For centuries millefiori has challenged glass makers

What might plump glass paperweights, ornamental beads, and bottle stoppers have in common? Many feature exquisite, flowery patterns called millefiori. This delicate glasswork technique is commonly associated with Murano, an isle near Venice, Italy. Yet it actually dates to

ancient Egypt, where it was known as mosaic glass.

Egyptian glassworkers often covered bars, rod-formed beads, and protective amulets with fine, tiny, identical disks depicting floral, eye, or animal mosaic-glass images. These were created by artistically arranging colored glass threads in thin glass

created by artistically arranging colored glass threads in thin glass canes, then miniaturizing them by stretching. After these were fused together, they were cut, like slice-and-bake cookies, into slender disks.

Egyptians also created lustrous, mosaic-glass inlay plaques, dishes, bowls, and vases. These were fashioned by fusing prepared disks into flat, ornamental circles, which were slumped over sand-and-dung molds to give them form. When gently heated, circles and bodies bonded.

Centuries later, skilled Greek and Alexandrian craftsmen also created Egyptian-style, mosaic-glass beads and vessels. Amazingly, many of these early mosaic-glass fragments and beads have survived. Those reaching the market currently command several hundred to many thousands of dollars each, depending on their size and condition.

During the Roman Empire, glassworkers, from Antioch to Africa, produced similar pieces as well. Many of their pieces feature checkerboard patterns, popular as sumptuous wall interior overlays and furniture inlays.

Roman beads, despite their size, often depict birds, lifelike faces, or florals. Their outlines are sharp. Their colors, both translucent and opaque, are pure and brilliant. Moreover, notes art historian J. J. Winckelmann, "The most delicate pencil of the miniature-painter could not have expressed [their beauty] more accurately."

Roman artists also created bright arabesque and spiral mosaic-glass urns, cups, dishes, and bowls — some with elegant monochrome or gold glass inclusions. By combining glass, metal, and gem cutting techniques, they also fashioned

flat, decorative brooches and plaques from mosaic-glass fragments.

Following the discovery of glass blowing in the 1st century AD, Roman craftsmen apparently abandoned this intricate, labor-intensive art form.

"Highly collectible Roman mosaic-glass, mostly fragmented beads and vessels from the Eastern Mediterranean, hit the market a handful of times a year," said Allan J. Anawati at Medusa-art. Prices can vary between \$1,000 and \$10,000, he adds. "But when a complete and desirable object comes to market, it could fetch many times more. Unfortunately, one must be careful before buying — high demand and short supply result in modern fabrications."

During the 8th or 9th century, mosaic-glass reappeared (or was rediscovered) in Mesopotamia and Syria. Its lush, patterned disks embellished not only beads, bowls, flasks, and game pieces, but also carpeted floors and architectural elements. Many

of these bear dramatic "bull's-eye" patterns ringed by colorful, concentric circles. Eventually, however, this technique vanished once more.

Mosaic-glass was briefly revived and refined in 15th century Murano. As more popular, lucrative, marbled, transparent, colored, and crystal-clear Venetian glassware entranced Europe, however, this time-consuming technique was largely abandoned

It surfaced again in the early 1800s, when Pietro Bigaglia, a master Murano glassmaker, re-created a number of long lost glass ornamentations. Eventually, he nestled them all—fantastic scrambles of white glass filigree, aventurine inclusions, adorned with mosaic-glass, spiral and silhouette canes — in clear glass globes. From this point on, mosaic-glass became known as millefiori, "many flowers" in Italian.

Beadmaker Giacomo Franchini produced many of Bigaglia's millefiori canes. His greatest achievement, however, was creating incredibly realistic, incredibly tiny millefiori silhouette canes profiling 19th century notables — some the width of a knitting needle. His intense, laborious efforts however, eventually drove him to the madhouse.

During this era, Bohemian glassworkers also created millefiori paperweights, perhaps from glass bits discarded

Collecting Mister Rogers Neighborhood

It's a beautiful day in the neighborhood, A beautiful day for a neighbor, Would you be mine? Could you be mine?

If you're over the age of 40, you could probably sing those lyrics by heart. You grew up hearing Fred Rogers' uplifting words on Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood. Whether you're an adult with kids of your own or barely into your 20s you can marvel at the Neighborhood of Make-Believe at the Heinz History Center in Pittsburgh and celebrate the story of Fred Rogers' life at a theater near you.

The movie, *A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood*, debuts in November starring none other than Tom Hanks as Fred

Rogers. It's not the first production to celebrate Rogers' life. Last year, during the 50th anniversary of *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood*, a documentary entitled *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* hit theaters featuring

archival footage of Rogers, his colleagues, and family. Even as a documentary, it grossed nearly \$23-million at the box office

The singing, soft-spoken, deeply philosophical Rogers was a native of Latrobe, Pa., near Pittsburgh. Even as a child, he was known for his love of puppets and music. He went on to earn a degree in music composition and later was ordained as a Presbyterian minister from the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

After graduating, Rogers spent three years in commercial television at NBC, then seven years at the nation's first public television station, WQED in Pittsburgh. It was



there that he drafted a puppet-based series called *The Children's Corner* that would eventually lead to his namesake show. In 1963, *Mister Rogers*, featuring a cast of puppet characters and a trolley that transported viewers to a world of make-believe, aired on Canadian television. The U.S. version, re-titled *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood*, aired Feb. 19, 1968, on the predecessor to today's PBS.

Elements of Rogers' life, beliefs, and personality were inextricably woven into the show. In an era when kids were glued to cartoons hijinks and caped crusaders, Rogers countered, using imagination, idealism, and messages of kindness and compassion. Many thought the

Winterthur Garden on postagestamp

WINTERTHUR, Del. — People across the United States will soon get a glimpse of the beautiful gardens of Winterthur Museum, Garden & Library as part of a new Postal Service series of stamps that celebrates 10 classic American gardens.

"Winterthur is extraordinarily pleased to be so honored by the Postal Service and grateful that it will share the beauty of our historic gardens with the nation," said Carol B. Cadou, the Charles F. Montgomery Director and CEO of Winterthur. "I believe our founder, Henry Francis du Pont, would have been very proud to have Americans everywhere see his stunning landscape designs."

An experienced and extraordinarily capable horticulturist, du Pont personally designed the 70-acre naturalistic garden that surrounds his former home. The garden is internationally renowned for its distinctive color schemes, remarkable specimen trees, and unique palette of plants, which created an aesthetic that was unique among American gardens of its time.

Winterthur also includes a formal garden designed by du Pont's close friend, the pioneering woman land-scape architect Marian Coffin. The stamp features a photograph of azaleas blooming around the reflecting pool in the Coffin-designed garden.

"The Winterthur garden is Mr. du Pont's masterwork, so it is a remarkable artifact," says Chris Strand, director of garden and estate at Winterthur. "We manage it carefully to preserve the design intent and skill of Mr. du Pont and the many staff who have cared for it for over a century, and we love sharing that vision with visitors every day."

The pane of 20 stamps features 10 different photographs of botanic, country estate, and municipal gardens, taken between 1996 and 2014.

\$5,750 crock highlights Joe Pyle auction


MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — Pottery, folk art, advertising, toys, and even militaria were part of a huge two-day auction held by Joe R. Pyle Complete Auction and Realty Service the weekend of Sept. 27-28.

The auction represented part of the lifetime collection of James and Karen Giuliani's, conducted at their historic home, the Alexander Wade House in Morgantown and online via Proxibid.

The bulk of Friday's items were smalls, including signs, advertising, sports memorabilia, and militaria among other categories. Seven lots containing signs and other markers were offered, including one local sign from the Giuliani Family store in Bretz, W.Va., featuring Scheidt's Valley Forge Beer. That piece sold for \$80 online. A fur trunk from Jones Fur Service of Fairmont, W. Va., sold for \$225 onsite.

Better than two-dozen lots of toys, including nine lots of Disneyana, were featured on Friday. Among them, a nice group of 1960s and '70s era items containing a Mickey Mouse radio, camera, soap dish, and Mickey "jack-in-the-box". An onsite buyer picked it all up for \$25. Other toys included a Marx Fort Apache playset and assorted Marx dinosaurs selling for \$130 and a made-in-Japan eight-piece tin Penny Toy train which went for \$35.

For the sports fan, 18 items were available Friday including six pieces commemorating Cleveland Browns All-American center Frank Gatski which sold anywhere from \$20-\$50. A pair of 1949/1950 Baltimore Colts versus Cleveland Browns programs sold for \$30.

Saturday brought larger, earlier, and typically more valuable pieces. Grabbing the highest bid of the weekend was a 12-inch freehand decorated crock with imagery of people selling for \$5,750 to an onsite buyer. A 5-inch ceramic Philadelphia lady's cosmetic pot, possibly centennial era, fetched \$950. And, an early blue-painted box featuring tulips, birds, and hearts sold for \$725

Also, selling high were primitive and folk art pieces like an early wooden rocking horse with glass eyes and mohair mane and tail at \$400. A regulator folk art clock marked "Kessie Price 1888-1926" and "Rock Creek, Maryland" sold for \$110. Both pieces went to on-site bidders.

Do you ever ask yourself why you collect?

Why do we love, admire and collect antiques? You might say, "That's easy, because I like them and want them!" That may be true but not the whole story. I am 87 years old, have a doctor's degree in psychology, and over 55 years experience as a psychotherapist for groups, families and individuals. Part of my job was to help people understand themselves, so that they would know their wants and needs better, both emotional and practical. I love and collect antiques also and have put a lot of thought into the "why" of that interest.

An obvious reason is the family history related to an antique item. My mom collected a certain kind of dish. and I remember it from my childhood. She knew how much I loved it but decided to play a little trick on me. During a phone call she happened to mention she had had a garage sale and was able to sell the spinning wheel for \$5. I was "without words" for several seconds, after which she quickly laughed and said it was a joke! After a couple of minutes, I agreed it was funny and I also had a great sigh of relief! Swedish antiques always get a second look from me, especially those that I own!

es. This is true in relationship or in marriages or even why we choose and love pet dogs or cats. We all choose things because we like the way they look and may serve a function in our lives, which then helps fulfill our emotional or practical needs. An antique item or items have several things about them that may excite a buyer. They are old and often made in special ways, they need research to fully understand their history, and they are not readily available to everyone. They are unusual or maybe "one of a kind!" A display of them is interesting to share with others, as it is an achievement, and there is enjoyment in describing it to our guests and friends.

A change though in collecting is that the "search" for items is not the challenge that it used to be. The internet makes the search easier, but many of us want to see/touch the antiques we are considering buying. The idea of a collection is partially a feeling of accomplishment. In other words, if one of the items is great, then 10 of them is even greater. Explaining to others how you got them is a feeling of being successful. We all need purposes and goals for our lives to be fulfilling. Searching to add to a collection can help meet our needs and the goals that we may have. We all need goals, and adding to our collections may be one.

Some antiques have an unusual look and function, which makes a collector happy. Many friends might wonder what "it" is, and providing a description of it can be a satisfying feeling.




Also being able to say "These are rare and I have several of them" is even an ego-trip or at least a feeling of accomplishment and self-pride. Learning the history can be a challenge and also a goal to reach. There is satisfaction in accomplishing a goal and many collectors use their collections as a goal and being successful as an achievement. We all need challenges and the challenge of finding more of a special antique can be big and worth striving for. Learning new things is also fulfilling, and many collectors study the history and make of their items and enjoy finding out more about them and how their makers have been producing for centuries.

The best life for all of us is one that has understood purposes and direction and goals. Keeping things in balance is important though. Collectors of things should keep that interest in balance with the rest of their life, or they may end up as a "hoarder!" As mentioned earlier, our items, antique or otherwise, should be things we like to look at, that serve a function and make us feel emotionally better...things that, in our lives, help fulfill an emotional or practical need. As also mentioned, our purchases should be realistic. Should I add this bowl to my collection or buy food for dinner for my family might be an important question to answer. Feelings and facts don't always match in a decision, but facts can often be more on target.

If handled correctly, antiques and collecting can be an important "part" of our lives. We need a balance and so antiques should not be 100 percent of what we are using to find fulfillment. Enjoy antiques but also enjoy other parts of your life so you have a balance that works for you.



show was hokey. In truth, it did lack flash; but with the help of local child development experts, Rogers was able to approach important topics like divorce, discrimination, disability, and even war with his young viewers. Drawing from his native Pittsburgh, Rogers crafted an idyllic neighborhood filled with friendly public figures and even a loveable trolley to teach viewers the value of community.

Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood went off the air in 2001 after an amazing 912 episodes. It was the longest-running series on public television and influenced three generations of children. It was bestowed a Peabody award in 1969 and Daytime Emmy awards in 1985, 1997, and 1999. Rogers himself was awarded a Lifetime Achievement award in 1997.

While millions watched the show, very few ever experienced the studio set in person — today, at the Heinz History Center in downtown Pittsburgh, you can. On exhibit is the largest collection of items from the show, including: the living room set that Mister Rogers walked through each show; King Friday's castle; the Great Oak Tree, home of Henrietta Pussycat and X the Owl; Picture Picture; Mr. McFeely's Speedy Delivery tricycle (not commonly known,

Rogers' middle name was McFeely); and, that iconic Cardigan sweater Mr. Rogers donned each show. Bill Isler, president of the Fred Rogers Company says additional pieces will be made available. Even the children's section got a bit of the "Neighborhood" with a special Google Doodle featuring Mr. Rogers' content.

The museum's gift shop offers many Mr. Rogers' souvenirs. However, if you'd like a vintage collectible, you'll find a few items worth huntin. Fairly common are press pictures of Rogers and/or cast members on and off-set (many autographed). There are 12-inch Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood records. In the 1970s, a series of character puppets was marketed, featuring characters like King Friday and Lady Elaine and a push-toy trolley was released. Today, DVD sets are available plus dozens of books on Rogers and the show. Parents will find a number of wonderful children's' books written by Rogers himself.

Fred Rogers died in 2003 at the age of 74. He left a legacy for children with messages about kindness, respect, and community. Marielle Heller, director of the upcoming movie said Rogers' "is a story for our times, a story about kindness and family connection and trying to tap into our better self."

So, as he asked us, each and every show...

Won't you please? Won't you please? Please, won't you be my neighbor

THE POP CULTURE COLLECTIVE

Patrons have helped the arts for centuries; is Patreon different?

A patron is someone who gives money or some other type of support directly to a person, organization, cause, or activity. A patron of the arts supports what in modern times are called content creators, which are creative entrepreneurs comprised of authors, poets, artists, musicians, podcasters, YouTubers, and the like.

In 2013, a membership platform called Patreon was co-founded in San Francisco by developer Sam Yam and musician Jack Conte, who was looking for a way to make a living from his popular YouTube videos. The platform, which keeps a relatively small percentage of each transaction, lets patrons donate to a creator each month — sort of like a subscription service — based on the tiers that said creator has set up. In most cases, the more money you donate, the more content you get, up to a point.

Patreon is important for countless creators because it has become very difficult to make money in the creative arts. It's always been hard, but there are special challenges that come with modernity, including a very crowded field. Also, with so much content available for free online, sales of physical media is down, so authors typically don't get as much money for the books they write, and even many popular musicians have a tougher time selling their albums.

YouTubers in particular have been hit hard in the past couple of years. Not only is there more competition than ever, the platform changed its rules in 2017 and 2018. The eligibility requirement for monetization (putting ads on your channel where you get paid) is now 4,000 hours of watch-time within the past 12 months and 1,000 subscribers. This makes it difficult for smaller channels to generate any revenue at all.

A number of creators in the field of antiques use Patreon, including, for example, a podcasting outfit called Antique Freaks. For a buck a month, you get access to deleted scenes. For \$5 per month, you receive a random vintage postcard each month. If you're a huge fan of the show, you can kick in \$150 every month, and they will build a monthly episode around the topics of your choice.

Other creators offer such Patreon supporter rewards as early access to videos and songs, exclusive articles or videos, advance chapters of books, private Discord chats, shout-outs during videos, behind-the-scenes photos and info, and any number of other perks, including greater access in general to the creator. Some of the more sought-after rewards are physical items, such as T-shirts with the name of the creator or their product, podcast, or YouTube channel.

Jason Lindsey, host of the popular Metal Jesus Rocks YouTube channel, will make you an official member of the Metal Jesus Metal Militia, which comes with a special challenge coin, if you join the \$10 tier of his Patreon.

I recently set up a Patreon account (www.patreon.com/brettweiss) to help support my creative endeavors, and I discovered first-hand that Patreon is a controversial topic. I already knew there were some consumers who are vehemently opposed to Petreon, calling it "e-begging," but I didn't realize just how bad it had gotten. Shortly after posting about my Patreon page on social media, I was called a beggar, a loser, and various words not fit for a family newspaper, and several people unsubscribed to my YouTube channel.

To me, Patreon is simple commerce. You offer a product or service, and people can choose to purchase or pass on it. If what you offer is in demand, and you market it properly, you will likely be successful. But some people seem to think that creative types should offer their art, music, videos, and other works for free. These days, most creators do offer some (or, in the case of YouTubers, most) of their work for free, but it's nice to get paid for your labor, even if you love what you do.

Lindsey is a big proponent of Patreon and is dumbfounded by the trolls who harass content creators for using the platform.

"More than 130,000 people have Patreon pages covering everything from YouTube, podcasts, cosplay, musicians, artists, and more," he said. "Over three million people donate every month. The site grew by 50 percent in 2018 (we don't know 2019 numbers yet). Obviously, it's popular for a reason and completely optional. If people don't like the service, why harass one or two specific users?! Maybe they need to have a conversation with the Patreon site itself."

While Patreon is indeed a modern platform that helps creators generate a sustainable income, the concept of the patron of the arts is hardly new. It dates back centuries, in fact. Kings, queens, and other people of means would give money to artists, writers, musicians, and the like to support them in their work. Sometimes they would be rewarded with special perks, such as "free" commissions and private performances.

"If it weren't for patrons, we wouldn't have Romeo and Juliet or the Mona Lisa," says Hank Green, who teaches quick lessons via his Crash Course YouTube channel. "Mozart, Shakespeare, Di Vinci—they all had patrons, mostly aristocrats who paid them so they could enjoy their works and brag to their friends about how cool they are for supporting creators."

Sound familiar? There's nothing new under the patron sun, except for the modern technology employed that allows convenient global access to fans.

So, if one of your favorite content providers has a Patreon, feel free to support it or not—it's totally up to you. The vast majority of creators with Patreon pages aren't "e-begging losers." They're simply hard-working entrepreneurs who enjoy eating, paying the bills, and maybe upgrading the services and products they offer.




Above: Most Patreon rewards are intangible, but some creators, such as Metal Jesus, mail out physical items.

at days-end. Many are loose-filled with canes afloat in seas of clear glass. Others feature close-pack cane designs or dominant central canes amid millefiori cane circles. These were produced by cutting warmed, cane-patterned glass rods into appropriate slices or lengths, then meticulously placing them on (or in) cushions of molten glass within paperweight molds. Coats of more molten glass completed their magnifying domes.

As their popularity spread, charming, affordable millefiori paperweights became coveted souvenirs, gifts, and collectibles. Their cheery orbs, colorful companions to inkwells, quills, and sealing wax, brightened up even the dreariest Victorian writing desk.

As master craftsmen immigrated to the United States, the Gillinder Glassworks in Pennsylvania, as well as the New England Glass Company and Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Massachusetts, also began producing millefiori paperweights.

The finest, most collectible ones, however, were produced through the 1860s in France. Clichy weights, known by their fine, pale palette, feature miniscule,

spiraled, garlanded, or concentric designs. Some include single canes depicting the letter C. Others bear pinkand-green Clichy rose canes tucked among close-pack millefiori patterns. Saint-Louis, a rival French company, produced round, footed, and faceted lead crystal weights featuring multicolored millefiori canes in carpet, close-pack, scramble, and mushroom patterns. Some also bear its characteristic dark yellow cane or a tiny "dancing devil" image.


The Baccarat Company created sparkling, high quality round, faceted, and mushroom-design weights in a wide variety of millefiori canes and patterns. Many feature concentric rounds, rosette circlets, or loose-pack canes against white swirl or filigree grounds. Others, carpeted with lush millefiori canes, evoke formal French gardens. In addition to paperweights, Baccarat also produced luxurious, highly collectible millefiori bottle stoppers, goblets, serving dishes, and newel posts.

Although 19th century millefiori pieces are extremely desirable, more contemporary examples are not only attractive, but often, less expensive. Many currently command well under \$500.

The Corning Museum of Glass, www.cmog.org/, offers extensive historical information about both mosaic-glass and millefiori.

Books discussing millefiori techniques, identification, pieces, and prices abound. Do-it-yourselfers may also enjoy manuals on creating millefiori canes from polymer clay.








Buyers sure to take a gamble on Morphy Nov. 20-21 auction

DENVER, Pa. - This month Morphy Auctions' gallery has transformed into a virtual amusement arcade, showcasing a first-class lineup of gaming, vending and music machines, as well as a fine array of antique advertising. Comprising 1,475 lots in all, this exciting selection will cross the auction block at Morphy's Coin-Op & Advertising sale, Nov. 20-21.

The first day will be devoted primarily to coin-op and gambling machines, while the second day will feature antique advertising and general antiques. An extra highlight of the opening session is a grouping of 78 early floor-model and countertop cash registers, many of them ornate and with toppers that display messages.

One of the auction's superstars is an extremely hard-to-find Caille Brothers 5-cent "Black Cat" musical upright slot machine in all-original condition. It has its correct castings, coin head and spinning wheel. The unit's handsome oak cabinet is heavily embellished with nickelplating, and it stands on four sturdy nickel-plated cabriole legs. The presale estimate for this coveted machine is \$60,000-\$90,000.

A later coin-operated entertainer, a Rock-Ola multi-coin Model 1414 phonograph jukebox was made around 1942. A sensational combination of late Art Deco design and technological innovation, this extremely rare jukebox is one of only a few known examples of Rock-Ola's "Commando" model modified to look like the ultra-rare "President."

A Holcomb & Hoke Butter-Kist Popcorn machine may well repre-

sent the original snack food multi-tasker. Made in the first quarter of 20th century, fully automatic floor models of this type not only popped and buttered fresh, hot popcorn, but also came with an attached accessory that utilized the machine's steam source to roast Butter-Kist peanuts or other types of nuts.

A glowing beacon on day two of the auction is the mesmerizing oversized Coca-Cola leaded-glass display bottle known within the hobby to be extremely rare and elusive. "Few ever appear for sale in the marketplace," Morphy noted. Standing 47 by 19 by 19 inches on its wooden base, it was manufactured in the 1920s by Metropolitan Art Glass Co., of New York. At auction, it should land in the \$50,000-\$80,000 range.

In all, there are 730 advertising lots with broad appeal, covering a number of sub-categories such as alcohol, tobacco, barbershop, candy and gum; soft drinks, ice cream, general store, and more.

Oerter rifle comes home almost 50 years after brazen theft

VALLEY FORGE, Pa. - An astute antique dealer with a penchant for history has helped recover a rifle stolen more than 50 years ago.

When veteran antique dealer Kelly Kinzle first saw the rifle, the old adage "when a deal looks too good to be true, it usually is" went through his head. In July Kinzle, a second-generation antique dealer who opened his own shop in New Oxford, Pa., nearly 30 years ago, was on a call. "I knew the guy had a lot of stuff," he said. "He wasn't what you would call a hoarder, just a mega-collector."

What caught his eye was a 5-foot-long Pennsylvania rifle (often referred to as "Kentucky rifles") complete with an elaborate brass wire inlay and the maker's name, date and location of its creation engraved on the top of the iron rifle Right: During his short life, Johann Christian Oerter (1747-1777) produced some authentic works of art and war. Finishing his apprenticeship at the age of 19, Oerter produced about 16 such rifles, as this tiger maple beauty, a year. Today his works sell up to \$200,000.

"The owner told me he had the rifle for around 20 years," Kinzle said. "I just

thought the deal was so good, I just couldn't imagine it not having some dubious ownership prob-

Intrigued - and somewhat skeptical - of his most recent acquisition, Kinzle began his research. On the upside, he had a good lead: the maker's



name, "Oerter;" the year made, "1775;" and the location, "Christian's Spring," near present-day Nazareth, Pa.

In the 1980 book Rifles of Colonial America, Vol. 1, written by the late antique long rifle



Right: A marble head depiction of Dionysus, the ancient Greek god of wine, theater, and ecstatic revelry commanded an astounding \$413,000.



among them was a leaded glass Dragonfly Cone table lamp, model 353, that had a shade designed by Clara Driscoll in 1899. It was mounted on a bronze base and stood 23 inches high with a 17 inch shade diameter and brought \$64,900.

A Maximilian suit of armor, made in 16th century style, stood 6 feet tall, was in excellent condition, and achieved \$47,200. The item came from the renowned collection of Peter Tillou, one of the great American dealers who made his mark in the 1950s.

Another item of interest from the Peter Tillou Collection was a sculpture, Memories of Honor, by Dave McGary (American, 1958-2013). The Polychrome bronze bust depicted a Native American Indian chief in a full feather headdress and tribal face paint. It measured 22 inches tall and sold well past the high estimate of \$1,200 to achieve \$7,375. Dave McGary is internationally known for his works in bronze. His living connection to Native Americans afforded him the opportunity to portray their culture in a deeply personal representation that has been heralded by prestigious institutions, including the Smithsonian Museum, the Buffalo Bill Historical Museum, and the White House collection in Washington, D.C., among many oth-

Topping a small selection of vintage automobiles was a 1931 Packard Model 840 with 26,062 miles. The six wheel rumble seat roadster was painted yellow with brown fenders and had a brown leather interior. It

had virtually every appointment, including window wings, a luggage rack, trunk, trunk cover, golf door, and wide white wall tires on spoke wheels. The previous owner had acquired it approximately 50 years ago and it realized \$69,620.

A unique item among the silver segment of the sale was a sterling silver owl with gilded highlights and blown glass eyes. The figural owl was positioned in a familiar crouched stance and was 11 inches tall by 8 inches wide, weighed 41 troy ounces, and was stamped "F&SON Ltd" on the tail. The eye-popping piece attracted a great deal of bidder attention and flew past the estimate of \$700 to \$1,000 to land an outstanding \$4,720.

One of the jewelry highlights was a 3.12 carat Asscher cut diamond ring by Marcus & Co. The company was founded in 1892 by William Elder Marcus, who was later joined by George Marcus and their father Herman, who was a former employee of Tiffany & Co. The signed ring exceeded the high estimate and brought \$37,760. The Asscher cut dates back to the early 20th century when it was developed in Amsterdam by Joseph Asscher. It requires a higher quality of diamond to make the Asscher design.
















expert George Shumway, Kinzle learned the Oerter was a master gunsmith from the Moravian settlement of Christian's Spring. Only a few signed and dated rifles from that era have survived, with Oerter's work considered among the finest. A similar Oerter rifle belongs to the British Royal Collection Trust.

Johann Christian Oerter (1747-1777) whose workshop in the Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley produced firearms for the American Revolutionary cause, completed his apprenticeship at the age of 19, and only then began producing and signing his own weapons. In Shumway's book, reviewing what are thought to be serial numbers on surviving weapons, he estimated Oerter made 16 guns a year until he died of an illness at the age of

On the downside: Kinzle learned that an Oerter rifle had been stolen in October 1971 while on loan to the now defunct Valley Forge Historical Society. In a brazen theft, the display holding the firearm was opened using a crowbar, or similar tool, after the museum opened shortly after 9 a.m. on Oct. 2. How the thief got the 5-foot rifle from the "theft-proof" display case, and past a receptionist in the next room is still unknown.

The Pennsylvania Society of Sons of the Revolution had loaned its Oerter rifle to Valley Forge Park, then about 20 miles northwest of Philadelphia, in 1963. The Philadelphia Inquirer reported that authorities waited nearly a month to publicly disclose the heist out of

- insured for more than \$15,000 (roughly \$95,000 today) - might panic when its value was realized and destroy it.

The details on the rifle Kinzle found matched those of the rifle which had been stolen. He turned the rifle over to the F.B.I. who later confirmed it was indeed the stolen gun. The antique dealer said he is not permitted to disclose how much he paid for the rifle, or from whom he bought it, as the case is currently under investigation.

Leads generated by the discovery of the rifle will be followed up, according to Montgomery County District Attorney Kevin R. Steele, adding that law enforcement author-

fear that whoever had taken the gun ities are "committed" to closing the ters during the Revolutionary War.

other law enforcement officials returned the antique to the Pennsylvania Society of Sons of the Revolution at the Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia where it is now on display. It is part of the special exhibit, Cost of Revolution: The Life and Death of an Irish Soldier, which is on view through March 17.

The museum, which opened to the public on April 19, 2017, is the successor to the Valley Forge Society and has a nationally significant collection of artifacts, including the tent that Gen. George Washington used as his mobile field headquar-

Another name, W. Goodwin, is The F.B.I.'s art crime team and carved into the rifle's maple stock, and may refer to its original owner. Museum curators are researching the identity of this individual and attempting to ascertain if he played a part in the American Revolution.

> "It is deeply gratifying to be able to return this rare artifact to public view after nearly 50 years," R. Scott Stephenson, the museum's president and CEO, said. "The Christian Oerter rifle exhibits exemplary early American artistry and is a reminder that courage and sacrifice were necessary to secure American Independence."
