'World of Tomorrow' section in their store on 34th Street and Broadway, complete

with rockets, moonscapes, and people dressed like spacemen. On the day the toy went on sale, lines stretched around the block. The department store kept selling out, and Daisy went into overtime to manufacture and deliver the ray gun to New York. But then their week ran out, and Daisy started shipping Buck Rogers Rocket Pistols to Macy's fiercest rival, Gimbel's Department Store. This kicked off an apocalyptic price war. Macy's would lower the cost of their XZ-31s to attract customers, so Gimbel's would lower the cost of theirs. Back and forth the price was lowered until one store would run out of stock. Then the other would immediately jack its price back up. Often, the stores would cut the price so much that they'd be selling it for less than they paid to buy the toys from Daisy. At which point Daisy would come

in and buy back their guns [at a cost cheaper than manufacturing them, also creating a shortage of the guns for the moment] — only to turn around and sell them once again to the retail giants!"

Buck Rogers' ray gun, in the cartoon series, was quickly redesigned to match Daisy's XZ-31 Rocket Pistol, and Daisy made a fortune selling ray guns in the 1930s. In fact, Daisy manufactured so many of these first ray guns that they are still considered "common" today.

After rocketing to success, the XZ-31 was followed by a string of Buck Rogers' ray guns. Collectors love the 1935 Daisy XZ-38 Disintegrator Pistol. According to Justin Pinchot, www.toyraygun.com, this ray gun was "A masterpiece of art deco design, featuring a fluted barrel and flamboyant fins."

In 1936 Daisy offered its most eye appealing ray gun, the brightly colored

XZ-44 Liquid Helium Water Pistol. This fascinating pistol preceded plastic water pistols by having an interior leather sack that held water, shooting "Liquid Helium" on all aliens encountered by the kids who owned one.

Prior to World War II, Daisy manufactured several more Buck Rogers ray guns, leather helmets, and leather ray gun holsters. Some of these models and accessories were sold in sets and all were offered individually (often with different finishes), allowing a large variety of Daisy ray gun items for collectors.

In 1945, Daisy manufactured its nextto-last Buck Rogers ray gun, the U-235 Atomic Pistol, which captured interest in the blossoming Atomic Age. The U-235 used Daisy's existing dies from the XZ-38 Disintegrator Pistol, making it cheaper to manufacture.

Today, collectors seek all things Daisy, especially its famous BB guns, but the earliest Baby Boomers grew up in a time when Daisvs Buck Rogers ray guns still occupied the shelves of the corner mom & pop 10c stores. And the continued presence of Buck Rogers on television has kept alive the hunt for Daisy's earlier contributions to Buck's armament.

Waltham pocket watches tick the loudest at Steffen event

FORT WAYNE, Ind. — A collection of pocket watches highlighted a recent online auction conducted by the Steffen Group.

The item taking center stage was a two-tone Waltham 18S Roy 14 carat pocket watch. This brand was one of the first mass-produced watches in America. Abraham Lincoln even carried one including having one on him when he delivered the Gettysburg Address. Waltham was a busy company in the 1850s, when they established new production lines of railroad, sport and military watches. They produced around forty-million watches, each of which had precise, interchangeable parts, second hands, sub-dials and jeweled plates. The 18S Roy which sold at the Steffen Group auction watched the bidding tick away until the new owner was able to tuck this one away for the final bid price of \$2,750.

Selling for \$2,050 was a Waltham watch from 1850. Another Waltham pocket watch sold for \$2,150. This one had a piecrust face. These collectibles have distinctive dials that feature a white enamel background with a gold or silver center. This particular one showed off the gold center. It was complete

with the original S & C red fob still attached and appeared to be in great shape.

The next Waltham pocket watch was a repeater coin case. This one was patented in June 1880. The repeater watches had a mechanism that allowed the watch to keep accurate time even if the movement was stopped. They were often used in hunting sports or fishing. A plain black case surrounded this timepiece, which brought a high bid price of \$1,350.

Coming in right behind the repeater watch was a Waltham 14-carat 6S 7J pocket watch selling for \$1,250. This one showed off the Roman numerals around the face of the watch and was displayed in a beautiful gold case. It had a pretty raised sand-like design around the outside edge of the case and looked to be in great shape.

Bringing the price right back up to \$2,650 was piece a pocket watch by AH Wallis. The plate on this one was frosted, which gave it a more vintage look.

Showing the face numbers that are more common here in the United States was an Illinois 14S multi-color box hinge pocket watch. This one had a beautiful, glowing

gold look to the outside case, with the inside being a duller gold. It sold for a very respectable bid of \$1,850.

A 14 carat gold Louisville and Nashville Railroad pocket watch chain gave the watches a run for their money when brought an impressive bid of \$1,750.

There were several pieces of furniture offered at this sale as well. A mid-century modern Lane four-piece bedroom set consisted of a queen-size headboard with a Denver Madison plush mattress and box springs, a four-drawer armoire, a two-door nightstand, two matching mirrors, and a nine-drawer dresser. This was a beautiful set of dark wood furniture that had been well taken care of. It took a final bid of \$1,350 to claim this for a new home.



Celebrate the Women of World War II


male pilots. The program was abruptly shut down in 1944 as men returned from the front. For a fictional take on their story, "Flight Girls" by Noelle Salazar is a solid pick.

Just before Pearl Harbor, the Coast Guard created its own women's reserve, the SPARs (Semper Paratus Always Ready). More than 10,000 women served. Over 200 went on to Naval Training School. SPARs worked as air controllers, LORAN and radio operators, and even pharmacy technicians. Mary C. Lyne and Kay Arthur's "Three Years Behind the Mast" dives deeper into their story.

At home, women flooded factories, famously symbolized by "Rosie the Riveter," portrayed on the iconic 1942 "We Can Do It" poster, part of Westinghouse's campaign to recruit women workers. The aviation industry led this surge, with over 300,000 women comprising 65 percent of the aircraft industry's wartime workforce. At Ford's Willow Run plant in Michigan alone, 14,000 women helped build over 8,600 B-24 bombers. Rosie earned her nickname as each plane required more than 300,000 rivets. Similar efforts occurred at Douglas, Lockheed, and North American Aviation. Shipyards nationwide also saw similar transformations. In Mobile, Alabama, 2,500 women worked at the Alabama Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Corporation in jobs spanning welding to crane operation. Women also helped assemble over 600,000 Jeeps at plants around the country. Penny Colman's book, "Rosie the Riveter: Women Working on the Home Front in World War II," offers a great overview of this chapter in history.

Some of the most secretive work took place in locations associated with the Manhattan Project, such as Los Alamos, New Mexico, Hanford, Washington, and especially Oak Ridge, Tennessee — a federally created city carved out of the countryside that grew to 74,000 residents. Around 10,000 civilian women, many recruited out of high school, operated machines called Calutrons, which separated uranium. College-educated women with science or math backgrounds worked in labs and theoretical roles. The work was so secret that none knew what they were doing and were forbidden to speak about it. Denise Kiernan's "The Girls of Atomic City" offers a powerful account of their hidden contributions.

Women also worked in highly dangerous munitions plants across the country. Roughly 85,000 women, both civilian and military, served as Women Ordnance Workers (WOWs). At Holston Ordnance Works in Tennessee, christened "The Powder Plant," about 3,500 women helped make RDX, the most powerful explosive predating the atomic bomb. Nicknamed "Bomb-Bomb Girls" or "Canary Girls" (from chemicals that yellowed their hair and skin), their work came with real risks many were injured or killed in factory accidents. "Bomb-Bomb Girls: Trading Aprons for Ammo" by Barbara

flight instructors, mainly handling ground training. Before the U.S. entered the war, British Flying Training Schools were established across the country to train Royal Air Force pilots. A British cemetery in Terrell, Texas, honors airmen who died training there. Throughout the war, women taught using Link Trainers (ground-based flight simulators) and taught essential subjects like navigation and meteorology. "The Girls of Flight City" by Lorraine Heath offers a good fictionalized account.

Codebreaking was another area where women excelled. Many with math or language skills were recruited from top colleges to translate and decipher foreign messages. At Arlington Hall Station in Virginia, thousands worked as cryptologists breaking German and Japanese codes. Nearby, WAVEs at a former seminary turned Naval intelligence facility did similar work. In Dayton, Ohio, WAVEs at National Cash Register helped build and operate the Navy's Cryptanalytic Bombe, used to break German Enigma ciphers. "The Codebreaker's Secret" by Sara Ackerman brings this hidden world to life.

In Hawaii, women served as radar operators in the Women's Air Raid Defense (WARD) after the Pearl Harbor attack. About 500 women tracked aircraft movements, freeing up men for combat roles in the Pacific. WARD was disbanded in 1945. "Radar Girls" by Sara Ackerman tells their story.

One of the most inspiring stories is that of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, known as the Six Triple Eight — the first all-Black women's Army unit. Created in late 1944, they were sent to Europe to clear a backlog of over 3 billion letters and packages. Despite racism, sexism, a German bombing, poor conditions, and inadequate facilities, they got the job done. In 2019, Congress awarded them the Congressional Gold Medal. Their story is told in Kaia Alderson's "Sisters in Arms" and the film "The Six Triple Eight."

Nurses and Red Cross workers took on some of the

war's most dangerous assignments, often serving near front lines — including at Normandy after D-Day. By war's end, 16 Army nurses were killed by enemy fire; nearly 70 were captured in the Philippines, and over 1,600 received medals. The Red Cross had over 100,000 women serving worldwide, with over 50 dying in service.

Back home, women volunteered at USO events and worked at places like the North Platte Canteen in Nebraska, located near the rail facility where nearly all deploying US troops passed through. The canteen served 6 million soldiers, often greeting trains with cakes and birthday celebrations for those onboard. Most workers were women who even used their personal ration coupons to help feed the troops. Meghan K. Winchell's "Good Girls, Good Food, Good Fun" recounts these homefront contributions.

When the war ended, most women were expected to leave their jobs and return home. Many were laid off or had to petition for a position or the recognition and benefits owed to them. But they'd already proven their value. In 1948, Congress passed the Women's Armed Services Integration Act, allowing women to serve as regular members of the military. Their experiences, along with those of the women who worked in factories and offices, changed opportunities for women in the workforce forever.

If these stories spark your curiosity, you might also enjoy hunting for related memorabilia at antique shows, auctions, estate sales, and online. Additionally, the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Michigan, is currently hosting "Our War Too: Women in Service," a traveling exhibit dedicated to these unsung heroes


