Collectors are not scared of Halloween noisemakers

Most of today's Halloween traditions began centuries ago as superstitions. The earliest roots of Halloween can be traced to the Celtic pastoral festival of Samhain, which later became "All Hallow's Eve" or, simply, Halloween.

Samhain, meaning "summer's end" was considered a day "between years." The day before Samhain was the last day of the old year and the day after Samhain was the first day of the New Year. Samhain was considered a very magical night when the dead walked among the living.

Ancient Druids believed that on the last night of October the veil between this world and the otherworld was diminished enough to allow the spirits of the dead, evil spirits, ghosts and witches to roam abroad over the land. This was the night when souls of the dead revisited their former homes. Villagers lit giant bonfires in an attempt to drive the dead spirits from their towns. Superstition led people to believe that spirits of the dead could inhabit the bodies of the living unless



the person was so grotesque or scary that no spirit would want such assume undesirable body. Bands young people disguised grotesque masks, carrying lanterns carved from turnips, ran through the villages scaring away the deadly spirits. Other villages used noisemakers such as bells, horns, or rattles to drive the evil spirits away. Today, the masks and noisemakers used Halloween are directly attributed to the early traditions of Samhain.

Modern Halloween noisemakers originated in Germany in the early 1900s and became popular in America around 1920. The earliest Halloween noisemakers were made of cardboard or reeds and made a ratcheting sound when spun. By the early 1950s, Halloween noisemakers were made of tin and came in all shapes and sizes, featuring colorful Halloween graphics. While noisemakers were popular for nearly 40 years, by the 1960s, they were considered old fashioned and all but disappeared from Halloween.

Today Halloween collectors make noise over vintage noisemakers both for their sounds and their visual

Cohn, and U.S. Metal Toy; although, many collections are based on "Made in Japan" noisemakers, which are interesting but of inferior quality. 

Halloween postcards offer scary delights in a small package

Halloween postcards are highly treasured among holiday postcard collectors. Witches, demons, jack-o-lanterns, Frankenstein monsters, black cats, and headless horsemen - the list of Halloween figures that have graced postcards for decades seems endless.

Some of these images, when first created, were not associated with darkness or scary thoughts. They were originally lighthearted and produced more smiles than fears. Other images, such as Dracula or Frankenstein's Monster have always had evil connotations associated with them.

The earliest Halloween postcards, those issued between 1900 and the beginning of World War II, had a fairytale quality about them, capturing the imagination of young and old alike with their festive scenes, characters, and rhyming words. These early Halloween cards are favorites with collec-

Halloween has its earliest roots in an ancient Celtic festival called Samhain. This festival celebrated the end of summer and the changing of the seasons from summer to winter. During Samhain, ghosts and demons freely roamed the earth, and people would wear spooky costumes to fool the dead spirits.

Irish immigrants brought Halloween's traditions to America in the middle 19th century, celebrating All Hallows Eve with jack-o-lanterns, masquerade parties, and visits to neighbors' homes. At that time the jack-o-lanterns symbolized a soul trapped on earth, which had been given the burning embers of hell to light

Turkish "gag" maestro helped remake Halloween and April Fools' Day

Samuel Oumano was a 16-year-old Turkish immigrant who operated a New York City pushcart in the early 1900s to help support his family. Daily, he sold fruits and vegetables, but he also made money on the side selling "naughty" French postcards, especially to sailors lounging around the US Naval docks in Manhattan harbor.

Another of his sideline "delicacies", as he called them, were "French ticklers", decorated condoms long popular in Europe. Within a few years, his side business had grown so prosperous that he opened a retail store at the southeast corner of 29th and Broadway in Man-

Oumano is hardly a household name today, but his family's company, Fran-

Halloween postcards, featuring pretty witches, cute children, adorable black cats, and fat, smiling jack-o-lanterns. Often the witches brought messages of love for their intended beaus.

Some collectors seek only certain artists. Two popular Halloween artists were Frances Brundage (1854-1937) and Ellen Clapsaddle (1865-1934). These artists painted all American, rosy-cheeked boys and girls, laughing at playfully frightening Halloween antics. Today, these artists are sought after for the nostalgic manner in which they depicted Halloween.

Halloween postcard collectors also search for John O. Winsch, of New York, postcards. Published between 1911 and 1915, Winsch's Halloween postcards are considered the most beautiful Halloween postcards ever created. Winsch embossed each card, coloring them with heavy, rich inks. And he sent the cards to Germany to be printed since German printing was far superior, at that time, to American printing methods. Most of Winsch's Halloween cards came in sets of four.

The Payne-Aldrich Act helped American Halloween postcards remain the best selling cards in America. The Act placed a high tariff on imported cards, so Winsch postcards cost 2 ½ cents each while American postcards were only a penny. This may not sound like a large difference today, but in 1900 the savings were huge.

Halloween postcards signed by the original artists sell best. Cards signed by Brundage, Clapsaddle, or any of Winsch's artists, such as Samuel L.

Ellen Clapsaddle may be the most sought after Halloween postcard artist. She painted cards for Raphael Tuck and Sons and later for Wolf Publishing Company. Clapsaddle had a unique style for depicting children. She also designed mechanical Halloween postcards. One with a mechanical arm on the card which moves a jack-olantern mask over a young girl's face costs \$560 on today's secondary mar-



include Clare Victor Dwiggins, Grace Gebbie Drayton, and H.B. Griggs, who signed cards "H.B.G." Griggs painted exclusively for Leubrie and Elkus of New York.

Collectors sometimes limit their Halloween postcard collections to certain types of cards. Some collectors only collect Halloween postcards which served as party invitations, inviting a youngster or adult to a costumed Halloween party. Other collectors enjoy searching for anthropomorphized vegetables, such as jack-o-lanterns or even turnips that represent Halloween creepiness or cuteness. And some collectors seek Halloween postcards that depict iconic but evil Halloween characters, often from literature, such as Wolfman, Frankenstein, Dracula, and the Mummy.

co-American Novelty, was one of the largest 20th-century American manufacturers and distributors of gag gifts. Along the way, Oumano helped reshape Halloween and April Fools' Day into the holidays we know today. The countless novelties produced by his company make for an interesting and fun collection as well as offer a commentary on 20th-century American social and cultural life.

A novelty or "gag gift" is usually defined as a gadget or object used or given to perpetrate a trick or practical joke on another. While regular or normal jokes are verbal or written, practical jokes are situational, requiring some kind of action and often a prop or two. Franco-American provided the props.

The young Oumano was multi-lingual, teaching night school French and German, and that knowledge gave him an advantage in retailing risque French merchandise. Unfortunately, his postcards and condoms were obscene and so classified as illegal to mail in the US under the 1873 Comstock Act.

His solution was to find more socially acceptable merchandise. An amateur magician, Oumano came up with a parlor magic trick he called "The Brass Nickel to Dime Trick". In those days, doubling a nickel was a big deal. The trick turned four nickels into four dimes and with Oumano's instructions it became an instant success.

Such Oumano gags helped remake April Fools' Day. While the holiday had been around for hundreds of years, the



tricks tended to be elaborate and expensive. Take the faked newspaper account of a failed 1588 invasion of England that was smuggled into the Cambridge University archives by four undergraduate students in the early 19th century. The newspaper was quoted repeatedly subsequently until an inquiring scholar noticed its April 1 date.

When a competitor introduced a cloth spring snake that jumped out of an opened peanut brittle can, Fran-

co-American responded with a snake that came out of a raspberry jam jar or a mixed nut can. Then there was the dribble beer glass, with small holes below the rim, and a cigar with a real exploding pellet mixed in with the tobacco.

With squirting flowers, a gag originally introduced in 1881 but copied and improved upon by Oumano, April Fools' Day in the 20th century became associated with smaller, quicker, cheaper practical jokes. The new gags also attracted attention for their cleverness or inventiveness, such as the Nickel to Dime trick or chopping a worthless item like horsehair into tiny pieces and selling it as itching powder.

One of the most popular early 20th century gag gifts was the joy buzzer. Originally invented in Germany in the late 19th century, a buzzer differed because it had to be offered to a target in the form of a handshake rather than given as a gift. Oumano and others improved on the German version until another American patented a very effective buzzer in 1932. In all cases, the buzz was always the unwinding of an internal metal spring, never a true electric sheek

The 19th-century French originally named what came to be called the whoopie cushion. He renamed his American version the "poo-poo cushion", a moniker that has stood the test of time. It became one of Franco-American's most popular sellers until the 1970s.

Beyond April Fools' Day, Franco-American accelerated the social acceptability of Halloween trick or treating. Originally early 20th-century tricksters dressed in plain dark clothing so they could surreptitiously start bonfires, tip outhouses, lead horses inside buildings, throw flour in a homeowner's face when they came calling (a trick called "ghosting"), soap windows, and perform various other pranks.

Franco-American began supplying masks, costumes, and party novelties in the 1920s, especially in five-and-dime stores and through mail order, for all kinds of occasions. Just as Charles

Dickens' 1843 "Christmas Carol" story helped turn Christmas into a major commercial holiday, Oumano's supplies helped make Halloween into the multi-billion dollar industry it is today. Even though interest in gag gifts has waned over the years, his family's company remained in business in the early 21st century primarily selling costumes and Halloween-type accessories like wigs and latex masks.

One particular Franco-American costume-related item became especially popular beginning in the 1940s. Incorrectly called "Groucho Glasses", a set of faux celluloid and eventually black plastic glasses, nose, moustache, eyebrows and maybe cigar were mistakenly labeled after the film and TV comedian. Such fake noses and black plastic glasses came to personify the entire mid-century gag gift culture and were an instant laugh almost anywhere.

Renewed interest in Egyptology in the 1950s inspired Franco-American to introduce the King Tut magic trick. When a performer attempted to place a small plastic mummy figure into his casket, it resisted. Only by following the instructions could the performer coax the figure back into its casket. The trick was especially effective in bars and other locales where "friendly" wagering and plenty of suckers were available.

Beyond naughty postcards, only a few other Franco-American gags have gotten the company into trouble. The government stopped Oumano from making rubber dollar bills in the mid 1930s, and stink bombs were discontinued when gangsters began using them to blackmail and terrorize stores, movie theaters, and other public places about the same time.

Franco-American "Goofy Flying String", liquid plastic in a can intended as a toy for use by children, became highly popular in the 1980s. Each aerosol can expelled a string-like substance that the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission determined was flammable and therefore a banned substance under the Federal Hazardous Substances Act (FHSA) in 1990. Franco-American had to pay a \$40,000 civil penalty for that gag. Surviving examples of all such banned gags are very rare.

By the time of his death in 1975, Oumano had designed more than 50 novelties, from fake doggy poo to exploding golf balls. He never selected a favorite although he enjoyed amateur magic like the Nickel to Dime and King Tut tricks. And he most certainly would have agreed with Groucho Marx, who once said, "If you find it hard to laugh at yourself, I would be happy to do it for you."

Miner's lamps were bright with \$2,550 bid at Pioneer

ALMA, Mich. — Two tiny lamps lit up big bids during a recent Pioneer Auctions event. This was the firm's fourth auction for the owners who had traveled extensively over the years but who had recently decided to downsize. This online only auction consisted of 468 lots, and the prices here do not include the buyer's premiums.

The lamps were Scranto Registered Trademark miner's carbide lamps made by the Shanklin Manufacturing Company of Springfield, Ill. The lamps were first produced in 1913. They were slightly different models, but both were in very good condition, complete with intact reflectors. They each measured about 4 inches tall and the set of two were eagerly claimed with a final bid of \$2,550.

The rest of this sale mostly consisted of wonderful animal and human carvings in bronze, cast iron, stone, and pottery as well as delicate vases and jewelry.

Intricate, hand tooled Native American jewelry featuring sterling silver and turquoise stones is always a crowd pleaser. A Navajo sterling

silver squash blossom necklace featuring 13 turquoise stones stretched out flat measured 16 inches in length. Each of the polished stones measured about 1 inch in length. This hefty and handsome jewelry item reached

an impressive final bid of \$1,200. An eye-catching abalone and turquoise inlay eagle bolo tie consisted of a figure of a flying eagle measuring 5 inches in length by 6 inches from wing tip to talon. This bold emblem was claimed with a final bid of \$950. Two other lots each consisting of two silver toned bracelets with turquoise offered more options, as one featured blue turquoise and the other green. The closing bid on these selections finished at \$450 each.

One of the most stunning items in this collection was the 44-inchlong giraffe rib bone which had been carved with intricate detail. There were several buildings, people doing various tasks, riders on horseback, and other animals. The workmanship was truly remarkable. It was rehomed with a final bid of \$550. An unsigned 20-inch-tall stone carving of



tled, and colorful appearance of the stone made it likely to be a granite carving. This dashing art display was carried off with a final bid of \$375. A Shoushan stone carving represented the traditional Chinese artform technique done with regionally mined stone. This particular example measured 9 inches tall and was densely populated with figures of riders on horseback, other people, fruit, and many other symbolic images in the orange medium. It closed with a final bid of \$140.

Decorated with incredible detail, an ivory-colored replica of an ancient Chinese seismoscope earthquake detector provided a conversation piece. This device was originally invented by Zhang Hen, a Chinese scholar and scientist. Standing 21 inches tall, it was decorated with lizards, frogs, and topped by a bearded man holding a book. In perfect condition it was claimed with a high bid of \$275. Another impressive item from China was offered in the form of a 16 inch tall turquoise color glazed porcelain vase with dragon handles and other elaborate decoration carved into the pear-shaped body. It left with a high bid of \$140.

Two African Senufo "Firespitter" helmet masks had been collected over the years. The first, measuring 32 inches long, featured two human figures reaching across the length of the mask. They were used in funeral cer-

The Tarahumara Indians of Chihuahua. Mexico, created a carved, 21 inch tall, glazed clay pot with an overall textured exterior. This hand-thrown pot done in earth tones proved an appealing object, drawing a final bid of \$250. In contrast, a Malabar Box or Amadapetti traditional handcrafted jewelry box from Kerala, India, consisted of a distinctive domed or pyramid-shaped lid in a deep red color with black etchings

and intricate brass ornamentation. This 11-inch-tall wood accessory was rehomed with a final bid of \$93.

And for something totally different, a lot consisting of a Fisher Price music box TV, a TPS (Tokyo Plaything) circus clown, and a Marx windup tin toy Porky Pig were added to the auction selections. These vintage toys were in great condition, and the giant screen TV/music box played "London Bridge" and "Row, Row, Row Your Boat" for a touch of nostalgia. This combined lot went for \$74.

Traditions were on display at Back to Our Roots Antique Show

By WILLIAM FLOOD

DAYTON, Ohio - The Back to Our Roots Antique Show returned to the Montgomery County Fairgrounds on September 27, drawing traditional antique enthusiasts from across the region. Now hitting its first decade, the show has attracted a loyal following thanks to its focus on early American antiques, country primitives, and folk art.

Held twice a year in June and September, these one-day events offer a glimpse into early American life through authentic, handcrafted antiques. From sturdy cupboards to delicate tea caddies, each item reflects the artistry and lasting appeal of 18th- and 19th-century craftsmanship.

The show's roots trace back to Medina, Ohio, where it began as a small event focused on country antiques. Around 2020, dealer and promoter Jamie Brunt took over and moved it to Dayton to capitalize on the city's central location. As she noted, Dayton's position near the intersection of I-70 and I-75 means easy access from much of Ohio, plus Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, and Below: One of the bargains of the show was a 19th-century plantation-style desk, priced at just \$165.

Illinois. Brunt, who also owns Cornfield Primitives, manages her own booth while running the show — a demanding dual role that fellow dealers greatly respect.

Back to Our Roots started with roughly 45 vendors, and Brunt has preserved that modest size, giving the show a curated, designer-like feel. Booths are thoughtfully arranged and filled to enhance the experience. Dealers commended Brunt and team, along with fellow sellers, for the welcoming environment. New dealer Carla Fouse expressed the appreciation: "We are so thankful to be included with this special group of sponsors, fellow vendors, and visitors! It was very well planned and

Attendance typically hovers around 350, creating a lively atmosphere full of energy and enthusiasm. Many in attendance are seasoned collectors who knew what they wanted and were buying. Prices reflected the heirloom quality, with furniture often reaching into the thousands and smaller items often hitting several hundred dollars, yet cost didn't seem to deter buyers.





reflects a strong regional interest in early American and primitive antiques, even as mid-century and vintage items continue to dominate. Ohio, in particular, remains a hotspot for primitive shows. Brunt acknowledged this, saying, "We are so fortunate in Ohio to have so many great primitive shows like Simple Goods, Gathered Treasures, and the Ohio Country Antiques Show."

As with the other shows Brunt mentioned, Back to Our Roots stands out for attracting dealers from well beyond Ohio — especially impressive given its one-day format running only from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. This fall's lineup included

vendors from Alabama, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, and Tennessee, plus strong representation from across Ohio.

Among the Ohio participants was the Patriot Antique Shoppe from Tipp City, which specializes in 18th- and 19th-century American antiques. In their booth was a not-often-seen piece - a pipe stand made for long-stemmed clay pipes priced at \$850. From Canfield in the northeast portion of the state came The Western Reserve Antique Shop. Owner Leisa Kirtley has sold antiques for 25 years and participated in Back to Our Roots for seven of them. Within the first hour, she had sold two petite steamer trunks, with two remaining for \$120 and \$345.

Sweet Pea's Primitives and Such traveled from Hinckley, Ill., west of Chica-

go. Their booth was nicely staged, with country furniture and primitives ranging from a two-door tall cupboard priced at \$1,695 to a hanging wall box with a single drawer at \$395. Nearby, longtime dealers Laura and Tom Burr, owners of Country Antiques of Bureau, Ill.,, returned to the show for their third time. Their space held smalls like carved butter molds, ranging from \$15 to \$95, and a charming nine-drawer hanging spice cabinet marked at \$225.

From farther west came Iowa City Antiques. Owner Scott Carpenter has been around antiques most of his life, having started by helping in his parents' business. They attended the first running of Brimfield and even acquired one of the original signs. Today, Carpenter specializes in folk art, stoneware, pewter, and pre-1900 furniture. Among his offerings was an 18th-century chestnut and pine blanket chest from New England, bearing rosehead nails and leather hinges, priced at \$1,395.

From Springfield, Tenn., was firsttime participant Sherry Baggett. She brought a beautifully aged New England cupboard priced at \$1,800. The piece featured a built-in spoon rack and early construction details like rosehead nails and raised "H" hinges. It was filled with period-correct smalls, including candlesticks and woodenware, starting around \$50. Also from the South were Kathryn and Mark Steinberg, owners of Dance in Thyme from Decatur, Ala. Specializing in early lighting and Americana, their booth held items like a barn lantern for \$495 and an early 19th-century sampler for \$599.

Across the building were plenty of other treasures for sharp-eyed collectors. Among them was a selection of 19th-century French pewter tankards bearing makers and tooling marks, priced from \$75, and a pair of Victorian-era ladies' boots priced at \$89. A handsome 19th-century plantation-style desk was a bargain at just \$165, while a late-1800s glider-style rocking horse

stood ready to gallop away for \$300.

Though the event lasts just a few hours, it leaves a lasting impression. Attendees depart with more than antiques - they leave feeling connected to the past and the people they met. A visitor from southern Ohio captured the sentiment: "So many beautiful pieces, and the vendors were all so friendly and helpful!"



find anymore. Although Americanmade Halloween noisemakers are the easiest to find, some companies such as Bugle Toy Company are quite scarce (especially since almost nothing is known of this company), so these noisemakers demand more money on the secondary

Wood and tin Halloween noisemakers were inexpensive, fun toys. They came in all varieties with many different styles, featuring the usual Halloween symbols of witches, black cats, ghosts, pumpkins, owls, and devils.

Mostvintage Halloween noisemakers sell for about \$10 with a few selling for \$75 or more. Exceptional ones sell for hundreds of dollars. Older, wood noisemakers are rarer than the tin ones from the 1950s, and ratchet noisemakers are more sought after than drum type noisemakers. Ornate designs greatly affect cost. German tin ratchet noisemakers have superior designs and often cost \$125 or more. Designs can be misleading though. Companies in the 1950s used identical designs taken from noisemakers of the 1920s and '30s, but while they appear similar, the earlier noisemakers are worth more than the 1950s ones are worth.

While ratchet and barrel noisemakers are the most common, when adding to your collection don't overlook Halloween tambourines, metal sparklers, clangers, and

rattlers. The earliest Halloween noisemakers h a v e sculptured wooden handles, next came straight w o o d e nhandles, and plastic finally handles. Some old
