# Tiny Tootsietoys are big with collectors

Almost any American who lived in the 20th century will know the name "Tootsietoy." Most famous for producing diecast toy cars, Tootsietoy continues making toys to this day. The diecast vehicles came in the familiar pocket-car size, but Tootsietoy also produced models in larger scales. Readers who shopped at five-and-dime stores will remember being able to buy some of the Tootsietoy cars loose from wooden trays, and in the 1960s and '70s the smallest ones were available in blister-packs.

Tootsietoy's origins go back to the Dowst Company, founded circa 1877 in Chicago by Charles O. Dowst. After obtaining a Line-O-Type casting machine, the company began producing buttons and laundry-related items. Soon they ventured into casting jewelry, animals, ships, whistles and other miniatures as premiums for companies such as the maker of Cracker Jack.

In 1901 the firm started producing pins, charms, cufflinks and other trinkets in tiny automobile configurations. Dowst also made some of the game pieces for the board games which evolved into Monopoly. In 1906 Samuel's son Theodore Dowst joined the company. Theodore was instrumental in guiding Tootsietoy in its production of toy vehicles, acquiring patents for many of the models.

After some preliminary three-dimensional toy vehicles, Dowst released its first true model car in 1911, a miniature limousine. The company added a three-inch Model T in 1915 and a Ford pickup in 1916. These three models were the extent of Dowst's toy car range into  $\frac{1001}{1001}$ 

In the early 1920s the company adopted "Tootsietoy" as a brand. The name was for

# It is a good year to start a calendar collection

Collecting calendars can be a bit daunting mainly because the options are limitless.

Some collectors enjoy calendars with unique artwork or photos of past celebrities. Calendars promoting highly collectible categories such as Coca-Cola also draw many collectors.

How does a beginner decide which calendars to start collecting? With 2020 being a leap year, collecting calendars from leap years would make for a unique collection and provide an engaging time finding them. An added benefit is that leap year calendars come in all forms, shapes, sizes, die cuts offering fascinating artwork, photography, adver-

tising and famous faces. Plus, there have been 30 leap years since 1904 which can make for a nice size collection.

A bit of history about leap years may be prudent. A leap year occurs every four years and there are 366 days in the year instead of 365. The extra day is in the shortest month of the year, Feb. 29. The purpose of adding one more day is to keep the modern-day Gregorian calendar in alignment with Earth's revolutions around the sun.

According to https://lineshjose.com/blog/the-history-of-the-print-ed-calendar, the first printed calendars became popular in the 15th century. "The world's first official calendar though was credited to Julius Caesar. The Julian calendar, which was introduced in 45 B.C.E., made 1 January the start of the year, and it was always the date on which the Solar Number and the Golden Number were



incremented. The problem with the Julian calendar however was that it did not take into account leap years and by the time it was replaced, the calculation of days was said to have been off by nearly 100.

"The Gregorian Calendar, which replaced the Julian Calendar in 1582, took into account leap years, the rotation and revolution of the earth. The time in which the earth circles the sun is approximately 365.25 days which the Gregorian calendar rounded off to 365. The Leap year therefore ended up having 366 days."

Here is a list of the leap years since the turn of the 20th century: 1904, 1908, 1912, 1916, 1920, 1924, 1928, 1932, 1936, 1940, 1944, 1948, 1952, 1956, 1960, 1964, 1968, 1972, 1976, 1980, 1984, 1988, 1992, 1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016, 2020

Early calendars had one page with a pad of calendar pages. Starting in

the 1940s and '50s, calendars transitioned to having multiple pages with a different month and photo for each

It's unfortunate that calendars, like many other types of ephemera, were made to be used and discarded. It is amazing how many calendars can still be found from the 1800s and early 1900s considering that many people threw their calendars away at the start of every new year. And, that is precisely what makes collecting leap year calendars an even bigger challenge.

For the most part, advertising calendars continue to hold the highest value. For advertising calendars, the history and popularity of the company that produced the calendar can add value.

Other calendars that draw collectors are those novelty type calendars such as miniatures, small tablet sizes in leather casings or framed calendars. Bottom line is that calendars offer a plethora of options for collectors. And for the new collector, it's relatively easy to get started.

A Western Plains Indian pipe tomahawk with a beaded leather drop was bid to \$800 against a \$200 to \$400 estimate. The tomahawk's blade was pierced with bat and stylized heart cutouts; the shaft sported brass tacks and was drilled for smoking, while the leather drop was finely beaded with small brass buttons, two bells, and tin tassels.

Equally as decorative was the 27 inch long, 19th century master powder horn boasting finely carved pinwheel designs throughout. The end plug was also hand carved at the tip. This powder horn was bid to \$850

A variety of paint decorated miniature boxes were presented for bids. An early 1800s diminutive (3 inches high by 5 inches wide and 3 ½ inches deep) European slant-front writing box decorated with a stylized house and floral sprigs and retaining its original hasp latch and wire hinges sold for \$500. A small box (2 1/2 inches high by 4 1/2 inches wide by 3 inches deep) wearing stylized folk art decoration with tulips, a house and trees on a mustard yellow background; again with a hasp latch and wire hinges was bid to \$300, and a slightly larger (12 inches high by 22 inches wide and 11 inches deep) circa 1840 dome topped box with original grain paint in green with gold trim and having replaced bun feet made \$350.

Of the furniture offered, the top lot of this category was the circa 1870 Valley of Virginia pie safe in walnut that was bid to \$850. Having a simple applied cornice with saw tooth trim, the case had two doors over two drawers with six punched tins of a simple compass flower. The case was of pegged construction with the back and drawer bottoms being tongue and grooved with nailed construction.

A 19th century walnut one-drawer stand made \$600 even with a replaced top and added later red wash. The piece's folk art snakes, lizards, and stars decorations as well as the initials "T.B." were major selling points.

Some of the most interesting items to sell this day were in categories all their own. A set of circa 1850 Wythe County, Virginia bed steps in walnut with turned front feet and turned rear legs supporting the four steps was signed on the bottom and sold for \$1,150.

A single lot that included 58 early US covers with 3 cent Washington stamps mostly from the 1850s, and most with Northern cancels sold for \$1,600. And it was hard not to love the life size three dimensional iron casting of a horse head with mounting flange; possibly a trade sign for a livery, that was taken to \$550.

# Singin' the vintage blues, one more time

Its birthstone might be aquamarine, and the flower of the month a daffodil, but to my mind, the real color of March has got to be green. Outside my window, trees are beginning to bud, bulbs are sending up shoots, and grass is starting to look like grass again. And if that were not enough, there's St. Patrick's Day in the middle of the month. So why, then, am I stuck on the color blue?

It's more than the fact that "classic blue" is the Pantone color of the year: What's really behind this mild obsession is a recent page-one feature on flow blue china (AntiqueWeek, Feb. 3). Limited to some 1,200 words, that article only scratched the surface of all there is to know about wares that have inspired generations of collectors, not to mention spawning dozens of books. One aspect not touched upon is the fact that even though vintage china might not be an obvious collecting choice these days, there are ways that the romantic charm of blue and white china (and flow blue china in particular) can be incorporated into contemporary lifestyles.

In the course of researching that story, I talked to a number of knowledgeable folks: among that merry band were Ellen King, historian and former president of the Flow Blue International Collectors Club, and

Blue and white china is the most popular of all dinnerware choices. And for good reason. Whether the colors flow or not, these pieces work well in a mix-and-match table setting. Blue Depression glass salad plates, for instance, work well until a table service of flow blue can be completed. For that matter, ruby red, yellow, and pink glassware is also comple-

If you're focused on flow blue, assembling service for eight, 10, 12 (or more - think buffet suppers) is a reasonable goal. Select a pattern you particularly love, or choose a theme, such as patterns with roses. Easier still, collect any English flow blue plate that appeals to you. Because the bodies match and the patterns

blend, you can't go wrong. Best of all, it's possible to pick up a plate inexpensively. Or splurge: chase down some pieces with turkey motifs and make them a new holiday tradition. No matter your style, be it a lace or damask tablecloth, or a set of woven placemats, it's all good. When not in use, display your collection in an open china cabinet, or on a chair rail or a plate wall.

If assembling yet another stack of plates is not something you find appealing (and, just saying, I can't imagine why it's not), perhaps a few random pieces of flow blue might be just the ticket. Small bowls work well in every room of the house. Aside from the obvious (on a kitchen or dining room table), they can function as receptacles for casual snacks in the family room, bars of soap in the powder room, holders for sewing or crafting accessories, organizers for odds

and ends on a bedroom vanity table. . .the list goes on and on. Or find a large platter for a display of cheese, crackers, and fruit for your next cocktail party. Even purists aren't upset if there's a small chip on the underneath.

For those of us who have limited space (or no space limitations whatsoever), there's a piece of flow blue china for you. Thinking small? Why not butter pats (just saying, I have one, and it's perfect for stashing odds and ends like straight and safety pins, as well as a few pennies, in one spot)? How about one large piece, including an umbrella holder or a jardinière? Remember, a collection begins with one.

But since it's March, and for those who insist on the wearing of the green, don't overlook patterns of flow blue china featuring - get this shamrocks. Erin go bragh!







### **Tootsietoys**

Theodore's daughter Catherine, who went by "Toots" or "Tootsie." Dowst trademarked the Tootsietoy name in 1924. From 1923-25 the range expanded to include more cars, vans, Mack trucks, a racing car, bus, fire engines and a tractor and implements.

Tootsietoy increased its output in 1927 with a series of General Motors cars of 24 variations. Also that year Tootsietoy released a range of Model A Fords, each sold in its own color-coded box. Articulated trucks, a coach and a Model A sedan followed. Throughout these years the company began marketing vehicle sets. By 1928 Dowst was exporting Tootsietoys to the UK. A slogan used in Britain in 1929 was "Set the Pace with Tootsietoys," while a December 1930 advertisement suggested you "Make Every Day Christmas" with the miniatures.

In the 1930s Tootsietoy introduced a Model A van, more Macks, military vehicles and a car transporter. Most of the toys were in the 3-inch size, but the car transporter carried 2-inch models which were five-cents each

Tootsietoy enlarged its line to include aircraft, a caterpillar tractor and a land-speed record car, the latter model also being released in a larger scale in multicolored sets. Military-themed miniatures included a cannon, mortar and tank. The toymaker also released "The Funnies" series consisting of vehicles based on those used by characters in comics such as Andy Gump in 1932. By this point "Tootsietoy" had become a household name and was used generically for any small metal toy or trinket.

Tootsietoy upgraded its diecast material in 1933 from a lead formula to Zamak, an alloy of zinc, aluminum, magnesium and copper. New in the catalog this year were the Grahams, a colorful range of cars which were also available in sets. Tootsietoy cars and trucks were now fitted with rubber tires.

Tootsietoy brought out larger-scale Mack trucks in 1933. These included tankers, contractor sets, stake trucks and car transporters. These models were more sophisticated than those of previous lines, making 1933 a high-water mark for Tootsietoy. Though now in the midst of the Great Depression, the company flourished, issuing one of its most comprehensive and colorful catalogs in 1933.

Tootsietoy released its line of LaSalle cars in 1935. These were sometimes issued in two-tone paintwork of sky blue or deep yellow, silver, red or other colors. Some chromed models were produced, reportedly for General Motors' promotional use. This year also saw the introduction of the Doodlebug, a model based on an experimental car which was a predecessor to the Lincoln Zephyr. Tootsietoy reworked the Doodlebug die in 1937 to create a model of a Zephyr. Some of these were fitted with a towing hook so that they could function as wreckers.

Further for 1935 the company brought out a line of small Ford cars which would fit onto a new Mack car transporter. There were also tanker trucks, pickups, vans, a camper trailer and a Zephyr rail car.

The 6-inch "Jumbo" (renamed "Torpedo") series appeared in 1936. This range included cars, pickups, aircraft and a wrecker. For 1937 the company presented a camper trailer to go with the LaSalles (and later with a Lincoln), modified fire engines, and a Greyhound bus in the Jumbo series. The years 1938-39 saw the release of an armored car, a line of fuel tankers and a military supply vehicle.

Tootsietoy brought out its 230 series in 1940, comprising 5-cent vehicles intended to replace the 1935 Ford models. The range included cars, trucks and fire vehicles. The station wagon and box truck from this line were also released in approximately 1/43 scale.

For 1941 Tootsietoy introduced its up-tilted car transporter, a Greyhound bus and a row-crop tractor. Though the proposed

"Giant" series was portrayed in the catalog, the range never appeared. At the opposite end of the scale was the "Midget" line which comprised vehicles and aircraft of about 1 ½ inches in length. These were one-piece castings similar to Monopoly game pieces.

Throughout the pre-war period Tootsietoy produced models of boats, aircraft, trains, animals, zeppelins, rocket ships, and made dollhouse furniture. During World War II Dowst devoted its manufacturing to the war effort, producing items such as buckles and detonators. Theodore Dowst, who had risen to the position of president of the company, retired in June 1945.

In the pre-war period Tootsietoy focused on models of contemporary vehicles. After the war some of these were reissued, but gradually the company shifted to making simpler, inexpensive toys.

From 1946-49 Tootsietoy's output included oil tankers, cars, Mack L-Line trucks, racing cars, jeeps, a Greyhound bus, pickups and a stake truck. These were primarily in the three-inch size. In the 1950s came an army ambulance, vans, a coach, a fire pumper, estate wagons and Mack B-Line trucks. These were in the 3, 4 and new 6 inch size.

In the early 1960s Dowst purchased the toy and hobby division of Strombeck-Becker Corporation. From 1964, operating under the Strombecker name the company continued to manufacture Tootsietoy brand toys. For the 6-inch series Tootsietoy produced Volkswagen Beetles, vans, jeeps, station wagons, oil tankers, cannons and pickups. In scale with the 6-inch vehicles was a wealth of trucks. These included auto and boat transporters, timber and pipe trucks, stake trucks, shipping vans, hook and ladder trucks and tankers.

Tootsietoy created its "Classic Series" in the 1960s featuring models of vehicles from 1906-29. Of this series the Cadillac Coupé, Stanley Steamer Runabout and Model T Touring Car all featured spoked wheels.


The 3 and 4-inch ranges continued, and the 2 to 3 –inch cars could be had in sixpack blister-cards called "Jam Pacs." Tootsietoy also introduced their "HO Pocket Series" which was made up of HO scale cars, trucks, vans, agricultural equipment and a school bus. The company produced a line of aircraft during this time which comprised private, military and commercial airplanes.

A typical postwar Tootsietoy vehicle was constructed of a diecast body, a pair of axles and four wheels — seven pieces in all. But Tootsietoy took a sharp turn in 1969-70 with its "Toughs" series. Toughs had plastic base-plates, plastic interiors, plastic tires on plastic hubs and heavy metal axles. Sturdily made, they lived up to their name: One packaging slogan read, "Made of Tough Stuff." The Toughs series included pickups, fire engines, dune buggies and four-wheel drives, tankers, military and construction vehicles, buses and hot rods. The Toughs also came in themed sets such as farm, construction, and fire.

Tootsietoy released its 'Little Toughs' (AKA "Midget") series in 1970, comprising cement and dump trucks, tankers, a timber truck, cranes and shipping vans. This line absorbed some earlier models, such as the 1967 Shuttle Truck. The Little Toughs ran until 1979, while the Toughs continued into the 1980s.

Tootsietoy introduced its "Hitch-Ups" series concurrently with the Toughs. These were sets with a 4 or 6-inch vehicle and a trailer. Among the Hitch-Ups sets were a 1969 Ford LTD (Tootsietoy's last 6-inch model) and U-Haul trailer, Jeep (or Jeepster) with boat and trailer, cab-over pickup with dog trailer, and a Volkswagen Beetle with dune buggy.

Tootsietoy is currently owned by J. Lloyd International Inc., in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The diecast vehicles line is marketed as the "Hard Body" brand, but is under the Tootsietoy umbrella. J. Lloyd's "American West" brand range is also within the Tootsietoy family. Reflecting its history tracing back to the first Dowst toys, Tootsietoy uses the slogan "America's Oldest Toy Company<sup>TM</sup>."





# Many records fell in 2019 at Rock Island Auction

ROCK ISLAND, Ill. — The information in the catalog for Rock Island Auction Company's (RIAC) Premier sale on Dec. 6-8, was the equivalent of an advanced course in the history of firearms in America. More than 3,300 antique and contemporary handguns, rifles, shotguns, edged weapons and cannons crossed the auction block during the three-day auction. After the sale grossed \$16 million, firearms collectors came to a long-anticipated conclusion: Oil paintings may no longer be America's most expensive antique.

Prices on a few select lots – those with direct ties to sharpshooter Annie Oakley, President Andrew Jackson, Civil War General George McClellan and firearms innovator Samuel Colt – blasted holes in the price ceiling at the Rock Island venue

December's top lot was a Marlin Model 1897 lever action .22 caliber rifle. It was presented to Annie Oakley (1860-1926) at the Marlin factory in New Haven, Conn., on March 25, 1903. Oakley's gold-plated rifle was engraved with vines, scrolls and game scenes and included a personalized silver presentation plaque. The engraver was assumed to be Conrad Ulrich Jr., Marlin's master engraver at the time. The one-of-a-kind rifle sold for \$575,000. All selling prices include a 15 percent buyer's premium.

General George Brinton McClellan (1826-1885) is remembered as the officer President Lincoln removed from command after the 1862 Battle of Antietam, and the civilian who in 1864, ran against Lincoln for the presidency. In 1863, in recognition of his service to the country, the president of Colt Manufacturing presented General McClelland with a Colt Model 1850 Army revolver engraved by Gustave Young. The historic .44 caliber pistol, accompanied by a letter from the Colt factory, sold for \$299,000.

The handgun that took first place among the sale's 1,373 other revolvers and pistols was an 1879 Colt single action Army (SAA) revolver with ivory grips and engraving on almost every exposed metal surface. The Colt's three engraved panel scenes set it apart. Just below the chamber on one side was a buffalo hunting scene; verso was a bear

# Heisey glass and radios will spark interest at A-OK sale

ABINGDON, Va. – On March 7, A-OK Auctions will be conducting an eclectic sale, comprised of more than 100 working vintage radios, hundreds of pieces of high-end Heisey glass, Native American artifacts, firearms and much more.

The majority of the 350 lots – many of them multiple piece offerings – are from the estates of two "very passionate collectors," according to Auctioneer Alan Shope. The Heisey glass is from the collection of the late Madalene N. Beavers, who according to Shope, was a long-time glass collector and an expert on Heisey glass. She died in 2014 at the age of 81, living much of her life in Bristol, Va.

The Heisey glass will be sold in large multi-piece lots, including a lot of 66 yellow pieces and a lot of 40 green Heisey pieces.

The vintage radios come from the collection of the late Frederick V. Perdue, who died in 2019 at the age of 77. Perdue was a life-long aviator, who after his retirement in the quality control department of General Electric Corporation collected and repaired radios. He lived in Atkins, Va.

"Both of these individuals were very passionate collectors," Shope said. "And they were very knowledgeable in their respective fields. Perdue repaired his own radios as a hobby. I've not seen so many radios in an auction in a long time."

Shope will also be selling hundreds of radio tubes and related parts, again in multi-piece lots throughout the day

Also included in the sale will be several lots of Native American stone tools, arrow and spear points, axe heads, fossils (including an Enchodus fish fossil with teeth, estimated to sell for up to \$1,000) and game mounts.

Both automatic pistols and rifles will cross the auction block, as well as a Colt

# Sparks of life for brown furniture

DESTIN, Fla. – Charles Green has a message for the "naysayers" within the antiques industry: The antique market remains strong and viable; if your shop or online business is not thriving, you're not presenting to the public what it wants to buy.

Green, as director of the Asheford Institute of Antiques in the Panhandle of northwest Florida, maintains he has an appreciable amount of data indicating that the public is still very interested in collecting and decorating with antiques. As director of the academic enterprise created by his father, Peter C. Green, in 1966, he has maintained a close relationship with many of the more than 150,000 graduates who have matriculated from the school during the past half-century.

The Asheford Program consists of more than 120 classroom credit hours, including an accredited instructional curriculum involving the study of antiques, vintage items, collectibles, estate sale liquidations and professional-level appraising services. The program, which went online in 2015, may be completed between eight and 12 months, although coursework up to four years is available.

"The antique industry is quite different from the 1980s," Green says. "But, today, the naysayers refuse to accept the fact that things have changed, and that they need to change with the times to be successful."

Each year, the Institute releases an informal survey among current students and past graduates who work within the antiques, collectibles and vintage marketplaces throughout the United States and Canada (both urban and rural areas). Traffic on the Institute's website spikes each January after the survey is posted, according to Green.

"A lot of dealers and other people in the industry look to us as something of a bellwether as to what's selling – and what isn't," Green says.

The focus of the survey is directed toward interest in current market trends, conducted by the research staff at the Asheford Institute, from January to December of 2019. The survey, informal nature, does not use any standardized or measurable scientific practices or criteria in obtaining results. However, it is very informative as to what antique entrepreneurs are experiencing throughout North America.

Among the survey's findings are:

Mid-Century Modern, although still "hot,"



hunting scene. A Native American warrior in full headdress on horseback decorated the back strap. Kevin Hogan, president of RIAC, attributed the work to master engraver Gustave Young (1827-1895). The gun, nicknamed the Peacemaker, was believed to be part of a Colt traveling exhibition that toured Europe in the late 19th century. RIAC officials speculate that this is one of only five such Colt SSAs. Its sale price of \$517,500 was a clear indicator of its rarity.

That stunning figure did not quite reach the \$1.03 million that a Colt Walker, E Company Number 120 revolver brought in RIAC's September Premier sale. In 2019, RIAC sold not one, but four handguns for over \$1 million. No wonder the year just passed set a record for the Illinois company. When all the

despite slipping a "notch or two," is still by and large the biggest hit with the decorative arts category. Once primarily, the domain of furniture aficionados, MCM has spread to all areas of the collecting marketplace including kitchenware, objects d'art, jewelry and even paintings and sculptures. Aside from classic designers such as Gehry, Jacobsen and Eames, many lesser known names have also become popular, including diamond metal work chairs by Harry Bertoia, cone-chairs by Verner Panton and knock-off chaise loungers from Charlotte Perriand have all skyrocketed in value.

Textiles "is the biggest single move we've seen in one year," the survey acclaims. "Vintage clothing ... has exploded all over the world ... Vintage jeans, sneakers and outerwear are leading the pack, but high-end dresses and hand-bags are close behind. Dealers who are incorporating this into their stock with other vintage and antique items are reporting exceptionally strong sales. Dresses and gowns from American designer James Galanos, whose high-end work matched the best of Europe's elite couture are examples of pieces that can command handsome sums, with many dealers reporting a three-fold increase in price and demand over the last year."

NASA's recent 50-year commemoration of the moon landing launched virtually every space collectible into orbit last summer. Many dealers reported massive mark-ups on selected items, especially those that had a direct connection to the actual mission; including photos, posters, signatures and toys. Also, along for this ride to the stars, were Star Wars and Star Trek collectibles and other forms of sci-fi memorabilia - especially items related to rocket ships.

Costume Jewelry, now nearly a perennial favorite, the survey results indicates demand for good vintage and antique costume jewelry remains high, while supplies are cited as "scarce," resulting in strong overall prices. Designer names such as Bogoff, Barcley and Trifari are all in high demand by dealers and buyers alike, with even lesser-known marquee designers such as Haskell, Carnegie, Florenza, Kramer and Coventry commanding more interest and strong prices.

Toys - another perennial favorite continues its rise in price and interest, as younger dealers are investing heavily in the toys of their youth. Popular this year were many Marvel Comicrelated items and figures, which saw hefty increases in value due, in large part, to accompanying movie releases. Near the top of the list were items from the 1960s through the 1990s, Guns, GI Joe sets, Batman action figures and anything Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles.

Vinyl Records – for the first time in decades, the survey noted, vinyl records "actually outsold CDs, as collectors clamored for rare examples of original presses." Prime examples from The Beatles White Album, anything Elvis Presley, the Sex Pistols and Bob Dylan's Freewheelin' album topped the charts for many collectors this year. Original pristine album jackets are a must for top prices.

"Aside from textiles, no other traditional category has made such a dramatic move up the charts this past year than items from the Victorian era," according to the survey. Dealers and East Coast pickers are reporting that cash-poor millennials are snapping up cheaply priced Victorian pieces as an alternative to buying new, and with an eye to helping the environment. "Elder statesmen of the

antiques and vintage trade seem to concur with younger dealers that Victorian era furniture may once again be on the rise," according to the survey. Leading the charge were drop-leaf tables, bookshelves, bookcases, whatnots, hutches, washstands, chests-ofdrawers and chairs, with dealers also noting that quirky pieces and decorative items were also starting to sell. Victorian mirrors and paintings are also seeing an upswing, according to

Lighting - "Moving way up the charts from last year, dealers in this category reported strong sales in virtually every era for lighting," the survey reported. "Desk models, floor lamps, table lamps and even chandeliers all posted strong sales," according to survey respondents. While MCM styles were prevalent in popularity, dealers indicated the late Victorian-inspired pieces were also moving well.

Automobilia/Petrolina - Once again demand, particularly of top-shelf inventory, is outstripping supply. Antique and vintage dealers report that sales in this category continues to show sustained growth with competition among dealers for the "best of the best" from auto emblems and signage, to oil cans and gas pumps remains tight as prices are expected to continue to rise. Baby-boomers continue to prop-up prices in this category with the sale of ancillary items, such as road maps, license plates and promotional clocks and automotive decals.

Western Collectibles are still a hot item among the decorative arts market during the past three years with interest spreading beyond the traditional geographic boundaries of the United States. "Cowboy art of any kind showed and sold well in many galleries, as did photos of gold rush scenes, famous gunslingers and old Western towns. Also, popular are leather gun holsters, belts with engraved buckles, silver spurs and leather stagecoach trunks. Famous Western artwork from Catlin, Bierstadt and Remington are on the rise, as well as the work of lesser-known artists Frank Johnson, Bert

Long depressed, Georgian furniture appears to be making a comeback, according to the Asheford survey. "Recent pricing figures for top-of-theline pieces suggests that the worst may be over for this decorative arts stalwart, as quality examples of hall tables, chairs, dining room tables ands sideboards are reportedly selling quite well in the Northeast and Southeast (United States)," the survey claims. Surprisingly, dealers from other regions are also indicating that "brown furniture" may be gaining traction within the market with prices appearing to rise.

Once thought to be "dead in the water," many glass categories "actually overperformed," according to survey such as original in-box Super-Soaker results coming in from the West Coast. The art glass market is strong with both collectors and the general public, drawn to bold colors and fanciful shapes which are capable of blending with a broad array of décor. "On the other hand, pressed glass remains stuck in the doldrums, as do most other forms of non-vintage and non-retro inspired pieces." Many dealers have reported stockpiling Depression glass, due to its plentiful supply and low cost, in hopes they may see a profit later.

> The Asheford survey first became public about 10 years ago, according to Green. "That's when we formally began collecting data," he says. "Every year we see an increase in participation. We saw an increase of 15 percent in the past year, and we keep adding vast amounts of data influencing the market each year. By sharing this data, we assist our mission of keeping the industry strong and viable."
