


You don't have to go into the woods to collect Little Red

"Once upon a time, there lived in a certain village a little country girl, the prettiest creature who was ever seen. Her mother was excessively fond of her, and her grandmother doted on her still more. This good woman had a little red riding hood made for her. It suited the girl so extremely that everybody called her Little Red Riding Hood."

French author Charles Perrault was 69 years old when he set the story of Little Red Riding Hood to paper in 1697. The son of a lawyer, Perrault laid the foundation for a new genre of literature – the fairy tale. Short stories usually having some basis in folklore, the fairy tale is often a comfortable home for elements of myth, magic, and enchantment. Perrault's story of the ill-fated Little Red – titled in his native language as "Le Petit Chaperon Rouge" – was contained in his book "Histoires et contes du temps passe, avec des moralites" – known in English as "Stories of the Past with Morals." The book was otherwise known as "Contes de ma mere l'Oye" – or "Tales of Mother Goose" and included the stories of Sleeping Beauty, Puss in Boots, and Cinderella.

The moral of Little Red Riding Hood, according to Perrault, was to be on the alert for gentle wolves who pursue attractive, well-bred young girls, as those types of wolves are the most dangerous of all. In the story, Little Red's mother sends her out to visit her grandmother, who is ill, to deliver some little cakes she has made and a little pot of butter. Little Red dons her scarlet hooded cape and sets out with the packed

basket. As she makes her way through the woods, she crosses paths with a wolf who asks her where she is going. When she responds that she is on her way to visit her sick grandmother, the wolf questions where the grandmother lives. "It is beyond that mill you see there, at the first house in the village," Little Red tells him.

The wolf offers to visit the ailing grandmother as well, then suggests they make a game of it. He tells Little Red to take one path while he takes another and see who arrives there first. Racing quickly, the wolf arrives at the grandmother's house first and knocks on the door. When the elderly woman inquires as to who is there, the wolf identifies himself as Little Red. The grandmother instructs him to pull the bobbin in the door and lift the latch. He does so and enters the small house where the grandmother is resting in her bed. As the wolf has not eaten in three days, he immediately consumes the grandmother in one swallow.

Little Red, who has taken the time to stop and pick some flowers, arrives at her grandmother's house a short

time later. She knocks on the door, and the wolf – who has costumed himself in some of the grandmother's clothing and slipped into her bed – softens his voice to

Pabst Blue Ribbon sign raised a toast to \$44,280 at Morphy

DENVER, Pa. – A spectacular Pabst Blue Ribbon double-sided porcelain neon sign with unique glass face inserts chalked up \$44,280; a rare, high-grade single-sided tin sign for Ace High Motor Oil with car and airplane graphic garnered \$41,820; and a Canadian twin 10-gallon double-visible gas pump rang up \$34,440 at Morphy's Automobilia & Petroliana auction held Feb. 17-19.

The three-day event was packed with nearly 1,500 lots of motoring-related signage and service station items, antique advertising, bottles and flasks, all meant to appeal to discerning collectors. It was held live at Morphy's Pennsylvania gallery, with all forms of remote bidding available, including live via the internet thru Morphy Live.

The Pabst Blue Ribbon double-sided porcelain neon sign was the overall top lot of the three days, easily breezing past its \$10,000 high estimate. Mounted to its original can, the sign was a fine, rust-free example that would enhance any breweriana collection. It was large, measuring 58 inches by 11 inches by 38 inches, and was graded 8.9+ on both sides.

The rare and high-grade

single-sided tin sign for Ace High Motor Oil, with a car-and-airplane graphic, measured 7 3/4 inches by 13 3/4 inches. Like some other choice lots in the auction, it was certified and graded by AGS, the premier authentication and grading service for antique advertising. It boasted great color and gloss throughout the field and was one of the highest-grade examples of this

type of sign that Morphy has ever sold. Already expected to do well, it still surpassed its \$30,000 high estimate.

The Canadian twin 10-gallon double visible gas pump, standing 100 inches tall, had undergone an older restoration in red, white and gold livery. The pump showed two intact glass cylinders, with the upper one in very good to excellent condition. It was a candidate for a good cleaning, or even a new restoration, but eager bidders pushed the final selling price to more than triple the high estimate.

From humble dirt to elegant marble, the floor had it all

The homes in pre-Colonial America had floors made of packed dirt – known as earthen floors. These early humble floors were often covered with rushes, straw, or sand to help with cleanliness and insulation or covered with blood from animals that were butchered for the table. Blood contains fats and proteins that reacted with the dirt, creating harder, less dusty, more water-resistant, and smoother floors than just packed dirt alone.

By the end of the 1700s and at the outset of the 1800s, there were still abundant old-growth forests in America, leading to the widespread use of wood floors. At last, the new Americans could get off their earthen floors and enjoy the resiliency and warmth of wooden floors. Since convenience superseded design, those first floors used simple, thick, wide planks of wood, often rough-sawn and left unfinished to develop a natural patina over time.

Early colonists built their homes

with whatever wood they could easily procure and mill nearby, hence, the variety of wood used depended on which trees were locally available. Eastern White Pine, a hallmark of colonial interiors, was a primary building material in New England for wide-plank flooring. Red and white oak, valued for their strength and durability, were available in the eastern and central United States. Cypress was used for flooring in the southern part of the country, where the trees were abundant. Its durability and resistance to rot made it a popular choice for flooring in those more humid climes. White pine, or softwood, available in most mid-Atlantic areas, was also a favored wood type.

White pine was rapidly consumed by the timber industry toward the end of the 18th century, and yellow pine planks cut to 5 or 6-inch widths were substituted. The long boards that spanned the length of a room were the most coveted; random-width boards, all


A Red Hat Motor Oil ("Approved") tin flange sign with an eye-catching top hat graphic was offered in original as-found condition. It was graded 7.75, but as was the case with the Canadian gas pump, bidders looked past the imperfections and drove the winning bid to a lofty \$31,980 against a pre-sale estimate of \$3,000-\$7,000. The sign measured 17 3/4 inches high by 17 1/2 inches wide.

A double-sided tin flange sign for Du Pont Red Cross Dynamite ("For Clearing Land, Planting Trees, Deep Plowing and Ditching"), graded 8.5 for condition, measured 23 1/4 inches by 12 1/2 inches. It sold for \$29,520, more than tripling the high estimate. Sides 1 and 2 both showed good color and shine.

Two petroliana lots posted identical selling prices of \$19,680. One was a Flying A Gasoline single-sided embossed porcelain sign, showing excellent color and gloss throughout the field and a clean Flying A graphic. The bright and glossy example, measuring 62 inches by 48 inches and graded well at 8.5 for condition, had no problem surging past the \$4,000-\$7,000 pre-auction estimate. The other was a brilliant example of a Tioga Gasoline single 13 1/2-inch diameter globe lens with a visually arresting Native American graphic. The globe lens, boasting excellent color and gloss throughout, scored a near-perfect 9.0 for condition. It exhibited negligible wear in the field.

A brightly-colored and embossed single-sided tin sign advertising Everlasting Roof and Metal Paint ("Old Government Paints") by the United States Refining Company out of Cleveland, Ohio, brought \$18,450 against a high



estimate of \$10,000. Showing a graphic of Uncle Sam standing on the Capitol Dome, the sign was produced by Meek & Beach Company of Coshocton, Ohio. It exhibited great color and good shine and measures 9 3/4 inches by 13 3/4 inches. It was graded 8.7.

A rare, circa-1920s single-sided curved porcelain Campbell's Tomato Soup can sign, measuring 22 1/2 inches by 12 1/4 inches and graded 8.5+, exhibited exceptional color and gloss. It was ex-



pected to change hands for \$6,000-\$12,000 but ended up finishing at \$14,760.

A circa-1920s one-gallon can from Valvoline Oil Company ("100% Pure Pennsylvania"), made exclusively for Indian Motorcycles, was overall bright and glossy on each side and showed a clean Native American graphic front and back. The iconic can marketed by Indian, 11 inches tall and graded 8.0, realized \$11,685. Each side had "Panhard Cycle" handwritten into the grade panel, and the original lid and carrying handle were both intact.

though prevalent, were considered the mark of a floor of poor quality.

Painted interior walls became increasingly common in the mid-1800s, leading the way for also using paint on wood flooring. Painting wood floors became commonplace and prominent people, like Thomas Jefferson, commissioned wood floors stenciled with patterns that mimicked more expensive materials. Early painted floors became a popular, budget-friendly way to hide imperfections, make floors more “foot friendly,” and could be quite beautiful. Unpainted wood planks could also be covered with canvas floorcloths.

Prior to the floorcloth, only the elite could afford to decorate their interior floors with patterns of marble, ceramic, or parquet. The floorcloth changed all that. Also known as an oilcloth, it was coated in an oil-based varnish and was an easy-to-clean floor covering that repelled water and insects, and protected flooring from dirt and grime. While the new middle class could indulge in little luxuries, those luxuries still needed to have a practical use and the floorcloth could be functional, yet stylish. Middle-class households could now imitate the intricate patterns that covered the floors of the rich without having to pay the same price.

By the time of the American Industrial Revolution, around the 1860s, many manufacturing processes evolved. Steam-powered machinery allowed for a much more uniform look in wooden planks and tongue-and-groove technology allowed the boards to be tightly bound together so that no nails were visible, giving them a unified appearance. Technological innovations also enabled parquet borders — typically found along walls and corners — made

of ornate geometric patterns using different colors of hardwood. The geometric cherry and beechwood parquet floor in Monticello’s parlor were likely copied from floor designs Jefferson saw in Paris while earlier serving as Minister to France.

By the end of the 18th century, focus moved away from painted floors and floor cloths to carpets. Manufacturing breakthroughs allowed more households to afford better quality carpeting. However, by the 1820s, cheaper imports posed a problem that was shared amongst other textile manufacturers, prompting Congress to enact tariffs that protected the infant U.S. textiles industries. Twenty years later, there

were 215 carpet mills employing 12,000 people. Rag rugs were the early carpets — often made by braiding or weaving lengths of fabric through a narrow loom and then sewing them together to achieve the desired width. Then larger looms, hence, the term “broadloom,” were able to weave wider, mass-produced carpets.

The jacquard loom, one of the early power looms, was invented in France by Joseph Marie Jacquard in 1804. It used punch cards that were read by the steel needles in the loom, which raised and lowered the harness of the loom allowing different colors, patterns and intricate designs to be woven into the rug. As the first programmable machine, it is considered a predecessor to modern computing, laying the groundwork for modern-day data processing. By 1832, power looms created a booming rug manufacturing center in the United States.

According to lore, in 1855, an Englishman named Frederick Walton, forgot to seal a container of linseed oil that he was using as paint thinner, and a skin of solidified oil formed on top of the oil. Five years later, he applied for the first of a series of patents for the resulting rubbery substance, and named this new material “Linoleum,” from the Latin word linum (Latin for flax) and oleum (Latin for oil). Walton established the Linoleum Manufacturing Company Ltd., in 1864, in England and by 1869, linoleum came in so many patterns and colors, provided a cushioned, comfortable floor, was easy to clean and durable, making it a top choice.

Walton’s linoleum had become so popular that he was exporting to the rest of Europe and the United States. After bringing it to the U.S., he faced competition from an established oilcloth manufacturer who sold his own brand of linoleum. Walton decided to sue for trademark infringement for the

use of the word “Linoleum,” but since linoleum had become so commonplace, the court determined that linoleum was a generic term — so he lost his suit and his stronghold on the linoleum industry.

Vinyl flooring came about as a fluke, thanks to some experiments in 1926 trying to bond metal to rubber, resulting in PVC. After a few versions of the material were created, vinyl became more widely available. Though vinyl is totally ubiquitous today, and is the world’s second-most used plastic, it didn’t become popular as a floor covering until after World War II when it dominated the market. It surpassed linoleum floors, because it was cheaper, lasted longer and was easier to keep clean.

Invented in the 1970s in Sweden, innovation created laminate floors, made from multiple layers of synthetic products and wood composite, over which a photographic design is set, typically mimicking wood, stone or other popular materials. Although early laminate floors had a plastic look, they offered a wood look without the high cost or installation challenges of typical hardwood.

It was still about the laminate, vinyl and linoleum well into the 1980s. The decade still offered plenty of plenty funky design trends, but styles were inching a bit more towards the traditional. Light wood, much of it pine, dominated the flooring trends in the 1990s. Wall-to-wall carpeting also made a comeback.

Finally, in the 2000s, back-to-basics, dark hardwoods were once again in vogue. Hand-scraped and distressed wide-plank wood floors became popular again.



Two distinguished art collections will highlight Cottone Auctions

GENESEO, N. Y. — Cottone Auctions will present a Fine Art & Antiques Auction on March 19 featuring a strong selection of modern and contemporary art, Tiffany Studios lamps, sculpture, estate jewelry, Islamic art, American and European clocks, Native American items, and more — offering collectors the opportunity to acquire works with distinguished provenance and deep regional significance. The sale is notably anchored by the estates of Charles E. Balbach and Frederic P. Norton, individuals who played meaningful roles in shaping Buffalo's cultural life.

Charles E. Balbach (1934–2024) had a distinguished curatorial career at the Buffalo AKG Art Museum, helping advance the museum's reputation as one of the nation's leading institutions for modern and contemporary art. His scholarly eye and institutional stewardship contributed to significant acquisitions, exhibitions, and the continued growth of its internationally recognized collection. Postwar and contemporary artists represented from his estate include Joan Mitchell, Kate Shepherd, Sadie Benning, Max Cole, Sally Mann, Gabriel de la Mora, Garth Weiser, Mary Heilmann, Enrique Martínez Celaya, Mai-Thu Perret, Nir Hod, Jene Highstein, Bryan Hunt, Mira Nakashima, and others — reflecting a lifetime of thoughtful engagement with contemporary practice.

Frederic P. Norton (1935–2025) was a respected Western New York attorney, civic leader, and devoted arts patron whose lifelong commitment to culture enriched the Buffalo region. Deeply engaged in civic and cultural life, he held leadership and board roles with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and the Albright-Knox Art Gallery, among others. A disciplined collector for more than fifty years, Norton assembled an extensive collection of prints, drawings, paintings, and sculpture. In 1999, he donated a substantial

portion of his collection to the Albright-Knox, underscoring his belief in public access to art. Works remaining from the Norton estate reflect decades of informed acquisition and stewardship, with artists including Charles Ephraim Burchfield, Wendell Castle, Lynn Chadwick, Willem de Kooning, and John Singer Sargent, among others.

The auction's modern offerings are led by Study (circa 1960) by Joan Mitchell, a mixed media work on paper reflecting her development as a seminal second-generation Abstract Expressionist. The work was a gift from the artist to the David Anderson Gallery, Buffalo, remained in the Estate of Annette McGuire Cravens, Buffalo, and later entered the Balbach collection (Est. \$40,000–\$60,000).

Works by Wendell Castle are highlighted by a rare immersive environment created in 1972, comprising a bed, desk, lamp, chest of drawers, and night table. Constructed using his signature stack-lamination technique, the suite dissolves the boundary between furniture and sculpture, embodying Castle's ambition to create complete environments rather than isolated objects. The work was acquired directly from the artist by Frederic P. Norton (Est. \$40,000–\$60,000). Several gel-coated fiberglass examples from the collection of Thomas R. and Mary P. Markusen, Kendall, New York, will also be offered.

An exuberant oil on canvas, Magic Star II, by Alfred Jensen will be featured. The 30 by 24 inch canvas was exhibited at Martha Jackson Gallery, Buffalo, in January 1961 in the artist's one-man show "Magic Square," and again at the Albright-Knox Art Gallery in 1978 in Alfred Jensen: Paintings and Diagrams From the Years 1957–1977. The work comes from the Norton collection (Est. \$15,000–\$25,000).

Regional highlights include May Wind **Below:** Joan Mitchell (American, 1925-1992) Study, Circa 1960. Mixed media on paper.

and Hay (1964) by Charles E. Burchfield, originally acquired from The James Goodman Gallery by Norton's father (Est. \$20,000–\$40,000). Additional regional artists include Martha Visser't Hooft, Virginia Cuthbert, Alexander Oscar Levy, Harriet Greif, Charles Gruppe, Emile Gruppe, and Harvey Breverman.

Fine decorative arts include a Poppy Table Lamp by Tiffany Studios (Est. \$50,000–\$80,000), along with lighting by Duffner and Kimberly and Handel Company. Art Nouveau bronzes by Harriet Frishmuth and Bessie Potter Vonnoh will also cross the block.

Estate jewelry highlights include a diamond necklace and sapphire brooch by Van Cleef & Arpels, from Mrs. Bernhard G. Bechhoefer, Washington, D.C., thence by descent (Est. \$20,000–\$40,000; \$10,000–\$15,000), and a gentleman's Overseas Dual Time wristwatch by Vacheron Constantin (Est. \$30,000–\$40,000). Silver offerings include a Tiffany & Co.

sterling 'Audubon' pattern flatware service for 12 and an 18th-century American coffeepot by John David.

Islamic art is represented by a fine polychrome Iznik deep dish from the Ottoman Empire (15th–17th century), decorated with tulips and rosettes and formerly in the collection of Alexandre Imbert (1865–1943), noted French dealer and collector specializing in Islamic art (Est. \$7,000–\$10,000).

For timepiece collectors, highlights include a rare Aaron Willard Bridal Shelf Clock, Boston, circa 1829 (Est. \$10,000–\$15,000); a Waltham girandole timepiece with reverse-painted "Aurora" scene; and European examples such as an ormolu and marble mantel clock, Allegory of Meditation, by Claude Galle, circa 1812, and an early 19th-century grande-sonnerie carriage clock by Lepaute (Est. \$4,000–\$6,000).

Little Red Riding Hood

ask who is there. When Little Red says her name, the wolf instructs her to pull the bobbin and lift the latch. "Put the cake and the little pot of butter upon the stool and come get into bed with me," the wolf tells Little Red when she enters the house.

Little Red climbs into the bed and begins to notice strange things about her grandmother. "Grandmother, what big arms you have!" she announces. "All the better to hug you with, my dear," the wolf replies. "Grandmother, what big legs you have!" Little Red exclaims. "All the better to run with you, my child," the wolf tells her.

"Grandmother, what big ears you have!"

"All the better to hear you with, child."

"Grandmother, what big eyes you have!"

"All the better to see you with, my child."

"Grandmother, what big teeth you have got!"

"All the better to eat you with!"

With one gulp, the Big Bad Wolf ingested Little Red Riding Hood.

The disturbing tale has been rewritten and adapted over the years. It has been the subject of poems, short stories, novels, comic books, musical recordings, video games, films and television shows. In happier versions, a woods-man arrives to cut the wolf open and free Little Red and her grandmother from the confines of his stomach. Other adaptations have the wolf eating the contents of the food basket instead of humans, or being successfully chased away from the grandmother's house.

The story of Little Red Riding Hood was the influence for the 1966 song by Sam Sham & The Pharaohs "Li'l Red Riding Hood," the 1987 Broadway musical "Into the Woods," the 2005 animated comedy "Hoodwinked," the 2007 video game "The Path," the 2011 ABC series "Once Upon a Time" in which American actress Meghan Ory plays Little Red, and the 2013 novel "Scarlet" by American author Marissa Meyer.

Cape Cod resident Ann Connell Bergin has been collecting Little Red Riding Hood memorabilia since 1969, after the birth of her first daughter. "When I saw a Madame Alexander Red Riding Hood doll in a department store, it pulled me

in," Bergin said. "I was very drawn to it and that's when it dawned on me that Red Riding Hood was the last Halloween outfit my mother had made for me before she had my sisters." With six children, Bergin's mother had become too busy to keep making costumes. "So I treasured that Little Red Riding Hood outfit for a very long time, wearing it for the next three or four Halloweens," she continued. "I even tried a few times to wear it to school when my mom wasn't looking!"

Bergin believes that her most valuable item in the collection might be of German origin. "I have a feeling it may be a porcelain Red Riding Hood figurine because she's dressed identically to the famous Kathe Kruse of Germany, and was sculpted by Sofia Kruse, the daughter of Kathe."

Bergin's collection is displayed in cases of various sizes her husband has made to hang on the wall of their home. She presently manages the public Facebook group 'Red Riding Hood Collecting' where members can share information and photographs regarding their hobby.


Another Little Red Riding Hood collector, Stephanie Clayton, has donated her collection to the University of Connecticut Library, located at 405 Babbidge Road in Storrs, Connecticut. She and her husband presented the collection to the library's Thomas J. Dodd Research Center in 2012. It includes assorted media, stuffed animals, dolls, porcelain figures, a fabric puppet and a clock.

The value of Little Red Riding Hood items, like most collectibles, depends on their rarity. A very rare Little Red book with crepe features on every page,

published by B. Wilmsen of the Philadelphia Print Company around 1890, is valued at around \$295 – which is a steal considering a 1915 lift-the-flap book about the hooded miss – published by the L.W. Walter Company – could take a \$599 investment to be had.


A 1949 Little Red doll, by Italian designer Lenci, is valued at about \$499. The doll stands about 12 inches tall and features mohair braids and hand-painted eyes. An unopened Barbie & Midge 'Red Riding Hood & the Big Bad Wolf' doll set from 1964 could fetch nearly \$750. Opened and used, the set is going for around \$569.

An antique four-pound, cast iron doorstop depicting Little Red and the wolf can be found at auction for a going price of about \$1,595. Five-pound heavy metal bookends with the two characters emblazoned upon them, manufactured by the Kronheim & Oldenbusch Manufacturing Company prior to 1940, can be found priced in the range of \$595.

A 1949 Little Red set consisting of a cookie jar, salt and pepper shakers, creamer and sugar bowl is rare in its entirety but readily obtainable by the piece. The complete set is typically valued at around \$440. A late 1800s Staffordshire porcelain vase showcasing Red, was manufactured in England, stands 8 inches tall and can be had for approximately \$199.

A vintage Little Red postcard, valentine or View Master Reel can be purchased for as little as \$5, while vintage patches, records and ornaments can be found for under \$10. The world of Little Red Riding Hood has been spinning for centuries – creating a wide spectrum of collectibles for every fairytale lover's budget.

Children's lunch boxes are still on the menu

From the beginning, the lunch box was nothing more than a heavy-duty, latching metal box made from a toolbox-grade metal that would protect the working man's noon-time meal from just about anything.

At the time, a lunch pail wasn't chic. On the contrary, it was a sign you were far enough down the pay scale that you didn't have time or money for a hot noontime meal. Still, children as early as the 1800s created their own school "lunch pails" out of the colorful tin boxes that once housed biscuits, cookies and tobacco.

In 1902 the first true kids' lunch box made the scene. It was shaped like a picnic basket with pictures of playing children lithographed on its side.

The history of the modern lunch box began in 1935 when a company called Geuder, Paeschke and Frey of Milwaukee, Wis., licensed the likeness of the then-new cartoon character Mickey Mouse which it used on its oval-shaped "Lunch Kit." This metal container was sealed at the top with a wire latch on each side, doubling as the handle when closed. It had a tray inside but no bottle or thermos.

Disney would go on to license two-handled picnic-basket-shaped lunch boxes in the late 1930s and early 1940s. Many of these featured characters from Pinocchio and Snow White on red backgrounds.

Mickey Mouse, Pinocchio and Snow White lunch boxes sold for 20 cents in those

days. Today those same lunch boxes can four figures depending on condition.

From 1935 through the 1980s, lunch boxes were a must-have for children who carried them to school. The first lunch box that was based on a children's TV show was in 1950 Aladdin model that featured a Hopalong Cassidy decal placed on a red or blue metal box. It was an instant success, with Aladdin selling 600,000 of those boxes at \$2.39 a pop in the first year.

Roy Rogers wanted his own lunch box, but Aladdin had turned him down, telling him that "one cowboy was enough." So, Roy Rogers approached American Thermos in Connecticut and convinced them to use bright, full-color lithography on all sides of the box instead of a decal on one face. American Thermos sold 2.5 million Roy Rogers & Dale Evans boxes in 1953, increasing their total sales 20 percent in one year. American Thermos produced nine styles of Roy Rog-

ers lunch boxes between 1953 and 1957.

space-age themes to choose from, including Aladdin's 1952 "Tom Corbett Space Cadet" boxes in red or blue. These rivaled the lure of Disney characters and Western stars.

In 2010 a 1954 Superman vs. The Robot lunch box in mint condition sold at Philip Weiss Auctions for \$11,865. This lunch box is widely regarded as the Holy Grail of rare and vintage lunch boxes.

Space imagery was even more popular in the 1960s and ranged from the carton future of "The Jetsons" (Aladdin, 1963) to the domed "Star Trek" models Aladdin made in 1968.

Aladdin's first dome lunch box, "Buccaneer" in 1957, capitalized on a pirate craze that had been spurred on by "Peter Pan" and other movies of the era. It was a huge success. From there, domes featured other whimsical patterns, some of which (like the VW Bus and the Disney Schoolbus) used the shape of the boxed to brilliant effect.

Aladdin retooled and adapted full-lunch box lithography for their 1954 line. So did newcomers ADCO Liberty and Universal, as well as another old-style lunch pail manufacturer, Ohio Art. The box wars had be-

gun, as manufacturers scrambled to be the first to tie up rights to the hot new TV shots.

Aladdin's Gunsmoke Double "L" error version of lunchbox (1959) is worth \$1,200. A typo on the box (Marshal was erroneously spelled "Marshall") appeared and was released before the company could make the correction. Collectors shell out big bucks for the extra "L".

In 1968, King Seely released its Yellow Submarine lunchbox, valued at \$1,300 today. This psychedelic 1960s lunchbox high-

lighted the boys from Liverpool. Lunchbox collectors and Beatles nostalgists will likely be duking it out for possession of this beauty for decades to come.

Thermos produced a series of Star Wars lunchboxes in 1977, some which could fetch up to \$15,000 today.

Television did wonders for the lunch box. "The Partridge Family", "The Addams Family", "The Six Million Dollar Man", "The Bionic Woman" – everything that was on television ended up on a lunch box. And what a marketing tool it was as the kids were taking them to school with them.

Lunch boxes had a good run, selling about 120 million between 1950 and 1970,

but the box boom couldn't last. ADCO stopped making them in 1956, Universal in 1963 and Ohio Art in 1985. The last metal lunch box of the Steel Age, fittingly, was Rambo. That was in 1987.

Of course, not all lunch boxes were made of metal. Companies made vinyl lunch boxes, as well, which were basically shower curtains wrapped and sealed around pieces of cardboard. Needless to say, these flimsy products did not stand up well to being dragged to and from school every day for a year, which is why finding a vinyl lunch box in good condition can take some doing.




